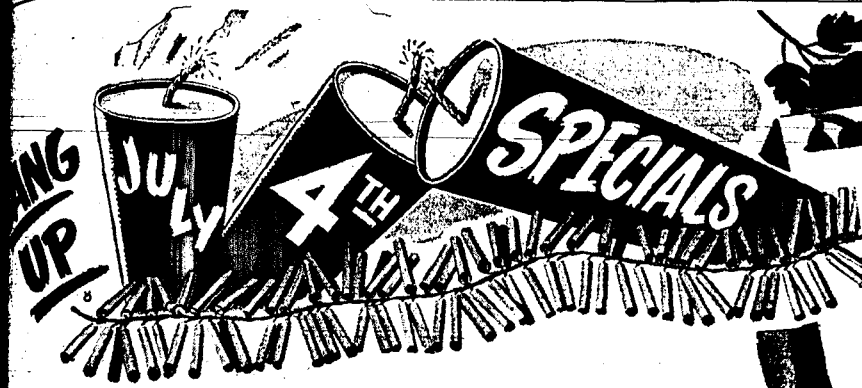

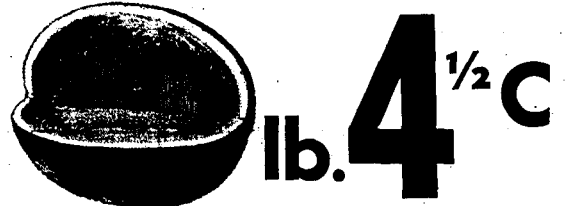

Rebel Troops Are Defeated, Quit Viet Nam

SAIGON, Indochina, June 30 (UP)—Premier Ngo Dinh Diem's loyal troops drove the rebel Hoa Hao armies out of Viet Nam today in the biggest victory of the civil war, the defense ministry announced.

Troops loyal to the American-backed premier hacked into the heart of the seven mountain areas held by the rebels in 48 hours of resolute hand-to-hand fighting and then shattered the resistance with a mighty air and artillery barrage.

The defense ministry said the rebel religious sect, a group of fanatical Buddhists led by Gen. Be Chit, fled in disorder into neighboring Cambodia where they faced internment. Rebel losses were described as heavy.

The scene of the fighting was the rich Cochinchina area which supplies most of the rice and fish for Saigon, 120 miles to the east. The seven mountain areas lie near the west coast only a few miles from Cambodia.

Hunt Is Begun For Red Craft In Philippines

MANILA, P. I., June 30 (UP)—A Soviet tanker anchored overnight in Philippine waters without announcing its arrival and air force ships and planes were ordered to try and detain it, Philippine government officials announced today.

The Philippines do not recognize Russia and no diplomatic steps were taken.

Customs Commissioner Manuel P. Manahan identified the ship as the 10,000-ton tanker Gromey and said he had ordered a full investigation in view of recent reports of subversive activities in the harbor.

The tanker apparently weighed anchor at dawn and there were no reports of its being sighted again. It had anchored about 500 yards from the wharf of Matit, a small Mindanao coastal town on Puncjaco bay.

A spokesman at the U. S. navy's Sangley Point base said "we have been informed" of the incident but indicated there had been no government request for assistance.

Surprise Chief

MANILA, June 30 (UP)—Moral Re-arrangement's world-touring mission called on President Ramon Magsaysay today and surprised him by saying the Philippine national anthem in the native Tagalog language.

Magsaysay said he couldn't sing it in Tagalog himself and added that few Filipinos could. The schools teach it in English.

25-Man Committee Completes Studies Of Federal, State Government Relation

WASHINGTON, June 30 (UP)—The first intensive study since the constitutional convention of 1787 on relations between the federal government and the states has just been completed.

The job was done by a 25-man group set up under the direction of President Eisenhower and called the commission on intergovernmental relations. Appointed in 1953 it has just reported to Eisenhower.

The reason for its creation had its roots in a problem which has plagued this country from the beginning: How to keep a proper division of powers between the federal government and the states.

The problem has become increasingly acute since depression days and the advent of the new deal which widened federal control over the citizens while at the same time giving them new benefits and protections.

Some, but not all, of what the federal government has done might have been done by the states if they had either the willingness or the financial resources.

So the special commission tried to examine this whole picture and make recommendations on what the states should do and what the federal government should do so that the latter would not eventually become all-powerful and dominant.

The commission made some specific recommendations. For example, Education is the states' job and there should not be any general federal aid to education; the federal government should be in full control of civil defense.

In short, the commission suggested less government from Washington, more government by states and local communities. But at this point the report was at its weakest since the commission could only suggest ideas and can't enforce them.

It recommended states and local communities do more for themselves and rely less on the federal government. How can it be done? That's up to the states to do for themselves.

