GENEVA, July 23 (AP)—The Big Four powers finished their historic summit meeting tonight in agreement on a quick-starting and long-range plan to relax world tension and improve confidence among nations. Their decisions, reached at a disarmament talk-up the previous day, were announced at a one-day ministers' talks to end tension and build for peace. U. S. Slating New, Speedy Jet Aircrafts

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—The air force plans to produce super-jet aircraft capable of operating at 10,000 ft. The new jet fighter will be up production of another jet fighter which is flying twice the speed of sound. The new jet program is a further move to counter Russia's improved bombers and fighters which have been displayed in recent air shows over Moscow. The air force earlier ordered a 50-cent speedup in production of its B-29 hydrogen bombers after the Soviets displayed a similar ocean-spanning bomber. The air force told the house and senate appropriations committees the new jet fighter development will require no additional funds. Plans Detailed The air force plans: 1. Scientists Hail Chemical Find

ZURICH, Switzerland, July 23 (AP)—Scientists today hailed the total synthesis of the hormone adrenalin as the most important news of the 14th congress of pure and applied chemistry. Adrenalin, the principal life-essential hormone of the adrenal glands, is a relative of cortisone which has proved useful in treating arthritis. Preliminary studies of small quantities of adrenalin, obtained from huge quantities of animal adrenal glands, have indicated that it will be even more potent than the other adrenal hormones in treatment of arthritis and other painful diseases. The total synthesis of adrenalin was made possible by a surprise report yesterday by Dr. Albert Wettstein of the research laboratories of the Swiss Chemical company at Basel. Formerly 3000 pounds of animal adrenal glands were needed to obtain only 50 milligrams of adrenalin. This made it almost impossible to use the hormone for healing.

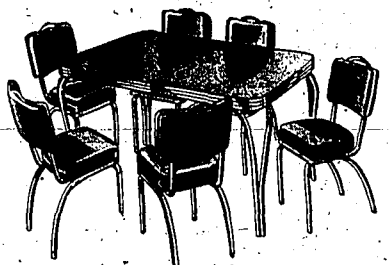

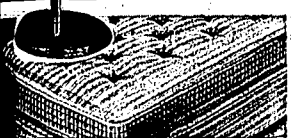

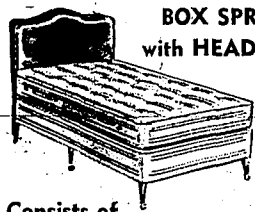

DeMary Sells His Abstract Firm, Retires

RUPERT, July 23—A. G. DeMary this week announced his retirement and the sale of his interest in the Rupert Abstract company to Floyd Pruitt, who has been associated with him in the abstract business since 1919.

One of the earliest pioneers of the Minidoka project, DeMary came here in 1906 and for 16 years served as United States commissioner. In that capacity, he handled nearly all of the original homesteaded proofs.

DeMary started the Rupert Abstract company in 1912 at the time the county was created by an act of the legislature. Up to then it was a part of Lincoln county with the county seat at Gooding. In forming the business in the new county seat, he purchased the records concerning the project from a Gooding abstractor, a Mrs. Garlock.

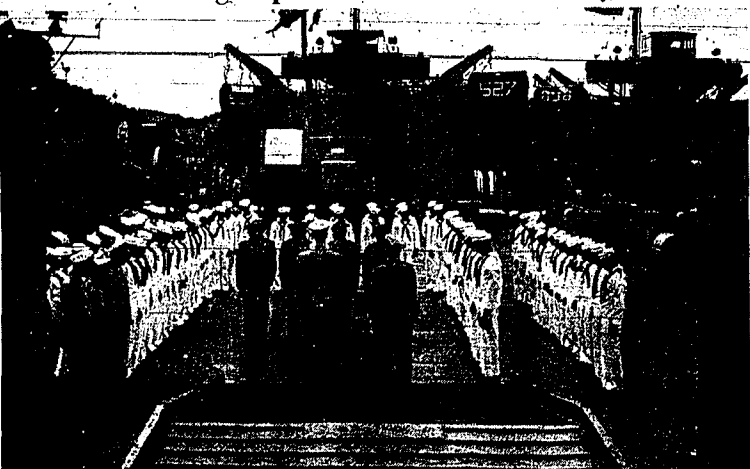
For many years the location had been in the field but it was not always so. Jack Vorhees, who had the contract with the government for transcribing the land records at the time Minidoka county was formed, also had the abstract business known as the Minidoka Title and Abstract company. He later sold to W. Pringle and a few years later the business was acquired by Clinton Spencer. DeMary purchased the firm and merged it with Rupert Abstract in 1925.

