MILITARY TUG OF WAR

The forthcoming visit of Japanese Foreign Minister Mamoru Shigemitsu will be just a little more than 10 years after he signed the surrender aboard the Missouri, Aug. 14, 1945. Shigemitsu's conversations with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles are intended to straighten out some of the loose ends of the American-Japanese relations at the top. But it's relations at the bottom that really need improvement.

INCREASE OF YOUNG WORKERS—Most of the increase resulted from the hiring of school graduates for the trades and services. A large percentage was attributed to the military service.

CONTRACTS TO AID OLDER WORKERS—Many unions, Larson declares, have negotiated contracts that require one out of every five new men taken on, among them are certain electrical workers, plumbers, bricklayers, painters, and carpenters.

SPECIAL WOMEN'S PROGRAM—The labor department, in cooperation with states and cities, has developed a special program for older women. Special courses for basic training or "refresher" courses have been or will be organized for practical, professional, secretarial, commercial, and sewing, institutional housekeeping, cosmetology and electronics.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP)—Americans piled up record debts during the booming second quarter of 1955. At the same time U. S. production and income climbed to new and unexpected peaks.

The commerce department reported these twin facts. They also underscored comments by President Eisenhower and Commerce Secretary Sinclair Weeks over possible soft spots in the current unprecedented prosperity.

The department indicated Americans may be leaning too heavily on credit to buy things they want. It also pointed out that business may be slipping up on outsize inventories.

The report brought out that statistics for the second quarter outdressed expectations in major economic categories. They topped first quarter figures by sizeable margins.

On another economic front, Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell praised the "remarkable growth" of the federal-state employment insurance program.

On the 20th anniversary of the program's beginning, he said yesterday, the number of workers protected and the size of jobs paychecks have more than doubled since 1935.

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### CIO Challenges Data of Bureau

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP)—The CIO today challenged the census bureau's non-farm employment statistics. The figures showed a larger gain in employment last month than was reported by the bureau of labor statistics.

CIO research director Stanley Ruttenberg said there must be "something wrong" with the census bureau's data. He asked for an explanation of the remarkable differences between the changes in non-farm employment as reported by the two government agencies.

The census bureau reported an increase of 600,000 in non-farm employment between June and July while the BLS reported no change. The census bureau said at the time that the difference was due primarily to the fact that its survey includes as employee persons who have jobs but are on vacation, ill or otherwise absent. The BLS includes these as employed only if they are getting paid while away from their jobs.
