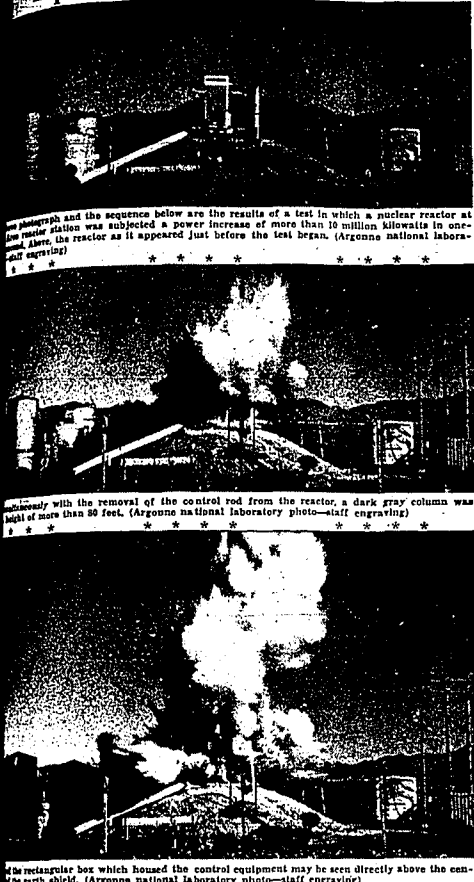

Reactions of "Runaway" Reactor Are Shown in Experiment at Arco Station

ARCO, Aug. 10—Details of the construction and operation of a nuclear reactor which was made to "run away" in more than 200 important safety experiments were described today by Dr. Joseph H. Dietrich of Argonne national laboratory at the United Nations International conference on general uses of atomic energy. The conference is being held in Geneva, Switzerland.

The experimental reactor, known as Borex 1, was constructed in 1953 by Argonne scientists and engineers at the Atomic Energy Commission's national reactor testing station at Arco under the direction of Dr. Walter D. Zimmerman, laboratory director.

The tests, conducted during a two-year period, have shown that a properly designed water-cooled and moderated nuclear reactor, if allowed to get out of control, will automatically shut itself down before excessively high temperatures would cause destruction of the reactor. The series of tests is regarded as being of great importance to the future development of reactors for the production of electrical power.

The reactor consisted of a core assembly of plates made of enriched uranium and aluminum immersed inside a steel tank or reactor vessel. The reactor vessel stood inside a larger open tank which was partially buried in the ground. Earth was piled around the protruding section of the tank for shielding. The reactor was operated remotely from a control console located one-half mile away.

The experiments simulated hypothetical reactor accidents in which the control rods which normally hold the reactor power to a safe level, suddenly lose control and allow the power to increase at a rapid rate. In the test, the reactor was provided with five neutron-absorbing control rods, one of which could be ejected rapidly downward out of the reactor core under the influence of strong surges and gravity. The reactor was made critical (operating) at a very low power with this rod inserted to some pre-chosen position in the reactor, and with the remaining control rods (known as shim rods) more or less fully withdrawn from the core. The main rod was suddenly ejected remotely from the control console. The shim rods were allowed to rise exponentially. Eventually, the reactor would produce sufficient steam to check the rise of power and, in fact, to reduce the power to a low level. At some pre-chosen time thereafter (from 20 seconds) the shim rods were actuated by an electric timer to drop into the core and terminate the experiment.

Motion picture records of the experiments or excursions show these results:

An instant after the center rod had been dropped, the inside of the tank was illuminated by a flash of light which originated in ionization and Cerenkov radiation as the reactor power reached a high value. Heat, liberated by the fissioning of uranium atoms, caused steam to form around the fuel plates and the resultant absence of neutron moderating water immediately reduced the reactor power to a low point. Shortly after the high flash—before the reactor power had been reduced by steam formation—the water surface was agitated by the motion of the water being expelled from the reactor core by the steam.

The effectiveness of steam formation as a safety mechanism de-

pends, of course, on the speed with which steam can be formed. In earlier experiments, the reactor power increased by a factor of 10 in about five hundredths of a second. By proper adjustment of the number of fuel elements in the reactor core and of the position of the four shim rods, the rate at which the power increases could be made much more rapid.