In about 1930 Judge Hardy and Mark Sullivan started another abstract business, Minidoka County Abstract company, but upon the death of Judge Hardy the next year, Rupert Abstract company purchased the business from the estate.

Floyd Pruitt joined Rupert Abstract in 1919 and has since been acquiring an interest.

Bob Baich, who started with the firm two years ago, will continue in his present capacity.

Constant Battle Goes on Against Huge Hordes of Insects, Pests, Mosquitoes

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—"Do what we can, summer will have its flies. If we walk in the woods, we must feed mosquitoes." — Ralph Waldo Emerson.

Although Emerson lived, swatted and scratched in the pre-DDT era, his prophetic comment on summer insects' plague still holds true. Despite all the wonders of modern insecticides, hot weather brings out bugs by the billions for man and his children, and destroys crops, harasses housewives and frazzles temper.

Government entomologists, a mid-manned group of scientists who dedicate their lives to wholesale slaughter of man's proliferous insect enemies, admitted today that total victory is still a distant dream. But they said that you can at least achieve tactical supremacy in your own home if you bring the latest weapons to bear in the battle against bugs.

Here are a few of their tips:

The best method of killing mosquitoes and flies is through use of a pyrethrum solution sprayed from a hand or power sprayer, or aerosol bomb. Pyrethrum is harmless to man and beast, but deadly to mosquitoes and flies. The pests have never developed resistance to pyrethrum, as they have in some areas, to DDT. Allethrin, a synthetic for pyrethrum, also is a good base for sprays.

Other effective sprays are those containing DDT, tospatiene, TDE, lincane, methoxychlor, and chlordane. All are on the commercial market.

area. DDT does a good job of fly-killing as it ever did.

Some insects now breaking damage are new. The kinara beetle, a stored grain pest, has appeared in three western states. The entomologists don't know its origin. The yellow clover aphid, which until last year was a minor pest in clover in limited areas east of the Mississippi river, has appeared in Arizona, California, and the southwest and is doing heavy damage to alfalfa.

A department survey last year showed insect damage and control to keep the upper hand in the never-ending struggle between man and bug.

"We never claim we can kill them all," said one scientist at the agriculture department's big research center at Beltsville, Md. "We keep trying. But it seems that as we solve old problems, new ones appear. Some insects build up resistance to former tried and true insecticides. At Beltsville, there is a strain of flies which thrive in cages coated with DDT. Scientists don't know why or how they developed their resistance to DDT. Yet in some

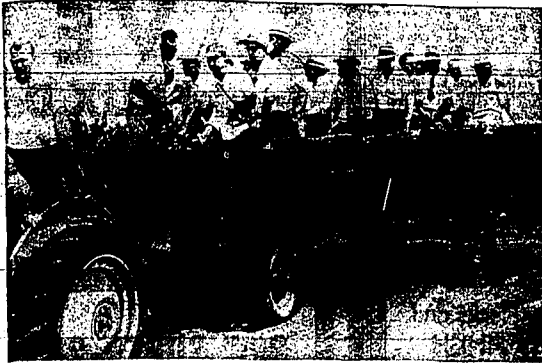

Four other farmers were entered in the county contest. Committee members for the Chamber of Commerce were Leonard Bond, soil conservationist; Jack Keith, bureau of land management; Howard and Wood Growers' association; and John Thomas, manager of Beakon elevator.

He Confides Informal Air Of Meet Best

GENEVA, July 23 (AP)—President Eisenhower confided to a friend that he prefers the informal atmosphere of the Big Four buffet to the formal sessions of the council chamber.

"We make long speeches—some of them dull—on these occasions," he told a friend, "but in the refreshment room we really think. You get to know a man a little in there."

Real Part of Meet
The buffet conversations among the Big Four have become a real part of this conference. They are relaxed, friendly and usually confined to two or three principals and sometimes an interpreter.

Credite Easy Manner
President Eisenhower, his friend said, has done some "very bright talking" to the leaders of the Kremlin at these little half-hour gatherings which follow the afternoon sessions of the Big Four.