Since what the government does for the people as a whole costs money, there is the endless temptation in the states, which don't want

Camp Kilmer Ready to Go On 'Standby'

CAMP KILMER, N. J., June 30 (UP)—Type will sound for Camp Kilmer tonight.

The post named for poet Joyce Kilmer who was killed in action during World War I will pass to standby status at midnight despite the efforts of local residents to keep it open.

The base was the temporary home for more than 5,000 men and women who passed through here to and from overseas assignment after it was opened in 1941.

Local merchants thrived on its monthly paycheck and thousands of residents were employed on the post.

The move which began last May 17 when the last soldiers processed for overseas assignment left for Europe will be completed about Sept. 1. Only three military men, including the commanding officer, Col. Andrew R. Matthews and 100 civilians will remain.

The overseas replacement and transfer station, which had processed an average of 30,000 soldiers a month for the past 18 months, moved to Ft. Dix, N. J., last month.

The fact that a majority of the 25 commission members agreed on all the recommendations—three were some individual dissents on a number of them—was in part a tribute to the chairman, Meyer Kestbaum.

Sharett Will Head Coalition Cabinet Okayed by Israeli

JERUSALEM, Israel Sector, June 30 (UP)—The Israeli parliament approved early today a new coalition cabinet headed by Premier Moshe Sharett. A 66-32 vote of confidence ended the 24-hour crisis touched off by a break in the old coalition government.

The old cabinet resigned Wednesday. With its resignation, Sharett in effect cracked down on the General Zionist party for refusing to support him on votes of confidence in parliament.

The new cabinet has 12 ministers instead of 16. It excludes the General Zionists and redistributes the ministries they held. It comprises nine members of Sharett's Mapai Labor party, two from the Religious Orthodox Workers party and one from the Liberal Progressive party.

President Yzhak Ben-zvi asked Sharett to form a new government following the resignation of the previous cabinet. The new cabinet is scheduled to arrive as a caretaker government until the July 28 general election. There are 120 seats in parliament.

Deaths Climb

CHICAGO, June 30 (UP)—The National Safety Council said yesterday traffic deaths in the nation climbed in May for the third consecutive month.

The May death toll was 3,080, an increase of 6 per cent over the same month last year. The five-month total this year was 13,860, up 1 per cent over 1954.

South Bend residents also felt the test had been worthwhile. One of them, Jay Money, said "a lot of people thought it was silly. But it might save some lives."

Fish to Find Pair's Invention Of Angling Pole Real Shocker

HAMBURG, Germany, June 30 (AP)—Two inventors here have figured out a way to take all the fun out of fishing. It's an electronic fishing pole, about the most diabolical invention to come out of Germany since the V-1 rocket.

You stick your pole into the water and press a button. All fish within a 10-foot radius stop in their tracks and swing around like compass needles pointing at the tip of your pole. All you have to do then is reach in with a net or your bare hands and pick them out.

Sportsmen already are shouting that there ought to be a law against it, and there probably will be.

But the inventors don't care. Herbert Pregelow and Conrad Kreutzer said they didn't have any anxiety in mind when they devised the "netless" pole, which is what they have christened their shocking brain-child.

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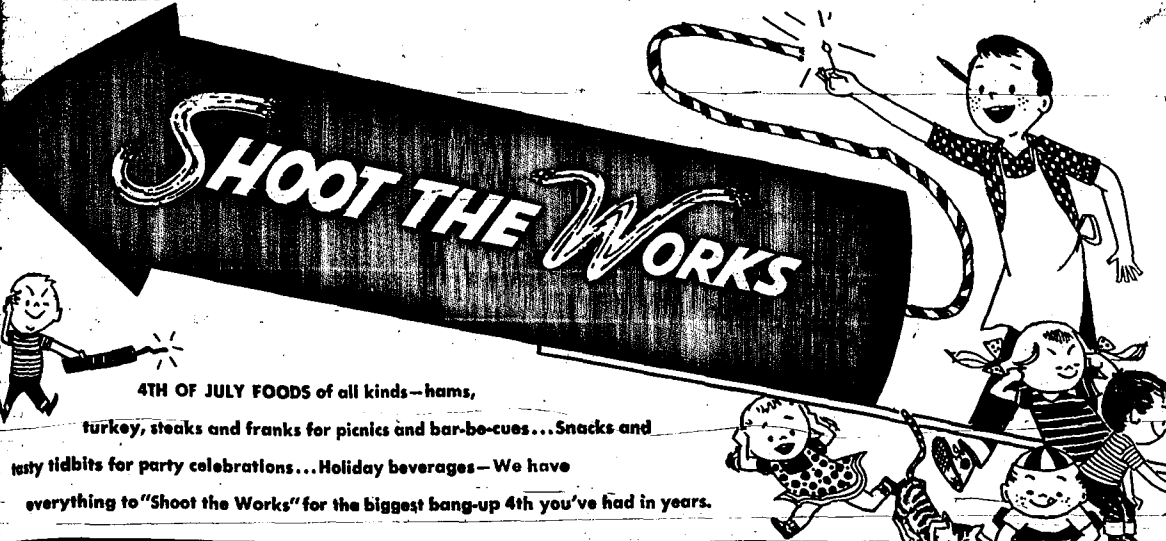

