## Molotov Ends Second Jaunt Across Nation

NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov ended his second trans-continental tour of the United States in two weeks today with his return to New York on the last lap of his trip here.

Molotov rolled into New York on the New York Central's Commodore Vanderbilt with a small army of red officials and secret policemen.

He made two train trips across the United States as he journeyed to and from the 10th anniversary meeting of the United Nations at San Francisco.

He got a good look at Americans and Americans got a good look at him—particularly in Chicago where he paid another unpolite visit late yesterday and heard himself called a "bum."

Molotov apparently intended no repetition of the confusion and traffic jams which accompanied his first stopover in the windy city June 11.

## Lost

DENVER, June 28 (AP)—A deer brought the jet age to a halt for 20 minutes yesterday at Lowry air force base here.

### Steelworkers Policy Group Okays Strikes

PITTSBURGH, June 28 (AP)—The CIO United Steelworkers' policy committee yesterday authorized a nationwide strike by Union President David J. McDonald said "do not get the idea we are strike happy."

The 170-member committee voted unanimously to give McDonald authority to strike the basic steel industry in mid-July. The union is not yet reached on union demands for a substantial wage increase.

Shortly after the committee action, U. S. Steel corporation, the world's biggest steel producer, announced that its top negotiator, Vice President John Stephens, would meet with McDonald Tuesday morning.

There was no indication whether big steel would submit a new proposal. At a news conference following the meeting, McDonald said: "I am still optimistic. There is some hope for a peaceful settlement."

Then the labor leader, who never has called a strike in his three years as head of the union, said he would not necessarily strike all steel companies at once "if such action is required."

At the point, McDonald said "it is possible that the union would make the services of its members available to some companies and not others through agreement is reached with them."

McDonald said he is still presenting a substantial wage increase and added he has never used a cents-per-hour figure "even in negotiations with the companies."

## State May Get 14-Millions in AEC Fund Act

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—The house passed by voice vote and with-out opposition yesterday a bill authorizing a \$267,700,000 construction program for the atomic energy commission including more than 14 million dollars earmarked for Idaho. The bill goes to the senate, where it may be considered today.

Subject to appropriations which must be provided in separate legislation, the bill gives the go-ahead for construction of new projects at 10 installations throughout the country. It also authorizes a 25 million-dollar nuclear power reactor for use in a surface ship adaptable for either military or commercial use.

President Eisenhower had requested 21 million dollars to start a nuclear-powered ship to demonstrate peaceful uses of atomic energy throughout the world. The senate-house atomic energy committee rejected this proposal in favor of the convertible reactor.

In numerous instances, the committee deleted the site of the project or security reasons. Approved projects for which the site was chosen included:

Aircraft nuclear propulsion program plant and test site, Idaho, \$600,000. Modifications and expansions to aircraft nuclear propulsion ground test plant, Idaho, one million. Reactor core test facility, Idaho, \$600,000. Reactor facilities modifications, Stanford, Wash., \$1,900,000. Special reactor facility equipment, Hanford, \$5,000,000. Modifications to separations and processing facilities, Hanford, \$2,500,000.

Expansion and modification of ore processing plant, Monticello, Utah, \$1,550,000. Additional housing units, Monticello, Utah, \$250,000. Water and sewer replacements and improvements, Richland, Wash., \$160,000.

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**Russia Tries to Sabotage Big U. N. Atom-for-Peace Meeting**

By United Press  
Soviet Russia is trying to sabotage the United Nations conference on President Eisenhower's atom-for-peace plan.

The U. N. meeting is to be held in Geneva, Switzerland, Aug. 8 to Aug. 20. Sixty nations are to attend.

Now it has been announced that the academy of sciences of the Soviet Union has invited scientists of 41 countries to attend a special five-day meeting on nuclear energy in Moscow, starting July 1.

There can be no doubt, of course, that the meeting was arranged by the Soviet government. Nor can there be any doubt that its aim is to take the edge off the Geneva conference.

Scientists who attend the Moscow meeting are sure to be treated to show that Russia leads the world in

peaceful purposes.

Most likely the Soviet government will take the opportunity to make some big announcement on its atom-for-peace plans. It may even elect to unveil some of its developments in that field.

This is indicated especially as it appears that the Moscow meeting was decided upon rather suddenly.

Originally, the Russians had invited Japan, India, Burma, Communist China and the Soviet satellite countries to the conference.

Last Tuesday, the Moscow radio said that it had been decided "a few days ago" to invite delegates from the other countries.

The Russian invitations were sent to academies of science in the countries concerned, not to governments.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 28 (AP)—William W. Wood, who said his secretary—a 16-year-old deposit—were being taken from him, filed suit yesterday for 25 million dollars damages. He named eight defendants.

In his suit Wood said he knew of an important ore vein in Clark county and had arranged with the defendants to advance money for exploration and development and to set up a corporation. He was to get a substantial interest in the corporation in exchange for revealing location of the ore and for his formula for processing it.

The deal didn't go through, he continued, but the defendants acquired title to the property. Wood wants an injunction restraining them from selling the land plus 25 million in damages.

# Cost of Government Cited as Reason For Series of Overlapping Taxations

WASHINGTON, June 28.—A federal commission said today the high cost of government is the main reason for the series of overlapping federal, state and local taxes. The commission studied the problem for almost two years.

The best chance to reduce overlapping, the commission said, would be in a "major reduction" of the total tax burden by American citizens.

The commission did not attempt to guess when a "major reduction" of the tax load might be possible. However, it noted a tendency to demand more public services than people are willing to pay for.

