

Solon Seeks New Probes On Talbott

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Senator George D. Cole, of Oregon, today announced that he will introduce legislation for renewed investigation of the air force secretary's outside business activities.

In a Senate speech, Morse quoted an affidavit filed by Fredrick E. Talbott, which he said he had reviewed. Talbott was not involved in last year's fight for control of the New York Central railroad, won by J. Edgar Hoover and Robert H. Young.

Morse called on the senate investigating subcommittee to review the new information he said he has "in order to determine what validity there is to it."

Morse said that "Secretary Talbott's record demonstrates quite clearly that he did not lose the attributes so necessary in a public servant."

He added that Talbott's "concept of what is right and what is wrong as long as he is in private life is as sound as his concept so long as he is in public life, they are."

The senate committee will be headed by the assistant secretary Arthur H. Brown, who has promised to clear crew of private business activities which might conflict with his new post.

3 Ex-Soldiers Deny Charges After Arrests

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—(AP)—Three American ex-soldiers denied to a reporter today that they were involved in the charges leveled at them yesterday by the army when they returned from 18 months in the Korean war.

Each, in turn, shook his head and denied the army charges, which would bring the draft penalty if convicted by court martial. The denials were made to George Draper, San Francisco reporter who interviewed the three yesterday at St. Baker's just north of the city.

Draper recalled that when the three men reached Hong Kong from Red China July 10 they advised reporters they had done things in North Korea prisoner of war camps which made them ineligible for the draft when they returned in 1953 to come home. They chose to remain in the army until they changed their minds. All three were captured as teen-agers early in the Korean war.

Yet today, Draper said, the men gave him various reasons why they could not be guilty of the army charges.

William G. Cowart, Dalton, Ga., never had a fellow prisoner. He had taken part in a kangaroo court trial of a fellow prisoner and advised that he would treat the prisoners as he would treat the enemy.

"I have no idea what the kangaroo court is," he told Draper.

Smylie spoke at dedication of the Palouse valley tree farm, which he said is the largest in the nation. It is sponsored by the Western Pine Association and the Mountain Home, Princeton, Kennedy Ford and Rock Creek Grange of Idaho.

"It was here in the Palouse valley that the nation's first organized effort to protect timber occurred," Smylie said. "A little band of very resourceful men put together the first of our protective associations in 1900."

"That was the year that the mill from which this town takes its name was established. In the same year marked the birth of the U.S. Forest Service. Today marks the 50th anniversary of our own Keep Idaho Green program. It is fitting therefore that we should mark with special significance this day when our reforestation programs reach another national high water mark.

"Forest industries pay 46 per cent of Idaho's manufacturing payroll and employ 30 per cent of our factory workers. Our forests account for 10 million acres of commercial forest land carrying an inventory of nearly 100 billion board feet of trees that are already grown to saw-timber size.

"This colossal resource will rise again as surely as the sun over Idaho for all the years to come if we administer it wisely."

"The United States is not proceeding legally," he said. "It hasn't the right to use territory that doesn't belong to it."

Mangan said that so far, Uruguay is the only nation which has taken cognizance of the Nation of Celestial Space. The United States Department of State has been informed six times of the existence of the NCS, he said, but has taken no cognizance of it.

"I consider the state department dead in its feet," Mangan said.

If it had been a Russian citizen and had established this nation, I am sure that the USSR would have gotten in touch with me to see if they could participate in this project," he said.

Mangan said he doubted that his Nation would be recognized by the government, but he has immediate effect.

Rocket Expert Gives Descriptions of Satellites, Envisions Space Futures

(WPA) Ray is one of the nation's best-known authorities on the subject of inter-planet and space travel. He is the author of "The Conquest of Space" and "The Conquest of Space." He was born in Germany and was one of the first to fly in a biplane in the United States. He has been a United States citizen for the past 10 years. He is now in the following dispatch, Ray analyzes the significance of the satellite announcement in plans for a satellite.

HIGHLANDS, N. J., July 30 (AP)—The first artificial satellite is launched today in the age of space travel to man.

The satellite announced yesterday is likely to be small and comparatively simple and will be launched in such a way that it will be the first to go into space and will be followed by more and larger airplanes.

