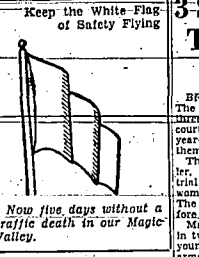

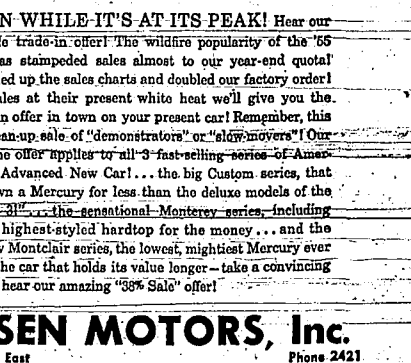

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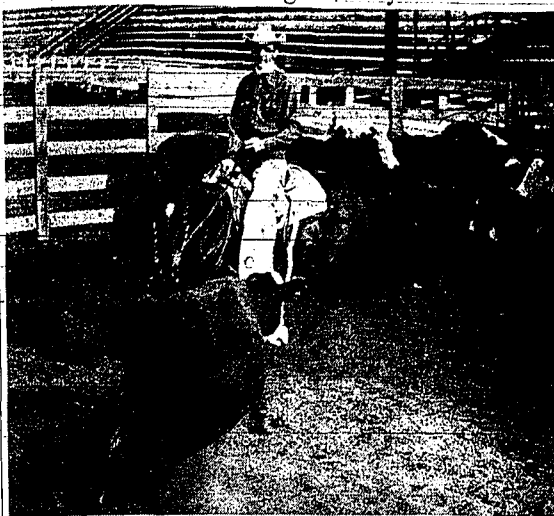

**Officer 'Girls' Banned From Army's Clubs**  
SEOUL, Korea, July 12 (AP)—Hundreds of U. S. Army officers were unhappy today over a three-star general's order to keep their Korean girlfriends out of army clubs. Thousands of enlisted men feared they were next in line for a similar ban.

The verbal order was handed down in a staff meeting several days ago by Lieut. Gen. John H. Collier, the army's top commander in Korea.

Headline Officer Collier told his officers they had until the end of the month to stop bringing their Korean girlfriends into army clubs. In fact, he discouraged officers from being seen at all with Korean girls.

The order by Collier—who shipped a similar ban on fraternization when he was U. S. commander in Stuttgart, Germany—was not very popular. However, when an army spokesman was asked about the ban he replied that "it is simply the general's wish to eliminate an undesirable situation."

Chaplain's Appraisal About the only officers in favor of Collier's ban were chaplains. "It doesn't look good," one said. "It sets our top officers—married men, even colonels—going around openly with these women."

"Collier is absolutely right," another chaplain said. "After all, most of these women who come into the clubs are just out-and-out prostitutes."

### Smylie States Thrift Needs For Economy

**IDAHO FALLS, July 12**—Gov. Robert E. Smylie declared yesterday that Idaho's cigarette and liquor taxes are producing more revenue than expected and that the state needs good chance of staying in the black this biennium if it spends thriftily. He told the annual convention of the Idaho American Legion that the liquor tax is bringing in 6 per cent more than expected and that the cigarette tax 4 per cent more.

"This proves that you can't make anything that we haven't got to do high priced enough that we don't do it," he said.

The governor noted that the state government went into the red at the start of this fiscal year when more than three million dollars was transferred from the general fund to the minimum education program.

But Idaho can end this biennium with a surplus, he said, if it watches its appropriations.

He noted that Idaho state tax burden is \$12.26 per capita compared to \$17.10 for Washington and \$11.34 for Oregon.

### Sports Group Is Planned by U. S. Officials

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The White House said today consideration is being given to the formation of a committee of interested youngsters in competitive sports—the subject discussed by President Eisenhower yesterday at his meeting with 33 leaders from the sports world.

Vice President Richard Nixon was suggested as the coordinator of such an effort, but Nixon, who was present at the luncheon, said no formal plans were drawn up.

Needs Told

Mr. Eisenhower, a baseball and football player in his college days at West Point and now the nation's best-known amateur golfer, told his guests that something should be done to promote greater interest in competitive athletics, both as an aid to the nation's general health and as a weapon against juvenile delinquency.