The chief of one western delegation is reported to have credited Eisenhower with helping the Russians understand at Geneva by his easy manner with them in the buffet.

"Laughter and smiles," said a delegation member, "are the order. There are no growls and frowns."

The buffet session was started at last year's Geneva conference on Asian problems, but the meeting time has been changed by the Big Four. At the time of the buffet, the foreign ministers interrupted their formal sessions by adjourning to the refreshment room. At this summit conference the heads of government adjourn to the refreshment room—without bar and high-taxed lunch counter—only after they've completed their daily sessions.

Asked About Drinking
A Soviet official who has been in constant attendance on the buffet was asked about the drinking habit of the Communists. The secretary of the Communist party, Premier Nikolai Bulganin, Marshal Georgy Zhukov and Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov.

"Nothing but fruit juice on the first day," he said. "But, later, they've been sipping whiskey and vodka."

"The most popular drink?""Martini, without question, dry and strong."

"The Road of Secretarial Success" was the theme of the convention. Speakers were named as: technical skill, personality, brains and good grooming.

Susan B. Thirs, IBM representative, told the girls that a good secretary should be a complete thing—well styled.

"Style is a latent unit of good taste and is not for sale," said Miss Thirs.

"The office posture, according to her, is the girl who comes to the office as though she were on the way to a cocktail party."

Just as bad as the office eater who does not look for comfort, Chester Soucek of the Underwood Corp. got down to the important business of sounding a typewriter.

"There's a picture of you in every letter you write," said Mr. Soucek. "Make it an attractive one."

The letters written by a secretary—some from notes and some out of her head—are a vital part of her job, said Dr. Nelson R. Lawrence, associate professor of business administration at the University of Houston.

"The average cost of each letter sent by a secretary is \$10," said Dr. Lawrence.

"If there's anything in this letter that offends a customer the cost is incalculable."

"And a wastebasket filled with letters that are called can send the price of one letter skyrocketing."

Is there any formula for secretarial success?

W. C. Thurquand, management representative of the Institute for Certifying Secretaries, said:

"A true secretary accepts responsibility along with her title. She is the world is looking for one thing in everybody—the ability and willingness to jump a little bit more."

And that's quite a lump from the position held by secretaries at the end of the 19th century. Then they wore the cumbersome and limited title of the "female typewriter operator."

We, the Women

To parents faced with the problem of either giving in to all of a teen-ager's demands or having the teen-ager pull the old "You never let me do anything" or "All the other kids get to do such-and-such" line the way one father faced up to the situation may be helpful.

When his 15-year-old daughter accused him of never letting her "do anything" because he had put his foot down a few times when he felt it was necessary to do so for her own protection he said:

"I love you very much and, of course, I want you to love me. But I'm not going to love you love by being an easy parent."

Even more important than having you love me and having you think I'm a wonderful Dad is doing what I know is right for your own good and your own protection."

The honesty and the strength of that father's answer to a daughter who was trying to high pressure him into turning a "no" he knew was right into a "yes" he knew was wrong is an attitude that is sadly lacking in many homes today where parents rule the roost.

It puts the parents' position right in the line and it points out, as no amount of wheedling could do, that the main responsibility of parents to their teen-age children is to make them happy but to guide and protect them.

Too many parents today sell out to their children just to keep them happy and to win the approval of the kids and their friends.

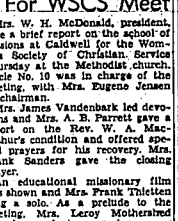

Breadbasket of Europeans Can Be Picnic Idea

Ever go on a picnic in Germany or Denmark? Can be fun. You usually ride out into the country on a bicycle with several friends.

The food is apt to be packed in wicker basket or "breadbasket." The canvas bag with straps which is worn over the shoulders. When you stop to eat, everything will taste good even though, except for sausage and beer, there won't be the variety of foods we take along in the U.S.A.

Rye bread will be the standby. It will be fragrant and fresh. But as you eat, you will find the sandwiches kept fresh in their breadbaskets. That breadbasket idea is adaptable for picnics anywhere.

Breadbasket Sandwiches Select a large, round loaf of rye bread. Using a long, sharp knife, slice the top off the loaf and set aside for later use as the cover. Next, loosen the bread from the loaf by cutting around the loaf directly downward to the bottom crust.

