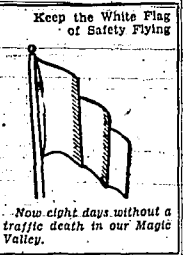


Reserves Bill Compromises Are Expected

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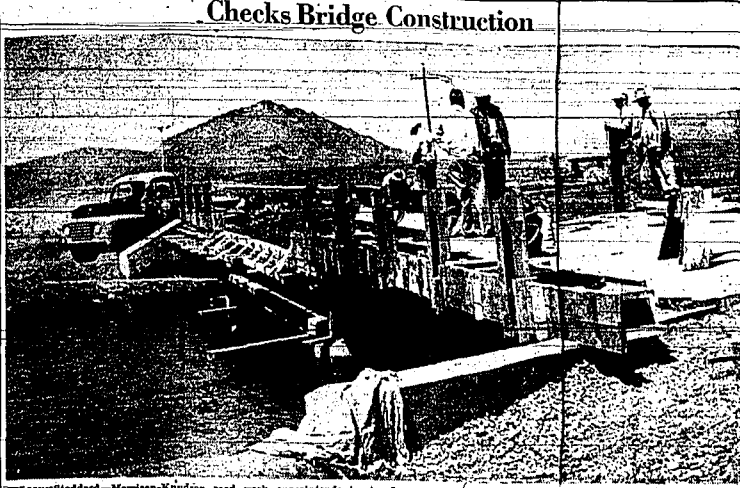

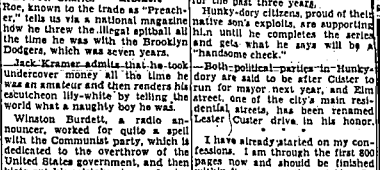

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Conviction Is Called "Fair" By Defendant

BRATTLEBORO, Vt., July 15—(AP)—Louis Miller said yesterday his conviction on charges of urging youths to desert the draft was fair and that it was only the first step in proving peace-time conscientious objection.

Miller, 34, was sentenced to a year in U. S. district court. The jury of seven women and five men deliberated an hour and eight minutes before returning the verdict to Judge Ernest W. Gibson.

The chubby, 44-year-old woman was freed in a \$100 bail pending sentencing and 24 others indicated they will appeal her conviction to the U. S. court of appeals in New York City.

She faces a maximum sentence of five years in prison or \$10,000 fine, or both, for the crime, which counts in two indictments.

Mrs. Miller admitted during the three-day trial that she wrote letters to nine young men urging them to dodge the draft and turn over limited cards for use in a copy of an anti-communist publication.

Mrs. Miller and her husband, Manuel, held off federal marshals at gunpoint last May when they were taken to a mental hospital. The couple was transferred from their home during the 12-hour siege.

Mrs. Miller was declared sane and released from a hospital to stand trial. Her husband, now free in \$10,000 bail, goes on trial Monday for obstructing justice.

Report on Drug Control Era Could Frighten Many People

NEW YORK, July 15—(AP)—In some measure, a sexual epiphany is not so easily spotted. Not the practice may meet any objection from the people so controlled.

(3) "Positive reinforcement" here means bribes and ties that create a classical pattern. But "better ways of using reinforcement in shaping up new behavior and in maintaining the condition called interest or enthusiasm, have been recently discovered. The reinforcing effect of personal attention and affection is coming to be better understood."

"Our government would probably be able to control drugs which taken by servicemen before combat, would eliminate all signs of fear, thus depriving the enemy of the protective reflexes which man has acquired through a long process of evolution," he said in a lecture at the New York Academy of Sciences.

Whether we like it or not, he continued, "it was not the distant future, the motivational and emotional conditioning of normal daily life will probably be maintained in any desired state through the use of drugs."

As long as there have been men, there have been controls over their behavior—for instance, the control exercised by the pulpit, or "cajoling, seduction, incitement, and the various forms of what biologists describe as 'influence'."

Instead of begging "our understanding of the need for counter-control."

He described three methods of behavior control:

(1) "Emotional conditioning." Example: "Advertising which shows a product being used by or associated with pretty girls or admired public figures. This condition is not likely to result against such control, and he may carry the resulting prejudice consistently to his grave."

Most of us let the garagement take the dip stick from the engine block, wipe it off and put it back in again to check the oil level. It's a messy job and an easy way to mark up a clean white shirt.

I usually "leave it to George" but in looking over a used car, the oil on the dip stick and the dip stick itself can tell you a lot about what the car looks like inside.

Here's one simple test that's effective: Wipe the oil off the dip stick (after getting your shirt sleeves out of the way) and notice if the surface of the stick is pock-marked or etched on the part that is normally below the surface of the oil.

