France Okays 'Self Rule' for Tunisian State

PARIS, July 9 (AP)—Responding to an appeal from Premier Edgar Faure, France's parliament today overwhelmingly voted overwhelmingly Saturday for agreements granting Tunisia internal self-government by gradual stages.

The assembly recorded its approval 540-43 after Faure warned that refusal to do so would mean repeated promises of Tunisian autonomy would lead to distrust of French motives throughout the Arab world and among western nations as well.

Autonomy Offered At that time, Mendes-France offered full autonomy to the Tunisians in order to bring an end to years of guerrilla warfare by independence-seeking nationalists in the North African protectorate.

In recent months, violence in Tunisia has ceased almost altogether.

The agreements provide for a turnover of government functions to the Tunisians over the next 20 years. France will retain control over foreign affairs and defense, however, and will keep control in some Tunisian departments such as the postal and telephone systems.

Debate Held In the overnight debate just before the vote, Faure declared that France is conducting an experiment in Tunisia and must "put aside an inflexible complex."

In appearing to doubt others too much, he would appear to doubt ourselves, he said.

Faure carefully avoided mention of troubled conditions in neighboring Algeria and Morocco where terrorist activities continue.

Eminent Scientists Ask World Rulers to Abolish All Warfare

LONDON, July 9 (AP)—Just before his death Albert Einstein and eight other eminent scientists signed an appeal to world rulers to end what they called nuclear weapons destroy mankind.

Bertrand Russell, the 83-year-old British philosopher who is now an emeritus professor at the University of Cambridge, was the first to sign the document. He disclosed its wording and the details connected with its signature at a news conference.

Russell said he received Einstein's signature to the document a day before the proponent of the theory of relativity died in the United States on April 18, Einstein called Russell "the dictator of the enterprise."

Russell said Einstein informed him on April 11 he was "gladly willing to sign your excellent statement."

Russell wrote to 20 scientists involved in nuclear work on both sides of the iron curtain seeking approval of his document. Only eight joined him in signing. Nine said no and three never answered.

The statement drafted for government leaders of the major powers said: "Here, then, is the problem which we present to you, stark and dreadful and inescapable: shall we put an end to the human race? Or shall mankind renounce war?"

State Lawyers Protest Social Security Plan

SUN VALLEY, July 9 (AP)—The Idaho State Bar association today expressed opposition to proposed social security legislation which would make the security compulsory for lawyers.

The association, in a resolution of the close of its annual convention, favored lawyers' inclusion under the social security act on a voluntary basis.

Supreme Court Justice E. B. Smith said the proposed legislation was "incongruous because it included lawyers while excluding doctors and ministers."

The association voted to sponsor a bill to amend the constitution to allow a legislative council to file a legislative initiative. The aim of filing the initiative would be to have bills drawn as accurately possible and in accord with previous legislation.

Russell Randall, Lewiston, Idaho, president, pledged the association's continued support for higher judicial salaries.

"I also occupies the unavoidable position of paying the lowest salaries to her judges of any state in the union," Randall said. "We cannot ask practicing lawyers to accept positions on the bench without adequate return."

Other officers elected were W. E. Sullivan, Boise, vice president; Gilbert G. Clark, Twin Falls, commander for the eastern division; and Paul B. Ennis, Boise, secretary.

The dean of the law school told the group Friday "McCarthy hysteria" and segregationist politics among their audience "development of our civilization."

"No from certain could suppress the news that America had the capacity of dignity, common sense and faith had rededicated herself to these first principles which form the basis of the inspiration of people everywhere," Carl B. Speth said.

Upton said that in Washington the number of districts was reduced from 140 to 100 with success. Upton is teaching in the University of Southern California school of education this summer.

The questionnaires will be sent by the western interstate commission for high education to Idahoans selected by the state's new mental health survey committee.

Mrs. Ida Hill, Salt Lake City, project administrator for the western interstate commission for high education, said the survey should include research, number of trained people, preventive programs and organizations needed.

Harold C. Kibbicher, administrator of the State Tuberculosis hospital at Gooding, urged formation of county mental health groups to work for community and legislative action.

