BOISE, June 29 (AP)—Idaho Power commission yesterday criticized a federal commission examination which would require the company to employ a dam in the area.

The commission, which was set up last year, has been criticized for 34 exceptions to the rule that a dam must be built to protect the public power advantage of the federal government on a large dam.

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State Will Seize All Water Rights In South Dakota

PIERRE, S. D., June 29 (AP)—Effective July 1, every drop of water in South Dakota will become state property.

Whether the water is on the ground or under the ground—or for that matter, in the air overhead—it will, under a 1950 law, be converted to public use and controlled for public protection.

The water will be controlled by a water resources commission. This group will include representatives of the various groups interested in water—dry land farmers, livestock producers, cities, miners, soil conservationists and others.

Like Notes Chances For Easing World Tensions Brighter

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—President Eisenhower said today he believes that chances of easing world tensions and fears are better than he thought two months ago.

He told a news conference he based this at least partly on what he had learned of last week's United Nations anniversary meeting in San Francisco.

The President said he is trying not to expect too much from next month's Big Four "summit" meeting at Geneva.

President Hits Demo Claims of Cooperation

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—President Eisenhower today challenged—almost angrily—Democratic claims of accomplishments on his legislative program at this session of congress.

He read to a news conference a long list of unpassed legislation which, he said, is vital to the United States.

Mr. Eisenhower said he is happy to have cooperation from any congressional quarter. But he said he thinks someone is confused as to where the blame for non-completion or failure should be placed.

Congress Approves Extension for Draft

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—Congress approved a four-year extension of selective service yesterday and, over bitter opposition of the house, voted a two-year extension of the doctors and dentists' draft.

The legislation now goes to the White House for President Eisenhower's signature. Both draft laws would expire at midnight Thursday unless extended.

Reserve Plan Gets Okay of House Group

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—The house armed services committee yesterday approved a military reserve program that has been snarled up to now on a racial segregation controversy.

The controversy is due to be resumed when the house takes up the revised bill, probably late this week.

The senate is expected to act on the bill on Monday. It would authorize a 1,000,000 military reserve force to 200,000 men by 1950.

Air Newsman Discloses Red Party Ties

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—CBS news correspondent Winston Burdell testified today that he was a member of the Communist party for two years, from 1942 to 1944, and engaged in espionage abroad for the communists.

Burdell told the senate internal security subcommittee he joined the party when he was an editorial writer on the Brooklyn (N. Y.) Daily Eagle in 1942. He named 12 other employees of the now defunct Eagle who, he said, also were members of the communist unit on the newspaper. The newspaper ceased publication this year.

Diving to Cease For Boy's Body

BOHNSHON, June 29 (AP)—Divers continued to probe the murky depths of the Little Wood river Wednesday morning for the body of Charles "Chappy" Robinson, 12, who disappeared last week.

Leo Wescott and Thomas Climas, both Boonshon, worked in the water Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning, reaching the bottom of several deep holes. They reported no heavy objects in any of them and said they believe the body may have drifted down river.

Air Force Cautiously Reports Effort To Win 'Intercontinental Missile' Race

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—The air force said cautiously yesterday it was making "advances" in developing an intercontinental ballistic missile.

American and Russian scientists are in a race to perfect this weapon, which could bombard targets on another continent with nuclear-explosive rockets.

Tuesday's terse reference to it was contained in the semi-annual report of the department of defense and the armed services.

Prop Program Changeover Is Set for Friday

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—The government will make its first shift Friday from high, rigid farm price supports of the Truman era to flexible price floors sponsored by the Eisenhower administration.

The changeover was authorized by congress last year, to take effect with the start of marketing seasons for the crops affected by the shift—wheat, corn, cotton, rice and peanuts.

Nebraska City Nabs Pair for Robbery Here

Two teenage youths sought in connection with the safe robbery at Lincoln, Nebraska, early Saturday were arrested about 3 p. m. Tuesday in York, Neb. The robbery netted \$10,000.

Robert McCoy, 17, of Twin Falls, and James Houston, 16, of Hansen, have admitted their part in the safe robbery in Lincoln, Neb. They were arrested by York police Chief William Wolf to Twin Falls Police Chief Howard Gillette.