Then, make a slit just above the bottom crust. Insert the knife and swing it back and forth in a wide arc to separate the bread from the bottom crust. Lift out the bread and cut it into 3 or 6 wedges, then cut each wedge into 4 to 6 slices, depending upon the softness of the bread.

Spread each slice with softened butter and liverwurst, reassembling each wedge. Stack the tiered sandwiches in the breadbasket, replace the cover and refrigerate until time to serve.

Veteran Printer, 92, Recalls "Boomer" Days of Riding Rods From Job to Job

Equipment and technique change, but the letterpress printer as a profession has remained the same since Johann Gutenberg invented typography from movable type in 1439.

That's the opinion of David Coleman, one of the few really old timers in the typesetting profession still around to make us hear their breath about the illegible scrawls of editors and copywriters.

He doesn't recall the chronological order of his employment as he rode the freights from one job to another, but he remembers well that he joined the ITO at Cheyenne, Wyo., in 1885.

For the next six or seven years the grass still looked greener in the next pasture and he embarked on an itinerary that took him throughout the west.

It was during this time that the cowboys and the miners still carried guns—and so did some of the printers. In fact, he had a gun-toting pal, one Byron Griffin who not only was a printer, but a cowboy and freight wagon driver as well.

Coleman's "booming days" came to an abrupt end in 1890 for a while when he married Gertrude Anderson, his first wife, in Denver. His Denver sojourn is remembered vividly because Denver Post Co. Publishers Tammien and Bonilla came out second best in a shooting scrape with a

lawyer who objected to a story concerning a client.

"I was operating a Linotype machine when I heard the shots ring out," he recalls. "I walked into the city room and saw 'em both lying on the floor and a couple of women feature writers in hysterics. The lawyer walked right by me. 'I just shot your boss,' he told me, 'you better take care of 'em.'"

In the pre-typesetting machinery days, Coleman could hand-set type with the best of them. Even today he remembers the ease and "while I might not be very fast, I think I still could set type from it."

Like many early-day printers, Coleman at first took a dim view of the newfangled Linotype machine. But he learned operation at the Omaha, Neb., World-Herald, in 1895, and he "stuck with it since."

Coleman's occupation has taken him from Omaha to California in virtually every major daily newspaper in the west and many of the smaller ones.

Coleman lists his birthplace at DeKalb county, Ill. He moved to Nebraska with his family when he was about 7.

Only one of Coleman's sons became a printer. Of his two sons by

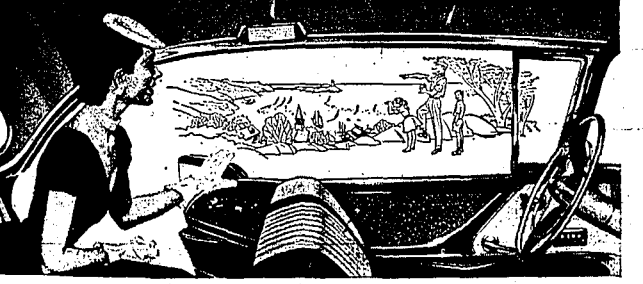

which have coffee lounge do not make it mandatory for their employes to take their break on the premises. They may go out if they desire.

Some businesses will give their employes two breaks a day, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. The majority limits the breaks to 10 or 15 minutes while others leave it up to the individual.

A check with local business houses reveals that Sears, Roebuck and company has an employe lounge. A company executive says 90 per cent of the employes take their breaks in the building.

He says one of the reasons possibly is that coffee sells for only a nickel a cup. He also states that the company building is outside the main downtown area and employes would have further to walk.

First Federal Savings and Loan association does not have a lounge in its present building but one is planned for its new home at Second street and Third avenue north. At present, employes go out for coffee and the number of times they go is up to the individual.

Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company has two 15-minute breaks a day. The company has a coffee lounge for its employes which is being used by most of the operators although the majority of the office girls go out except in bad weather.

The Twin Falls Bank and Trust company also has two 15-minute breaks. It does not permit its employes to leave the building. Since the opening of the bank lounge in the basement in 1953, an executive

feels the employe's loyalty to the company is better. "Persons who never spoke to each other before, now are friends," he says, "because they meet in the lounge for coffee."

Health Department does not have lounge facilities. It gives employes two 15-minute breaks each day.