The second satellite will be launched in a more elaborate longer-lasting. The third or fourth may well carry a television camera to show us what the planets look like from space.

By that time, a man-carrying rocket ship will be launched into an orbit around the earth and after that engineers will be planning manned space stations.

Rocket experts have known since 1928, when there were very few such experts, that an artificial satellite was possible. The development of large liquid fuel rockets to become reality.

In principle, the problem is not very difficult. If a rocket, or missile, is moving outside earth's atmosphere with the velocity of four and one-half miles per second, approximately three times as fast as the fastest missile has accomplished so far, it will not return to the ground.

Manned Craft Out in Space Is Proposed Now

SAN DIEGO, Calif., July 30 (AP)—A bullet-math expert soon will propose a powered and manned "satellite" space craft, superior to the "rocket" satellite, which someday could possibly be used to explore other planets. It was disclosed today.

The Convair aircraft division of General Dynamics corporation disclosed such a craft soon would be proposed by one of its missile scientists, Kraft A. Ehrliche, former German rocket specialist. The company said Ehrliche would make his proposal before the sixth congress of the International Astronautical Federation in Copenhagen, Denmark, July 31-Aug. 7.

Ehrliche's satellite would circle the earth with just enough power thrust to sustain flight. It was not disclosed what type of power would be used or if such a craft would carry more than one man or how a man would fare in space.

The satellite, because the drag of atmospheres becomes greater at lower altitudes, could fall "relatively soon," the company said. It could descend below the 200 and 300 miles minimum altitudes of satellites to about seven miles.

This would conceivably enable the satellite, when and if interplanetary travel becomes a reality, to be launched from a space ship to explore a planet range the surface of another planet.

They also "manufacture" household used in upholstery.

The Swiss businesswoman was curious about the Vonin's family checking account. She said only very large businesses use them in her country; a family never has one. Even in her business if she has a \$1000 bill to pay she uses cash. She didn't think that in a bank there would be very happy with this sort of thing, meaning family checks of small amounts.

The few cars in Wangen are used mostly for business purposes and nearly everyone has a bicycle or motor bike, "the noisy thins."

On Sundays they go to the nearby mountains, take a cable car, similar to chair lift, walk and picnic. "We think nothing of walking for 4 or 5 hours," Miss Herberberger said. Many families will get up in the middle of the night and hike to the mountains to view the sunrise.

Their national holiday on Aug. 1 is called the Fourth of July. There are speeches and big flags are hung from the roofs of the houses along covering the entire front. The children go about the streets in parades carrying paper lanterns called "fakes" with lighted candles. In every window are many small red cups centered with a lighted candle.

Although Miss Herberberger is a "career woman" she is not one to neglect her home. She said that the national dish might well be sauerkraut and sausages and the middle class eat it in butter in a skillet to which are added enough flour for gravy, a tablespoon of mustard, red wine and seasoned to taste. This needs to be cooked only about 3 minutes and served with mashed potatoes, green salad and fresh fruit for dessert.

Top Industry Workers Get Salary Boost

PITTSBURGH, July 30 (AP)—The Aluminum company of America last night followed the pattern set by the steel industry in granting an average 15-cent-an-hour increase to 25,000 workers—then announced it would boost its price soon.

The action averted a possible strike at midnight Sunday when rival AFL and CIO unions could have called their members off the job.

Agreement Reached

Only a few hours after David J. McDonald, president of the steelworkers, had stepped into the bogged-down negotiations, an agreement was reached for some 15,000 members.

An hour later, the AFL union agreed to an almost similar pact for its 10,000 Alcoa employees.

The AFL agreement is subject to ratification by seven locals. The USW had empowered its bargaining committee to sign a contract without further ratification.

Dates Stated

Both contracts call for the increase to be effective Aug. 1. The wage hikes were granted under contract-reopening clauses.

Under the old contract, USW workers at Alcoa's big plant in nearby New Kensington, Pa., had a base hourly pay of \$1.82.

AFL aluminum workers have been receiving from \$1.60 an hour in the east to \$1.85 an hour on the west coast.

Hike Provided

Both contracts provide an 11 1/2-cent-a-year raise with another 1/2 cent an hour spread between job classifications.

