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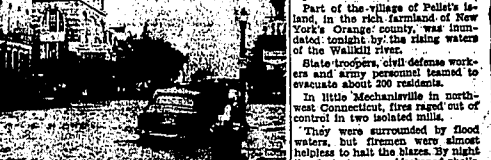

# Swirling Waters Cause Damages in Billions and Start Fires, Explosions

The tharvest, still gripped by the most savage floods in its history, counted the damage in billions of dollars today. An even more terrible toll in human lives kept mounting. At least 143 persons were known dead in the eight seaboard states, ravaged by the uncontrollable torrents of water. Perhaps as many more were missing and unaccounted for. Swollen brooks, streams and rivers generally receded today, but some areas still were threatened by rising waters. As the mud was cleared away, the wreckage of homes and buildings was seen everywhere by the silt the flood left everywhere as its calling card, bodies trapped in crumpled, submerged homes, in scattered trees and piles of debris.

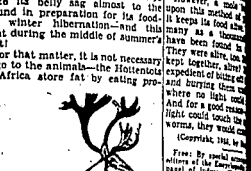

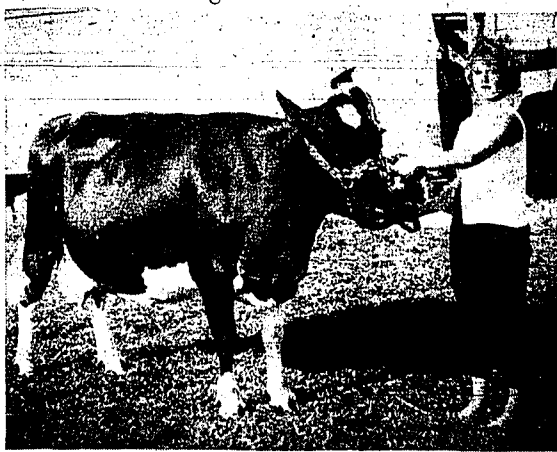

Erwin, 36, was accused of making disloyal statements and giving aid and comfort to the enemy during the spring of 1951 while in POW camps at Fuyong and Pongwang. He was captured Dec. 1, 1950, and released during Operation Big Switch, Sept. 4, 1953.

His trial took 15 days. The prosecution presented 21 witnesses. Another 28 testified in Erwin's behalf. All but a few were former prisoners of war in Korea.

During the trial the defense emphasized conditions at the camps where hundreds of American soldiers died of starvation, disease, bitter cold and, in a few instances, brutality.

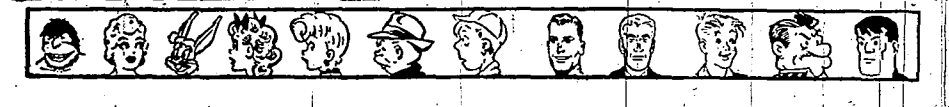

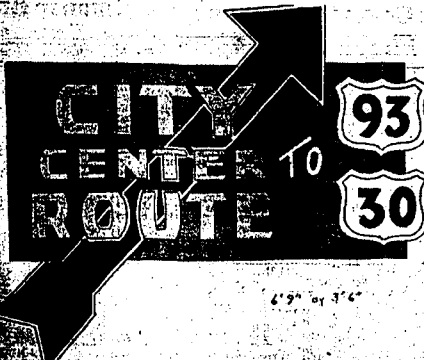

### Installment Method for College Tuitions Is Used by Families

If you're sending a youngster to college this fall you may be able to pay the tuition on the installment plan. Many schools permit installment payments. A survey showed and some have their own privately endowed loan funds for deserving students.

About 300 schools belong to Tuition Plan, Inc., oldest and biggest institution in college installment financing. The trend toward time-payment tuition was reflected in a recent announcement by Queens college and the Union National bank at Charlotte, N.C.

Under a plan adopted jointly by the two institutions, a student's education may be financed at the rate of \$50 or \$60 a month under two different contracts.

