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Woman Dies as Car Rolls Over Into Field; Driver Is Still in Critical Condition

Mrs. Jacqueline Inge, 31-1420 Eleventh avenue east, a medical technician at Magic Valley Memorial hospital since last Jan. 1, was killed instantly shortly before 2 a. m. Friday when the 1950 Ford convertible in which she was riding left the road and rolled into a field three miles east of Five Points east on highway 30.

Deputy Sheriff H. E. Kaufman, who discovered the wreck, and state and city police said the car ran off the road on the left side and continued for 400 feet with 700 feet wheels off the paved section of the road.

Some 111 feet of the marks indicate the car traveled across the road and continued for 123 feet before it began rolling over into the field.

It took three or four times for a driver to get over the top of the right side, the car scraped a telephone pole and jumped 30 feet across a ditch. The car was demolished. It did not burn. Mrs. Inge was thrown out of the vehicle and was lying under the car when it rolled over.

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Razed Warehouse, Elevator Smolder In Wake of Flames

HAZELTON, July 22—Fire fanned by heavy winds destroyed the Hazelton Elevator and Warehouse Thursday night and menaced a lumber yard and two nearby warehouses as firemen from nearby communities fought through a thunderstorm to control the blaze.

While no official estimate of the damage was made, Hazelton residents unofficially estimated damage at one-half million dollars. The rains still unrelenting Friday morning and Charles J. Kelly, Twin Falls, district manager of the Colorado Mining and Elevator company which owns the structures, said the safe was "still too hot to open so we can't check the records." He said an official damage estimate would have to come from the firm's home office.

Smoke blackened the village of Hazelton as firemen pumped a stream of water into the fire with seven pieces of apparatus in operation.

The roof of the Bole-Payette lumberyard across the street and west of the elevator burst into flames from the flying sparks and chunks of blazing debris knocked loose from the elevator by the force of the water. Several tons of lumber were burned in the roof before hoses could be brought into play.

The fire spread to the elevator and water quickly started to pour as firemen played hoses on the walls to prevent the structure from bursting into flames.

Walls of the collapsing elevator fell across a freight car loaded with lumber, shoring up the structure, setting it afire.

Across the railroad tracks, the warehouse of the Bole-Payette Inc. was endangered by collapsing walls and flying sparks but constant streams of water from fire apparatus kept it from igniting.

Fire trucks from Kimberly, Jerome, and other nearby communities rushed to the scene in response to a radioed plea for help from the Hazelton fire department.

Pumper trucks ran lines to ditches and pumped water onto the windows of the elevator. Firemen had to have started shortly after 5 p.m. The origin has not been determined. Blasting was listed as one possible cause.

Fire hoses and trucks from Jerome and Kimberly were in the center of Hazelton, causing traffic over highway 25 to be routed south of town. Volunteers directed traffic.

Hazelton residents prepared for the night at the start of the fire. Many believed it would wipe out the north section of town.

The elevator and the warehouse were filled with beams and wheat. "Rain" began to fall shortly after the fire started, but the fire was completely destroyed.

Bob English is manager of the elevator.

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Eisenhower Asks Russ to Drop Iron Curtain, Admit Exchanges

GENEVA, July 22 (AP)—President Eisenhower urged Soviet Russia today to tear down the iron curtain and permit freer exchange of ideas and travelers between east and west.

An American Peace Officer, James C. Hagerty, said the heads of government at their session instructed their foreign ministers to continue their discussions of three other problems—disarmament, German unification and European security—until they are able to bring back a report to the Big Four.

The top leaders met an hour later than usual, to give the foreign ministers more time in their efforts to come up with a solution on those matters.

Hagerty said also that Premier Bulganin's proposal for a nonaggression pact between the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and the Warsaw Pact Organization was discussed.

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Panel Favors U. S. Schools Building Sum

WASHINGTON, July 22—The House labor committee today approved a bill to authorize \$1,000,000 for the construction of new national buildings during the next four years.

Frank Thompson, Jr., D-N. J., said reporters the vote was 21 to 5.

Thompson said the committee authorized Chairman Graham A. Barden, D-N. C., to ask the rules committee to report on the bill immediately for action by the house.

But committee members were split on the question of action on the bill before congress goes out on the year.

Opponents of the bill and two Democrats voted against the bill—Barden and Rep. Phil M. Landrum, D., Ga. The bill is pending in the House.