The report was made by the commission on interest in the taxations, a group first proposed by President Eisenhower and then created by congress in 1953.

The combination of federal, state and local taxes now takes more than 27 percent of the total national income—more than 41 out of every 100 dollars.

The commission filed with President Eisenhower a 90,000-word report on the whole field of interest in the taxations.

It offered some specific recommendations on a wide range of activities. In addition to taxes, they included such fields as agriculture, aviation, education, highways, housing, civil defense, public health, employment security and welfare.

The commission is entirely separate from the Hoover commission which has been making a series of reports on purely federal functions—recommending changes which it estimated would save the taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars a year.

The inter-governmental study group was headed by Meyer Rosenstein, former secretary of the Federal Reserve, and Charles E. Schaffner and Marx Clothing Company.

Centralization was the keynote of the commission's proposals. It listed a "proper division of civil responsibilities" along the lines often expressed by President Eisenhower.

# Americans Patronizing New Pay-as-You-Go Stock Buying

NEW YORK, June 28.—Americans at the rate of 10 a week are signing up for a pay-as-you-go venture in the stock market.

In a year and a half since the New York stock exchange set up its "monthly investment plan," the business has attracted 1.2 million owners, but many are known to be persons who are investing in stocks for the first time in their lives, and on a "nick-and-dime" basis.

The "New York stock exchange monthly investment plan" was introduced in January, 1954, and reported this week that more than 34,000 new investors had begun the systematic program of accumulating stocks. They can invest as little as \$40 every three months.

The exchange said these investors have picked up about 600,000 shares of common stock in 18 months. Over 90,000 showed up at the exchange and more than 100,000 have arrived in Cadillac. Most came by subway.

### 45-Year Career of Seed Firm Aide Reflects Industry Growth

Next Friday will mark the retirement of William Middleton, 127 Pierce street, from Northrup King and company after 45 years of continuous service with the organization.

Having no particular plans for the future, Middleton says he has seen the company's local plant grow since 1930 to the point where it now plants more than it produced 25 years ago.

Middleton has seen the farmers switch from the horse and buggy to what is now an almost complete mechanized industry. "In the olden days the farmers would haul the seeds with teams," he says. "Now they drive up in trucks."

"The neighborhood spirit in the farming business is gone," he states. It used to be that the employment of the big threshing machine was quite an event. Five or six farmers would get together and really go to work.

"What used to be the time for some excellent feeds. Nowadays the farmer doesn't even know what his next door neighbor is doing. The huge combines have become the property of most everybody and have taken away the charm of fellowship between the farmers in an area."

Middleton says the mechanization of the farming business has not increased the quality of seeds. The crops are harvested in a faster and more efficient way, he says.

Discussing Magic Valley farming, Middleton says he has seen crop failures in this area caused by the while fly many years ago. Generally speaking, he says, the area is excellent for peas and beans. His company also deals in turnips, clover and alfalfa, onions and carrots, but on a smaller scale.

Middleton says production varies from year to year depending upon demand. The company furnishes the seeds. Explaining the growth of the local plant, he says there are now 75 employees here while the figure before the war stood at 25.

The local plant works in direct contact with its headquarters at Minneapolis, Minn. Deliveries are made in all 48 states, Canada, Europe and Australia according to orders received from the main office.

Middleton was born in Aberdeen, Scotland, in December, 1893. He came to the United States in 1909 and only a few days later began working for Northrup, King and company in Minneapolis.

In 1918 he took over as manager of the company's plant at St. Anthony. He came to Twin Falls as manager in 1930. During the past year he had worked in the capacity of manager-consultant.

Middleton says he has no definite plans for the future. He might do some fishing and hunting. He doesn't think he'll be going back to Scotland. He did go back once. "That was in 1929 and my mother was still living," he says.

He finished school and went to work at the age of 12 in his native Scotland. He did go back once. "That was in 1929 and my mother was still living," he says.

Middleton registered for army service in World War I but never was called. He was in agriculture and considered of vital importance to the country's welfare.

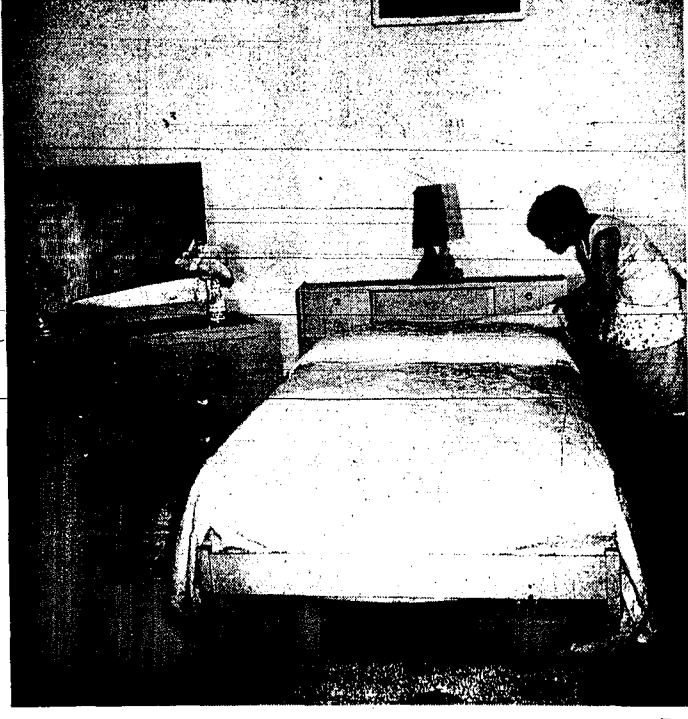