Further experiments were conducted in which the power was increased tenfold in slightly more than one-hundredth of a second. These experiments were mechanically more violent than the earlier ones, and caused the expansion of steam and water from the reactor tank. Water was thrown out of the tank to a height of about thirty feet, and the pressure in the reactor core arising from the rapid ejection was sufficiently high to deform the fuel plates.

Despite this mechanical damage to the fuel plates (about 60° P) did not approach the melting temperature. It is desirable that a reactor, which by this time had failed in other respects, should be sacrificed in an experiment which would be violent enough to melt the fuel plates. Extension of the experiment to create such a condition was considered important even though there is an almost negligible probability of this happening to an operating reactor.

This experiment was conducted on July 22, 1954. The ejection of the rod required only about 0.3 seconds and the rod was about 80 per cent out of the core when the reactor power reached its peak value. In a very short time after the release of the center control rod a column of dark gray smoke was ejected from the reactor to a height of some eighty feet. Shortly thereafter, the

sound of a medium sharp detonation—reached the control trailer. A few seconds the smoke cleared away. It was apparent that the entire superstructure of the reactor, containing the control rod mechanism, had been carried away. The maximum power achieved was in excess of ten million kilowatts.

"Twin Falls" of the experiment was expected. Most of the fuel plates had been melted. The pressure resulting from the molten metal in contact with water had burst the open reactor tank, carried away the control rod mechanism and ejected the remains of the reactor core high into the air. Most of the fuel element fragments fell to earth within a radius of two hundred feet around the reactor, and there was no appreciable radioactive fall-out at distances greater than a few hundred feet.

Although the reactor was destroyed, the explosion was a relatively mild one, comparable to that which could be produced by a few pounds of TNT. The catastrophic release of energy characteristic of "nuclear devices" was prevented by the inherently safe characteristics of the reactor, even though the "accident" was severe than any that might occur in operation. Results of these studies are being published in a report which shows how a more economical power reactor through minimization of the human problem, simplification of reactor design, and reduction of the temperature demands on reactor materials.

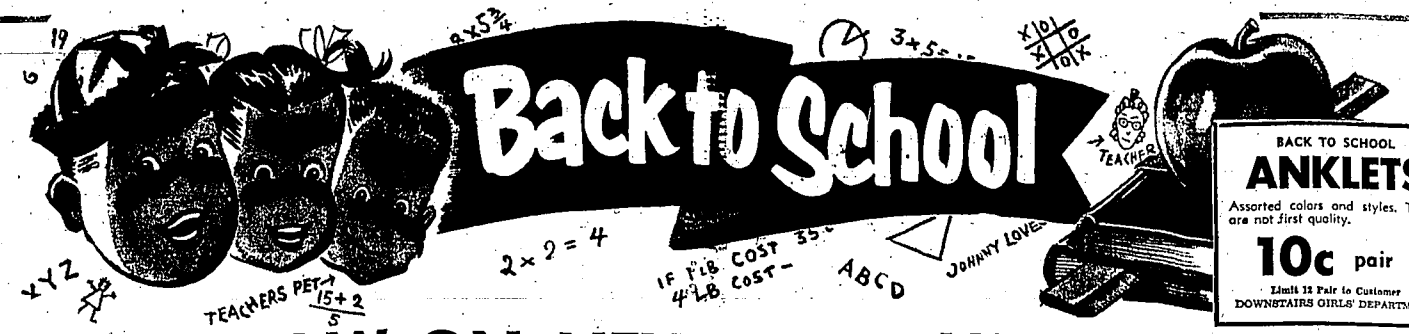

Italian Terms Stops Man at \$32,000 Prize

NEW YORK, Aug. 10 (AP)—"E basta così!"

With those words, a little Italian cobbler from the Bronx, Olino Prato, rang down the curtain and retired \$32,000 rich today.

They mean: "That's enough."

Prato, making his fourth appearance on CBS-TV's "The \$64,000 Question," had captured the fancy of much of the nation by wading through a series of questions in the category, "opera."

The gentle, gray-haired, 55-year-old shoemaker had pyramided his winnings to \$32,000 by doing so. Last night, Prato had the opportunity of doubling his stake by lacking another question. He decided to bow out.

"My father in Italy sent me a wire," Prato explained. "It said 'fermale dove ti trovi. E basta così.' That means: 'Stop wherever you are. That's enough.'"