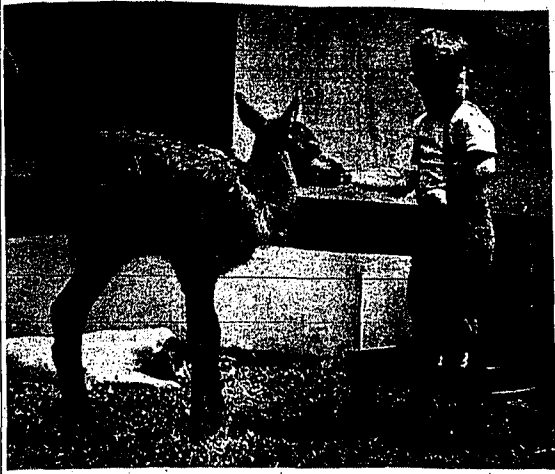

Youngster Finds He's Just too Short To Give Adopted Elk Calf Daily Milk

HAILEY, July 22—Year-old Bradley Couita finds he isn't tall enough to feed the 3-day-old baby elk calf his grandfather Pete Couita just brought home in a starved condition.

Couita, fishing at Democrat gulch west of Hailey, heard a splashing sound in the water. Investigating, he found a new-born elk floundering in the creek. He lifted it out and beside the stream found a second calf. Thinking the mother was somewhere in the neighborhood, he did not touch the second calf—as he had been told that if a human touches the young of either a deer or elk the mother will have nothing to do with it.

Early next morning Couita returned to see if the cow elk had taken her twins away. They were still where he had left them and the one he had rescued from the water was dead. The other seemed barely alive. Gathering it in his arms, he took the calf to his car and brought it to Tom Mizer, game conservation officer in Hailey.

When young Bradley saw the baby elk he wanted it for a pet. Mizer has made arrangements with fish and game department for Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Couita to keep it until after the hunting season this fall. It drinks two quarts of milk daily and is fed every four hours.

Since its arrival at the Couita home it has been the center of attraction for youngsters and oldsters alike.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt has joined the ranks of the "pot" crowd, which includes many newspaper heavy subsidies to profit-making commercial aviation companies. Since her husband inspired expansion of the "pot" crowd...

Mrs. Roosevelt's deep concern is revealed in a letter she wrote to Sen. Styles Bridges, N.H., chairman of the senate appropriations committee, on July 1, 1954.

She referred to Senator Douglas' floor presentation, which revealed that the airlines are getting \$100 million a year in subsidies from the government.

She asked for a thorough familiar with this question, and I only wish to say that for a number of years, I have watched this situation, including all the political and public relations angles.

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Is That So!

Lightning Strikes Same Spot Again

Mail call. Because it's thunder season, many letters deal with thunder and lightning. Today's lightning strikes the same spot again.

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PEACEFUL ATOM SHOW

The big thrill for some of the world's great nuclear scientists at the United Nations conference on peaceful uses of atomic energy, opening at Geneva, July 3, is that they'll be permitted to push a button.

That will close an electric circuit to start the machinery that will operate a small atomic reactor. It will be the principal item in the U. S. exhibit at Geneva.

The exhibit at Geneva will be a "swimming pool" type, will be at the bottom of a vertical, cylindrical tank, 10 feet in diameter, buried 20 feet in the ground. Water is kept circulating in the tank to keep the reactor cool and as insulation to prevent radiation.

When the button is pushed the reactor will give off the equivalent of about 10 kilowatts of energy from the eight pounds of uranium 235 in the reactor at the bottom of the tank. This will give off a light blue glow through the water. Occasionally the reactor will be flashed to 100 kw. output. Then the blue glow will be brighter.

This may sound like a long way to go to see a very simple thing. But it must be recalled that this exhibit of the United States, Canada, Britain, France and Russia, few scientists have had a chance to see an atomic reactor at work.

The United States has now made available 440 pounds of uranium—enough for 22 small research reactors—and has offered to pay half the cost of construction to countries entering into the agreement for sharing information on the peaceful development of atomic energy. The U.N. conference at Geneva may be a certain water to this new era.

In addition to the working, swimming-pool reactor, the United States exhibit at Geneva will also have scale models of five types of research reactors.

There will also be a reactor simulator—an exhibit to show how the control rods of a reactor are operated to start and stop the chain reaction of atomic fission.

Another exhibit shows the processing of uranium ore to the enriched metal used in the reactors.

A model of a chemical processing plant will show how the uranium is purified for reuse, after it has been "poisoned" by the isotopes made in the reactor.

The United States is not yet ready to offer to help build any of these chemical processing plants in foreign countries. The present agreements with 22 friendly countries call for bringing the atomic fuel back to the United States after its usable energy has been burned up in the reactors.

