WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (AP)—The cattle and beef industry said yesterday a "test" freeze early indicates that a freeze of cattle and beef prices in any national emergency would fail to raise prices and reduce supplies of the meat.

Included, the industry said, a freeze would result in extreme shortage of beef, farmer withholding of cattle in anticipation of higher prices later, and a deluge of supplies among regions, cities, retail stores and public eating places.

Other consequences of a freeze order, it said, would be increases in beef prices through various methods and the development of a "tremendous" enforcement problem.

Meet Recesses As Reds Hint Of Agreement

GENEVA, Aug. 12 (AP)—The United States and Red China called a 24-hour recess in their "little Geneva conference" yesterday amid communists' hints an accord was near on the release of 41 American civilians from China.

A communist informant close to the Chinese negotiators said only details still have to be ironed out. He intimated an agreement could be reached at the next session Saturday.

There was no official support for this view from either side. Both U. S. Ambassador U. Alexis Johnson and Chinese Ambassador Wang Ping-nan maintained the secrecy they clamped on their talks at the start 10 days ago.

They emerged from their fifth closed session to announce only that they confined discussions to repatriation of civilians and that they would meet again Saturday morning.

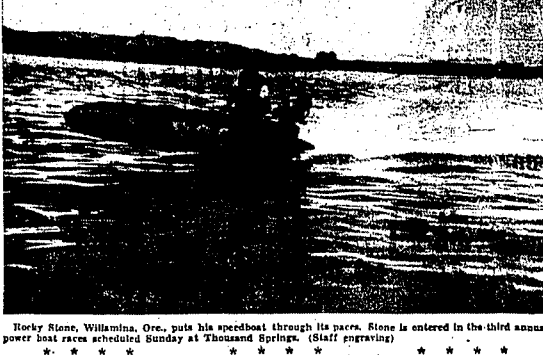

Idaho to Get High Federal Forest Fund

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (Special)—The state of Idaho next year will receive the third highest federal allotment for national forest highway, the department of commerce announced.

Idaho's share of the overall \$22,500,000 will be \$2,200,177, or over ten per cent of the national figure.

Only California (\$3,221,556) and Oregon (\$2,088,216) will receive larger federal outlays for forest roads.

In making the announcement, Commerce Secretary Sinclair Weeks said the allocations were made on the basis of "the area and value of national forest lands as certified by the secretary of agriculture."

The recipient of the smallest federal expenditure in fiscal year 1957 will be North Dakota, which is scheduled for a mere \$80 payment.

Other states receiving apportionments over a million dollars are: Arizona, Colorado, Montana, Washington and Alaska.

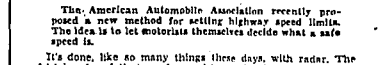

The fact that highway speed laws aren't really set by any scientific study of safety, but just seem to be numbers pulled from a hat becomes especially apparent when you drive through the U. S. You may cross two or three states in a day, and find the speed limit jumping up and down between 50-55 and 60.

The American Automobile Association recently proposed a new method for setting highway speed limits. The idea is to let motorists themselves decide what a safe speed is.

It's done, like so many things these days, with radar. The AAA has found out a safe speed usually is the speed traveled by 85 per cent of drivers on any particular road. So the AAA has asked that statewide or province-wide speed laws, many of them unreasonably low, be abolished in favor of the speed limit radar devices show is the usual speed of 85 per cent of motorists.

Figures I noticed recently showed that, contrary to what I always believed, most highway accidents don't happen at high speeds. A study in Nebraska established that 75 per cent of all accidents occurred at less than 30 miles an hour. When speed limits were raised in Nebraska the accidents were reduced and the average speed of the cars on the highway didn't change at all which only went to prove drivers were ignoring old speed limits anyway and driving at what they thought was a safe speed.
