### Sidown Ends In Nevada at State's Prison

CARSON CITY, July 20 (AP)—Wearily hungry Nevada state prisoners gave up their strike yesterday in the face of threats that patrolmen guarding the prison walls were prepared to use force.

The convicts gave up five minutes after Warden Bernard West said he would strike prisoners that 25 heavily armed members of the Nevada state patrol ringing the walls of the court yard were getting tired and won't wait much longer.

Ready to Return  
A reply came that the prisoners were ready to return to the cells if they hadn't seen since the afternoon when they refused to budge from the recreation yard, demanding more privileges and better opportunities for parole.

Three hours under the bright sun, the convicts moved slowly into their cell blocks. Guards searched each cell. The last man to enter his cell at 7 p.m.

Tired and Sick  
The men don't want anything. They are tired and sick, a three-man committee of prisoners told the warden after the ultimatum.

Bernard ordered the convicts fed about 8 o'clock yesterday. He said he had not decided what steps would be taken against the ringleaders.

Wagon Collision  
Lieut. William Coleman, in command of the prison during a brief absence of Warden Art Bernard, said today he was studying the wreck. "It looks like it may be a joint holdup."

Among those returning early to the cell blocks and their first meal in 30 hours was Tony Jackson, 65, a convicted murderer. A number of younger convicts signalled their desire to leave but were restrained by the warden. "I'm not a socialist," he said.

Rebellion had settled into a tense, nervous game yesterday and neither side had made a move until about 11 o'clock. The convicts were allowed to move out, snuff, after a night of bickering and quarrelling. The youth committee prisoners lotted quietly about a grassy lawn while sent guards sat on the high walls with submachine guns.

Wyoming Gaming Probe Is Sought  
CHEYENNE, Wyo., July 20 (AP)—Gov. M. M. Nease yesterday asked to look into reports of large-scale gambling in Wyoming's Jackson Hole resort.

Request yesterday came from the state's attorney, R. J. Keenan, D. Laramie. He charged that a recent trip to the town of Jackson he saw dice, roulette, and black jack games operating.

Keenan made the trip to Jackson, Wyo., and stayed overnight. He said gambling was being conducted on a large scale at numerous places, including one of the main hotels and several homes.

Wyoming statutes relating to gambling give the state right to power of eminent domain. This is left to county officials.

Visitor Believed Killed in Tumble  
YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo., July 20 (AP)—A Bell Lake city man was believed killed yesterday when he fell about 400 feet from a canyon ledge in Yellowstone national park.

Mr. Zep, Joseph Hoff, 52, identified him as Bob Landon, about 23. He said Landon fell into the waters of the Yellowstone river flowing below the ledge.

Wreck in Nevada Causes 3 Deaths  
TONOPAH, Nev., July 20 (AP)—A single-car auto accident near here July 19 claimed the lives of three people when Mrs. Hazel Holt, 52, Las Vegas, died in a Tonopah hospital.

Mrs. Holt's mother, Mrs. George Edwina, 81, Portland, Ore., was killed in the wreck. Her husband, a Mrs. Holt's husband, H. E. was not injured.

Mrs. Holt's husband died a week later of injuries suffered in the mishap.

Mrs. Holt's death marked the 33rd traffic fatality in the state to date and hiked the state's county highway toll to three.

Hearings Set By Solons on Security Plan

WASHINGTON, July 20 (AP)—Senate hearings on a social security legislation were ordered yesterday, but final action on a bill to liberalize certain benefits still seemed likely to be held off until next year. The senate finance committee agreed to start consideration Friday of a house-passed measure to provide for earlier payments to women and disabled workers. Mrs. Cresta Culp lobby, residing secretary of health, education and welfare, was listed as the first witness. Senator Byrd, D., Va., committee chairman, announced the plan. He said the group intended to go ahead with hearings on this and other legislation until congress adjourns for the year. Leaders of both the senate and house have set their sights on quitting by Aug. 1. A provision to take into the system about 200,000 additional professional persons—still excluding doctors—has caused little dispute. But the financial impact of two other propositions has evoked 20-odd amendments from many Republicans. These would make women eligible for benefits at the age of 62, rather than the present 65, and allow payments to disabled workers at 50 instead of 65. The changes would be put into effect next Jan. 1, but at the same time both employees and employers would have to pay out an additional 1/2 per cent tax on the first \$4,000 of earnings. The present social security tax is two per cent on employees and two per cent on employers.

### Japan Women Lose Round in Brothel Fight

TOKYO, July 20 (AP)—Angry housewives, fighting to stamp out legal prostitution, suffered a major setback to parliament last night. Prime Minister Ichiro Hata's Democratic party and the closely allied Liberal party defeated an anti-prostitution bill in the judicial affairs committee.

The action produced pandemonium in the visitors' gallery. Outraged women supporters of the legislation shrieked denunciation of the conservatives. One woman fainted.