Israel's Premier, Government Quit

TEL AVIV, June 29 (AP)—Israeli Premier Moshe Sharett and his government resigned today.

President Isaac Ben-Zvi immediately named a new cabinet and called consultations in an effort to form a new government.

The truck, carrying a load of lumber, was traveling south on the highway when it struck the car, which was traveling north.

BOISE, June 29 (AP)—State Police Sgt. A. E. Perkins said today 16 new patrolmen will be on the highways this Fourth of July week-end with instructions to crack down on "moving hazard" traffic violations.

These are the violations that most often cause fatal or injurious highway accidents, Perkins said.

Doctor Gives Expansion of Talk on Polio

Widespread polio is a distinct possibility, although there is no way of telling, according to a report by Dr. Robert H. Coe, R. H. Reinhold said Wednesday in clarifying a talk he gave Tuesday for the Exchange Club.

"We do not know what will happen during our normal polio season," Dr. Reinhold said. "It may be that through widespread dissemination of the virus, a substantial immunization of the population will occur. On the other hand, this widespread dissemination may create a very high incidence of polio."

Meeting Sets Early Potato Crop Rulings

BOISE, June 29 (AP)—The Idaho-Oregon potato control committee approved yesterday regulations for the early potato crop, virtually the same as last year's.

The only change is in the maximum number of tubers per acre, which will be 100 per acre, up from 80 per acre last year.

Amazon Warriors Battle GI's Of Viet Name, Reports Note

SAIGON, Indochina, June 29 (AP)—Soldiers of the Viet Namese national army are returning from the jungles and rice fields of western Cochinchina with word of a new and ferocious enemy: Woman warriors.

These modern amazons wear black shirts and trousers and black scarves around their heads. They wield swords and daggers. They like to fight at close quarters, or better yet, to take prisoners alive and kill them slowly by mutilation.

The women—and there are hundreds of them—are in the army of the rebellious Hoa Hao sect which the government of Premier Ngo Dinh Diem is trying to subdue in the important rice-growing area of the Mekong basin southeast of here.

Soldiers of the national army encountered the women in full battle for the first time a few days ago. The existence of their corps, however, has been known for years.

The women are commanded by Le Thi Gam, wife of Hoa Hao Commander-in-Chief Tran Van Soan, himself an ambitious warlord. Le Thi Gam organized the corps in 1949 with a nucleus of 300 recruits chosen from among the most robust and healthy daughters of the Hoa Hao.

The Hoa Hao is a primitive Buddhist cult which practices sorcery and black magic. One of the cult's beliefs is that its warriors are invincible. "This serves to give the warriors fanatical courage, and the women warriors share it."

Madame Gam gave her amazons commando training and skilled them in the use of knives and swords as well as submachine guns. They tasted first blood in battles with the communists in the Indochina war.

The women sowed panic in communist ranks, rushing into combat at the side of Hoa Hao men and striking with long daggers or sabers.

The prisoners they took were dragged off to jungle hideouts and worked over with knives before being let to die.

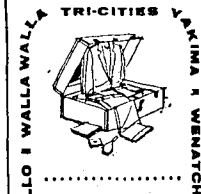

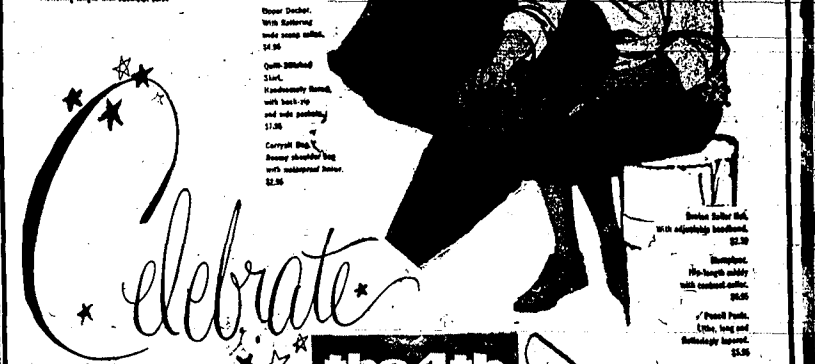

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—David Barrows' outline of an intricate, comprehensive and continuing campaign of economic, political and psychological pressure against Moscow was freighted than any since the inauguration of this administration.

