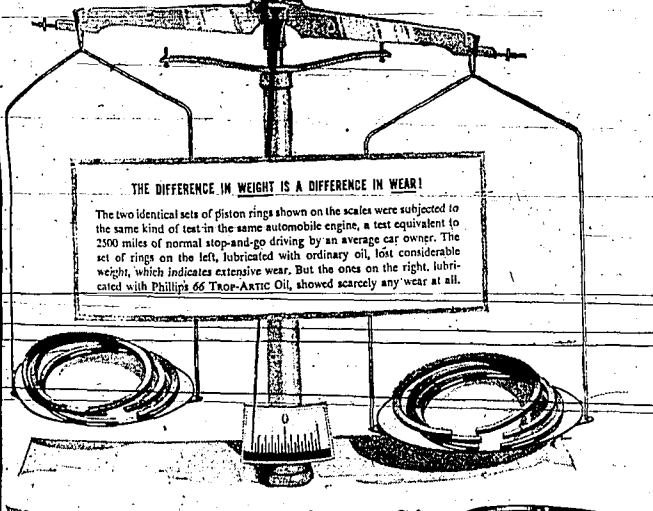

**TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS**

WASHINGTON—Texas may have lost this chance to win a rare honor for one of her eminent citizens as a result of the serious illness of Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson.

A definite movement for nomination of the senate majority leader for the presidency has been started by his friends on Capitol Hill before he was hospitalized by a severe heart attack.

Dozens of members who would have preferred the "progressive" candidate, but who are loyal to Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois or Gov. Averell Harriman of New York, are being urged to support Johnson.

Evidence of Senator Johnson's popularity and strength was given when a number of his friends met with President Eisenhower over the Democratic legislative record.

Sen. Harry Byrd, Virginia conservative, joined with other "liberals"—as Sen. Herbert H. Lehman of New York and Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota. It is about the first time that these two groups of opposing factions stood on any thing.

**SUCCESSFUL PARTY STRATEGY**—Johnson is the Garner-Rayburn-Jones type of Democrat, although more "liberal" in thought than the former vice-presidential candidate. He is considered to be a protégé and follower of Speaker Rayburn, who never broke with FDR.

He has never been identified with the Lehman-Humphrey group, however. And yet, he has managed to harness and hold together many of his major allies. When they disagree, it is without rancor.

Johnson, the likable and strapping Texan is almost the only presidential possibility in sight who could count on the loyalty of the Byrd-Byrd-Shivers-Kennon group, which includes Sen. J. Lee Smith and Sen. J. Lee Smith.

**POLITICS AND CONGRESS**

The record of the first session, 84th congress, on President Eisenhower's legislative program, will be made.

All the honsting by senate Democratic leaders on their accomplishment so far can't conceal this fact.

And President Eisenhower's listing of the 14 top proposals on which he wants more action this session tells only half the story of what he has accomplished.

Congress will begin to roll in June. In the first four months of the session, only 28 acts were passed and signed into law by President Eisenhower. Twenty more were signed in May for a total of 48.

But 32 new laws were signed by the President in June, bringing the total for the session to an even 100. The rate for July will be even faster.

There is a 50-50 chance the session will run through the first half of August. In the final weeks bills will be coming down faster than you can keep track of them. That's the way it always has been and probably always will be.

President Eisenhower's 14 measures on which he wants action aren't exactly a "must" list. Legislative proposals now before Congress will be coming down faster than you can keep track of them.

Neither party is showing any great fondness for the administration's power-sharing policy. This applies to the Congress and to the public at large.

The President would like to get Cougar and John Day out of the back of his mind and local interests share construction and operating costs. The idea is that if just a couple of these partnership power projects could be started; they would set a pattern for more.

There is even some evidence that congressional majorities have deliberately gone out of their way this session to sabotage the President's program.

Neither the President nor the congressional leaders went into this phase of the situation in their own good faith of complaints on legislative achievements or lack of them.

The house Democrats plan to put over a \$20 billion example. It would have cut government revenues by two billion dollars a year, or more.

The senate-led crusade against the President's bond issue plan for highway construction financing, if successful, will increase the federal government's direct expenditures for new roads by an estimated \$1.7 billion dollars a year.

The house Democrats' latest plan to increase social security benefits for the aged is another move—in the same direction—that would cost only hundreds of millions a year, instead of billions, but the effect would be the same.