Though the Democrats later proposed and put through the committee session an alternative proposal recommending study of the problem, the bill was not mollified. The housewives, once so submissive in this country, promised to step up their war against brothels.

**Narrive Threat**

For Japan's powerful prostitution interests, the committee decision meant they had survived the first big threat to their centuries-old organization of red-light districts since a dissolution order by U. S. Gen. Douglas MacArthur during the American occupation.

It is only since World War II that Japanese women have won political equality. The experts predict they will lose their present right but not before they and some politicians into retirement.

### Tito Emerges As Big Key in Europe Plans

By United Press  
President Tito of Yugoslavia probably will be frequently in the minds of the big four leaders who are meeting in Geneva.

Sixteen years ago, Tito was just the communist satellite ruler of a little Balkan country of 11 million people. Today, he is one of the key figures of 1944.

Tito is being courted by the Kremlin, whose "summit" men made a humiliating pilgrimage to Belgrade to mend relations with him. He also is being courted, in a quiet way, by the United States and its allies.

Tito is being courted too by "neutralists," Jawaharlal Nehru of India and U Nu of Burma. King Paul and Queen Frederica of Greece are to pay Tito, a communist since his youth, a state visit next month.

Plan to visit  
On Tito's list of engagements for the next few months are state visits to Russia, France, Egypt, Ethiopia and Lebanon.

It was in July, 1943, that Tito broke with the Soviet line. He refused to subordinate the interests of his own country to those of Russia. He was expelled from the Comintern, happened before in the communist world. It was predicted that Tito would be overthrown by his own troops and executed, or assassinated by Kremlin gunmen.

Instead, Tito's men rallied to him. Ever since, he has been on the upgrade. In 1942, Tito's relations with Greece and Yugoslavia were deteriorating. Now he has entered an alliance with Greece and Turkey against Soviet aggression.

Feed Ends  
Yugoslavia's feud with Italy was ended when the Trieste area was partitioned between the two countries.

Tito's attitude will have to be considered in all negotiations in Geneva on a European security organization. Not only has Yugoslavia one of the best armies in Europe, but its geographical position is important. Yugoslavia borders on Italy, Greece, and the Balkans. It is a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

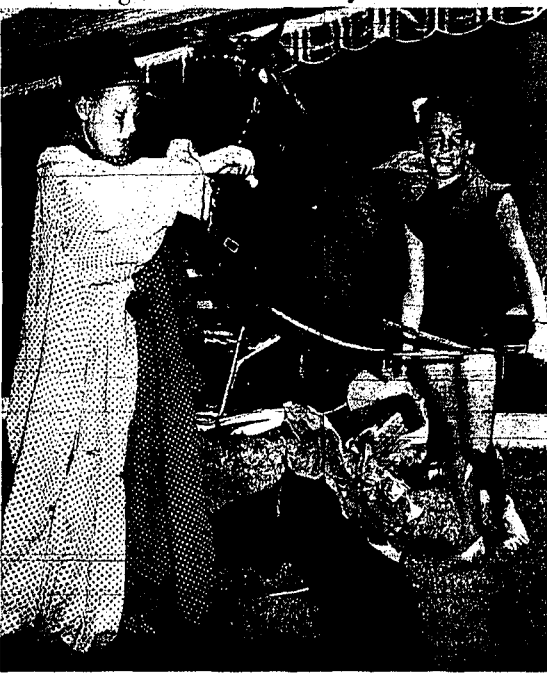

### Pressing Need for Working Public Cited as "Napeteria"

NEW YORK, July 20.—What this country needs is half a million napeterias.

What is a napeteria? Well, actually it hasn't been invented yet. But it is something like a cafeteria and a garage.

In a napeteria you eat your own self food; in a garage you park your car. But in a napeteria you park your tired old body, take the weight off your feet and mind and serve yourself some sleep—in other words, it's a place where you can take a nap.

The napeteria is today perhaps civilization's greatest health need. As any doctor knows, half the tired feelings in America would disappear if people got one more hour of sleep every day.

The immediate query arises, "Well, if that case why don't people get that extra sleep at home?"

And the obvious answer of course, is that it is impossible. The modern home is a great place to visit, but a poor place to live in—that is, when a man is looking for sleep.

Too many other interesting things to do in it—like watching television, throwing parties or listening to the quavering of neighbors in the apartment next door.

Ever try to take a nap at home? Can't be done. Inside, the phone rings, the vacuum cleaner growls, the electric dish washer groans and bubbles, the automobile

Laundry machine gasps and grinds as it tears apart your soiled shirt. Outside dogs bark, birds bellow in the trees by your bedroom window, and merry sounds float up from the neighborhood children assaulting their neighbors at play.

Besides, the average working man really needs his hour-long nap most right in the middle of his work day.

There is a prejudice in this country against taking a nap after a lunch. It is regarded as slacking and un-American. But the custom of the ancients, a nap after lunch, is an honored and sensible one.

