WASHINGTON—A generally known fact behind the scenes of the Memphis, Tenn., strike is that the Tennessee valley authority and to build their own utility system that the Mississippi valley authority is doing so. It is usually in the process. And it was the Dixon-TVA proposal which made possible this strike.

Like every other municipal and cooperative customer of TVA, Memphis has a right to be heard. It is a matter of federal government power as exercised by the TVA board. Under the terms of the act, Memphis was allowed to impose a 15 per cent surcharge on the more important services. The annual revenue amounted to \$150,000.

Many other cities and electric companies in the TVA territory collect a 10 per cent surcharge, which pays the local expense in handling TVA power. In view of the fact that the TVA has not increased the rate to consumers was not increased too heavily by addition of the surcharge.

RECHARGE ELIMINATION ORDERED—TVA authorities recently ordered Memphis to eliminate the surcharge, which would mean a serious loss of revenue to the city. In the midst of this controversy, came the administration's proposal that Memphis be allowed to purchase its own power from TVA. In lieu of energy which TVA must turn over to atomic plants, Memphis is to accept TVA power to run its own plant. When Mayor Frank Toney gave a firm promise to that purpose on the 15th of June, the TVA board authorized the contract with Dixon-TVA.

GLAD TO BREAK WITH TVA—Mayor Toney's demeanor and remarks on his visit to Washington agree that he was only too happy to break off connections with TVA. The TVA board has been in the campaign, especially as many business interests in Memphis and West Memphis, Ark., favored the Dixon-TVA contract.

It is also probable that any other "captive cities" within the TVA empire may follow Toney's example. They expect their contracts with the TVA, any time they may cancel or reduce their surcharges any time it sees fit.

Furthermore, the contract stipulates that any surplus resulting from the surcharge must be applied to a reduction or elimination of the municipal tax. The TVA board has agreed to keep utility charges at a minimum.

TVA CONTROL—In other words, through its monopoly on the generation, distribution and cost of power, TVA has had partial control of the finances of Memphis and other cities in its area. The purchases have been at the mercy and whim of federal bureaucrats appointed by a man who has no other business but to understand local needs.

Despite technical details and differences, the outcome of this contract is a new era of control, one that Memphis, and possibly many other cities in the valley, may be freed of a federal domination.

Incidentally, Mayor Toney's eager acceptance of the new arrangement appears to refute the Kefauver-Gore-Lohan contract policy controversy, known as the "Spot Dome" (Kefauver), and that it will be a major issue in the presidential election next year. Under their contract with the TVA, they are counterpoising neatly.

SUPER HIGHWAY PROGRAM

Prospects for a new "pay-as-you-ride" highway construction program seem to be looking up in the house of representatives. The proposal has come out of a house public works subcommittee headed by George H. Fallon, D. Me. It is to finance a year, 45 billion-dollar road-building program by increasing federal taxes on gasoline, diesel fuel for trucks, truck tires and trucks.

The Fallon plan would be substituted for President Eisenhower's 10-year, \$1 billion program. It is financed entirely by bond issues, as proposed by the special highway commission under Gen. Lucius Clay.

The Fallon bill would also have to be substituted for the senate-passed bill sponsored by Sen. Albert M. Gore, D. Tenn. The Gore bill provides for a 5-year, 18 billion-dollar program paid for out of general revenues.

This would mean an increase in federal government spending of over 3.5 billion dollars a year. There would be a corresponding increase in the national debt. But a majority of the senate believed this better than paying higher interest on a road construction bond issue, which would cost even more.

As far as the Eisenhower administration is concerned, if it cannot have the Clay report program and bond issue, it would much prefer the Fallon program of the house to the Gore program of the senate.

But whether the senate will be willing to accept the house program, involving automotive tax increases, is something else again. The way the Fallon program changes up now, subject to still further revision, is like this:

Increase gasoline taxes from two to three cents a gallon, to yield an extra 475 million dollars a year.

Increase diesel fuel taxes from two to six cents a gallon, to yield an extra 44 million dollars a year.

Increase the tax on new trucks from 8 to 10 per cent, to yield an extra 42 million dollars a year.

Increase taxes on truck tires weighing over 90 pounds from five to 15 cents a pound and increase the tax on tubes for heavy truck tires from nine to 15 cents a pound. These two increases would yield an extra 30 million dollars a year.

Increase a new tax of 7 1/2 cents a pound on cambalck for the tire retreads. Yield, an extra 22 million dollars a year.

The total yield of these six new taxes is estimated at over 600 million dollars the first year. But the total yield of the new taxes and their use increased from year to year, it is estimated that over the 15 years of the program, through 1970, the total tax increase yield would be around 12 billion dollars.

This sum, added to the 23 billion dollars collected from existing taxes on tires, tubes, diesel fuel, truck tires and trucks, would just about make the Fallon program self-supporting.

EUROPE'S VIEW OF U.S.

It was not so long ago that Europeans—largely due to the influence of Hollywood's "class B" pictures—regarded the U. S. as a land of gangsters and speakeasies.

