Fighting Flares in Gaza Area as Two Jet Planes Felled

JERUSALEM, Sept. 7 (AP)—Fighting flared furiously along the Gaza front, Israel said today in a broadcast. Two Egyptian jet planes crashed during a reconnaissance flight.

Amid the fighting and disputed claims, an Egyptian spokesman declared Egypt had received an Israeli message urging an end to hostilities all along the tense border line.

The spokesman said the message was delivered through N. Leica, general manager Maj. Gen. Edson L. W. Burns and came from the Israeli foreign ministry.

Situation Bad For Big State Fire in Forest

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—The public health service today announced that it has received a new batch of polio vaccine for children aged through 9.

This was the third and largest allotment to the states and territories of new vaccine under the voluntary control plan started on Oct. 31, 1955.

Under the voluntary control plan each state has a certain amount of its share of vaccine it will distribute through public agencies and how much through commercial channels.

Russia Seeks West's Okays On Six Points

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 1—Russia today asked the west to agree upon six points which the Soviet Union considers the major issues in the disarmament question.

Soviet Delegate Artyak A. Sobolev broke his silence in the United Nations disarmament subcommittee to bring up the six points.

1. That the manpower levels proposed by the Russians in their disarmament proposals of last May 10 should be the basis of the arms reduction.

2. That the manpower level for armed forces of other countries should be set at 150,000 to 200,000.

3. That a ban on atomic, hydrogen and other nuclear weapons should be effective when the countries have completed reduction of their agreed arms reduction.

Son, 8, Claims His Daddy Is Best in World

CHICAGO, Sept. 1 (AP)—Eight-year-old Edwin Broukal, Jr., was positive today that there is no one in the whole world like his daddy.

He saw his father, an off-duty police officer, capture two bandits at gunpoint on a crowded bus yesterday after a wild chase through Chicago's streets.

Edwin, who had some along with his father to pay the two men, and he chased them from the back seat of their car, where his father had ordered him to take cover.

It all began for the two Edwin's, Jr. and Mr.—when they were driving home.

When Broukal, 31, saw that the shot had come from a car, he cut it off and found out that the driver, Derek E. Zwart, 23, was pursuing two young robbers who had just stolen \$50 from his grocery and meat mart.

As for the rest of the story, let Edwin, Jr., tell it:

"My daddy started after the two men, and he chased them until they ditched their car and got on the bus.

"My daddy stopped our car in front of the bus, shouted to the driver to open the door and hoped to shoot with his pistol in his hand.

"He pulled off those two guys while he searched them for guns. He found a gun on one. The other had left his in the car.

"Then my daddy sent for help and lots of policemen came. The bandits, Joseph Lecko and Charles Brown, both 19, admitted the holdup.

For Edwin, sr., it was the first arrest, except for traffic cases, since he joined the force last Feb. 1964.

Edwin, Jr., said he wanted to be a policeman, just like his father.

Gigantic Legal Battles Seen Over School Desegregation

ATLANTA, Sept. 1 (AP)—The state is set for the legal battle of the century. The case: Public school desegregation. The demands: That the state fully integrate schools by September, 1966. The court: Federal district, circuit and supreme. The Counsel: The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, represented by special counsel Thurgood Marshall, as the plaintiff. The southern states, represented by an array of attorneys general and special lawyers including former Georgia Gov. Herman Talmadge, as defendants.

"The year of crisis is upon us," Attorney General Eugene Cook of Georgia says. "I think we are ready and we are going to keep the fighting within the framework of the state and federal constitutions."

Says Marshall: "We do not underestimate the job ahead. Whenever local districts ask the national NAACP to step in, we intend to aid them."

Legal action by the NAACP to force the south to fully integrate schools during this next year will be stepped up soon, Marshall said. The strategy is for local groups to initiate the first action.

"When a branch is told by Negro parents in an area that they will no longer put up with segregated schools and we are convinced that the local school board is not proceeding in good faith, the state conference will then decide whether to offer legal assistance," Marshall said.

The NAACP presently is flooding the south with petitions from Negro groups asking local school boards to eliminate segregation. Failure to comply would be used in an effort to convince courts that the supreme court's orders for integration with "reasonable speed" were being violated.

Georgia, South Carolina and Mississippi have taken drastic stands by steps, including machinery to

close public schools to prevent integration. But there can be no less litigation before that step is taken. The court fight could go on for generations.

