Pfost Scores Presidential Sugar Plans

WASHINGTON, July 7.—The American Sugar Beet Industry today God-given right to share in the growth in sugar consumption in this country. Rep. Frank P. Fitzgerald, Idaho, voted at sugar hearings in the House agriculture committee today. Author of a bill to increase domestic sugar quotas next year, Representative Pfost opposed the administration's sugar proposals which he said offer only a small measure of relief to the domestic industry and put their relief off until some time in the future. "We must give some recognition to the progress the American sugar farmer has made in improving his yields and increasing his efficiency, and some relief to pressure of huge inventories which have piled up in spite of efforts to control production," he said. She pointed out that in 1949, when the present sugar act was passed, this country was producing 1,761,000 tons of beet sugar on 116,000 planted acres. Last year, in an effort to keep production in line with the marketing quotas, beet sugar plantings were reduced to less than 93,000 acres. Because of technological improvements, the yield per acre now runs 1 1/2 million tons of beet sugar was produced. This year, she stated, sugar beet acreage has been reduced an additional 15 per cent. "Does this make sense?" she asked. In a nation whose very spirit from the earliest beginnings has been the spirit of progress and growth, it is "ridiculous" to impose stringent penalties on progress, to deny the right to grow within the best of the nation's. Idaho produces 10 per cent of the country's beet sugar. Representative Pfost told the committee, "and it is a cash crop which is the main source of dependable income for many farmers. It buys groceries and clothing and sends the children to school."

Official of Firm Pleads Innocent

William H. Baker, attorney for Frank Dewey, manager of Sun Valley Stages, appeared in Twin Falls police court Wednesday and entered a plea of innocent for his client in charge of illegal solicitations of passengers at Jeehin-ripid. Dewey has violated city ordinance No. 294 which gives Yellow Cab company an exclusive contract with the city for transportation of passengers to and from the airport. Dewey was released Tuesday on \$100 bond and time for his trial will be set later. This is the second time in one week Sun Valley Stages has been charged with violating the ordinance. Baker says the firm has a public utilities commission permit to transport passengers, to and from the airport to Sun Valley—and that a city ordinance can not override such a permit.

Meetings Held Upon National School Issues

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Many thousands of Americans are talking about their schools these days at meetings being held throughout the country. By the time the meetings are over, perhaps as many as one million will have joined in the local, county, and state discussions. These meetings are forerunners to the White House conference on education to be held here Nov. 23 to Dec. 1. Their purpose is to arouse citizen interest in the problems facing their schools and to search for solutions. Chas. Pace, director of the White House conference, said "there never has been such a widespread interest in the schools." This, he said, is reflected by the number of people attending state conference meetings now going on. These meetings, he said, are giving persons concerned about the state of the nation's schools a voice in proposals for doing something about it. The schools have long been struggling with a steadily worsening problem—too few classrooms, too few teachers. An administration program of federal aid for school construction is before congress. The purpose of the current meeting is to study these ills in exhaustive detail and consider how they may best be attacked. —

