OPIMISTIC SKEPTICISM

All the halyho, speculation and unwarranted optimism has reached its climax preparatory to the Big Four conference going forward in Geneva Monday.

While Western Europe has been clinging to hopes for real accomplishments at the Geneva meeting, there have been mixed emotions in Washington, ranging from wishful thinking to a profound skepticism.

Our European allies—with the notable exception of West Germany's wise Chancellor Konrad Adenauer—seem to believe that there is more behind Moscow's "new look" than meets the naked eye. President Eisenhower, on the other hand, is said to temper his high hopes with doubts about the Reds' peace drive, suspecting it is designed chiefly to induce a relaxation in the Western defense system.

Moreover, there is a feeling in state department circles that Russia is negotiating from weakness, brought on by grave internal troubles in the red bloc.

Who is right: Britain and France or the U. S.? That is the \$34,000 question. Some of the experts have suggested that neither in Europe nor in the U.S. are the diplomats really concentrating on the major issue.

And the major issue is: How to maintain the unity of the NATO alliance, despite Moscow's bandwagons of a political "new deal" and "peaceful co-existence."

When diplomats say they are hopeful or skeptical about the Geneva conference, they usually refer to the prospects of reaching a settlement with the Moscow-Peking axis. This, of course, is important. But it is not all-important.

It will not be the first time—nor is it likely to be the last—when a conference, with some of the nations of NATO, has ended in a deadlock. However, the conference could end with another split between the NATO powers. That would be really tragic.

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Some counselors are advising that Geneva may be a case of a mis-disappointing conference held in recent years. Top honors in this field are still given to the Bermuda conference of Eisenhower, Churchill and Bidault in December, 1953. Nothing came out of that but a lot of money.

There will, however, be a lot of power around the table when Eisenhower, Eden, Faure and Bulganin sit down together. It will be the first peacetime—or at least the first cold-war—conference of the heads of government.

Some surprises are possible. Yet no negotiated settlements of outstanding crises are contemplated.

There is no agenda for the conference. They will decide what they want to get together. But it is considered unlikely the Big Four will be able to agree on even what all the causes of tension are.

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Some of the causes of tension the Russians may want to bring up, the United States will not want to discuss, and vice versa. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has mentioned "the activities of international communism" and "Eastern European satellites" as causes of tension. The Russians will consider this no business of their partners.

President Eisenhower and Secretary Dulles have both said that the question of reunification of Germany would be discussed. There is increasing evidence, however, that any concessions which the Russians want to make on Germany will be made by the French and Western powers, but directly to German Chancellor Adenauer in Moscow later on.

On the other hand, the Russians want to bring up problems relating to Communist foreign ministers, ambassadors or technical experts who can deal with specific problems like the Far East and disarmament.

Giant Catholic Confab Is Set In Brazil City

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, July 16.—The world's most important Catholic nation today laid aside its political, coffee and inflation problems to roll out a red carpet for pilgrims coming from more than 40 countries to the 56th international ecclesiastical congress.

The largest number of Catholics ever to meet outside Rome was expected to be in attendance on the congress that begins Sunday with an almost three-mile-long parade in "continual" Brazilian history and the preparations made for this congress.

Cardinal Benedetto Aloisi Masella, the legate of Pope Pius XII, arrived today aboard the liner Augustus and will receive the honors of a chief of state.

Hundreds of thousands of persons are expected to give the Pope's representative, one of the greatest popular receptions seen in Rio. He will ride in an open car through the heart of the city to La Tourette palace where he will reside.

The congress lasts one week. It will conclude July 24 when the Pope will address by radio a crowd of 500,000 Catholics who will mass in "continual" Brazilian history and the mass celebrated by Cardinal Masella. The Pope will broadcast his address from the Vatican City to Rio.

Congress square is a 200,000-square-yard fan-shaped area of land bounded by Guanabara bay. It is in the center of Rio, seating accommodations for 200,000 persons from all over the world. It is about 100 yards wide where throngs for 20 cardinals and prelates will be seated. There will be four equestrian thrones, symbolic of four cardinals now behind the iron curtain.

Reunification For Germany Is Big Object

BONN, Germany, July 16.—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer said today that any European security system based on the continued division of Germany would be "unacceptable" to the German people.

Socialist opposition leader Erich Ollenhauer agreed with Adenauer on this point. Both made brief statements in the Bundestag lower house of parliament this morning, shortly before resumption of debate on government legislation for West Germany.

"A European security system based on the continued division of Germany is for us unacceptable," Adenauer said. "Such a system would continue the division of Germany for an indefinite time, and would bring Europe no security."