If it is, that's a sign of acid. Most fuels contain a trace of acid and if the engine is running cold, or a cylinder is misfiring, unburned fuel, with this acid, makes it way into the crankcase and will continue to attack polished steel surfaces, such as the crankshaft journals, the cams, the links, and pins in the timing chain—and, of course, the dip stick.

And while we're about it, this is the time to point out the importance of changing oil frequently. This acid action against the car's vital insides is the penalty of letting old oil work its worst against your engine.

I've already mentioned the trick of watching for blue smoke from the exhaust (blue, not black or gray) that is another easy trick for sizing up a car.

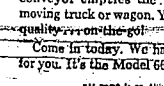

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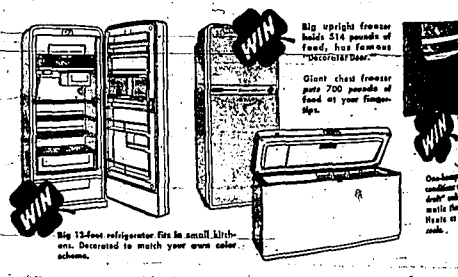

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Periodic Crop Estimates Are Guarded Secrets Until Releasing Times Arrive
WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—You could make a killing in the market if you could just get advance information on the agriculture department's periodic crop estimates. No secrets are more closely and successfully guarded than the estimates of such specialties as corn, soybeans, livestock, and many others that go to make up the nation's store of food and fiber. If you want to test the truth of this, and are willing to spend some time in mild captivity, just wait until the agriculture estimates division unveils a "crop report" to be prepared.

There is how reports are prepared: The 41 field offices for the 48 states make up their reports and recommend them to the crop reporting board. The recommendations are submitted to the secretary of agriculture. The box also has two locks. The secretary's representative has the key to one and the chairman of the crop reporting board has the other. About 30 minutes before the board's working quarters are locked up, the board's chairman and secretary arrive at production estimates for each state, and pass the information along to the board.

Young children know nothing of the need for such qualities of character as generosity and friendliness. These are qualities of maturity, of slow growth through the years. This cannot expect much of a child in that direction. We can only teach him.

Instead of making a child share his piece of candy, give him a piece for each playmate, "one for you and one for Benny."

"But Jane Ellen is there, too." "All right. One for Jane Ellen, too." That will register the fact that good things must be passed around, each getting some. It presupposes that there is enough for all, that there should be enough to go around.

By and by, the time comes when the child realizes that there is no more than what he has in his hand. He matures how and because he has been taught to pass the good things along, he faces the problem of sharing what he has and does so.

Forcing sharing, forcing a child to hand what he wants himself to another child, will not make him generous. It will make him resentful. People are inherently selfish.

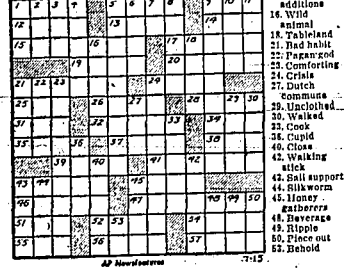

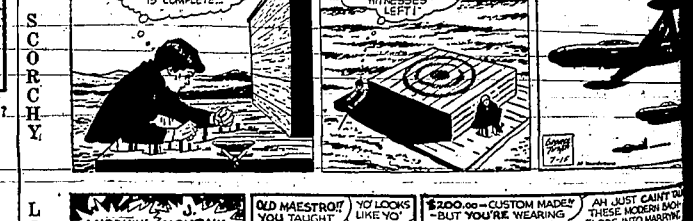
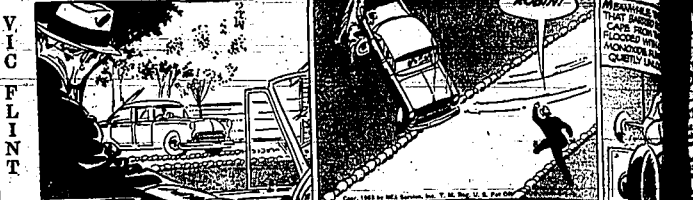

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Religion Plans To Fight Reds Are Proposed

NEW YORK, July 15 (AP)—A rabbi, a priest and a minister who have turned the energy that once made them a football star into evangelistic fervor embarked today on an crusade to outstrip the Christian message in a war against communism.

The Rev. Paul M. Stevens was on his way to London with an ambitious plan to inject the word of God behind the iron and bamboo curtain by radio and in time-television.

Go to London
Dr. Stevens, 39, a former left end at Mississippi college who carries a bulk of 300 pounds on his six-foot, three-inch frame, is en route to the Baptist world alliance meeting in London, where 28,000 leaders from 100 countries will represent 27,000,000 Baptists.

He said he will try to set up a permanent organization to stockpile programs of scripture, religious music, and a brief Christian message and make these available to large and small radio stations on the edge of the iron curtain in Europe and the bamboo curtain in Asia.