Biggest Year Forecast for Car Industry

DETROIT, June 30 (AP)—The booming automobile industry, whose activity is one of the best pulses of the nation's economy, finished up the first half of 1955 today with the biggest year in its history—the first 7,000,000-car year on record—almost assured.

The fear that many had earlier in the year that the keystone industry wouldn't keep up its rapid early pace was all but gone.

"The only possible trouble in sight appeared to be the threat of a steel strike.

Production was expected to be down for the three-month quarter starting tomorrow, as the industry prepared for model clean-up and introduction of new models. But the "black quarter" will be one which would have looked like a tip-roaring production period in any other year.

With sales still booming at record rates, production is scheduled to slacken to only a 1,500,000 mark early in the July-August-September summer months while the industry finishes selling 1955's and readies plans for 1956.

But 1,500,000 cars for a quarter is turning them out at a better than a six million-car-a-year mark. Only twice before in history—in 1950 and 1953—have more than six million cars been turned out in a year. The record of 5,674,933 in 1950 was expected to be left far behind by Dec. 31 this year.

U. S., Germany Conclude Pact On Assistance

BONN, Germany, June 30 (AP)—The United States and West Germany today concluded a treaty for American aid to German rearmament. German and American officials said the treaty will be signed today by West Germany's newly-appointed Foreign Minister Heinrich Von Brentano and by U. S. Ambassador James B. Conant.

The signing came in the midst of the bitter parliament controversy over the government's plans for the re-division of the army.

After stormy debate in the lower house, the government now is resigned to accept sweeping changes in its defense plans and a probable delay of several months before putting the first young West Germans into uniform.

Details of the American aid treaty have not yet been disclosed. Officials said, however, that it lays down the principles under which the United States will arm, equip and train the army. It does not specify actual quantities of arms, or their cost or means of payment, the source said.

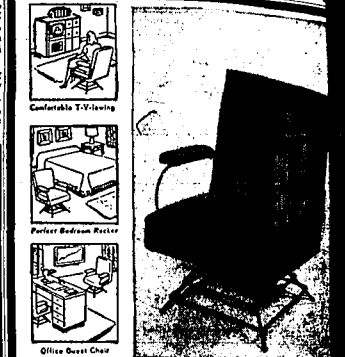

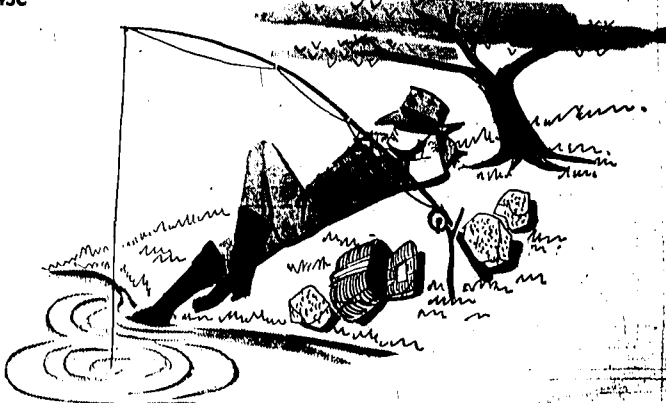

Progress for District Road Work Is Told

BOHOSHONE, June 30 — Highway construction in the district is in full swing, I. H. Cairns, district engineer, reports.

In the Burley vicinity, the Montgomery bridge which crosses the Snake river five miles east of Rupert on U. S. 30 was opened to traffic on June 1. Bridge construction work is complete to a small amount of work remains to be done on approaches and the old bridge is being removed.

Another bridge over Snake river, the Downard bridge, which is located on state highway 77 between Declo and U. S. 30 north, should be open to traffic about the middle of July, the engineer reports. Contractors are driving piling and placing the deck on the bridge this time.

The Heyburn bridge, also over Snake river in the vicinity of Burley and Rupert on U. S. highway 30 north, will be placed during the latter part of July, Cairns said. Contractors are placing the deck this week and the bridge will be completed this month.

A project to remove two sharp reverse curves over a two-mile stretch of U. S. 30 south, known as the "Bumping Curve," is near completion. The contractor is completing grading and placing of the oil mat. Seal coating will be placed during the first part of July.