"No security system can be built which ignores such a deeply rooted demand (as reunification) in the German people."

Ollenhauer said the time has arrived for negotiations for the peaceful reunification of Germany, saying that "a way must and can be found which leads to this goal."

Ollenhauer called on the major powers meeting in Geneva to prevent any attempt to bind the German states or all Germany in the military system of the east or the west.

The midwestern farm vote has been predicted by many political national elections. It was credited with giving President Truman an edge in the election over Gov. Thomas E. Dewey in 1948.

At that time, farmers were disgruntled with a drop in grain prices. The Democratic Party, then in power, controlled both congress and the state.

The week's forecast of the big feed grain crops came shortly after the department reported a sharp expansion in hog production in under way. This expansion, government economists say, is expected to be followed by a sharp drop in hog prices.

In last year's congressional elections, Republicans fared well in rural districts. In the Midwest, hog prices were rising high prices.

But there is the possibility that by this time, hog prices will have dropped to levels where farmers will complain and possibly demand government action to raise prices.

The government does not maintain price supports under hogs. There are supports for corn. Many midwestern growers will be ineligible for this type of government assistance because they do not comply with the department's corn program. This agency allotted planting shares in the effort to hold down corn production. Only those farmers who complied with their allotments will be eligible for price support assistance.

Because of a high degree of ineligibility for corn supports and also because of the availability of large quantities of market pigs, corn and sorghum grain, market prices of corn could well drop to a dollar a bushel in the corn belt during the marketing year ahead.

By comparison, the barley or "bar" exchange price of this grain is \$1.25 a bushel.

Farmer complaints over lower prices of corn and hogs, added to continuing midwestern milk and dairy price supports, could make the situation expected to create political problems for the Republicans. They are in power and the farm program in effect this year and scheduled to be in effect next year is one the Eisenhower administration got congress to accept.

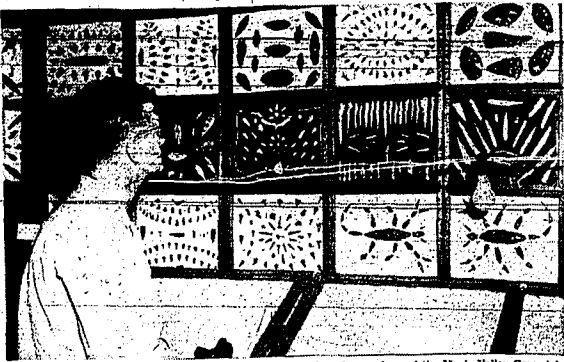

Designers Slate Fashion Showing For Fall Clothes

NEW YORK—Designers have opened their showroom doors officially to let women across the nation know what clothes they'll be buying next fall.

The dresses, coats and suits that are paraded daily past 200 fashion writers from newspapers across the city represent high fashion and big business.

Business is expected to reach a peak \$11 billion high this year. That is the approximate amount will spend in 1955 on clothes for women and girls, not including the shoes we buy.

High-fashion will establish some new figures too. The 20 designers who belong to the couture group of the New York Dress Institute, which stages this week-long fashion preview each summer and winter, represent many of America's most talented style makers.

If they decide skirts are going down three inches, you from now on will all be getting down them, even though these 20 are a small part of the more than 2,000 manufacturers of dresses, coats, suits and separates that operate in New York City alone.

Names like Paulina Trigler, Claire McCardell and Christian Dior are on the American couture group list, although Dior will unveil his Paris collection later this month when the top French couturiers hold their much-publicized preview of new designs for fashion writers alone.

There is a big difference in the way the showings are held in Paris and here. In Paris, the models are the models, not the models. Madame Helene Levacher, director of foreign liaison for Christian Dior's American company, explained.

"There is more excitement about the Paris showings, because there the clothes have been seen by no one until they are shown on the press. Then they write about the clothes the same day and the world knows what they are. We cannot do that way here in America."

It's the difference between clothes designed to be made for thousands of women, as American collections are, and clothes that will be made-to-order for an exclusive clientele, as Paris collections are.

Buyers from American stores began seeing next winter's styles two months ago. They will buy more than 20 million dresses this year, based on past figures, which means designers must sacrifice the languid excitement of Paris fashion previews to get their production lines rolling in time for September shoppers.

That explains why predictions of fashions to come can be made ahead of time before the news is released officially. Several thousand women already know what they're about to get a new kind of shoulder—a line, we're threatened with much longer skirts and the bustling line hasn't recovered from Dior's flattened effect.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO: Mosquito, July 16—Sanitation and control of houseflies and blowflies go together. The job and water say entomologists at the University of Idaho. Without a constant sanitation program, there is little chance of keeping fly numbers down either on the farm or in the city.