Under one plan, the parents begin depositing \$50 a month in the bank 24 months before the student's registration. The deposits continue for two years and eight months after graduation.

The bank will pay \$1,200 to the college each year the student is enrolled. Under the second plan monthly deposits of \$50 begin one year before registration and continue one year and three months after graduation.

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### Discount

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—The Democratic Digest will offer farmers lower subscription prices, it announced yesterday, because their incomes have declined.

The Digest, published by the Democratic national committee, charged President Eisenhower had farmers to believe they would get 100 per cent parity but that the current rate is only 84 per cent.

Thus, it said, farmers attending state or county fairs this week will be granted a regular business subscription for \$3.50 or 84 per cent of the usual rate.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—John L. Lewis has won a hefty 32-a-day pay hike for his soft coal miners in a secret agreement with northern coal producers, informed sources said today.

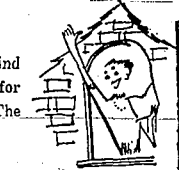

### Idaho Cows Hike Output's Average

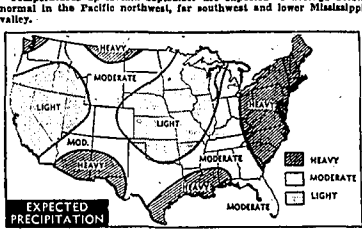
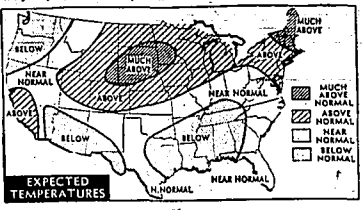

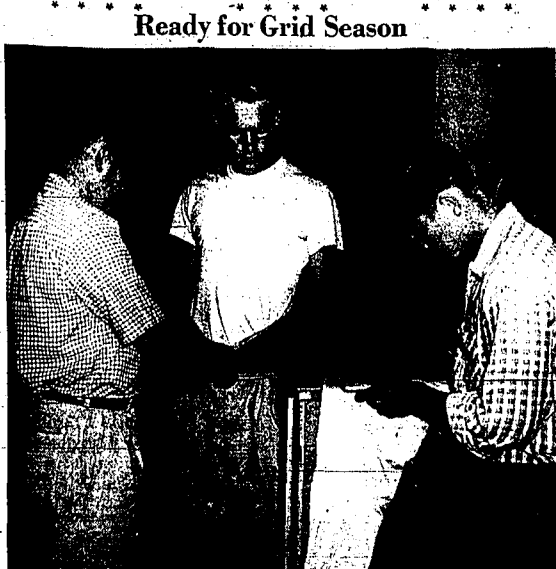

### Orders Given In Hardening Fighting Men

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Orders have gone out to harden American fighting men for the ordeal of combat and captivity. Secretary of Defense Wilson directed the military service to make a start by putting the new code of military "honor" prominently in every unit, ship and post throughout the world. In training men to cope with an enemy both in fighters and possible prisoners of war, Wilson said, it is essential that they be taught the "basic truths and advantages of our democratic institutions and the falsities of communism." The new military code, holding to the loftiest ideals of courage but recognizing that every man has a breaking point in the tests and the trials of war, was proclaimed by President Truman on Wednesday. It was drafted by a group of experts who drew heavily on the lessons learned by the American soldiers captured by the reds in the Korean war and forced to endure torture and brainwashing. Wilson issued his orders in strongly-worded memoranda to the secretaries of the army, navy and air force; the joint chiefs of staff and Asst. Secretary of Defense Carter L. Burgess. Burgess is the Pentagon's manpower chief and chairman of the commission which drew up the code. Each branch of the service was directed to make its own detailed plans for educating its men. No time limit was fixed for the steering process, but Wilson said that even before it starts each man should be "thoroughly grounded in the salient features" of the code. He called for help from the civilian fields—religion, medicine, labor and industry. The secretary said these groups

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# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

"It's going to be a tough job to keep me off Main street," Virgil "Pop" Halbert retorted as he related in his easy chair, Halbert, one of the 100,000 pioneers, last month closed his grocery and sold the stock to Jerome Halbert.