All three of these measures would throw the budget further out of balance, increase the public debt and so make the Republican fiscal record look bad.

Perhaps the most effective wrecking of the President's program has been done on the military reserves plan, which the President considers vital—and the aid to education and school construction bills.

Rep. Adam Clayton Powell, D. N. Y., was encouraged to introduce anti-budget amendments for both proposals. These amendments made the legislation unacceptable to Southern Democrats and action was effectively blocked.

**Frustrations and Competitions Cited as Hose-Digging Causes**

By HENRY McLEMORE  
 The disappointing garden hose of Downey, Calif. is nothing new only its method of escape is it.  
 The fact that it is digging straight into the earth to get away from it is the only reason it has attracted nationwide attention.  
 Most hoses just up and run away like small boys. Now the "maker" people see in the woods are pulling out the greenest pastures, and the last Loch Ness monster turned out to be nothing more horrid than 50 feet of fireman's hose trying to evade Scotland's winter climate.  
 The Garden Hose, Its Aims, Ambitions, and Frustrations, was the subject of a brilliant paper read only last year in Vienna, and its author, one of the world's recognized authorities on the problem, laid quite a few things which he felt accounted for the growing unrest among hoses.  
 Chief among the unlagging factors named by Dr. Snitz was the underground spring system now used to water so many lawns. It pointed out that for years and years the garden hose was the only means by which a family could keep its grass in condition. It was a daily ritual for some member of the family to fondle the hose, so to speak, as he watered the ground.  
 Thus a feeling of belonging was instilled in the hose. It felt, it counted for something. Even more intimate and easy were the times when it was turned on the children and the pups in the summer.  
 Now much of that is over for the hose. Cold, aloof, superior, functional iron pipes circulate under the lawns and flower beds, and need only a twist of a tap to do the job much more efficiently, and in a tenth of the time, required by a hose.  
 There is no telling how many old, faithful hoses lie discarded in garages and sheds, forgotten by the masters they served so long and well.  
 The sprinkler system has given the garden hose a deep-seated, inferiority complex. It simply can't face up to reality. So they try to get away, just as that Burrowing California one is trying to do. Dr. Snitz also laid stress on the fairly recent invention of hideous types of sprayers which are easily attached to a garden hose, and which make its head swivel, swirl, turn, spin, jerk and bounce. This

distributes the water more evenly and more evenly, yes, but can you imagine what it does to a sensitive hose? A hose accustomed proudly to send its water in a powerful jet when a handsome bronze nozzle is lured. Just the correct amount to the right, or sure it is a fine, lovely mist when the nozzle is turned all the way.  
 Hamilton, Dr. Snitz termed it, and how right he could be!  
 Hoses have been cheapened, too. Dr. Snitz pointed out. Once they were pure rubber, blackly handsome as a python, and costly. They were taken care of as a prized possession, and in their old age were carefully patched with bicycle tape. Now they are made of plastic, dressed in gaudy colors, are worth a fraction of what they once were, and are treated accordingly.  
 This has given them a disgrace complex, and they often try to get rid of themselves by crawling across

the driveway to the family car with them beyond repair.  
 I hope the Downey hose maker pool its escape.

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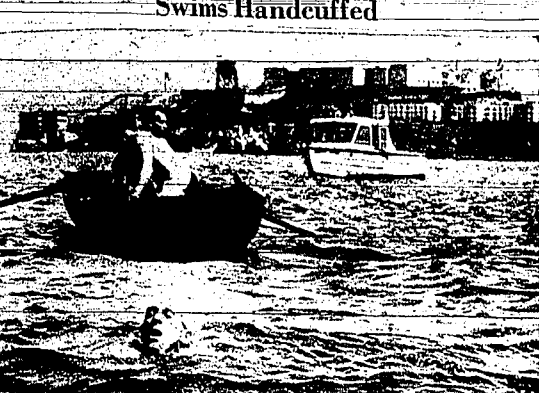