"We are prepared to resist everywhere," said J. P. Coleman, recently-nominated governor of Mississippi.

"If a local board is sued for refusing to integrate schools, the school district could be abolished one day and reestablished the next under a new set of trustees," he said.

Georgia's position in court will be that the supreme court actually didn't outlaw segregation per se but merely established a principle that a child cannot be kept out of a particular school for race reasons only.

"There may be a hundred other reasons why we could legally keep the 'nices' segregated," Attorney General Cook said.

Cook said the state would battle integration efforts regardless of where they occur in Georgia. That means, he said, that even should a city such as Atlanta decide on its own to how to the supreme court, the state of Georgia would intervene.

"Under the state constitution, we would be required to intervene," Cook said. "The law clearly states that it shall be a felony for any local school authorities to operate a mixed school."

Protest Set

TOKYO, Sept. 1 (AP)—Japanese women reformers inspired by western ideas are planning a new attack at the next session of parliament on prostitution, a stubborn survivor of the postwar revolt against tradition.

Japan didn't know prostitution was a "problem" until the allied occupation imposed American notions and morals into an ancient Oriental culture.

The traditional system of planned marriages without pretense of love and stag entertainment entirely outside the home made prostitution on a mass scale inevitable and acceptable.

Today, many of the traditional social patterns remain but the cry for reform in keeping with western custom and the new emancipation of women is growing more insistent.

Female suffrage introduced by the allied occupation brought women to the national parliament. In the past eight years they have sponsored one bill after another trying to ban prostitution.

This year they came near success but tradition won out. Opponents successfully attacked the reformists' failure to provide new jobs for the 500,000 prostitutes if their profession were abolished overnight.

Crews from Deer, Newport and Colville were called in to fight the fire, believed started by a welder's spark in a pile of hay. Little fire in the Spokane valley and adjacent areas also did fire line and proper protection duty.

Smoke spiraled high into the air and attracted crowds of spectators, some of whom got dangerously close to the fire.

Plumes consumed grass, brush and timber. A Washington Power company's 200,000-watt power line running to the Coe-Gale mining district was felt to be in danger.

The fire was believed under control after burning some 60 acres yesterday afternoon, and then flared up again and remained out of control until after dark.

No Value Is Put On Crash Report

Freud Airman Tells of Letter He Gave Reds

TOEYO, Sept. 1 (AP)—Air Force second lieutenant Guy H. Bumpas today has filed a letter he says he gave to the communists while a captive in North Korea.

"But I can tell you that nothing was done to hurt the United States," said at a press conference.

"I gave them the type of answers they wanted to hear," he said. "I told them I gave them nothing that was going to hurt the United States."

Bumpas insisted he was over the Korean peninsula near the Chinese line when communist anti-aircraft gunners opened on him and his plane. Plans were used to land in territory.

Bumpas, Jackson, Miss., spent six weeks in North Korea. He said he was shot down north of the Chinese line Aug. 17. He was released Aug. 22 and returned to the States.

An air force surgeon said Bumpas could undergo a psychiatric examination an injured check-up.

Bumpas said a North Korean interpreter asked him to write the letter.

"I wanted me to thank him for the food and medical treatment I received, and wanted me to wish the communist soldiers in the States a successful future," Bumpas said.

Bumpas said he wrote and signed the letter.

"I denied angrily the reds' claim that he had admitted to giving the communists the type of information they were looking for when first fired on by communist gunners."

"I was taken away I landed in the same valley from where they started shooting," he said.

Bumpas also denied the claims that he had praised red treatment and denounced "U. S. propaganda."

Warning Told By Expert on Nuclear-Blast

BRISTOL, England, Sept. 1 (AP)—A leading British scientist warned last night that no one knows just how big a nuclear explosion is produced.

Sir Robert Robinson, president of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, called for an international conference of scientists to find out if there is a ceiling limit beyond which man should not meddle with the elements.

"Do we really know enough about nuclear reactions to be sure there is no loophole?" Robinson asked in his association's 137th annual meeting. "Has every conceivable case been considered?"

Robinson said ordinary atomic explosions are used to touch off nuclear explosions. Now the bomb in its turn can initiate a vastly greater uranium explosion, but physicists insist they can keep it all under control, he said.