Halbert is known as a walking encyclopedia and many persons will have to start digging for information which once was supplied by him. He has been valuable to such firms as the Jerome Abstract and Title company for he remembers almost everyone who ever lived in Jerome, where they lived, when they came to Jerome. He also has been helpful to newspapers and agencies about facts about the romances have been needed at the time of death.

Halbert not only knows about people but he also knows about many things. He is an ardent reader and many nights the lights in his house will be on until the early hours as he finishes a book or two magazines.

Halbert came to Jerome from Omaha, Neb., in March, 1909, when the town had a population of 100 and the streets had plenty of dust. He has seen the city at its best and its worst and says it has never been out but those who stuck it out have been repaid with wonder.

When he first came to Jerome he worked for the North Side Land and Cattle company for one year and then for a clothing store. In 1910 he went to Chicago but returned to Jerome in 1911 to work for the Jerome Milling and Elevator company for five years for the manager. After the five year stretch with the mill and elevator he went to work for L. O. Thompson who had set up a hardware store. He stayed with Thompson for four years and six months.

Early in 1924 he went to work for the North Side Auto company, selling cars and trucks for one year and then for a "pocket" store. There were plenty of ditches in 1924 but no water in them and car owners couldn't run their automobiles into ditches to soak up the spooks. So he sold plenty of cars.

Late in 1924 he moved to WENDLE and managed the Wendle Milling and Elevator company. He stayed with them for two years and then managed a garage in Wendle, moving back to Jerome in 1927 to take over the L. O. Thompson Hardware store which he managed for 30 months.

It wasn't until 1928 that he went into the grocery business, starting by managing a store for the Cash Grocery. He worked seven years for the company and then purchased the business. For 20 years the business has been known as the Halbert grocery and has been located in the Peterson building on East Main street.

Mr. and Mrs. Halbert have four children and 24 grandchildren. One daughter, Mrs. Frances Eubelmann, lives in Jerome and the other daughter, Mrs. Mabel Griffith, lives in Council. One son, Virgil Halbert, is a hospital administrator in Baltimore and the other son, Norman Halbert, is a assistant sales manager for a welding company in Phoenix, Ariz.

## Assessment of Property for 1955 Goes up

BOISE, Aug. 20 (AP)—Property assessments by the state tax commission and county assessors for 1955 are about 1 1/2 per cent higher than last year, the commission announced here.

The commission said it assessed utility properties at \$150,048,282, an increase of \$2,726,294 over assessments for 1954.

It said taxation of 137 railroads, electric, telephone, telegraph, pipe line and private car companies was expected to yield about 12 million dollars in local property taxes.

The state assessed values, together with county-assessed values of over \$447,900,000, bring the aggregate local property tax base for 1955 to approximately \$590,000,000, the commission said.

Taxes levied on this base for support of counties, cities, school districts and other taxing districts were expected to approximate \$450,000,000.

The commission said the two-million-dollar state ad valorem charge, included in the overall figure, would require a levy of 2.39 mills compared to 2.63 mills in 1954.

The figure also includes \$200,000 for the state building bond sinking fund, which is to pay interest and bond retirement on a two-million-dollar bond issue authorized by the legislature for construction at state institutions.

## Army Taking Enlistments for New 6-Year Reserve Program

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—The army announced today that enlistments will be accepted immediately for the new six-year reserve training program.

The announcement also said the army will be ready to take volunteers for the six-month training plus 7 1/2 years of active reserve phase of the new program in the "immediate future." Officials have said this means about Oct. 1.

Six-year enlistments directly into the reserves are open to youths of 17 and over who have not received a draft induction notice. Those accepted must serve two years on active duty, three years in the ready reserve and one year in the standby reserve. Enlistees will be permitted to serve their two years on active duty anytime they choose within the six-year period.

The new six-month training program, for which the army is preparing now, will be open to volunteers 17 to 18 1/2 years of age. These short term trainees will be paid \$30 a month for the six months, and then must spend 7 1/2 years in the ready reserve, which requires regular training.