**Cooperative Base for Further Meets Eyed as Talk Objective**

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—Just about the best statement which could come out of the Geneva meeting among President Eisenhower and the British, French and Russians would be one which said: "We got along together and made a little progress."  
 To expect more than that is probably to expect too much. The Geneva meeting is expected to end Monday; it is not in itself intended to solve any of the big problems separating the west and Russia.  
 They're too big and complicated to be settled in detail in the six days which Eisenhower's White House aides now think will be the limit on his discussions with Prime Minister Eden of Britain and Premier Pature of France and Bulganin of Russia.  
 The Big Four do not intend—at least as the state department views it—to discuss details on any of the problems rather, they will talk about them in a general way.  
 They can agree on the problems which the four governments can try to solve later through special committees or future meetings of the foreign ministers of the four countries.  
 Geneva the Big Four will probably reach successful if, through their indication of willingness to make concessions, they have been able to lay the groundwork for friendlier relations and future agreements in detail.  
 The schedule itself, as it stands now, will give an idea of how the conference will be held:  
 Next Monday, July 18, Eisenhower, Eden, Faure and Bulganin will meet in the morning and again in the afternoon. It will be the only day at Geneva when they meet twice.  
 Starting Tuesday, their foreign ministers — Dulles of the United States, Pinay of France, Macmillan of Britain, Molotov of Russia — will meet in the morning by themselves.  
 The Big Four will lunch together Tuesday and every following day until they have their formal session each afternoon, accompanied by their foreign ministers. Only one formal session is planned. The Swiss government is giving that.  
 There's nothing to stop the Big Four from getting together—in the evening for some conversation but that isn't planned. The Big Four will have some language problems: English, French and Russian.  
 The speed with which they overcome that "barrenness" depends upon whether they wear earphones and have translators filling them in word for word or depend on a soundman (translation after each speaker finishes).  
 The foreign ministers are likely to end their sessions when the Big Four quit. But they can arrange to meet whenever they wish.

**\$100,000 Damage Inflicted by Hail**

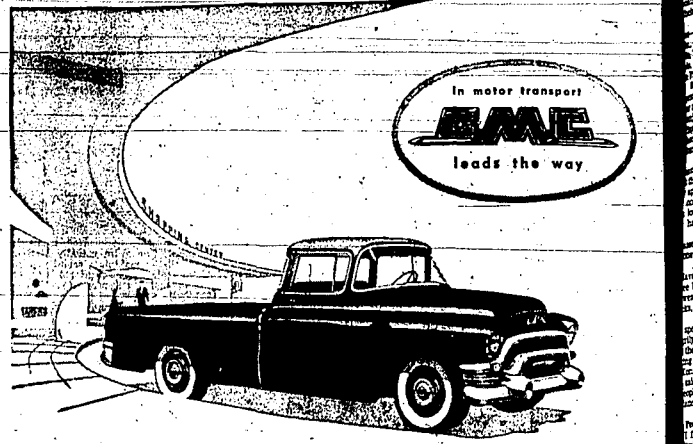

MARTINSVILLE, Tenn., July 15.—There is a new kind of "hillbilly" here in the Great Smokies heart of old hillbilly land; the mountain people have found a new way of life that enables them to keep their ancient freedom while escaping the poverty of the past.

he doesn't mind playing up to this role—a bit for the tourists—but he doesn't relish having a "Flinthead" (tourist) call him a "hillbilly." He prefers to be known as a southern highlander, a hillman or mountain man.

he drives 10 miles to work from a 12-acre mountain farm where he lives with his wife and six children.  
Clark raises much of his own food. He can afford the comforts of the city man, but he wouldn't willingly move to the city if you gave him a house with five bathrooms.  
"Good times are changing the mountains fast," he said. "Very few people live in log houses anymore."  
The mountain people no longer have the desire to live in town, because they can now have everything in town they need. They have electric stoves, television and radio. "We have good schools in the country now, too. There's an \$80,000 school going up in my neighborhood."  
"Why should I want to live in town? You know, I've never had a hair cut, a shave or a shoe shine in town in all my days."  
While revenue agents are certain there is still a great amount of bootlegging in the Tennessee hills, Clark says the growth of industry jobs has cut it down.  
"When I was a boy, you could count seven stills from where I lived," he said. "Now there isn't one."  
The liquor now is being made deep in the mountains where there are no jobs.  
Clark, like most mountain men, is deeply religious. He neither smokes nor drinks.  
He feels he is pretty lucky. He has retained the rugged independence and individualism of his ancestors, he has achieved an economic security they never knew—and he can still enjoy the sunbines and shadow and free-flowing winds of the mountains.