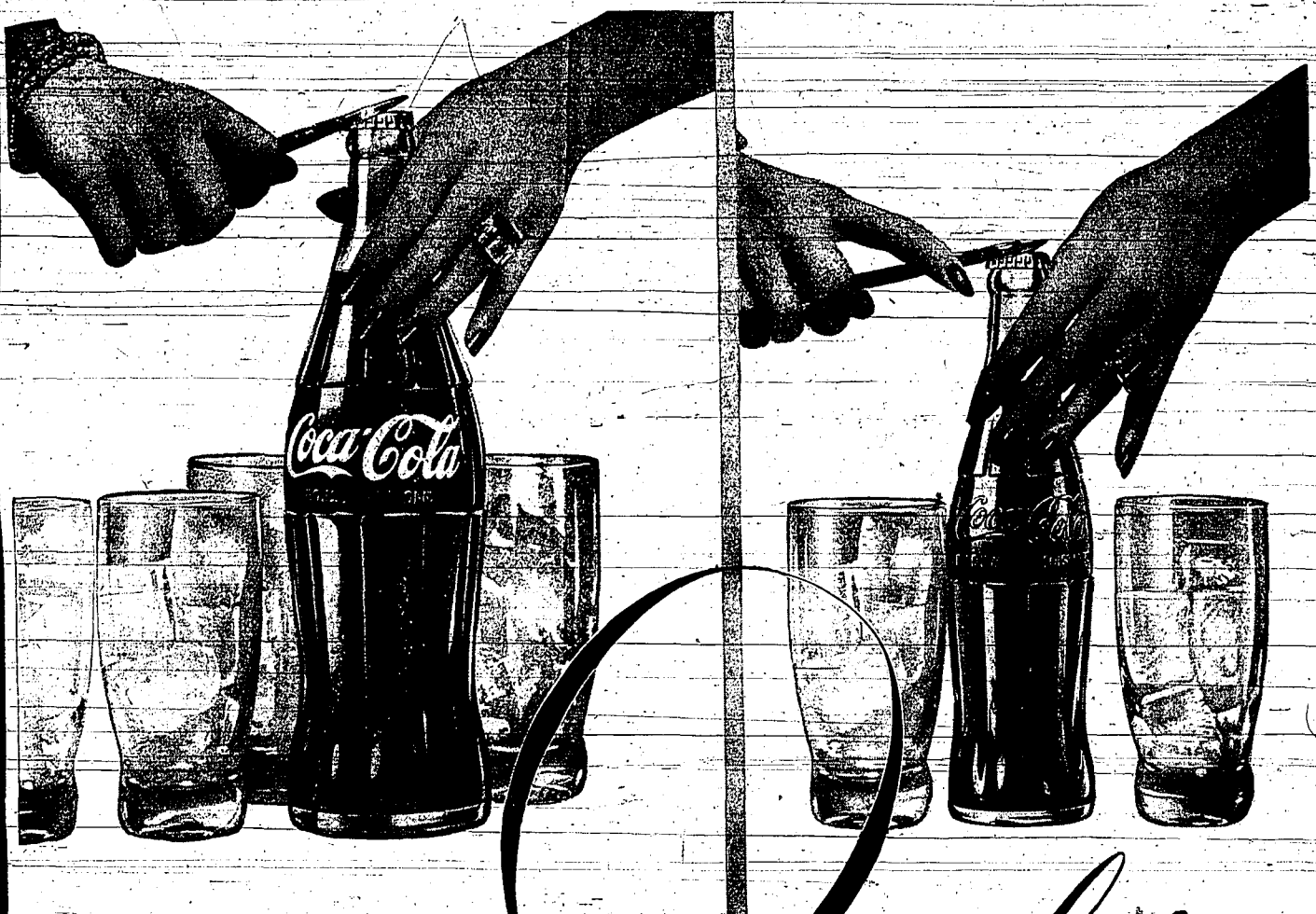

Khrushchev's Address Gives Psychologists Big Field Day

WASHINGTON, July 7.—The psychologist can have a field day analyzing the Krenellin mind after the July 4 speech by Nikita S. Khrushchev, boss of the Russian Communist party.

And President Eisenhower, it seems, will have a double job on his hands when he goes to Geneva July 18 to negotiate about peace with the Russians.

As Khrushchev was going to negotiate and his Kremlin friends sound self-conscious and flustered by a feeling of inferiority.

Khrushchev, considered by many to be the real boss of Russia, told Americans in the garden he wanted to make a speech. He said that if the western powers treat the Russians as equals at Geneva, "something may come of it."

It probably never has occurred to people in the west to look down their nose at the Russians, who have the largest land army in the world, have made astonishing progress with the atom bomb and are probably ahead of the United States in the production of some kinds of jet planes.

Khrushchev, holding a highball glass as he stood under an elm at a party at the U. S. embassy in Moscow three days ago, made himself and his Kremlin friends sound self-conscious and flustered by a feeling of inferiority.

Khrushchev, considered by many to be the real boss of Russia, told Americans in the garden he wanted to make a speech. He said that if the western powers treat the Russians as equals at Geneva, "something may come of it."

It probably never has occurred to people in the west to look down their nose at the Russians, who have the largest land army in the world, have made astonishing progress with the atom bomb and are probably ahead of the United States in the production of some kinds of jet planes.

