### 6 Rules Told To Help Dog In Dog Days

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Dog days, which are right now about the height of a dog—and they don't. They just happen to you. Dogs are too smart to let you happen to them.

So spoke Walter Kendall, head of the president of the National Dog Welfare club and an expert of many years' standing on what makes dogs tick.

Kendall offered the following rules for hound beings to follow to keep themselves from miasing up their dogs' natural heat-the-heat ability:

1. Under no circumstances clip your dog. His hair insulates him from the sun and heat.
2. Don't bathe your dog unless he's positively filthy. He should be kept clean by vigorous use of brush moves the natural oil from his skin which is needed for health.
3. Give him a constant supply of fresh water and shade.
4. Don't try to force large feedings on him; keep them smaller. Occasionally give him buttermilk in the morning.
5. Help him to keep quiet and relaxed.
6. Never leave a dog in a closed car for any length of time in hot weather; it gets cruelly hot.

But what, you may ask, is my "Don't-Do-It-Yourself" show going to be like? What will be its attractions? Well, this is one exhibit I have in mind.

Two houses will be shown, complete with families. In one a living room scene a husband and wife will be seen as they attempt to put in a beamed ceiling. The wife will be wearing a brace on her back (the result of putting in beams in the rum-

# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Fancy new automobiles with automatic this and that mean nothing to Ellie and Nina Morris. TWIN FALLS: They've been driving the same automobile for 27 years. What's more, they're not thinking about buying new ones.

The sisters drive about Twin Falls in a Whippet they purchased new in Minden, Neb., in 1909. But they don't confine their driving to the city streets. The car has been driven 50,000 miles—which isn't a great deal as automobiles go—over several times and once was driven to California and back.

Statistically it is more than 300 months old. This means it has been driven on an average of 200 miles a month for its entire life—less than many persons drive their new automobiles in a week.

When the cars was 10 years old the two sisters moved to Twin Falls from Lincoln, Neb. When they bought the automobile cost them "a big Nash coupe" and \$700 cash. The trip to Twin Falls was taken in 1907 when the four cylinder job was nine years old.

The sisters report they have no trouble getting parts for the vehicle and that it serves their purposes nicely. Typical of the feminine outlook, it isn't the gasoline mileage or the mechanical aspects of the car that they like. It is the convenient pocket in the right front door in which they can keep paper and pens.

Barney Glavin, in Ketchikan, Alaska, has had his first flood-south-of-Rogerson—two weeks ago "wasn't exaggerated."

### Physiological Aspects of Space Trip Are Examined, Found to Be Feasible

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Aug. 6.—If you're worried about your first trip to the moon don't you're worried. It's not until you're there.

The only time you may realize you are on a journey is at the moment the space ship leaves earth and the moment it lands wherever you are going.

In between, there'll be no noise or vibration.

Don't be surprised if your cabin is full of such things as seaweed or other marine plant life. That's just to keep you alive.

These were some of the aspects of future space travel presented by Fred A. Hitchcock, director of the laboratory of aviation physiology at Ohio state university. Hitchcock has been director since 1941 of the laboratory, whose research aids the U. S. air force.

Hitchcock was not present but his paper was read to the delegates of the sixth International Astronautical congress by a member of the Danish Interplanetary society.

In it Hitchcock said there were still some medical problems to be solved before man can journey in outer space.

"But he added:

"... While there are many physiological problems in relation to space flight still to be solved, nevertheless in the light of current investigations none of these seems to be insurmountable."

Looking into the future, Hitchcock said:

"One of the minor although increasingly important stresses in conventional aircraft is noise and vibration. These would be completely eliminated in space travel except during take off and landing."

Hitchcock said one of the most

important things was to find a way to air conditioning the space ship's sealed cabin during flight.

"We should begin investigations of the biological method of air conditioning sealed cabins," he said. "This method would consist of the establishment of a balance between some form of plant life and the human occupants of the sealed cabin."

The problems of temperature are also being investigated, Hitchcock reported.

"During escape from the atmosphere surrounding the earth the skin temperature of the ship would undoubtedly be very high and even though the cabin is insulated unacceptably high temperatures would undoubtedly occur in the cabin. It seems unlikely however that these would exceed human tolerance."

Hitchcock said the most serious hazard during takeoff for occupants of a space ship would come from linear acceleration but that from present studies there is ample evidence intolerable accelerative forces would not be encountered. He added:

"Once the space ship has attained escape velocity (that is when it is beyond the atmosphere) and the rocket engines are shut off, the crew will of course be in a gravity-free state."

"No animal or man has yet been in this condition for more than a few seconds at a time and it is therefore impossible to predict all of the objective and subjective effects of such a condition."

"However, such evidence as we do have indicates that no serious consequences will result from exposure to the gravity free state. The worst that could happen would be an inability to orient oneself in space and the occurrence of perhaps a mild form of motion sickness."