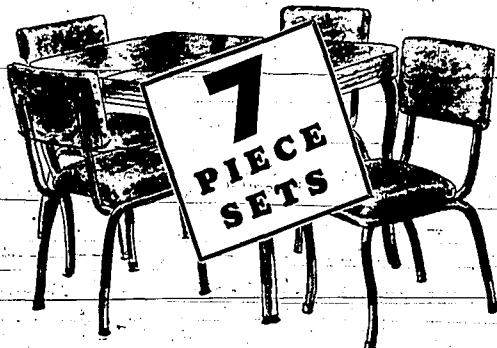

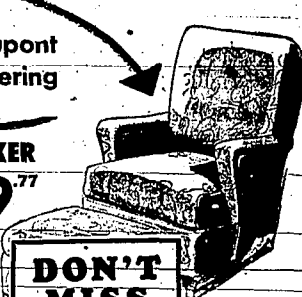

### Contestant on Program Gets \$32,000 Sum

NEW YORK, July 13 (AP)—Mrs. Catherine E. Kretzler turned to prayer for guidance on whether to keep \$32,000 won answering Bible questions on a television quiz, or risk losing it in trying to double it on a final question. "I prayed for guidance twice, a few days ago," she said, "and the answer seemed to me to be—take the \$32,000 and quit."

Early today she drove with her husband, James, 55, a carpenter, to their farm home in Pocomo, Pa., near Harrisburg. Mrs. James Kretzler had the check for \$32,000 in the inside coat pocket, and it will be deposited in the Lemona, Pa., trust company.

Mrs. Kretzler, 44, a grandmother who became nationally famous in answering questions about the Bible on the CBS show "The \$64,000 Question," had won the largest cash prize in radio-television history, according to the network.

Mrs. Kretzler said she expected to pay about \$12,000 in federal taxes. According to accountants that will be about right for a joint return with her husband.

The contestant decided to stop. She was Olga McEzride Grayson, 26, formerly a grade teacher in Evansville, Ind., who is seeking a model's job in New York to finish a master's degree in education. She won \$3,000 last week named "Sam," and last night she said she would take it rather than try for \$10,000.

### War Prisoner Issue Will Be Put in Agenda

Ten years after the end of World War II, the war prisoner issue is still sparring Russia's relations with the West. The prisoner issue could become a major obstacle to the conclusion of peace talks in Geneva, for which the Kremlin made a bid when it invited West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer to Moscow.

May 24 Discussed

It is possible, too, if not probable, that the prisoner issue will come up during the big four conference in Geneva. It may not come up during the first or "summit" phase, which President Eisenhower is to attend—Korea likely, it would come up during the second phase, in which the big four foreign ministers are to negotiate on specific questions.

The Russians undoubtedly are aware of this and undoubtedly they hope fervently that by some chance of fate the prisoners will be ignored. But if the men in the Kremlin really are sincere in their expressed desire to reduce world tensions, they could make the first step by releasing some of the foreign victims they hold in slave labor camps.

Members Listed

Japanese government records list 446 Japanese prisoners known to be in Soviet prison camps about 1,000 held in the island of Sakhalin off the Siberian coast. Another 10,000 who were known to be alive in prison camps as late as 1950.

German official sources estimate that more than 20,000 Germans, soldiers and civilians, are still held in prison camps in Russia and its satellites.

### Uranium, Thorium and Tungsten Clues Detailed in Booklet Written by Idaho

MOSCOW, July 13 (AP)—Memo to amateur uranium prospectors: If you want to strike it rich, begin looking around in areas where other prospectors are finding pay dirt.

Also, you'd do well to take a look at a brochure written recently by Earl Ferguson Cook of the Idaho bureau of mines and geology at the University of Idaho. It's called "Prospecting for Uranium, Thorium and Tungsten in Idaho."

Cook tells you where to look for the stuff, how to find it, and how to go about filing a claim.

He writes that "it is wisest to start prospecting in an area of a geological environment in which uranium has already been found and to thoroughly explore such areas before venturing into an area or environment where uranium has never been found."

However, traces of the atomic fuel have been found in widely scattered areas of the Gem state, he notes, so "almost no area in Idaho is ruled out as a possible source of uranium."

North and central Idaho offer the best prospects for the man with a Geiger or scintillation counter, Cook suggests six specific localities, based on actual uranium occurrences:

1. The area between Naples and Lemhi in Boundary county.
2. The northwest corner of Kootenai county and the area around Mica and Ghata peaks in the western section.
3. The area between Hamlet, Ida., and Salsouse, Mont., and the Coeur d'Alene district in general.
4. A belt extending from the northeast corner of Benewah county across Benewah and Latah counties into Clearwater county.
5. The area between the south fork of the Clearwater river and the northern part of Valley county, especially the Ten Mile, Buffalo Hume, Florence, Warren and Mansfield lake mining districts.
6. The north fork Cliftonville area in the northern part of Lemhi county, and the southern fringe of

the mountains between Boise and Hiale.