The Twin Falls Canal company has a recreation room in the basement for its employes. The recreation room contains a pool table, and attractive lighting and carpeting. All employes use the lounge.

The postoffice equipment, installed by the government, represents an outlay of \$18,000. The equipment includes 803 boxes, E. R. Werry, postmaster, reports. Also included are windows, 140 separation letter cases, 10 wire ceiling, 20 pouch racks, steel paraf post racks, storage and cupboards and a new scale for the mail.

The postoffice history in Shoehorn practically began and ended at the former location in the Gooding building on South Hall street. The office was opened there in 1892. Postmasters have been E. Noble, Ben Weeks, E. Clinger and, since 1949, Werry.

At the original site, the postoffice was developed from fourth to third and finally second class. Some of the equipment was handmade and some new installations were added at the town grew. The majority, discarded in the recent move, was original equipment.

Present employees include Frank Burdett, rural mail carrier since 1921; Elizabeth Clinger, regular

Plans Told for Skyway Ghost Air Comeback

LOS ANGELES, July 22.—The "Tin Goose," a ghost of the skyway, is on its way back under its own power.

A new Los Angeles aviation company says it will start soon on construction of the "Tin Goose," which hasn't been built since 1924. The company thinks it will sell as a cargo plane.

Phil Cooper, project manager for Hayden Aircraft company, has said engineers are now working over blueprints of the original trimotor. Hayden plans to build two a week, with the first model flying next April.

Cooper said the trimotor will be modernized a little, but essentially will be the same as the six-sided, three-engine workhorse which pioneered many of the nation's present air routes.

The Ford, first built in 1928, was a square-looking, six-sided, high-wing transport with an engine hung under each wing and another in the nose, directly in front of the pilot's compartment.

Its cruising speed was just over 100 miles per hour but it could carry a terrific load and could lift off the roughest fields in only 1,000 to 1,500 feet of runway.

"We've had a wonderful response from South America, Australia, South Africa and other places where they have short airstrips to contend with," said Cooper.

A few of the oldtimers still are flying in the bush country of South America and Africa. In their prime the trimotors were passenger planes. Cooper thinks the new ones will be used mostly for cargo hauling.

More 3-Toned Cars Planned In Big Trend

DETROIT, July 23 (AP)—More than 100,000 cars are expected to be offered on the 1938 model auto, but wholly new colors will be comparatively few.

But the combination of colors that counts, say the experts. There is no suggestion any of the present color combinations will be withdrawn in 1938. But 1938 brought so many combinations of color that designers and interior, that additional hues will not be needed.

You can't get a body designer or stylist to admit the limited number of single color finishes, even as they profess to find it hard to think of a color combination that was not available in the 1937 line.

Some merchandising experts insist color was a big factor in stimulating the biggest increase in car sales in automotive history. Other say bargain prices brought buyers into the car market.

But however you look at the record—smashing retail volume of 1937, the color of the car that sold, or the price that was paid, it was undoubtedly price considerations attracted buyers.

But all buyers indicated the used car market suffered less than new cars from such deflation.

Competition in the new car market has been so keen that it is anticipated the production of a larger variety of models by the different car makers.

Some experts are predicting that more sports models and more four-door hardtops in growth phase.

Industry reports indicate a tremendous postwar growth in demand for station wagons and sports models.

The hope of a new car market is relatively new. Their acceptance has not so widespread, however.

Some experts are predicting that eventually will replace the conventional four-door sedan.

Times of reaction are times of danger. When the eventful moment to which all other moments lead up is delayed, watchfulness is apt to be relaxed. Depressed by deferred hope and overcome by sheer exhaustion, we slumber and sleep.

The hour of awakening is an hour of revelation. All in sleep, the 10 virgins were snoring when they awoke. As those who were foolish and came to realize the consequences of their neglect their distress was more than personal; the marriage festivities suffered by it. It was not that the foolish virgin keeper who neglected the filling of his lamps.

A watchful attitude is demanded. The Church, the bride of Christ, should, as St. Jerome suggests, be always standing with her toes stir and her hands in listening for the midnight cry, "Behold, the bridegroom cometh, go ye out to meet him."

There are testing times in the life of every man when everything depends upon his reserved resources. It is his duty to keep his light burning brightly for a time, but the decisive thing is his holding out "the oil of the Spirit of Jesus Christ." We may have some oil, but not enough to last till the bridegroom comes.
