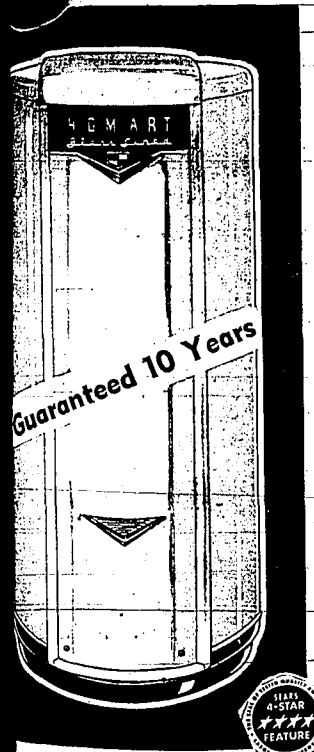

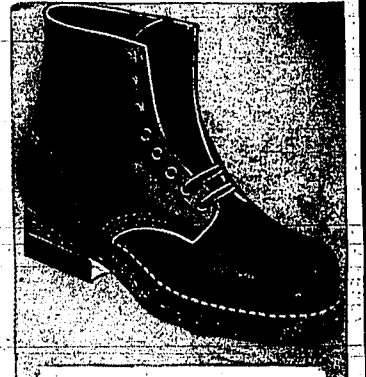

Expert Classifies Three Main Types Who Seek Pain, Defeat

 First is "the injustice-collecting type," said Dr. Edmund Bergler. "He will provoke an actual or potential enemy—until he succeeds in getting his badly needed dose of injustice."
 "Between doses, he will accept a vicarious dose of impersonal universal injustice. Since the world is

 Also there is the "nice" type. "They are interested in your troubles, and eager to be helpful. Under this ingratiating surface is a hopelessly enlarged masochist, suffering for reasons which he cannot understand, which is his construction of the unhappy situation. In general this type accepts his condition unhappily with atonement and resignation. It is hopeless to try to help these people with common sense advice. Their inexhaustible stock of rationalizations assures the permanence of their painful situation."
 "These people," who are classified as "psychic masochists," are different from other people only because they obtain a greater unconscious enjoyment from suffering than most people, Bergler said in the

Lawmakers in 23 States Votes Additional Educational Funds

CHICAGO, Aug. 4 (AP)—Growing shortages of teachers and classroom space prompted lawmakers in at least 23 states to appropriate more money this year for public education.

Illinois was typical of the states reporting increased appropriations in an Associated Press survey. The Illinois general assembly voted a record high appropriation of \$200-

million for state aid to grade and high schools for the two year budget period. Also increased were appropriations for state supported universities and colleges.

In addition, the Illinois state legislature set up a fund for aiding local school districts to build needed classrooms and appropriated funds to aid junior colleges.

California lawmakers voted to let the people pass on a 100 million dollar bond issue to continue state loans for school construction.

More retirement benefits also were voted for California teachers.

Similar bills, scaled down to their population, were passed in Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut and Idaho.

The Delaware legislature raised teacher pay and loosened requirements so that teachers no longer have to use their vacation time for study.

Indiana aimed a \$20,000,000 state aid boost to teacher's salaries. Iowa followed suit with higher appropria-

tions for both lower and higher education units.

Kansas entered the field of state aid to high schools for the first time.

Under a constitutional sliding scale mandate, Michigan's state aid to schools went up automatically by 22 million dollars. However, this year's legislature suggested that 10 million dollars of the increase go for teacher's salaries.

Minnesota raised basic school aid from \$80 per pupil to \$82.

Missouri voted to increase the percentage of tax money given to schools. The increase amounted to about five million dollars a year.

A new sales tax, the first to be passed, won approval in Nevada. Most of the six to eight million dollars expected from the sales tax revenue will be given to Nevada schools.

Ohio passed a 275 million appropriation for school aid.

Oklahoma and Texas passed bills dividing school districts more latitude in taxation. Increased revenues from these measures will be used to build new facilities and raise teacher salaries.

Rhode Island voted \$1,834,000 in additional state aid for teacher raises.

By PROF. MARCEL NICOLLET "BRUSSELS, Aug. 4 (AP)—In the past week the world has been bombarded by the word "geophysics." Its imagination has been caught by American project to fire a satellite into outer space.

Geophysics is nothing new. Of all sciences it necessitates the widest coordinated understanding of experimental, theoretical and mathematical problems.

Geophysical observations are of value when they are synchronized on a global scale and in large numbers.

In terrestrial and atmospheric physics and astronomy the new word which has sprung up to define physical processes occurring at high altitude it has become evident that observations must complement each other if any progress is to be made.

For example in mathematical research connected with geophysics the scientist must possess a profound knowledge of several scientific subjects in order to simplify his mathematical calculations.