Central intelligence agents, operating within the department of the chief of the bureau, reported on the communist reaction to the vice-like trap which the board chairman of the Russian Corporation was placed before President Eisenhower. TESTS OF OPINION show that the country wants the President to find out what substance, if any, lies behind Russia's new professions of good intent.

OVERHEARD MARGINS, the Senate foreign relations committee and the senate slapped down this proposal.

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Is That So!

As I rose with the sun and saw the sun naturally rise, the sun came out and the pressure of the sun puffed out. I was not really surprised.

Miracle of The Clouds OVER HUDSON BAY—Early this morning, a low, misty fog came out of the sky and covered the bay.

When day cool toward evening, the blue sky was over, now flying will have come again to take on the deep hues of sunset.

Of such is day in June—and surely, no greater wonder exist than an open sky filling and empty of puffy cumulus clouds.

How and why do these woeless, fleecy clouds come down—they there must be water vapor—invincible water particles suspended in the atmosphere. But this is not enough.

It is quite possible for the air to be full of water and yet to be without a cloud—It is usually at night and early morning, but under other conditions, at midday atmosphere with but one-fifth as much moisture in it, can be as thick as pea fog.

What brings the second requirement—The vapor-holding air must be subjected to a temperature change. The vapor-holding air must be cooled and warming of air to bring the cloud and take it away.

Just as in the cup of hot coffee which the attentive G.S. hostess brings me—the hot coffee can dissolve much more sugar than a cold cup. Sugar is hard to stir into cold coffee—will always have sugar left in the bottom. So, too, warm air can hold up more water vapor than cold air.

Actually, the atmosphere can hold over five times as much vapor in the invisible state as air at 32 degrees, or freezing. The reason, incidentally, why my breath steamed when I left chilly Copenhagen last night but will not be seen when I step off the plane at warm Los Angeles this afternoon.

Now, to transform invisible vapor to visible, the warm moist air must get to a colder place where the excess moisture condenses out—in exactly the same way as breath becomes visible when it is puffed from warm lungs into cold air.

Let's imagine that I was hitchhiking a ride on the wingtip of a plane and had brought with me a 40-pound parcel of air at a temperature of 32 degrees containing 15 ounces of invisible water vapor.

Auto Industry Faces Cleanup For Old Cars

DETROIT, June 29 (AP)—The tough job of the year—carrying out an orderly cleanup of outgoing model cars—looms ahead for the nation's auto retailers.

An orderly liquidation of new car stocks means disposing of them without recourse to throat-cutting competition schemes. Right now it does not seem likely the industry can escape some bargain sales later in the year.

The biggest new car inventories in automotive history coupled with the competition and raze-the-stockpile manufacturers for sales leadership could make the retailers' task more difficult this year than it was in 1954 and 1955.

The battles between Chevrolet and Ford for first place in car output and sales and between Buick and Plymouth for third place promise to break out at an even hotter pace during the second half of the year. For these four companies, at least, this means relatively little letdown in assembly line output.

Part of the manufacturers' program to aid in the cleanup operation will be the awarding of cash premiums to dealers for above quota car sales. Such a program is being used in the light among Buick and Oldsmobile on some previous occasions.

This year, however, it apparently is being whipped into shape somewhat earlier. Some industry authorities say the cash award offers encourage dealers to continue price discounting.

Ike's Plans for Vessel Defeat

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—Senate Democrats defeated last night an effort to provide funds for President Eisenhower's atomic peace ship, which critics ridiculed as a "floating museum."

A Republican attempt to restore 21 million dollars to an atomic energy construction bill, was beaten 42-14 on almost a straight line party vote. The money previously had been stricken out in committee.

The amendment to restore it was defeated by the senate only after Reps. used a tactic leaders made strong floor fight. Democrats poked fun at the proposed ship as "the most useless wonder" and "the floating museum."

