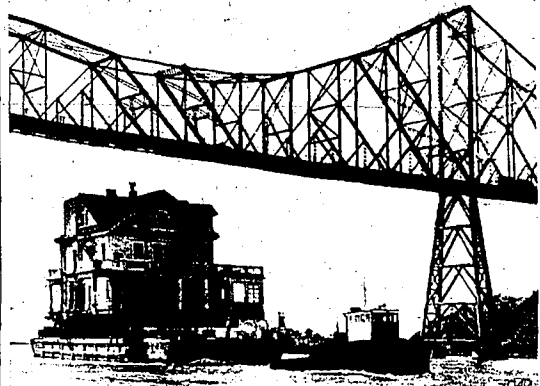

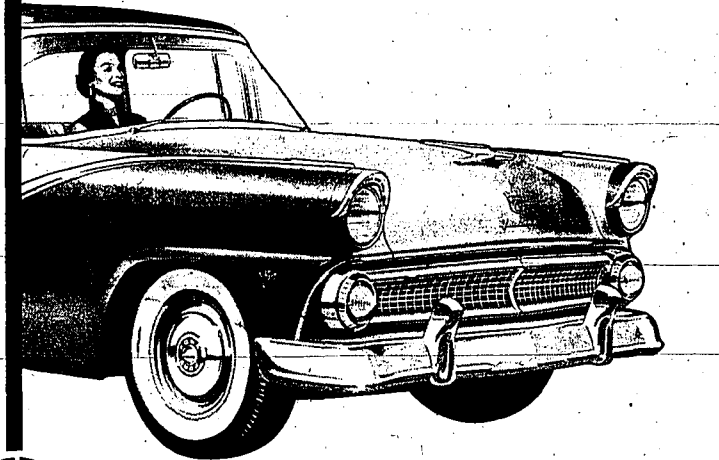

## TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS



**WASHINGTON**—A realistic spirit of "charity begins at home" animated the congress which recessed last week after the president described the situation in the world as "extremely constructive, although not spectacular." There were few and smaller foreign news items in the Washington Post-Newsweek magazine's lead-lease program in 1941.

The economists on Capitol Hill were not motivated by a 1955 desire to get themselves right with taxpayers voters. They sought to get the government's budget and the public debt. But they also believed that the time had arrived for a new policy to help the nation's recovery of national economic recovery financed by American taxpayers.

### DOUBT REGARDING RESULTS

As a result of the factor was the doubt as to whether these huge expenditures are winning and retaining friends.

For instance, refuses to permit us to see whether he is spending our money wisely and efficiently and in accord with the terms of the grant. France has withdrawn two divisions from NATO. The United States has been heavily reduced in service for her army. Paris has virtually turned over defense of Vietnam and Southeast Asia to John Foster Dulles.

Finally, foreign nations rebuilt by our postwar contributions of 50 billion dollars are cutting into markets for our goods. Britain, Germany and Japan have been the chief competitors in old and new markets.

President Eisenhower has not been entirely sympathetic to this trend, although he understands the apologetic line. He only fears it that Europe will regard it as full-scale economic withdrawal, similar to our political and military withdrawal of aid from the West in return for American assistance.

### GRAPHIC EXAMPLE

The drastic 500 million dollar reduction in foreign military and economic aid was the most graphic illustration of this new policy. It was brought about through the face of White House and Pentagon officials.

In fact, the thing would have been larger, if Eisenhower had not shifted Harold E. Stassen, regarded as a do-gooder and spender, from his job as Master of the State Department to that of Under Secretary of the State. Robert A. Taft, was interpreted as an attempt to inject some hard common sense into the thing.

In other ways, congress demanded greater consideration for American taxpayers, consumers, farmers, and investors.

They have stormed the White House to insist on a cotton export policy that would maintain domestic prices, cut surpluses and open overseas outlets.

### PROGRAM REVISED

Secretary Benson had formulated a program. But it was shelved on the ground that "dumping" cotton under a subsidized, low-price scheme would jeopardize "good relations" with the rest of the world.

It was pointed out that Canada does not suffer from dumping cotton. But it does in the case of "curtain" countries—Czechoslovakia—42 cents a pound, or 15 cents less than the Canadian goods.

Another powerful bloc has demanded smaller quotas for offshore countries in order to increase the market for domestic producers of corn and beans. He himself raised tariffs on Swiss watches and he has been pressed to erect barriers against a flood of foreign goods.

### MEYER KESTINBACH'S COMMISSION

On an exactly opposite track, however, congress refused to put the government into any new business like the Upper Colorado or Hell's Canyon projects and now getting to make over 107 million little five and 10 million dollarwise and harbor projects to satisfy local pressure groups.