But this is the first time that this process of purification—sometimes referred to as taking the clinkers-out-of-the-burned-fuel—has been declassified by the U. S.

"NEW CHINA" TYRANNY

The Asian nationalists constantly refer to the Peking regime as the "New China," implying thereby that a great and wonderful era of progress is now unfolding behind the Bamboo Curtain.

Not too well publicized is the fact that an Indian labor union delegation which visited Red China this spring left the country abruptly two weeks ahead of schedule. The delegates themselves had no conditions they discovered in the "New China."

What they found, of course, was the old tyranny. Every device of tyranny known to the modern practitioners in the Kremlin and elsewhere was and is being employed in Communist China.

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Land Reform Plans in Italy Hit Mid-Point

ROME, July 22 (U.S.)—The gentleman farmer who started a revolution in Italy five years ago expects to win the payoff battle by Christmas.

Antonio Segni, 64-year-old, head of the revolution which transformed hovels into homes, ditches into fields and Communists into Democrats, hopes to hand over the last acre under the land reform program this year, halfway through the 10-year demeracy and a triumph for Segni, now Italy's premier.

ADD Still Needed

But distribution of the land plot to the last peasant marks neither the success of the program nor its end. In the next five years the government will help the new landowners develop their property.

It will pump in 650 million dollars in aid and advice to the new proprietors. But by 1936 it is scheduled to quit out, leaving inexperienced farmers to go it alone.

A generation hence the estates are carefully carried over to the state, given to the poor may be "big" again. Already some farmers are planning to sell out to more experienced neighbors. And a tendency to collective farming has set in.

Land Disfranchised

A total of 1,222,337 acres has been distributed to 232 families.

The government found a simple method for deciding whose land to take. Italian landowners have the habit of declaring their holdings almost worthless to avoid taxes. The government seized the land, appraised low-value land of more than 741 acres which was not cultivated intensively. The outlay was paid with 25-year government bonds bearing five per cent interest.

On the government picked beneficiaries by need and without political discrimination from lists compiled by the state.

Five to 15 people often lived in a single room. The standard allotment was 15 acres.

The peasant is not given the land. He buys it at low cost and easy terms amounting to about \$10 a year at the outset. After 30 years, when the land is finally his, the peasant still has paid about \$1,000 for his 15 acres.

Filer-Baptist Church Pastor Resigns to Accept New Post

FILER, July 22—Resignation of the Rev. Ernest C. Trapp after five years as pastor of the First Baptist church was announced Friday.

The Rev. Mr. Trapp, who will deliver his final sermon here Sunday, and his family will leave during the first of next week for Mountain Home where he has accepted the pastorate of the First Baptist church.

During the Rev. Mr. Trapp's tenure in Filer, the educational unit of the church has been completed, final payments made on the furnace and the laundry installed. New hymnals, a piano, Sunday school equipment and 140 steel chairs have been added.

The last project, completed this spring, included remodeling of the front of the church building and addition of two rooms. New pews, a new pulpit and windows in the sanctuary also were included in the remodeling.

A total of 125 new members have been added to the congregation during his pastorate here.

The Rev. Mr. Trapp came to Filer from the First Baptist church of South Chicago March 20, 1928, where he had been for one year. A successor has not been appointed.

Reds Eviction Over Politics Ruled Illegal

WASHINGTON, July 22 (U.S.)—A high court ruled yesterday that tenants can't be evicted from government housing projects just because they refuse to swear they are not members of a subversive organization.

The U. S. court of appeals said the attorney general's subversive list was intended for use in screening government employees, "not tenants."

It acted in the case of John and Doris Rudder, whom the national capital housing authority tried to oust from their apartment in Lincoln Heights dwellings, a low-cost housing development here.

In 1933 the housing authority asked the Rudders and other tenants to sign a certificate that they do not belong to any of the nearly 200 organizations on the attorney general's subversive list. The Rudders refused to sign.

The appellate court avoided ruling on the constitutionality of the Owen amendment to the U. S. housing act, under which the housing authority had acted.

It said the government must not act arbitrarily in such cases because "unlike private landlords it is subject to the requirements of due process of law."

PARIS, July 22 (U.S.)—The French council of the republic senate approved the Austrian independence treaty 315 to 0 yesterday, completing the last governmental legislative hurdle for the pact.

The national assembly earlier approved the pact and the governments of Austria, the United States, Great Britain and Russia have already completed all ratification steps.

As soon as France deposits the ratification instruments in Moscow, the treaty will become effective.

About half the two billion dollars given private charity in the United States each year goes to charity funds, says the Twentieth Century fund.