Report Says Reds Seeking Arm Ban

LONDON, June 29 (AP)—The Communist Daily Worker reported yesterday in a dispatch from Helsinki, Finland, that Russia had offered to halt all tests of atomic and hydrogen weapons as "the first stage in the process of securing a total ban on the use of these weapons."

The Daily Worker, in a propaganda-laden dispatch, said the proposal was made to the so-called "world peace assembly" now meeting in the Finnish capital.

Western correspondents have been barred from the meeting.

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—President Eisenhower may be teased by his New England audiences about his 1956 intentions, but the four only strengthened Sen. Styles Bridges' belief that he'll go for a second term.

Mr. Eisenhower was back in the White House today after a six-day New England trip during which he kept the country guessing with off-the-record hints about 1956. But Bridges, R., N. H., thought the chief executive was already acting like a candidate.

But Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler took an opposite view. He told a radio audience last night he is convinced the President will not seek another term. But Butler said if the Republican party thinks he is the indispensable man, "Democrats will be happy to take him on" and "feel very strongly that we can beat him."

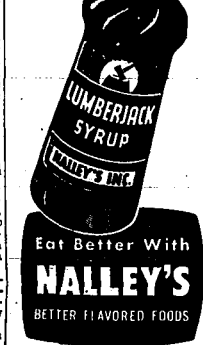

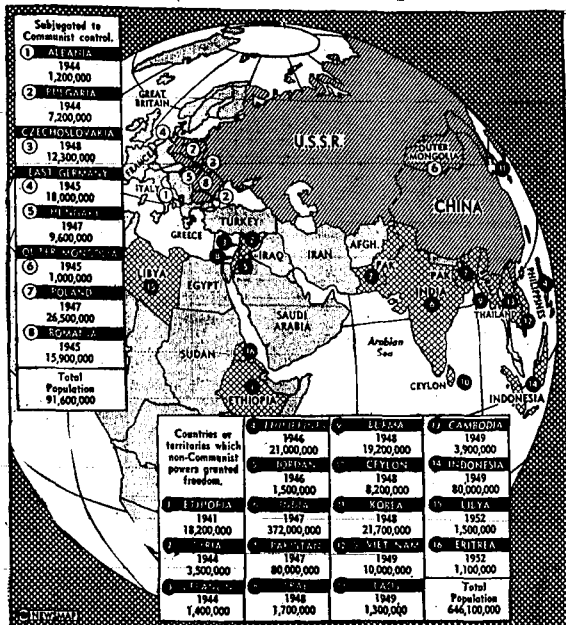

NEW YORK, June 29 (AP)—This is the year good times flattered the cautious. The economy has hit its peak since the recession. Now, the recovery is peacetime. Business becomes "almost too good to be true."

At midyear businessmen are revising their predictions—on the upside, just as they were a year ago. Then, the recession was proving to be much shallower than many had feared earlier. Now, the recovery is proving to be much more vigorous than most had dared to hope. Only the fear of crippling strikes or future inflation clouds the prospects.

Last year the stock market out-paced business. This year industry forces ahead faster than stock prices. Securities have advanced since the first of the year, but often hesitantly, and with overall gains about one half as steep as last year.

This has been a "big ticket" year, with the consumer unquestionably in control. He has been buying, going into debt to buy, the hard yards of peace—autos in record numbers, TV sets, freeters, automatic washers. He continues to buy new homes and their furnishings at an astounding rate.

As a result, the makers of durable goods, and the suppliers of basic materials for them, have been having a field day.

Consumer buying has sent the gross national product—the dollar volume of all the goods and services —to an all-time high of 370 billion dollars.

In the previous peak—365 billions in 1953—it was government spending for defense that furnished the spark.

And now, at midyear, business itself is about to goad the economy to a new pace with more plans for spending more for new plants and equipment.

But he said he had denied now that this point is not material to the issue. The bond holders are asking the court for an order forcing Mrs. Moon to redeem the bonds from this year's appropriation.