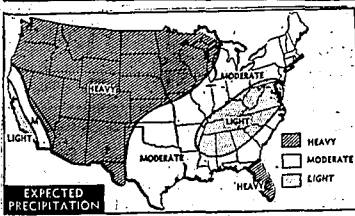
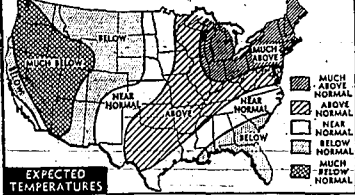
The president said he found statistics on the physical condition of young Americans "most alarming."

The luncheon guests appeared enthusiastic about the president's idea and Jack Fleck, who recently scored a major surprise by winning the U. S. open golf championship, commented, "you can easily see the importance of this thing, since so many children are physically weak."

Nixon also addressed the group and suggested that athletic programs of schools be reviewed to see whether more children could participate.

### Wet Out West

### Three Topics Seen as Major Points for Big Four Meetings

GENEVA, Switzerland, July 12 (AP)—Germany, Western Security, Disarmament.

These will be the big topics at the Big Four conference at the summit which starts here next Monday, President Eisenhower, British Prime Minister Anthony Eden, French Premier Edgar Faure and Soviet Premier Nikolai S. Khrushchev will discuss these and related issues.

They will then direct their foreign ministers to negotiate in detail on specific problems.

Germany will be the center of negotiations. On the future of that industrial, traditionally warlike country hinges the immediate future of Europe.

Russia wants above all to neutralize Germany, wants to keep West Germany from arming, wants to unify Germany—but on its own terms.

The United States, Britain, France have just won their biggest victory of the cold war by forming the Western European Union, which provides for rearming the West German republic as a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. They want to unify Germany by holding an honest secret election, for a national assembly which would organize an all-German government. Germany would then be free to choose its own course as regards its alignment with the west.

Russia has proposed an "all-European security pact" in a desperate attempt to prevent German armament. All European countries on both sides of the iron curtain would belong. The United States and Western Europe would be dismantled and American forces withdrawn from Europe, leaving the red army dominant.

The west refuses to abandon its North Atlantic Treaty Organization or to exclude West Germany from its right to enter factories and to inspect all military installations. If Russia agreed to that, disarmament could become a fact.

### GOP Senator Asks Ike for Bombs Policy

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—Senator Flinders, R., Vt., said yesterday he has asked President Eisenhower to declare publicly that the United States would not use its atom bombs on civilian centers except "in reprisal" for such attacks by an enemy.

Flinders said he thought next week's Big Four meeting at Geneva would be a logical place for the declaration. He said he did not know how Eisenhower felt about the idea.

"The Flinders suggestion" was one of several developments looking ahead to the American-Russian-British-French conference on world troubles. Among others:

1. Eisenhower discussed plans for the meeting here last night with Secretary of State Dulles and Senator George D. Acheson, chairman of the senate foreign relations committee. He arranged another conference, on the same subject, for this morning with Democratic and Republican leaders.

2. Representative McClellan, D., N. J., said Russia may be raising the hopes for a peace agreement at Geneva, just so it can blame the west. If nothing much is accomplished, he advised against expecting too much, or too little.

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4. Secretary Dulles arranged to leave for Paris by plane Wednesday afternoon. He will spend Thursday and Friday conferring with the British and French foreign ministers.

### Uranium Rush Gives Agency Big Headache

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The growing popularity of uranium prospecting is giving the bureau of land management a few headaches.

Edward Woolley, director of the bureau, told the house appropriations committee that is one of the main reasons he needs an additional \$250,000 for his agency.

He said he needs the money because more people to look after the uranium hunters.

"While the bureau of land management exploration on acquired lands is not on public domain lands, we are being deluged with requests for status and other information desired by prospectors, requiring assignment of personnel who otherwise could process regular cases," he said.

In March alone there were 7,000 inquiries. And 800 applications for permits and leases on acquired lands were filed in the land offices.

"Our original program for 1955 could not anticipate this volume and did not make provision for it."

### Evidence Proves Liking of Boy, 11

LANCASTER, Pa., July 12 (AP)—The evidence was pretty clear yesterday: Bobby Lewis likes movies.