The USW agreement also provides that employees will get a lump payment, equivalent to three cents an hour, for the period from Aug. 1, 1944, until Friday night. This results from a wage study pact concluded last year.

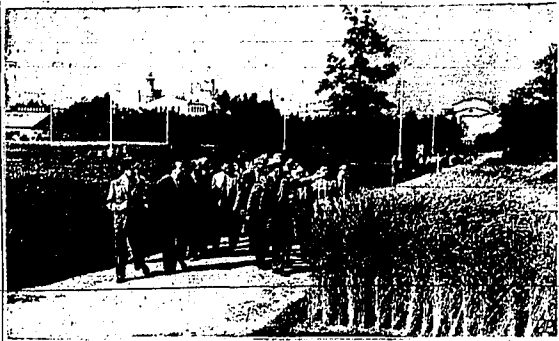
The company also will continue to set aside three cents an hour per employee for the wage study program.

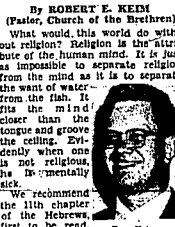

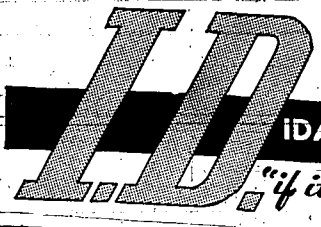

Cost Tags for 1956 Models Now Awaited

DETROIT, July 30 (AP)—Styling and engineering changes will share interest with price tags when the 1956 model cars are publicly introduced.

First of the 1956 models to appear in the showrooms will be Ford's Lincoln. It is scheduled to go on sale early in September. It should give a hint of the industry's pricing program, although the more conventional models will not appear until late October and early November.

There will be a lot of facelifting in the 1956 models and perhaps another round of horsepower boosts. Generally, however, there will be few major engineering changes.

Increase Expected

Most industry authorities are freely predicting an upward revision of new car prices. There is more than a little speculation, though, whether these advances can be passed on in full to the car buyer.

The car retailers right now have what one trade publication calls "mountainous stacks of new cars well in excess of three quarters of a million units. They will have to continue price cutting to dispose of these vehicles out of their inventories."

Already numerous sales promotion stunts have developed. Retailers are offering radio and television sets and other prizes to lure in new car buyers. Many are offering so-called "trading" stamps redeemable monthly for a variety of the same type of stamps the housewife gets at many chain food stores.

The Hottest Competitive Battle

In all auto industry history will start another heavy outpouring of cars from the assembly lines as soon as the switch of new models is completed. That means the new cars will have no opportunity to ease off in sales until the final months of the year.

It also raises the question of whether price concessions will absorb another high volume of retail inventory. Increased prices, say industry experts say, it will take continued price discounting to maintain sales volume during the first months of the new model year.

There is some difference of opinion in trade circles as to just how many 1955 model cars the retailers should have on hand. Automotive News put the figure at 200,000 units. Ward's Automotive Reports said the figure is 150,000. It put the July 1 total at 675,000.

Just think of getting in on the ground floor in a land where the people have never heard of used-car bargains, annual white sales, or never read such signs as, "lease expired—must vacate," and "going out of business—everything half price."

It makes a man siddy just to think of being the first salesman to offer Neptunians the first toothpaste with the secret ingredient EXCEL, a wax that you can't scrub with soap, a sewing machine that makes "zigzag" buttonholes, a material for suits that is forest fire and atomic resistant, and a cereal that not only goes whang-bang-clang, but whose every box includes a corkskin cap and a detective badge.

But greedy as I am for money, and as much as I would like to produce the first television giveaway,

Local Firm Bids Low for Project

IDAHO FALLS, July 30 (AP)—Delweller brothers, Inc., Twin Falls, and Martin-Grindle Co., Gordon, Neb., are apparent low bidders on two contracts for construction work at the national reactor testing station, the Idaho operations office, U. S. atomic energy commission, announced Friday.

Three bids were submitted on construction of additions to the materials testing reactor electrical system. The apparent lowest proposal was the Delweller bid of \$162,000.

Martin-Grindle's bid of \$48,875 was the apparent lowest of four bids submitted on remodeling and changing equipment in an air compressor building at the MTR-1 site.

Bids on both projects were opened Wednesday.