Winston Churchill decided in his youth that the human body was ill-adapted to eight hours of steady attention to a task. All his life he has taken a daily refreshing nap. Thomas Edison, who once said he only slept four hours a night, also took regular naps. Both Churchill and Edison managed to live to a ripe old age, and got three times as much work done as the ordinary man.

As employers so far haven't put in office dormitories, the napeteria needs the best solution.

Here's how it works. You waddle into it after a heavy lunch, plunk down your quarter or half buck, and lie down on a slowly moving belt.

The belt carries you along until you come to a real cubicle containing a bed and a comfortable pillow. You roll off the belt onto the bed and a soundproof door descends.

There is a button you can push if you want soft music. You fall into the rug, the electric dish washer an hour later, musical chimes wake

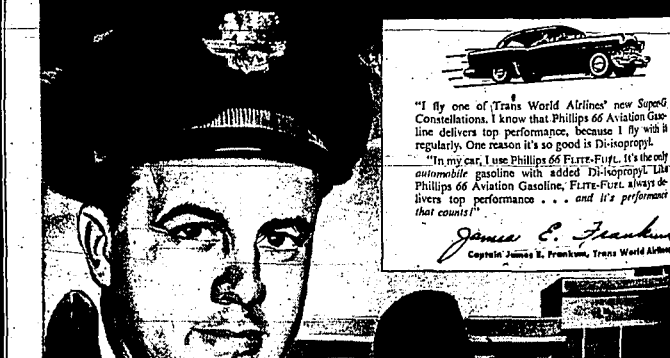

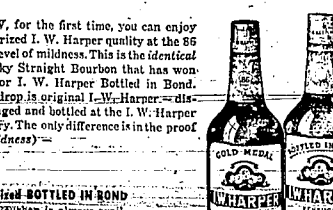

### Solemn Parts Begin in Huge Catholic Meet

RIO DE JANEIRO, July 20 (AP)—Cardinal Guizot, bishop of Rio de Janeiro, celebrated the opening pontifical mass today to lead the 30th international eucharistic congress into its solemn phase.

The mass at 10 a. m. (EST) was the first of four scheduled before the closing pontifical mass Sunday will be celebrated by Benedictine A. Cardinal Masella, personal representative of Pope Pius XII.

Later in the evening the first solemn session of the week-long congress will be held in Congress square to begin a series of homages to Christ in the holy eucharist.

The session will include addresses by Cardinal Masella and Cardinal Guizot. The conference, a lay organization meeting concurrently with the congress, has held a series of discussions aimed at coordinating the widespread activities of the 31 world Catholic groups.

The congress opened last night with the enthronement of Pius XII. The ceremony was witnessed by more than 200,000 persons.

President Jose Cafe Filho, his cabinet members and many of the nation's top military officers were present for the installation of Pius XII.

### Harried Solons Find Females More Deadly, Even in Politics

WASHINGTON, July 20—Harried house Democrats and Republicans (male type) conceded today that the female of the species is more deadly than the male, even in politics.

In a moment of rare carelessness the men turned the floor over to the ladies of the house yesterday. And the ensuing political slugging became so intense the boys had to blow a whistle to prevent the hassle from becoming a real hair-pulling dandybrook.

It all happened during house debate on the minimum wage bill. The house was dressing alone in dictatorial fashion when Rep. Edith Green, D. Ore., approached the house microphone with a message.

It seems that Bertha Adkins, an official of the Republican national committee, was quoted in a local paper as advising the Republican party to "reach the voter at the lowest level" and Mrs. Green wanted to read an open letter to Miss Adkins on the subject, signed by seven female house Democrats.

"Our generosity impels us to assume that by the water at the lowest level you do not refer to the lowest intelligence level or at the lowest ethical level. Consequently we assume you mean the lowest economic level."

The letter went on to say that it was the Democrats who had always helped the poor folks but that even so the Democrats do not recognize class warfare for political or other purposes.

The women who had signed the letter—Reps. Edna F. Kelly, N. Y.; Vera Buchanan, Pa.; Oracie Frost, Idaho; Leonor K. Sullivan, Mo.; Iris P. Blitch, Ga.; Martha W. Griffin, Mich.; Coys Knutson, Minn.; and herself.

A couple of male Republicans tried to needle Mrs. Green, but Rep. Marguerite Gillis, Church, R. Ill., quickly brushed them aside and took over the microphone with fire in her eyes.

Mrs. Green said she wished her "good sisters" among the Democrats had checked with the Republican women about Miss Adkins' remark. She said Miss Adkins was referring to the rank-and-file voters when she referred to the "lowest level."

Mrs. Church explained that Republicans were being urged to go from door to door telling men and women "what it means to live under the wonderful Eisenhower administration where they can go to bed at night without wondering in what foreign country their boys are going to be shot at next."

This propelled Mrs. Frost out of her chair like a shot. She lunged for a microphone, but Rep. Peter Frelinghuysen, Jr., R. N. J., got the floor first.

He accused the Democratic girls of banding together for political purposes. He made the unique suggestion that women should stick to the subject at hand—minimum wages that is.