Chicago and Al Capone were better known to the sophisticated Parisian than were Washington and the high standards of living of the average American.

Though Scott Fitzgerald died 15 years ago and some of his "characters" have since become successful doctors, lawyers, teachers or businessmen, the myth of the American speakeasy persisted abroad until quite recently.

Today it is the problem of the "American juvenile delinquency" that troubles the friendly and not-so-friendly European. With Sen. Joseph McCarthy and his "red baiting" tactics, the longer the issue, he has found another reason for pointing an accusing finger at the U. S.

Perhaps the man from Europe who never winks at the trouble to find the true source of American strength and progress is not likely to be blamed—Reading the U. S. press or listening to our television and radio commentators he must inevitably come to the conclusion that the majority of American youngsters are juvenile delinquents.

We are therefore invited to the London Economist for its fresh and friendly appraisal of American "Youth in Jeopardy."

Writes the Economist: "In the midst of the furor, it is easy to get the impression that all American children are living lives filled with horror and crime, but in fact 95 per cent of them are growing up in a normal and healthy way."

Unfortunately, the Economist, which always takes an impartial view of the U. S., is only too ready to blame the U. S. for the rise of juvenile delinquency. The majority of Europe's newspapers and organs of public opinion, are quite content to paint the more lurid aspects of juvenile crime in the U. S.

It is indeed ironic that even the leaders of the "Red paradise" where juvenile crime has been rampant on a vast scale since early days of the Bolshevik revolution, speak richly of the rise of youthful waywardness in "capitalist America."

The blame is to be exacted to unearth the cause of juvenile delinquency and find the proper remedy. As Sen. Estes Kefauver, who heads the senate subcommittee which is investigating juvenile delinquency, said recently: "The causes of delinquency are as complex as our society."

And American society has become more and more complex in the last 25 years.

House Okays Law to Admit Basques' Kin

WASHINGTON, July 21.—The house judiciary committee has approved a bill permitting the entry from Spain of 87 wives and children of Basque sheepherders now working in western states.

All 87 would be admitted as "non-quota" emigrants.

The bill also would lift current restrictions on the Spanish quota and give priority to the immigration from Spain. Puerto Rican and other "skilled technicians" needed in hospitals and social welfare agencies in the "economic and social development" of the island.

Half of Spain's annual 250 quota is currently "monitored" to account for 600 sheepherders already in this country. This has the effect of limiting the quota to 125 a year for the next four years.

In effect, the bill would grant the sheepherders priority to account and restores the quota to 250 a year.

The measure was sponsored by chairman Francis E. Warner, D., Pa., of the immigration subcommittee. He said he learned of the sheepherder dependency problem during a visit with Generalissimo Francisco Franco in Madrid.

Western sheep or wool growers had always indicated that all sheepherders are Baschons, he said, but Franco said some had left families behind in Spain that now are on relief.

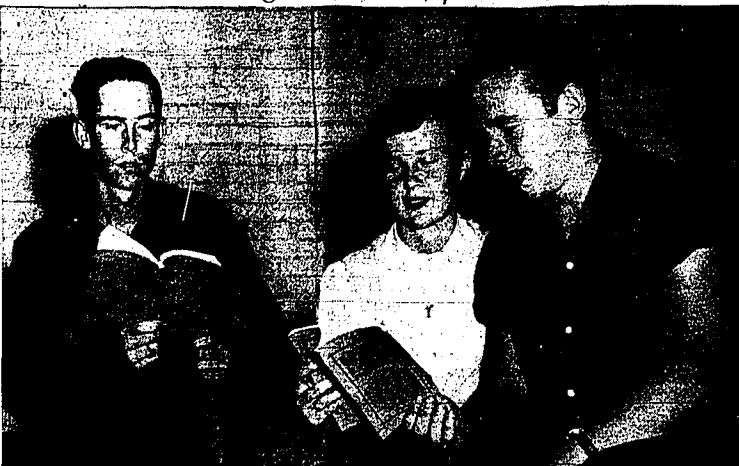

GENEVA, July 21—A four-power agreement on lowering the iron curtain between east and west was confidently expected today to emerge from the big four summit talks.

The conference scheduled formal discussion "development of such contacts between east and west" as one of the four main items on the agenda.

Conference sources predicted that an understanding was almost certain to be reached on this point. But it would be done by slow stages.

Observers said the talks would set only the broad outlines of the scope of future contacts between east and west which have been divided for nearly 10 years.

But the move led the assumption that direct contacts between the two camps might prove one of the most effective ways to relax international tension.

East and west still have widely differing ideas on how they could usefully be set up and developed.

Both Britain and France stand solidly behind the United States and are prepared to go along with American officials emphasized today.

The west has most prominently in mind an understanding with Russia which would enable western diplomats and press representatives to move more freely in the communist east.

Russia has in mind, in addition to similar contacts, a loosening up of the west's trade embargo. Bulganin has said that "this could lead to favorable results for the improvement of the well-being of peoples, relaxation of tension and consolidation of confidence among nations."