The geophysical year was conceived by Dr. L. V. Berkner, president of the Associated Universities, Inc., and former member of the Carnegie Institution of Washington. Dr. Berkner has done research in every region of the globe and suggested the "year" in order to coordinate geophysics on a global scale.

The international council of scientific union (ICSU) look up Dr. Berkner's idea with enthusiasm and created a special committee to prepare the "year."

The committee is made up of representatives of international bodies connected with astronomy, geodesy, radio-science, physics, geography, etc. Its chairman is Professor Sydney Chapman of Oxford University.

The first step will be in the field of meteorology, with establishment of a network of stations to sound out the higher layers of the atmosphere. This network will extend from the North pole to the South pole.

The northern and southern lights auroras will be observed from a chain of stations situated around the earth about 20 degrees from each pole.

In addition, more than 100 stations will send radio waves into the ionosphere in order to determine with extreme accuracy the physical conditions prevailing there and to predict with certitude the circumstances in which radio communication is possible.

But these observations will have only a limited value if they are not complemented by observations of solar activity.

To fully observe solar activity it will be necessary to coordinate the activities of a chain of stations studying the sun 24 hours a day.

And this will be carried out during the "year" simultaneously with international studies in such sciences as glaciology and oceanography.

Since one nation cannot have stations in every part of the globe the 40 nations participating in the "year" will distribute their efforts in the Arctic, Antarctic and equatorial regions and along the meridians 10 degrees east-10 west and 70-80 west.

As it is impossible for 40 nations to observe every minute of the 550-odd "year" it has been decided to hold "world days."

On what scientists call "regular world days" there will be observations of such phenomena as predictable meteor showers and solar eclipses. "Special world days" will be held to study perturbations in the aurora borealis and fade-out of short radio waves.

On the special world days scientists will be notified to turn their attention to the phenomena being observed. Alerts will be sent out by radio from four to seven days ahead.

A final "standby" will be sent from 25 to 10 hours before, warning observers to watch their instruments.

These ground observations will be complemented by high altitude readings from rockets to be launched from the United States, the Arctic, the Antarctic, Japan, Australia, the Sahara, etc.

The rockets will transmit back information concerning temperature, density, pressure, wind velocity, etc.

To complete these varied observations it was suggested at the special committee meeting in Rome last October that the possibility of launching a satellite be studied.

Last Friday's announcement that the United States would build such a satellite, completed the chain.

KURBAN STATION, U.S.S.R. Aug. 4 (AP)—The American farm group touring the Soviet Union handed out some advice yesterday on how to improve Soviet agriculture.

A reporter from the Soviet news agency Tass wrote a dispatch about it which was distributed to every corner of Russia.

This demonstrates the seriousness with which Soviet authorities are making the immensely popular visit of the American. The party came to this little white stop in the Kuban republic to tour a collective farm specializing in hogs.

Tass said they "gave advice on how to carry on more rationally. Despite the significant success of Kuban animal husbandry, manpower is not always used productively" the Tass correspondent quoted them as saying.

J. M. Kleiner, Nampa, Ida., said "personnel could be cut back with better mechanization and organization," the dispatch said.

Moving on to a cattle farm, Kleiner said—and Soviet reporter telegraphed—"with you everything is done in a great way. There is much good and attractive. You need to try to obtain more from every acre and from every cow."

The Americans spent the night at a farm named for the late Josef Stalin. They were entertained at a concert—there-by local musicians and planned to leave this morning for Khostor-on-the-Don.

Law Signed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—President Eisenhower yesterday signed legislation authorizing \$25 million for airport construction over the next four years.

Previously federal funds have been determined on a year-by-year basis. Federal funds are matched on a 50-50 basis by the local communities.

Suburb Flight Has Result in Big Vacancies

Up and down the Pacific coast the number of vacancies in metropolitan areas appears to climb as the flight to suburbs speeds on. A United Press survey of a major west coast city shows that in most cases the vacancy rate is much more familiar sight today than at this time last year.

But the law of supply and demand does not seem to be having much effect here. Though there are apartments plenty, rents remain high. Where landlords have given ground, the concessions have been modest.

Crash Is Blamed

Real estate men blame the "own your own home" crash is responsible for the vacancies. Keen competition among suburban renters is resulting in increasingly more attractive installment plans by which estate real estate owners are buying.

This trend hasn't hurt the owners of luxury apartments. Demand remains high for the most desirable rentals in exclusive districts. In San Francisco, where the occupancy rate has dropped sharply, more apartments are being rented for \$50 to \$100 per month. There is a ready market for \$15-to-\$20 per month.

Faced with a buyers' market for the first time since before the war, the landlords are facing up to the fact they have to "sell" their wares. They haven't gone to the extreme of overstocked auto dealers but they do have a number of gimmicks.