"Because I take my daddy's advice when I was a small kid, I take it now."

Prato was presented with this check for \$32,000 and kissed amidst heavy applause from the studio audience. He said he would use some of the money to visit his 82-year-old father who lives in Sialate di Me, Italy, a small village near Genoa. He said he had not seen his father since he left Italy, 33 years ago.

"I will also buy my father a good hearing aid," said the smiling Prato after the broadcast. "He is stone deaf."

Queries Ask Answer Upon Press Issues

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10 (AP)—A house government operations subcommittee set out today to determine whether government departments and agencies are withholding information to which the public is entitled.

It sent about 60 executive departments and independent agencies a 31-page questionnaire asking 30 specific questions about their formation and press policies. It asked the agencies to reply by Sunday.

The subcommittee, headed by Rep. John E. Moss, D., Calif., was set up to investigate government areas and public information practices and specifically to determine whether data is being unnecessarily held back.

Some of the questions are directed at the use of security classifications on information.

Moss said in a statement that mailing of the questionnaire is the first step toward the subcommittee's goal of finding out whether information from the government agencies is sufficiently available to inform the public on the activities of their government.

The questions on press policies include such inquiries as:

"How many press conferences were held by your agency from July 1, 1954 to July 1, 1955? Who held these press conferences, what is the basis for accreditation of persons attending the conferences...? Are transcripts of the press conferences available?"

"How many formal or informal 'background' or 'briefing' sessions have been held by your agency for the press from July 1, 1954 to July 1, 1955 and who, in general, was invited?"

"What specific requests from the press for information have been denied by your agency between July 1, 1954 and July 1, 1955?"

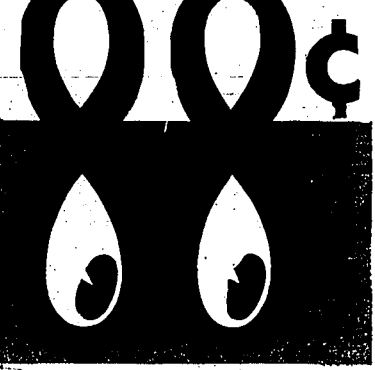

Facts Dispell Crazy Credit Talk on Cars

DETROIT, Aug. 10—Despite all the talk about "crazy credit" in the booming automobile market, Americans buying cars on credit as a whole are making just as big down payments as they've done in the past 10 years, a study of new car financing indicated today.

The survey was made by Universal Credit Corporation, New York, which whose business is financing automobiles. It claims to be the largest independent automobile financing agency.

It reported it found that in the 10 years since the end of World War II, the American public has bought 107 billion dollars worth of new cars on time. Of this amount, 22 per cent was handled through down payments and the other 78 per cent financed.

The total amount of new cars financed during the first six months this year has been moving at a record clip. A lot of the new down payment deals with long terms to pay them off have attracted attention.

The liberal financing has been responsible for part of the boom in new car sales now running at a record pace.

In the first six months of the year, the Universal Credit report said, \$6,000,000 in new car loans were made. But these loans were used to buy cars worth \$1 billion dollars, indicating the buyers still were handling only 78 per cent of the total price of the cars through down payment and making cash down payments of 22 per cent of the cars.

Two Southern Democrats Top Opposition for Sugar Measure

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10 (Special)—Utah-Idaho beet sugar producers have two southern Democrats largely to thank for the loss of new sugar legislation.

The bill to divide U. S. consumer markets 55 and 45 per cent respectively between domestic and offshore producers was turned back without a Senate vote on the last night of the session.

Final approval was withheld through house and Senate this year reveals Rep. Harold Cooley, D. N. C., and Sen. William Fulbright, D. Ark., as the successful opposition leaders.

The final approval was withheld despite the fact that 40 senators sponsored the bill and the house passed it by a 194-104 vote for it in the last days of Congress.

Additional support was provided by the White House, and both the Utah and Idaho delegations—as well as the southern sugar cane states—were solidly behind the bill.

In opposition were such offshore sugar producers as Cuba, with a powerful lobby at work on both sides of the Capitol hill to kill the measure.

The lead was taken in March by Sen. Walter F. Bennett, R. Utah, and Sen. Russell Long, D. La., to introduce a bill equalizing domestic and offshore shares of the rising U. S. sugar market.