Dr. Carl McIntosh, president of Idaho State college, said Idahoans could take psychiatric training in other state universities under the interstate commission program. McIntosh is an Idaho representative to the commission.

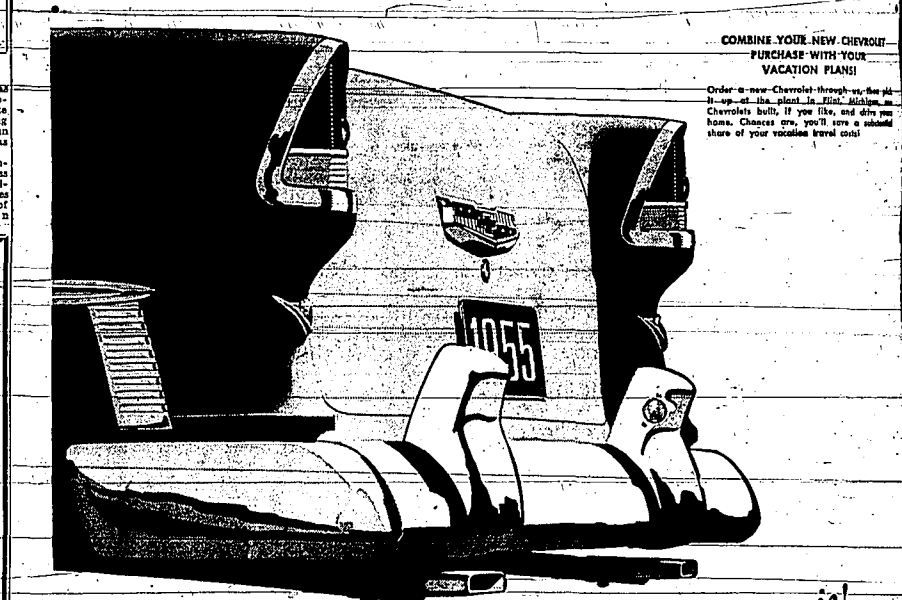

HOLLYWOOD, July 9—Hollywood has pioneered pet centers and a huge ranch for dogs, and now comes the world's finest pet hospital and the first "Blue Cross" for four-footed patients.

Galaxies and Nebulae Are Noted in Sky

By J. HUOH FRUETT
Astronomer, Extension Division Oregon Higher Education System

"I collect your articles and keep them in a note book. There is only one thing I don't like about them. You put too much emphasis on the positions of the stars and little things like that. I wish you would discuss planets, stars, nebulae, galaxies, etc. Is there any difference between a nebula and a galaxy? M. P."

Many years ago at the University of Oregon readers of this column in several instances stated giving a J. HUOH FRUETT sky review for the first story of each month. In such a review I try to help the readers learn the brighter stars and planets. Our correspondence will find that the main articles discuss various topics and are generally not "positions."

The word "nebula" means mist or cloud. Scattered over the sky among the stars, there are several faint, hazy patches which are barely discernible to the unaided eye. These are spoken of as nebulae or clouds. When is employed these become much more distinct and thousands of additional ones appear.

In 1781 Charles Messier, the French astronomer, compiled a list of 110 such objects. He was especially interested in the discovery of comets and wanted the permanent objects well located so his comets would not be getting them mistaken for comets. 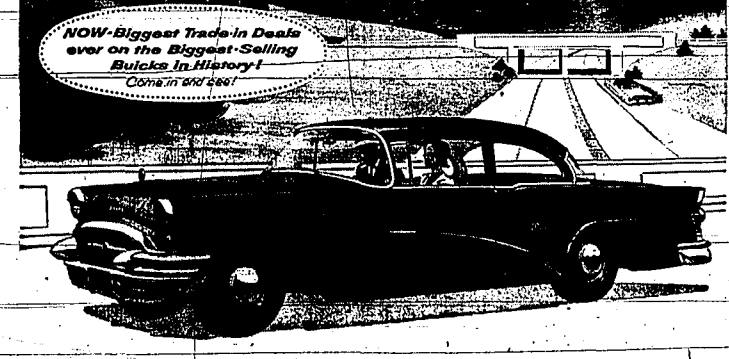