"An ordinary scientist cannot help wondering whether every possibility of setting fire to the lighter elements has 'quits' certainly been excluded if nuclear war is to be taken to further stages," he added.

What must be checked, Sir Robert insisted, was whether every possibility of a runaway-explosion has been covered.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—More than 100 sociologists in conference here today pondered the counting habits of cooks, mental breakdowns among soldiers in combat, and what besides girls) worries boys 13 and 14.

Papers dealing into these matters were among about 70 readied for delivery at opening sessions of a three-day 50th anniversary meeting of the American Sociological Society, Gilbert Geis of the University of Wisconsin and William Shuman of Washington, D.C., reported that random sampling at the University of Wisconsin and the University of Minnesota also disclosed that the Norwegian code is more liberal about money apparently. Missing Cash Is First Top Clue for FBI

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 1 (AP)—A \$100,000 cash, an airport employee, and a \$100,000 bill were the first clues to catch his psychick.

Robert G. Greenleaf, 40, left the bank with the first \$100,000 bill he has seen in the United States for almost two years.

The cash clue carried from the St. Louis bank was a \$20 bill out of 17,000 bills paid to the bank by the 6-year-old Bobby Greenleaf.

The days that followed three of the ransom bills turned up. They stopped.

It was the first time any of the \$100,000 notes had been seen in St. Louis since two business associates of wealthy automobile dealer Robert G. Greenleaf stuffed \$100 into a duffel bag and tossed in a speeding car near a culvert on a lonely road outside Kansas.

The ransom, largest ever paid in a kidnapping case, was delivered according to instructions of the kidnapers in early October. Within 48 hours of Bobby Greenleaf's discovery in a shallow grave near St. Louis, and Carl Austin and Mrs. Bonnie Heady were arrested in St. Louis for the crime.

As he was captured, trail had led to the ransom bills in a pocket in the luggage. The luggage was at the Newland district station. It held \$250,000 of \$100,000 delivered by the Greenleaf family.

More than a year the mystery of the missing money remained the greatest in the history of the kidnapping.

The mysterious ransom notes seeping into circulation. After Greenleaf's first missing bill, three other \$20 bills were at the federal reserve bank in St. Louis by FBI agents.

The second was traced to the National bank at Springfield, Mo., and the third to the Bank and Trust company, St. Louis, Mo. There was no line where the third bill came from.

FBI still doesn't know who had the bills into circulation; or the remainder of the ransom money is intact; or whether it was found; but agents are confident it still exists that it hasn't been destroyed, and that there is a chance of finding it.

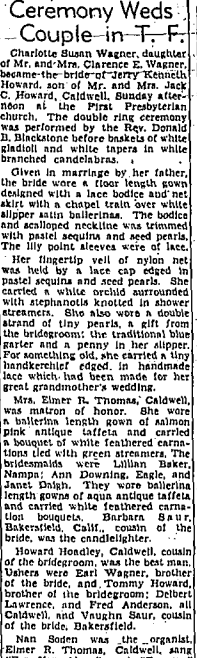

Fuel-Saving Methods Told For Satellites

ROSENBERG, Denmark, Sept. 1.—A favorite gasoline-burner coasting on the hills—be employed as a rocket fuel in these upcoming celestial pods, the artificial satellites, scientists at the sixth meeting of the International Astronautical Federation outlined two possible methods by which an unmanned satellite "coast" part way to its orbit pathway around the earth.

Professional Engineer Kraft of the Convair Aircraft Company, San Diego, Calif., said one of the possible techniques is to launch a satellite vehicle into an orbit 200 to 300 miles above the earth, use a modified version of the technique employed to launch ballistic rockets during World War II.

Lauded World War II Hero Tells Effects of Fight Impact

 NEW YORK, Sept. 1 (AP)—What is a war hero like 10 years after he leaves his last battlefield? How do the men and women who served in the war years ago feel today? Audie Murphy, still too young to vote or grow a mustache, came home as America's most decorated soldier of the second World War. His 24 decorations included the medal of honor and a purple heart for each of his three battle wounds.

The fanfare of a nation's acclaim first bewildered the 20-year-old kid from Texas, then made him a bit resentful. "All I wanted was peace, and time to think things through," he recalled.