Lemhi county offers the best prospecting localities for thorium—also used for atomic power—and tungsten occurs most commonly in a belt extending from Grangeville through central Idaho to the Graters of the Moon national monument in Butte county.

Cook has a number of pointers for successful operation of a Geiger counter and a scintillation counter, a more sensitive instrument which can be dangled from a plane going 100 miles per hour.

"Don't let the counter get wet, he warns, and keep it away from watches with luminous dial. If the needle jumps to the top of the dial switch off the machine, because increasing doses of radioactivity may damage it."

And don't be alarmed if the counter clicks lightly when you hold it in front of the family cat. This is just "background count." All objects are slightly radioactive, because of cosmic radiation.

Don't overlook trees and shrubs as possible clues to uranium—deposits. Many roots absorb particles of uranium and give off radiation through the leaves.

In general a few feet of earth will mask the richest deposits. And remember that "no counter" can be used for accurate quantitative work. The best way to determine the uranium content of a sample is to obtain a chemical analysis.

Cook goes into considerable detail covering mining claims, the points out that no national monument is a national reservation. 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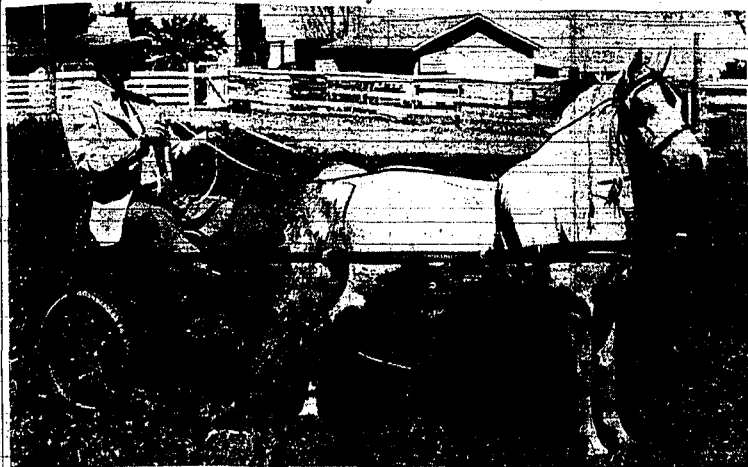

World Communism May Be At Crossroads in Big Talks

By WILLIAM F. RYAN—AP Foreign News Analyst. The summit conference of the Big Four will find world communism at a "crossroads."

Much has happened in the Soviet Union since President Eisenhower saw it at the end of World War II. Unsubtly by ambassador Charles E. Bohlen has been bringing the President up to date on those changes which seem important to the West.

The Geneva conference is a fateful gamble for high stakes. The Soviet leadership has, in essence, ante-up the future of world communism. The West may be gambling on its faith in human nature and a belief the communist experiment to produce a machine called "the new Soviet man" has failed.

Two world wars and modern technological progress have produced a new Russian common man. He seems gradually to be realizing his own strength. He is looking around his vast, rich and beautiful country, a land he loves passionately, and sees promise of a peaceful and prosperous life.

But he is afraid, too. He has spoken to him in many places and found him deathly afraid of a new war. He accepts most, if not all, of his government's peace propaganda because he dreads war. The ordinary Russian is not a Communist, party member—there are only six million party members in a country of 210 millions—but he is an important factor at Geneva.

Comment Lacking On Russian Plans

BONN, Germany, July 13 (AP)—The West German government declined comment last night on Moscow's new statement on German reunification but it was viewed here as another Russian bid to pull West Germany out of the North Atlantic alliance.

Informed sources said on first reading the statement appeared to have unchained the old Russian price for German reunification—renunciation of the obligations undertaken by the Bonn government under the Paris treaties rearming West Germany.

These manifestations of Soviet cynicism must be in the back of the minds of the West at the conference table at Geneva.

Thanks to the sign which reads "Buy now, pay later," more and more Americans are making their dreams come true by signing on the dotted line. They're doing it at a time when credit is the easiest in 10 years.