Police reported that Bobby, who is 11, went to a theater Sunday afternoon to see a double feature bill of western thrillers. Like a lot of small fry, Bobby stayed for the second showing, then the third. Somewhere along the line he fell asleep. About 4 a.m. he awakened, groped his way through the darkened house to the front door. There his knuckles attracted passerby who called police.

Yesterday afternoon a news photographer went to Bobby's home to take a picture. He wasn't there. Bobby had gone to the movies.

### Ruling

LONDON, July 12 (AP)—The House of Commons today ruled that the second time later Regulation of Explosives Act 1945, which prohibits the use of explosives in the streets, is not unconstitutional. The order followed an explosive incident that took place two days later at a cinema. The incident had caused a sound barrier to be blown down.

### Senate Asked To Pass Ike's Full Help Bill

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The administration shifted to the senate today its efforts to win congressional approval of the full \$2,064,741,750 foreign aid program sought by President Eisenhower.

The administration suffered a major setback last night when the house approved a \$2,033,741,750 bill that was a whopping \$31,000,000, or about 2 per cent, less than Mr. Eisenhower has asked. Not a single house member moved to restore cuts in the measure which had been made by the house appropriations committee.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and former Foreign Aid Chief Harold E. Stassen planned to try a senate-appropriations subcommittee today at a closed hearing to vote the full amount of the President's request.

The house, driving toward adjournment this month, passed the big money bill by a roll call vote of 351 to 125 after just one day of debate. The biggest cut was \$10 million dollar slice from the President's request for \$100,000,000 in extra aid, leaving a total of 750 million dollars. The house also acted in half the President's request for a special 700 million dollar discretionary fund for Asia development.

The house eliminated an extra \$2 million dollars in economic aid to Spain, reduced the President's 70 million dollar request for aid to Greece and Turkey, and slashed by \$12,500,000 to a total of \$305 million dollars the direct forces support fund.

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### Fines Posted

PARIS, July 12 (AP)—An officer writing on a French building will be subject to a fine of 1,200 to 1,200 francs (\$270 to \$3,500) under a bill passed by the national assembly yesterday.

### Doubts Noted For Truce in Laos Fighting

TOKYO, July 12 (AP)—Some high American officials in Tokyo doubt that the Indochina International armistice commission can bring about an effective cease-fire between communist and government troops in Laos, it was learned today.

Reliable sources told the United Press that many high-ranking American believe the communists will continue to fight in Laos, if that is what they want to do, and very well may ignore the armistice commission.

This belief was said to be based on what has happened in Viet Nam since the armistice agreement there.

Private reports reaching American officials here, sources said indicate the communists have ignored the armistice commission in Viet Nam repeatedly and, in many cases, the commission has been unable to do anything about it.

Some Americans were said to feel that even if the communists halt their warfare, they will continue illegal subversive and infiltration tactics.

India, Canada and Poland are members of the International armistice commission which has demanded an immediate cease-fire and requested the forces of both sides to halt in their present positions.

The communist attacks against Laos government troops there, a new war near Laos, just as the Geneva big four summit conference was about to get under way next week.

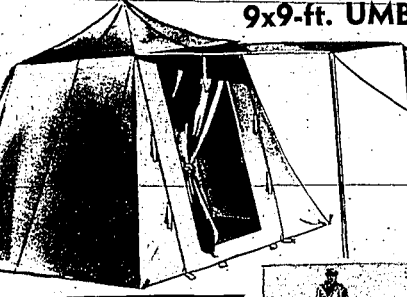

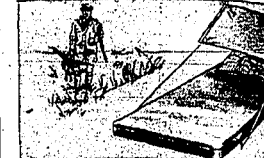

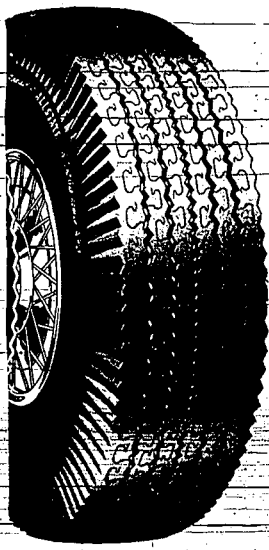