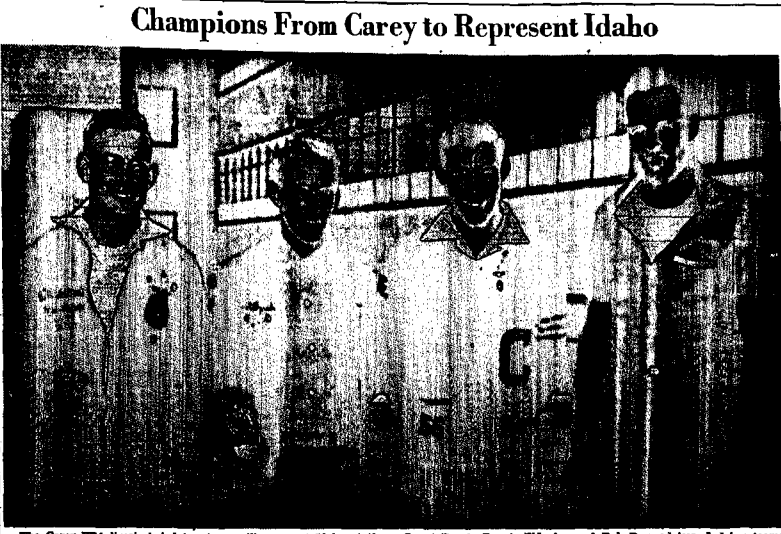

Photography Is Fine Hobby, Says Hank, if You Can Do It

One of the basic American beliefs is that every man should have a hobby. "And there's no better hobby than photography," I told myself as I bought a new candid camera.

Well, Bleichen, Bachrach, Hurrell, and the rest of the celebrated photographers don't have to worry about competition from me. Of the 24 pictures I took, 11 are coal black—there isn't a speck of light to be seen—and the 13 pictures that "turned out" aren't much better. They have a certain similarity, to begin with. The subject is always "way over to the left of the film, with vast expanses of landscape on the other side."

In 20 instances do the feet of my subjects show. And in four of the pictures, only half of the person shows. It makes an interesting study—half a person with no feet. My group pictures could scarcely be called group pictures, though that was the original intention. For instance, I took a picture of four friends and my dog. The camera caught part of the dog—no feet, of course—but the friends were a little too far to the left to get in the picture at all. I don't think I am quite ready yet for convention and banquet pictures.

On looking at my pictures someone suggested that what I needed was a course in composition.

"Oh, I've had composition," I said. "Took that in the fourth of 11th grade. Miss Phopy was my teacher. I remember I won a prize once for the best crayon cover for my composition on a visit with grandmother in the country."

He said he didn't mean that sort of composition, but photographic composition. As I get it, photographic composition is the art of arranging your subjects attractively. You must never photograph a fat man standing next to a barrel, or a porcupine climbing up a cactus.

A photographic "mistake" is that if you ever run across an old, old man with a beard, stick your camera right in his face and get a picture that will show every single whisker in his beard and every line in his face. The result is almost sure to win you the \$10 second prize or the \$5 third prize in any photo-

graphic exhibition. And if he happens to be a real ugly old man you'll have a good chance at first prize; that is, of course, unless some rival has snapped two pickaninnyes eating watermelon with a broken-down wagon as a background. In that case you might just as well stop dreaming of first prize.

The technical details of a candid camera still gave me puzzled. I have all the handbooks around the lens set at certain little notches and I am afraid to move them. As a result, I can only take pictures from a distance of six feet, and in bright sunlight. Most of my shots have been of a friend who happens to be exactly six feet tall. He lies down, I drop a handkerchief where his head rests, and then he stands up and I take a picture of him. Some of my best shots are of this friend.

Another thing is getting the film developed. I've found that developing shops are packed with fibers. They say your pictures will be ready at three in the afternoon, but when you get there, all a flutter to see your handiwork, they're never ready. When they finally are ready about six, they come out all damp and curly, and it's hours before you can paste them in your album and admire them.

As for loading a camera, it is a task that not even Satan would make his most unpopular imp do in his spare time. The instructions for loading that came with my camera have nothing more to do with the job than a book on chafing dish cooking has to do with sailing a three-masted schooner. The only way to load mine is to put both feet on it, and beat it into subjection with a hammer. Anyone seeing me load mine would swear I was beating a wild animal to death.

I think I'll try basket weaving instead.