Dr. C. Manis, entomologist at the University points out that both the housefly and the blowfly must have filth or decaying matter for breeding places. Best control measures make sure that all such breeding places are destroyed.

"Destroy the breeding place, and you eliminate the fly," Manis says. "Keeping barnyards clean, making sure that all sewage and garbage is taken care of, and promptly removing dead animals will go a long way in controlling flies."

Manis points out that there is as much danger today from fly-borne disease germs as in the past if fly numbers become great enough in and about the home. They are most notorious for carrying germs of typhoid, dysentery and tuberculosis. They also are an excellent means of spreading cholera, mastitis, and brucellosis among farm animals.

Manis says that flies are a most annoying flies cut down milk production in dairy cows and reduce rate gain in beef animals. The entomologist does not leave the use of chemical insecticides out of his fly control program. He says these are only good when thorough sanitation practices are in action. Although the housefly has been used in DDT-immune populations which are not successfully controlled with DDT, Manis says that DDT is not available that will do a thorough control job.

Some of these can be used safely in all places other than in the home or in milkhouses.

Manis points to the spray mixture made with two gallons of 50 per cent malathion emulsion and 20 pounds of sugar in 100 gallons of water as a good example of a new control. The spray is effective for six or eight weeks, depending on the area in which it is used and the temperature at the time it is used. Prolonged hot spells dissipate the effectiveness of the mixture more rapidly. Do not use this sugar-salt mixture on animals, he says. Other good materials are Dieldrin and DDT (Eyer 15/50).

When necessary to spray flies inside the home, Manis recommends using fly free pen DDT in refined, deodorized oil. For milkhouses or other places where milk is handled, use the DDT with four pounds of 50 per cent methoxychlor and two pounds of 25 per cent lindane wettable powder in 100 gallons of water. Sanitation followed by necessary applications of good insecticides is a sure fire way of controlling flies, Manis says. "But," he adds, "it takes a complete program of each-if you are to eliminate these dangerous pests from your home and premises. A haphazard attempt at control brings little satisfaction."

Ballots Mailed Out for Votes On Wool Plan

SHOSHONE, July 16—Ballots have been mailed by the Lincoln county ASC office here to all known wool producers in the county in a referendum on restrictions from wool payments to finance the wool marketing development program. Ballots must be returned to the Shoshone office not later than Aug. 19.

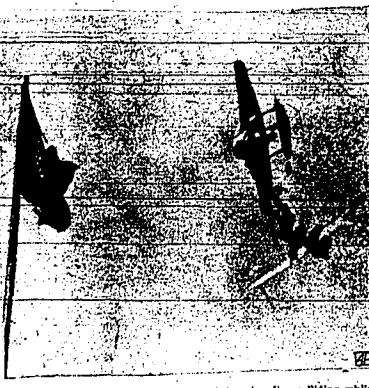
The deductions would provide for advertising and other promotional activities—to enlarge and improve the market for wool and lamb. Before the agreement can be put into effect, producers owning at least two-thirds of the sheep and lamb must vote their approval. Producers who have owned sheep 6 months of age or older, for at least 30 days since Jan. 1 will be eligible to vote. Volume of production will be based on the number of sheep 6 months of age or older owned for at least 30 days since the January 1 date. The number of sheep will be noted on the ballot. If the referendum is approved, deduction will be one cent a pound from wool payments and at the rate of five cents a hundred pounds of the live weight, from lamb yearling payments.