Under the sugar act of 1948 Cuba monopolized the increased U. S. market to the extent of almost 90 per cent. Domestic producers get only 10 per cent of the increase.

"Fifty-fifty" senators from sugar producing and allied states introduced a bill to give the domestic producer a fairer share of the market.

In long White House conferences, Bennett and others worked to develop a bill which might be agreeable to all sides.

Since the action involved financial considerations, the house was required to make the first move.

"This it did in March when over 400 representatives introduced a measure similar to the Senate version."

It was here that North Carolina's Cooley, chairman of the house agriculture committee, acted to prevent passage of the bill.

He kept it from the committee agenda two and a half months until July 15, and then attached an amendment calling for 50 per cent of parity price supports for sugar.

With Republican sentiment running against high price supports, Cooley hoped to see the sugar bill enacted if it came to a house vote.

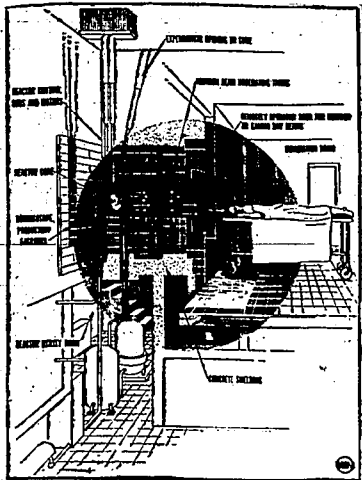

Atomic Bombs Know-How Is Now Available

 GENEVA, Aug. 10 (AP)—Scientists attending the atomic-for-peace conference here have admitted reluctantly that all nations learning the secret of atomic power would soon know how to make atomic bombs.

But everybody is so determined to make the conference work that no one wants to talk about this unpleasant subject the world may have to face sooner or later—every nation armed with A-bombs.

The subject clashes with the high ideals that led President Eisenhower to propose this unique assemblage of atomic scientists from both sides of the iron curtain.

It was raised by the president of the conference himself, Dr. Homi J. Bhabha of India who is also a distinguished atom expert. He told the 1,800 delegates:

"The risk of an atomic power industry in many parts of the world... will put into the hands of many nations quantities of fissionable material from which the making of atomic bombs will be a relatively easy step."

That seemed to be a clear enough statement until it took it around to other scientists for comment. I learned quickly that I had chosen the most unpopular question of the day.

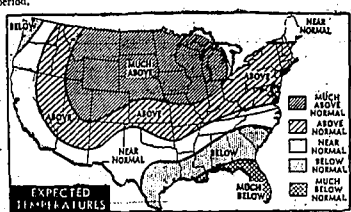

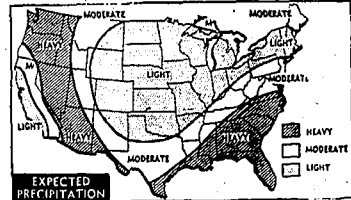

4 Homes Show Part of Survival Story From Nuclear Bomb Testing Pattern

NEW YORK, Aug. 10 (AP)—Four homes are part of the story of survival against H-bombs.

They stood on Yucca flat in Nevada less than a mile from the center of an atomic blast nearly twice as powerful as the bomb that killed 100,000 Japanese in Hiroshima.

A two-story brick house was demolished. But its basement and job shelter came through intact.

Next door, a one-story frame rambler was smashed into rubble. It had no basement.

But part of this rambler house did stand up—the bathroom. Inside were two tall-waisted, barking dogs, showing no immediate signs of injury.

This bathroom was specially made. It had thick concrete walls, a blast diaphragm window that recessed into the wall when not needed. The blast door and window had been closed.

The A-blast last May gave a test of this bullet-in shelter, which cost \$100 when the rambler was constructed.

A safe haven for humans? Very probably, at this distance from that powerful A-bomb.

Atomic weapons blast out not only with blast, but with heat and with radiation. At this distance of less than a mile from an explosion of this power, the rambler house probably was bathed with X-rays of 400 to 500 roentgens through intact walls.

This X-ray radiation is immediate, and over very quickly, like the X-rays that take a picture of your chest.

The lesson: This bathroom shelter greatly boosted the human chance of living through that close to an atomic blast of that power.

Next door to the rambler houses were two other one-story houses, one of pre cast lightweight concrete, the other of reinforced lightweight cinder block.