Reluctant to lower rents because of high costs and rising taxes, the landlords are relying instead on "rental inducements" such as "prior occupancy clause" written in many leases by which a tenant may get as much as a month's rent for agreeing to let the property for six months or more.

Offering Inducements

Many new apartment buildings are offering both adjacent playgrounds. Apartment owners are resorting to suit these tenants and a few are offering free utilities.

Notable exception to the trend is Seattle, where rent for the same apartments is rising slightly and there is no increase in the number of vacancies.

They say low-down-payment homes in the suburbs have no effect on apartments as the area has enough new families to fill up the rentals as home buyers vacate.

Firm in Pocatello Awarded Contract

BOISE, Aug. 4 (AP)—State Public Works Commissioner Arthur Warren yesterday announced the award of a dormitory construction contract at the State Industrial Training school at St. Anthony to the Peterson and Johnson company of Pocatello for \$98,500.

Only one of two outmoded dormitories will be demolished, he said, because of a shortage of space.

The award must be confirmed by the state board of examiners, which meets today. It was approved earlier in the week by Warren and the state board of education.

Divorce Started

BURLEY, Aug. 4—A divorce action has been filed in district court here by Pauline Bingham against Gerald Bingham. They were married at Elko on April 26, 1923. She charges him with extreme mental cruelty.

She is asking the court to award her some household furnishings and personal property. She also asks the court to restore her maiden name of Pauline C. J. Burgess in her attorney.

Weight Barrier to Enlistment In Marines Reduced by Girl

Many girls, if they wanted to join the marine corps and found they were 19 pounds overweight, would feel so sorry for themselves they'd drown their sorrow with a chocolate bar. But there's always one who would want to be marine enough to forego the chocolate milk.

Such a one is Ennis Small, 19, who applied last May for enlistment into the marine corps, standing 5 feet, six inches, she weighed 177 pounds. The marine corps limit for women applicants is 158.

Miss Small didn't drown her sorrows with a chocolate milk. Instead, she stopped in to see a Twin Falls physician. Hearing her problem, he put her on a diet. And last Tuesday, weighing 158 pounds, Miss Small became a marine.

The physician put her on a 800-calorie diet. This consisted of toast, fruit juice and coffee for breakfast; lean meat, thin soup and one vegetable for lunch; and meat, two vegetables and fruit for dinner. He then cut her down to 140 calories a day. This consisted of orange juice and coffee for breakfast; thin soup or salad for lunch, and for personal property. She also asks the court to restore her maiden name of Pauline C. J. Burgess in her attorney.

New Curb Put Upon Credit to Help Economy

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—The government put another mild brake on credit, effective today, as part of its program of keeping the nation's economy from booming into inflation.

Four federal reserve banks increased their loan discount rates to 10 percent, the highest since the government's second recent move to curb inflationary factors in lending. Federal reserve loan discount rates tend to increase interest rates generally and thus curb borrowing.

The federal reserve board action came five days after the federal housing administration and the veterans administration increased down payment requirements on homes and shortened the terms of FHA and GI home loans.

The federal reserve board's move, announced yesterday, was prompted by the record rise of loans. Businessmen borrowed two billion dollars in the first six months of the year for a new January-June record. The federal reserve bulletin also reported heavy loans to consumers through June totaled a record \$22,371,000,000. Real estate loans, the bulletin said, were swelled by about \$1,300,000,000—a new high—for the first half of any year since World War I.

An increased discount rate means that member banks borrowing from federal reserve banks will have to pay higher interest. This was the second boost of the year.

The discount rate went from 15 per cent to two per cent in Atlanta, Boston and Chicago and to 3 1/2 per cent in Cleveland. The other eight banks in the federal reserve system were expected to follow the lead of the four in hiking the discount rate.

Checks Made On Efficiency Of Spray Job

MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 4 (AP)—U. S. forest service officials are surveying sample strips this week in the Bitterroot and Gallatin national forests of Montana to determine the mortality of spruce budworm from aerial spraying operations completed in the two areas July 30.

Results of their findings will be available about Aug. 10, an official said.

A total of 122,556 acres of the Gallatin and 161,600 in the Bitterroot forests were sprayed with DDT insecticide dissolved in an oil solvent.

The spraying had to be completed during a very brief period of the insect's life when it is vulnerable to poison.

For this reason, forest service officials called into service a huge B-18 Flying Fortress equipped for spraying operations.

Forest service officials point out that although the DDT spray killed the spruce bud worms and other terrestrial and aquatic insects, the spray is harmless to wild and domestic animals or human.

Officials say that insecticide damage to forests is several times greater than destruction by fire.

The spraying program will be extended over the next two or three years. Surveys to be conducted later this fall and winter will determine which areas will have priority.