The west's trouble with them has never been their ability or intelligence but solely over their intentions and their tactics.

But even as he indicated the Russians feared they might be treated as inferiors, Khrushchev became more self-destructive. He gave an impression of worry that the Americans might not believe his words for the Kremlin.

He looked around and said Premier Nikolai Bulganin, who had suggested that they had been speculation in the American press that perhaps Russia needed time off from military preparations because of farm shortages and lagging industrial production.

"Day Mines the boss is a Blue Goose group."

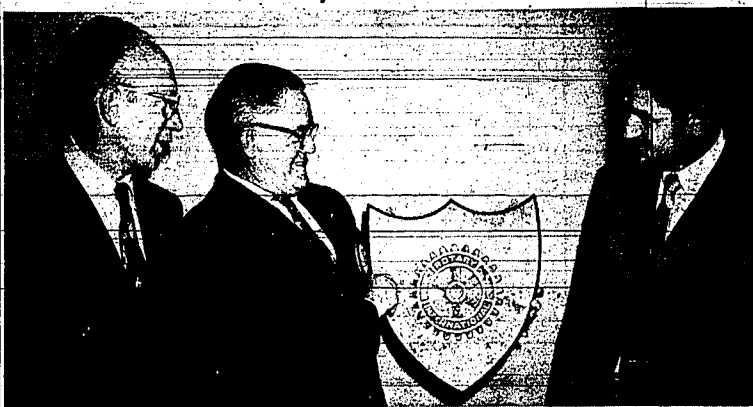

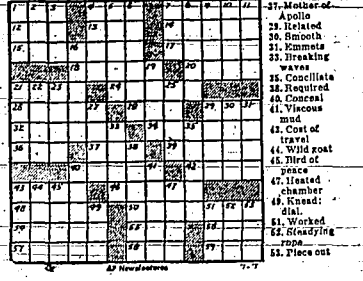

"Is Beer Intoxicant?" Issue

Is Challenged by Scientists

NEW YORK, July 7 (AP)—Let's all start being truthful with our words, says a Yale university professor, "no one gets drunk on beer, and so beer is not an intoxicating beverage."

Prof. Leonard A. Greenberg, a scientist who demands that we change our way of speaking of beer, has stirred a storm among scientists devoted to the effects of alcohol on human beings.

Greenberg worked it out this way:

1. The man whose bodily and mental functions have not been shown unambiguously abnormal is not drunk.

2. For an "intoxicating" beverage to make the man drunk by causing unmistakable abnormalities, it must get into the blood in a concentration of at least 0.15 per cent.

3. The capacity of the human stomach is one and one-half to two ounces of alcohol content of beer. In 37 percent of weight, the man is not intoxicated; he would have to have two and one-half quarts of beer in his stomach at one time. And that's impossible.

The body eliminates and destroys beer at a rate of about one-third of a quart an hour. Therefore, for the man to get drunk on beer by degree, he would have to drink three quarts or more within one to three hours. That, Prof. Greenberg argues, is not the least "physiologically intolerable."

His views were set forth in the official journal of the famous Yale studies of alcohol and alcoholism, Greenberg, an authority on physiology, explained that he was concerned only with definition and with straight thinking. Certainly, he said, the alcoholic should never touch beer — they should drink nothing containing alcohol. If the alcoholic ever had that college students show "considerable exuberance and excessive and noisy activity" in the past of constituting a nuisance, rudeness, and misbehavior while drinking beer. But that is not because they're intoxicated, since they behave as such without drinking "in any other situations as athletic events, public celebrations, rallies, riots, and so forth."

The journal published his views with seeming unease, since they were preceded by an international one of the editors. Dr. Selvid D. Bacon, and followed by four distinguished scientists.

Bacon, praised "his more careful definition of intoxication." He saw the danger of a word which has two meanings separates facts from the emotional coloration given it by the public. But changing the definition of what is and what isn't intoxicating could raise such problems.

"If people are told that some beverages containing alcohol are not intoxicating beverages, will they not feel that such beverages are not really alcoholic beverages and therefore as free of danger as sarsaparilla or milk?"