Audie, one of nine children of a tenant farmer, wanted to forget the war that everyone he met seemed to want to remember. He first thought he'd like to go to West Point, but decided against it. He felt he wouldn't make a good peacetime soldier. Then he thought of going to college and studying to be a veterinarian. But there was a stumbling block—he had only an eighth grade education. There was a movie offer came along, and he felt he had to take it.

"I had the responsibility of helping two younger sisters and a brother who were in an orphanage while I was away at war," he said.

In Hollywood Audie went up like a rocket—and came down almost as fast. His contract was dropped. He made a marriage that lasted only a year. He stepped into a semi-obscure life.

But in the years since then Audie has shown the stubborn fighting qualities that made him outland-

ing in combat. He is no flash hero. He has now appeared in 15 pictures. His latest, Universal's "To Hell and Back"—based on his own fabulous career—has brought him to the top again. He has remarried happily, and has two children. His future looks secure.

"I still wish I could have gone back to school," he said a little wistfully. "but it has worked out better this way—at least financially. I average about \$2,000 a week now and have a six-year contract. In another five years I should be independent. By that I don't mean I'll be a millionaire. But I'll be able to have a ranch or a farm and enough put by to send my children to college."

Audie, part of whose right hip was shot away, draws \$93 a month pay as the result of a 50 per cent disability rating. For three years, until he joined the Texas national guard as a captain, he refused the money. Now he feels it is fair to take it.

Murphy still holds a steadfast love for the army and says the war didn't disillusion him.

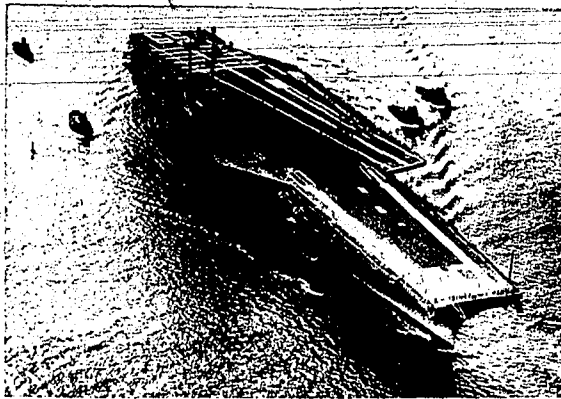
"War is like a giant pack rat," he remarked. "It takes something from you, and it leaves something behind in its stead."

"It burst me out in some ways, so that now I feel like an old man but still sometimes act like a dumb kid. It made me grow up too fast. You live so much on nervous excitement that when it's over you suddenly fall apart."

"That's what war took from me—the excitement of living, getting a thrill out of the little things in life. That's too bad, for it's a great asset to get a kick out of little things. I still get more kick out of seeing other people have fun than looking for it myself."

"I don't get excited. The biggest thrill I have now is coming home and wrestling with my kids—the little devils. But usually I go to bed

before they do."

Audie, who weighed only 117 pounds when he enlisted, has grown three inches taller and gained nearly 40 pounds since then. He feels this is what he gained from war.

"It taught me how to get along with people not to be selfish. War is a pretty good course in public relations."

"The first time you see a man topple over in combat you learn that the war isn't just yours—that

you have a responsibility to the guy on your left and the guy on your right. It's the same way in peace. Peace doesn't give you the same bad comradeship as war. It can't. There you still have a responsibility to the guys on your left and right."

His studio biography says Audie slew 240 enemy soldiers in combat. And the question he hates most to be asked is, "How does it feel to have killed 240 men?"

"To begin with, I didn't kill that

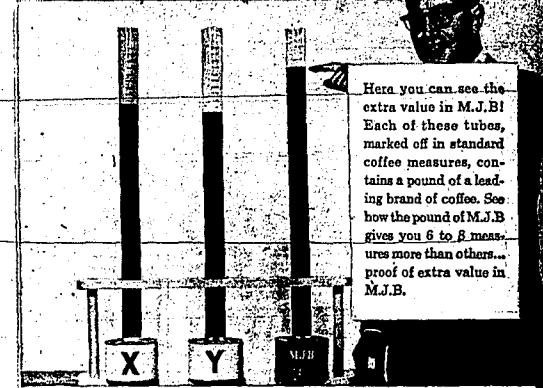
many," he said. "And anyway how the hell does anyone think it felt? It didn't feel either way, good or bad. Feeling wasn't a luxury in the infantry."