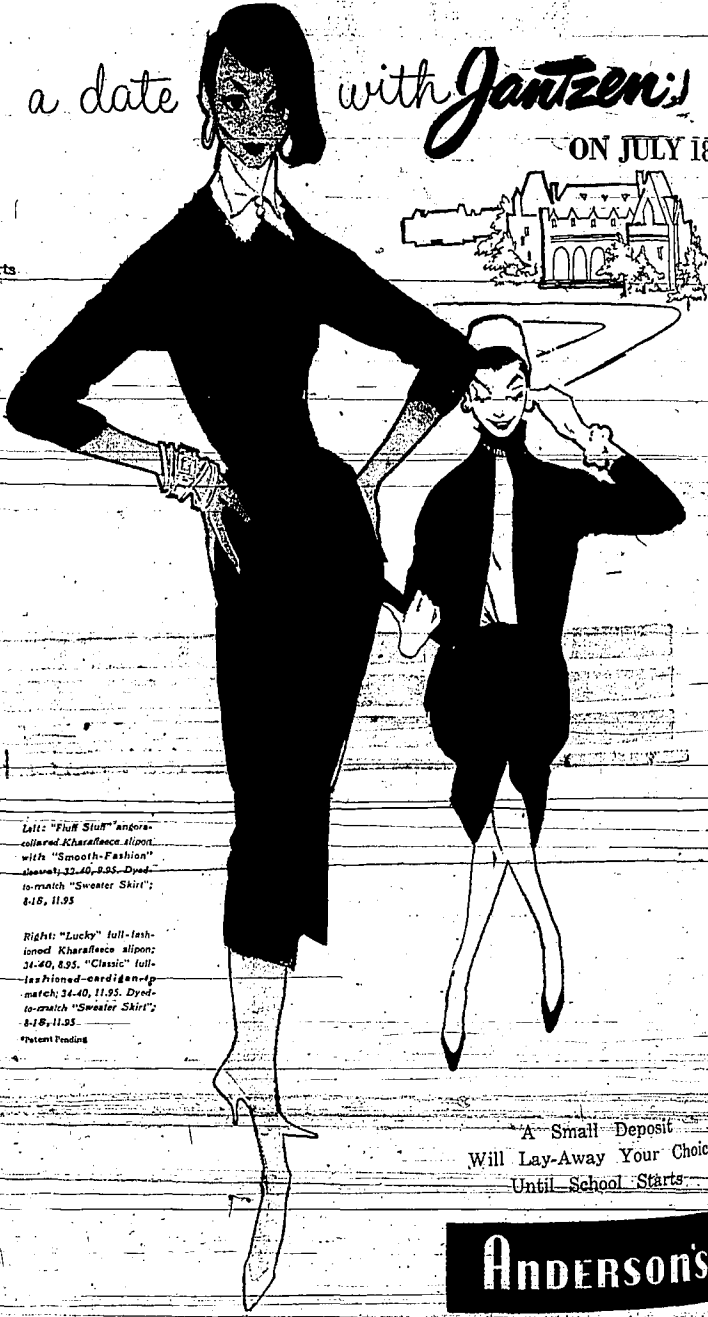

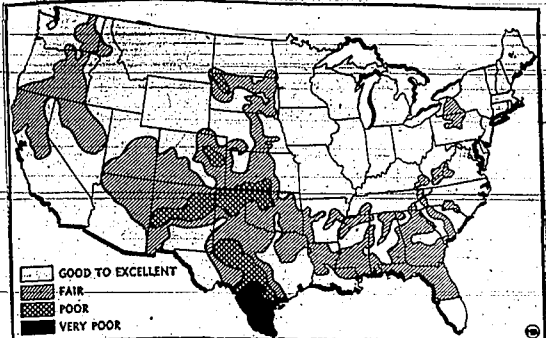

The findings of the investigation will be made public as soon as they are available.

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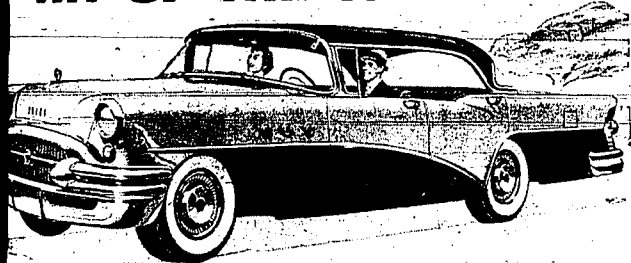

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Mrs. Anna Marten, with her bag of remedies and her dialect, is a well-known figure in Buhl. Although she has lived in Buhl for many years, her English has improved little but she seems to enjoy a laugh at her expense, as much as people enjoy laughing at her idiosyncrasies. One of her mottoes, spoken in broken English, is "To laugh makes health and health makes happiness." So Mrs. Marten goes about her tasks dispensing both health and happiness. A Russian American, she came to this country in 1907. But she says she has been so busy raising her three sons working on her farm and distributing good cheer she has had little time to master the English language. Besides she was busy helping people through major and minor illnesses. In Russia, she claims, her mother was a "doctor" and from her she learned to massage. She has used the art to ease away the aches and pains of many Buhl residents and, on occasions, she has served as midwife at births. Before moving to Buhl, Mrs. Marten lived in Blackfoot and while there, aided at the birth of Mrs. Cecil Jones. In 1945 in Buhl, Mrs. Jones' son, Alan Jones, was born with Mrs. Marten's help. Mrs. Jones' brother, Lewis Wenzberg, McCall, Nev., also came into this world with Mrs. Marten on hand when the two families lived in the Fairview district. When the Martens came to the Buhl area in 1929 they settled on a farm in the Fairview district. They moved to Buhl 15 years ago when Marten's health began to fail. A few weeks ago, her own health failed.