### NOTHING WAS DONE TO SAVE THE COUNTRY

There was a terrible struggle over whether to kill or continue public housing. The last minute compromise to authorize 45,000 new units for one year satisfies nobody.

### AMENDMENT OF THE NATURAL GAS ACT

The amendment of the natural gas act proved to be too controversial for either side to do anything about.

### THE FARM PRICE SUPPORT PROGRAM

The farm price support program was not changed and cotton and sugar crops couldn't even muster enough strength for more government aid and subsidy.

### ACTION ON THE LONG-STANDING BILL TO EDUCATION, HEALTH INSURANCE AND TAFT-HARTLEY LABOR LAW REVISION WAS PUT OFF.

The draft was extended but the President's plan to build up military reserves was greatly watered down.

### ONE POSITIVE THING CONGRESS DID DO WAS RAISE ITS OWN PAY AND THAT OF ALMOST EVERY OTHER FEDERAL EMPLOYEE.

That was the only thing they decided not to deny till next year.

## HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

GENEVA—Geneva is the headquarters of a grand international bureaucracy called the International Labor Office. A subsidiary of the United Nations. The ILO embraces 60 nations, some of them little more than tribal chiefdoms.

Miller was opposed by Jay Lovestone, an unrepentant "communist" of David Dubinsky's International political machine from the day early in 1933 when his name was proposed for the job of assistant secretary of labor for International Labor Office.

Raymond Moley, who has no superfluous authority on such matters, wrote when Spencer Miller was abruptly fired by Eisenhower's order in 1952 that Miller's political position had placed him in authority over a field "already cluttered up with many busy workers."

In his letter to Eisenhower, Miller subscribed himself "your fellow soldier in CIA." He acknowledged that he was almost a member. He expressed "appreciation" of Miller's service and expressed "best wishes for the future."

As a veteran anti-communist, he was the first witness heard by the Dies committee in 1952. He testified for three days and put into the record the names of 83 active communists on the CIO payroll under command of John L. Lewis.

He said that he was thoroughly convinced that further "Americanization" of the American Communist party who broke with Stalin and set up his own American Communist party. He said he himself, later was "somewhat concerned" because the AF of L was "doing nothing to back the efforts of Lovestone to elect" our labor attaches.

Taffy was rewarded by a dog food company (Ken-L-Rations) for rescuing to the life of his master, Steve Wilson, Cour d'Alene, Ida, slip away in the waters of Fernan lake last April.

Steve and Taffy had wandered to the edge of the lake and the little boy slipped into four feet of ice-cold water.

Taffy, racing manfully, raced to Steve's father, Perry. But the father didn't understand and Taffy ran back, springing into the water and trying to save the drowning boy.

Once again, Taffy dashed back to the father. Wilson, seeing the dog's wet coat, raced to the lake and saw his son's coat floating on the water. The father sprang in and recovered the unconscious boy in time.

Taffy's prizes also include a gold-plated leash and collar, a gold plaque, a dog blanket, and a year's supply of dog food. The Wilsons will get a free three-day trip to Chicago, where Taffy will be honored at a dinner Aug. 17.

### Pilot Credited With Averting Air Disasters

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., Aug. 9.—A research pilot in the world's fastest rocket plane was credited today with averting a possible disaster when his high-powered plane exploded in the belly of its "mother ship."

The rocket pilot, Joseph A. Walker, 34, saved himself and the bomber's seven crewmen from possible death yesterday when the rocket plane exploded seconds before its scheduled release nearly six miles over the desert. Walker's flight test center, the rocket plane crashed on the desert as "probable a total loss," but the bomber landed safely.

The one million dollar -I-A, which holds the world's speed record of 1,650 miles per hour as well as the world's altitude mark of 50,000 feet, had to be jettisoned for fear a second explosion might destroy the bomber. The rocket plane crashed on the desert as "probable a total loss," but the bomber landed safely.

Walker, in the rocket ship when it exploded, exercised "great coolness" in cutting off switches to prevent any further explosion. He also emptied some of the highly-explosive rocket fuel before escaping into the bomber's bomb-bay.

Walker also came close to death when he disconnected his oxygen supply to escape the rocket plane. He felt unconscious from lack of oxygen and was pulled up to safety by the bomber's crew. Death can occur in a few minutes without oxygen at high altitude.

Pieces torn from the small craft by the blast struck a following P-26 jet "chaser" plane, flown by Major Arthur Murray, who set the altitude record in the X-1-A. Murray said