On U. S. 93 south of Twin Falls near Meteor, a new underpass for the railroad crossing was opened to traffic June 15.

The reconstruction and paving of sections of state highway 50 east of Addison, between the junction to U. S. 93 at Twin Falls city limits was completed on June 30. Construction on state highway 50 extending three and one-half miles north from the city of Jerome is progressing and contractors have completed grading and surface work. The oil mat if being placed this week.

Another county project extending seven and one-half miles north and west of Gooding has the grading completed and the gravel surfacing is now being placed. The oil mat will be completed in August.

Five miles of state highway 46 east of Fairfield is being graded and bridges are being built. Surfacing will be started in August and the work should all be completed by October, the engineer said.

Contractors are placing an oil surfacing on a county project in Blaine county from the junction of U. S. 93 three miles north of Mosier along Antelope creek to the Ouzter county line. This project should be completed by the middle of July.

Grading will be completed by the middle of July, too, on the 12.4-mile stretch north of Shoshone on U. S. 93.

Cairns said he doesn't anticipate being able to award a contract for surfacing and oiling on that project this year.

Work was resumed recently on a 16.5-mile stretch on U. S. 93 over Galena summit. Paving will be done soon and the job should be completed by August. The plan is to lay sharp curves and other minor work will be completed in September.

Awaiting Sacrifice

Rhesus Monkey Situation Is Problem of Vaccine Making

NEW YORK (NEA)—High in the order of problems that stand between mankind and the successful use of the Salk polio vaccine is the Rhesus monkey.

For while each new day brings its new crisis in laboratory tests, commercial production of the wonder serum is seriously threatened—and so, too, is the immunization of the nation's children.

The threat is not in scientific process, or in lack of funds or in labor-management troubles. But strangely this modern medical emergency stands between two ancient points of view: East and west.

The Salk serum is almost wholly dependent upon the Rhesus monkey for production. And the Rhesus monkey is an import from India. But the Hindus, who hold this animal sacred, have stopped the vital shipment of monkeys.

Reason: Before the serum can be made, the monkey must be killed and dissected—a western discovery that comes up against an eastern religious tenet.

According to experts at the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, there is no immediate way out of this corner. In the words of one research executive:

"If we are to have Salk serum produced economically, we need Rhesus monkeys."

It works this way: Poliomyelitis is caused by a virus. And like all viruses, it needs living tissue for growth. The Salk serum itself is made from polio viruses which have been grown in aseptic laboratory conditions in living tissue until they reach an effective strength.

It had been known for years that certain types of monkeys were susceptible to polio in much the same way as humans. The chimpanzee, the cynomolgus, the Rhesus all proved satisfactory — monkeys that came from Africa, India, Malaya, the Philippines.

And so, scientists at work on polio research imported monkeys by the boatload and plane load. Last year and the year before, 70,000 of these chattering, mimicking, peanut eating primates were imported. The monkeys that went to polio experiments were taken by the National Foundation, kept under quarantine to separate the healthy from the sick, and sold to researchers at about \$35 each.

It was the Rhesus monkey, finally, that proved to be the best suited to serum production and tests. Not only did this animal react like a human to the disease, but his tissues allowed the virus to multiply at the highest concentration without introducing other factors.

Hints in Tots' Travel Aired During Meet

NEW YORK, June 30 (AP) — Although 80 per cent of young children are subject to motion sickness, there are a number of ways of having a happily uneventful journey so far as the children are concerned.

One way is "auto-suggestion," Dr. I. Newton Kugelmas, a pediatrician told the first International Symposium on Health and Travel today. Get the children to thinking all will be well, and all will be.

Kugelmas and other physicians agreed that science now has made comfortable traveling possible for everyone—the ill, the infirm, and the young as well as the old. The symposium, timed to coincide with the time of year when family physicians are concerned with the travel problems of vacationing patients, was sponsored by the International record of Medicine and General Practice Clinics, a medical journal.

Kugelmas concentrated on the youngsters whose upsets make traveling, particularly motoring, trying, it's true, to say that young children are more likely to have motion sickness in cars and trains than in planes and ships. The up-and-down motion bothers them the worst.

See that the ventilation in the car is good, that there are no pungent odors and no shrill noises, and don't jam children in with baggage—thus you avoid "predisposing causes," he said. And don't let them get too tired or eat and drink a great deal or read a lot in the car, since eye strain is a predisposing cause, too. But above all, watch the "emotional climate."

Dr. Walter C. Alvarez, editor of "Modern Medicine," said people with heart trouble could fly safely.

 Present wages average from \$14.87 to \$15.77 for an eight-hour day for underground miners and \$15.94-\$14.40 for common laborers.
