Cause and Cure of Bloat Found

PULLMAN, Wash., Aug. 27 (AP)—Discovery of the cause—and cure—of bloat, a centuries-old menace to livestock, was announced today at Washington State college. Dr. Robert Hunsaker, WSU biologist, and Dr. Alan T. Jones, New Zealand research specialist, both found an answer to the problem although they worked without knowledge of each other's research. Both found that methyl siloxane, a well-known industrial chemical, would prevent or cure bloat in cattle on pasture. Hunsaker did much of his research in Mississippi with an experimental herd of steers and found that they worked without knowledge of each other's research.

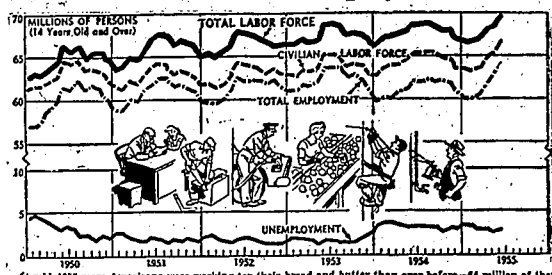

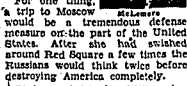

Although Japan's occupation ended in 1951, the 65-year-old diplomat told a news conference "The time has come when we must go forward constructively toward a complete posture of independence."

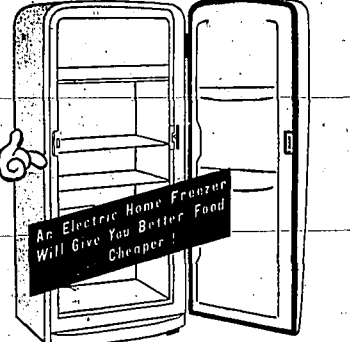
"We are going to have to do it by ourselves," he said.

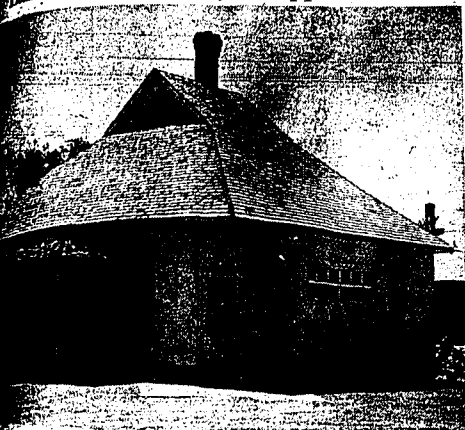