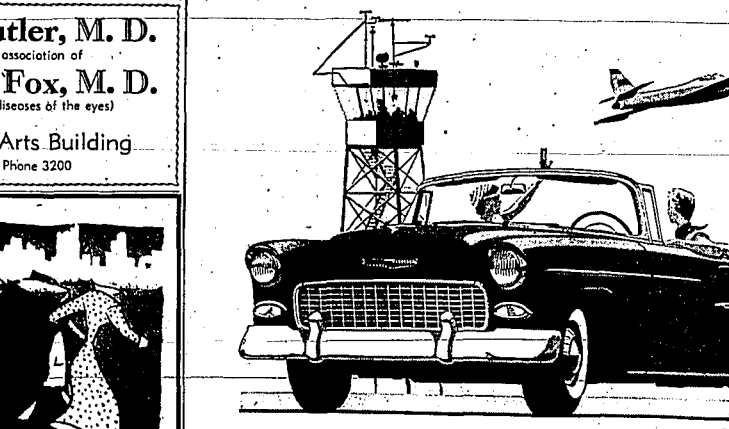

### Nine Students In Air School Face Releases

DENVER, Aug. 6.—Officials of the new U. S. air force academy said here yesterday that six of the 206 original cadets had submitted resignations and that medical discharge proceedings had been instituted for three other cadets.

The cadets were released from the academy on July 11 at the academy's interim headquarters at Lowry air force base here. They will be in the temporary academy site until permanent buildings are constructed north of Colorado Springs.

An academy spokesman said final action had not been taken on the six resignations and the three medical discharges. He said recommendations had been made to the air force secretary and that the final word would come from Washington.

"The six cadets generally submitted their resignations on the grounds that they were unable to adapt themselves to military life," the academy spokesman said. "Some of them said they lacked sufficient motivation for military service while others told officials they accepted the academy appointment only to satisfy desires of relatives and friends."

The spokesman said the names of the six who had submitted resignations would not be made public.

"These resignations were expected in view of other service academy records," the spokesman said. "A certain percentage of each class is expected to drop out as the training progresses."

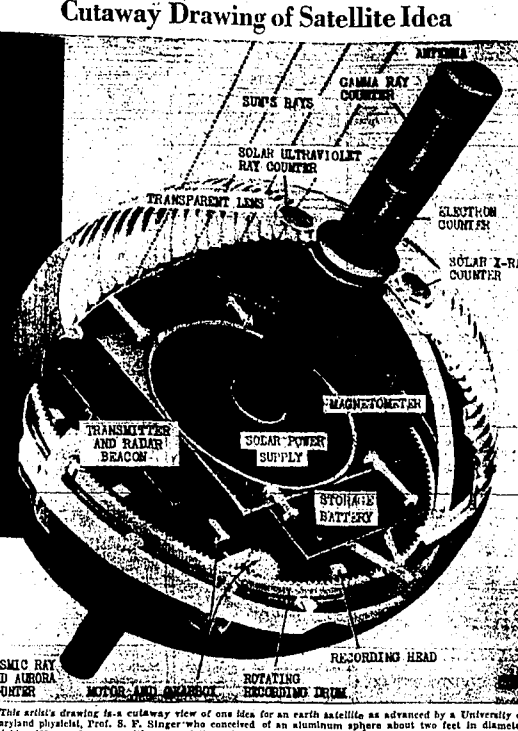

### August Skies Almost Out of Planet Array

The days are definitely getting shorter, yet summer is still with us. The sky is quite devoid of the ordinary array of planets. Mercury, Venus, Mars and Jupiter have temporarily "gone into hiding" as they are now so near the sun that it is practically impossible to see them. Only Saturn remains in the open. By the time the sky is dark this evening a small twinkling object appears as a dark star fairly well up in the southwest.

For the study of the brighter stars let us observe about an hour after sunset. Low in the south, red Antares is flashing as the heart of the celestial Scorpion. This star and its constellation were discussed in this column last week. Somewhat east of Antares a sort of double dipper joining the hands of the Scorpion is the Archer. Some call this the Teapot.

West of southwest, blue-white Spica glitters brightly. It is the principal star in the constellation of Virgo, the Virgin. It lies up in the north, and only orange Arcturus is brilliant. This star is at the base of a kite-shaped figure made up of bright stars. To the left of the top of this kite, a small half circle of dim stars outlines Corona Borealis, the Northern Crown.

High in the northwest, next the familiar Big Dipper, the brightest stars of the Big Bear, as it is called, stand toward the northern horizon. The Dipper constitutes the hips and tail of the bear. Fainter stars lower down outline the rest of the creature.

Turning to the eastern half of the sky, we find blue-white Altair in the point directly overhead. Some of the lower and more numerous stars mark the head of the Northern Cross. This cross, easily outlined, is lying on its side with its feet extending toward the south.

High in the southeast, Altair in the Zenith is bright. Not far from the summer guard stars, one on each side of Altair, somewhat to the east of these, a diamond-shaped group of four small stars marks Delphinus, the Dolphin.

### Inflation Evil Missing U.S.; Hits Abroad

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Americans have been enjoying a stable cost of living for some time. But inflation hasn't bowed off the stage in some other lands.

They still watch prices climb. And worry is increasing even here lest the economic strain be being shifted again by recent wage increases, so that inflation, writing "in the winner, can make a return appearance.

Inflation, a chief problem in most Latin American countries and in some parts of the far east, still haunts a few European nations and threatens England anew.

Special conditions seem to account for inflation's hold on those spots.

On a worldwide basis, commodity prices taken as a whole have been remarkably steady for three years. Metal prices are rising. But farm product prices are falling. Rises and declines just about cancel each other out.