Several months ago, he said in an interview, he got the idea of using mass communication to get religion into communist-ruled countries. As he envisions it, programs can be carried out in many languages and recorded on tape for use on radio. Plans also call for television against the day when television may reach through the curtain.

Seeks Organization
In London, he said, he will try to get together international religion leaders who are interested in such a program to work out details for the organization, perhaps establishing headquarters in Washington.

The organization would share American technical knowledge of broadcasting techniques with other countries and would be prepared to help train personnel in Asia. He said it would be the first concerted campaign to take religion around the world by electronics.

Dr. Stevens said he believed the financing could be handled by voluntary contributions "by missionary minded people."

Monument Bills Are Introduced

PORTLAND, July 15 (AP)—Senator Neuberger, D. Ore., informed the Oregonian yesterday that he is introducing bills to establish national monuments at Indian Post Office on the Lolo Trail in Idaho and at Ft. Clatsop, Ore., commemorating the Lewis and Clark expedition.

Three rock cairns now mark the site of last relics of the expedition at Indian Post Office. Ft. Clatsop, now owned by the Oregon Historical Society, marked the end of the trail for the 1806 expedition.

Copponents of the bill are Senators Morse, D. Ore., and Dworkin, R. Ida.

Soviet Patience Stressed as World Communism Confused

Wait . . . and hold on . . .

This admonition for world communism is not new. But now it has overtones of desperation, as the Big Four summit conference at Geneva approaches.

"If you just are not prepared to talk seriously," said Soviet Communist boss Nikita S. Khrushchev, "advancing the west in general." "We can wait and hold on."

Khrushchev's words at the American embassy's Fourth of July party in Moscow gave an inkling of what is in the back of the Soviet mind: to wait.

Things have not happened in the world as Marx and Lenin predicted. Now the hydrogen bomb has changed yet another basic Lenin concept that the communist and capitalist worlds must collide, with communism victorious. A clash with hydrogen bombs would leave nobody victorious.

The communists who Khrushchev represents still hold to the view that world communism holds sway.

But to the communist way of thinking, there are more ways than one to skin a cat. There is little doubt that present Kremlin leadership has decided to ride with a program of waiting and watching—waiting for a crisis to take hold in the capitalist world, watching for a chance to give the process a shove forward whenever possible. If war comes some day, the fox must be weak.

The communists have done much waiting. The permanent revolution they dreamed of for Europe after World War I never developed, and they retreated behind Stalin's slogan of "socialism in one country." The

economic crisis they still confidently predict for the United States source of the greatest opposition to their goals, seems far off. The communists against retreat, this time behind the slogan of "peaceful co-existence."

"This sort of thing goes by the name of 'living Marxism,'" which means dogma can be shifted to meet changed demands. But while the communist leaders wait, the Soviet Union continues in a swift, evolutionary movement which has boosted it from backwardness to an advanced nation.

The more process develops, the more world communism suffers. World communism looks on in confusion while their ideological base in Russia, continues to cut ground from under them. The chain that ties the world conspiracy to Moscow continues to weaken, and for the communists there is a bleak prospect of paralysis and then stagnation. That is the point of attack for the west at Geneva and a hope of victory in the war between slavery and freedom.

Asian Shift of Soviet Planes Seen by U. S.

TOKYO, July 15 (AP)—U. S. far east air forces commandant today said almost one-third of the communist world's air power has been moved into Asia.

It also has taken note of a gradual shift southward from Manchuria and North Korea to communist air power in the past year.

"Such a shift would support any program to 'liberate' Formosa," commented Col. James T. Stewart, USAF assistant deputy for operations, at a military briefing for visiting U. S. newsmen.

Stewart said communist air power, with its weapons of mass destruction, remains the most serious immediate threat to free world security even though communist nations have "a huge combined ground army and a significant number of long-range submarines."

Stewart said a steady buildup of communist air power in recent years has produced a red air strength in the far east of 7,000 to 8,000 aircraft, against which the U. S. air force has in this area less than 2,000 planes.

He said the communist aircraft were built by Soviet Russia and represent almost 90 percent of the total now in existence in Russia and satellite nations.

Doctors Amputate Man's Right Leg

IDAHO FALLS, July 15 (AP)—Doctors amputated the right leg of Grant E. Robinson and yesterday reported the 40-year-old man in good condition.

Robinson's leg was caught in a hay baler on Ed Johnson's farm Wednesday. Johnson, driving a tractor in the same field, didn't hear Robinson shout immediately because of the noise of the engine. Doctors amputated the leg below the knee.

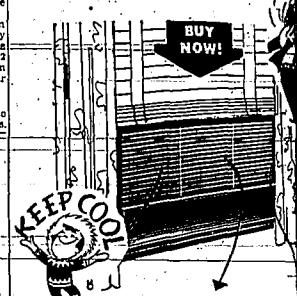