Salmon River Trip Recalled As Adventure

LEWISTON, July 16 (AP)—The Salmon river, the famous "river" to return. It is named because it is impossible to go upstream the length of the river by boat—but making the voyage downstream is quite a trick, too.

R. C. Bailey made the perilous Salmon trip about 20 years ago, and the boat he used is the only type which has navigated the stream successfully. Bailey went to Salmon City in March, when the Salmon was frozen over and the upper valley was jammed with ice. He made preparations there and selected a co-pilot and departed down the torrential stream during high water, when the more dangerous rocks were submerged.

The vessel used for the trip was 32 feet long, eight feet wide and three feet deep. When the boat was loaded with five tons of supplies, it drew 14 inches of water. To navigate the boat, the men used huge sweeps which had 24-foot long handles and blades which were 10 feet long, 13 inches wide and 1 1/4 inches thick.

During the first day of their perilous voyage, the men progressed 10 miles to the Salmon's north fork. They first met trouble at White Horse rapids where their boat got stuck again, but a little maneuvering with a two-foot pole kept the vessel on its way. On the second day, the men coped with a stretch of cold water where the river was almost at a standstill for three miles and a raging waterfall where the stream plunged 50 feet within half a mile. But they managed to arrive safely at Shoup, where they spent the night.

On the third day the couple reached Pines Creek rapids, the point reached by Capt. William Clark when he decided the river was not navigable. Within one minute, Bailey and his companion were swept over the danger point. The boat was tossed about like a matchstick. With their axes they threw the craft from one side of the stream to the other in rapid succession as white-toped breakers rolled from eight to 10 feet in the air. The men encountered the celebrated Black canyon on the fourth day of their stint. This four-mile-long precipice above Hot Springs Bar has a sheer drop-off with a seven-foot waterfall.

The only way the vessel could navigate the obstacle was to pass through a narrow opening near the center of the falls. The first attempt was nearly disastrous when the boat created against a huge jagged boulder. Somehow they escaped, dragged the boat a quarter of a mile upstream and made another try. This time they struck the opening at just the right place.

Bailey considered this venture well-rewarded, which indeed it was and still is. Trips down the stream are comparatively rare; when persons in search of adventure try it these days, they use powerful outboard motors. But Bailey's old-time boat still serves as the model for conquering the treacherous stream.

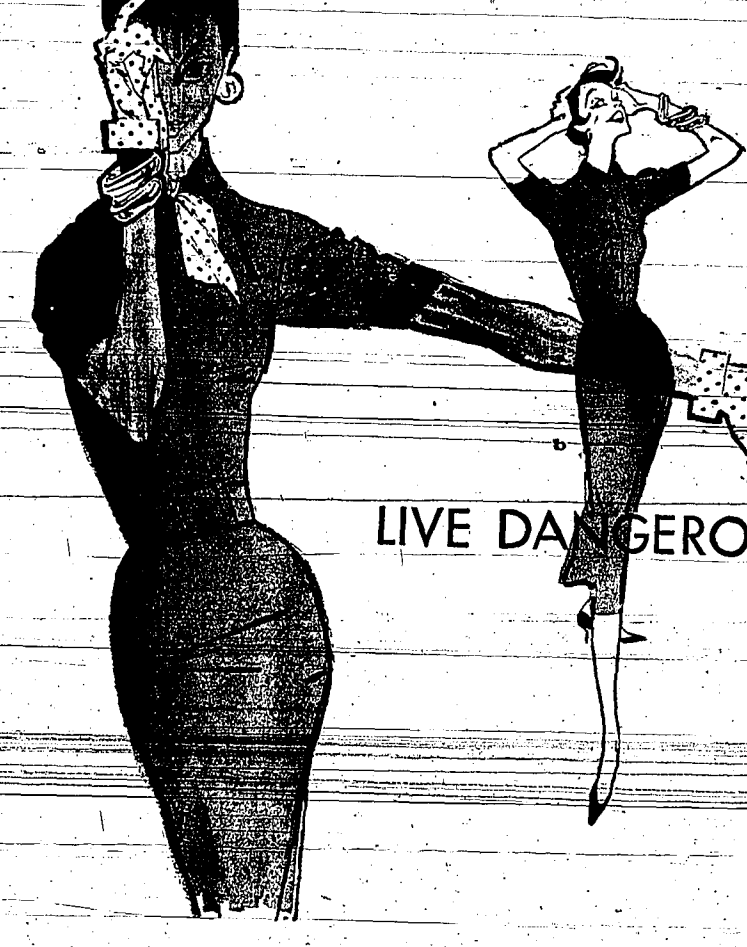