During their 7 1/2 years in the ready reserve, they must attend up to 38 weekly drills a year and serve up to 17 days of summer training a year. Or they may be able to choose instead to take 30 days full time training each year, dispensing with the 48 drills. They will receive one day's pay for each drill attended or day at camp. The rate of pay will be based on regular army scale and will depend on rank and length of service.

The marine corps expects to take 5,500 during the same period. The navy and air force are not offering this type of training.

Enlistments will be handled by the nearest organized reserve unit, although regular recruiting centers will give information about the new program.

Build a third part of the new reserve force law is ready for immediate action, the army said. This applies to men now on active duty who complete their tours before July 1, 1957.

If these men join a ready reserve unit when they get out and serve in it satisfactorily for one year, they then will be transferred to the standby reserve to complete whatever military obligation they have remaining.

No regular training is required in the standby reserve.

### Hulks of Ancient Fleet Are Found In Bay at Sicily

SIRACUSA, Sicily, Aug. 20 (UP)—Divers have found water-logged hulks experts say are those of a Greek war fleet lost 2,368 years ago in one of the greatest naval defeats of ancient history.

The first skeletal wreckage was spotted this week by men who have been working almost a month in the silt at the bottom of the broad Bay of Siracusa, on the southeast coast of Sicily.

"They described the ancient ribs and ship's prow of what appeared to be an ancient trireme, a galley with three banks of oars. The wooden wreckage crumbled at their touch. 'There can be no doubt,' said Prof. Luigi Barnard Brea, director of the Siracusa Historical museum, that 'the wreckage is from the Athenian fleet that besieged ancient Siracusa.'

"We stand on the threshold of a discovery of perhaps the most ancient warships ever found on earth."

The search for the sunken fleet was started by the Italian navy and the Sicilian department of antiquities on clues furnished by Arthur Baker, British consul in Siracusa and an ardent student of Sicilian history.

### Concern Seen On Pricing of Cars for 1956

DETROIT, Aug. 20 (AP)—Pricing of 1956 model autos is giving the car makers considerable concern right now.

The conviction throughout the trade is that 1956 list prices will be higher. But they will also have to be competitive. And they will have to take in account the fact that the new car buying public has become discount-conscious in the last couple of years or more.

The auto-makers probably can justify some price advances on the basis of continuing refinement of their new cars. While major changes will be relatively few there will be styling refinements, improved automatic transmissions and numerous additional safety features.

The car builders probably will also be able to point to increased manufacturing costs to explain higher price tags. But their big problem is to "sell" the motoring public on higher prices.

Many auto industry analysts say the era of price discounting in retail merchandising has come for a prolonged stay. Some say it will take continued price cutting at the retail level to maintain high sales volume in new cars through the 1956 model years.

Some industry experts have suggested that even if manufacturers raise their prices it doesn't follow delivered prices will be advanced. This is possibly within thinking; it assumes the retailers can absorb further profit cuts.

Retailers already have slashed their prices about as heavily as they can and stay in business. They may be able to match some of the present discounts on a percentage basis, but the net price to the buyer almost certainly will have to be higher.

All this adds up to a good argument in favor of the purchase of current outgoing models during the next few weeks. These models are available at bargain prices in almost every marketing area. The prices undoubtedly will hold good until present model inventories are cleaned out.

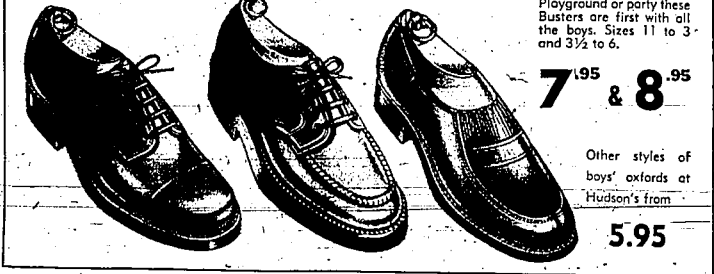
