Schools Hit by Congestion and Teacher Dearth

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (AP)—Public school enrollment this fall will increase over last year, and the U.S. office of education has drawn this gloomy picture of the scene:

A shortage of 138,000 teachers. At least 500,000 pupils attending classes half-day only because of lack of space.

Thousands of boys and girls are reciting their lessons in church basements, lodge halls, city auditoriums and converted army barracks.

Education officials say the most serious shortage of classrooms this year will occur in the suburbs of metropolitan areas. Population shifts from city to country are sending more than 6 million children to school districts where schoolhouses can't begin to accommodate them.

In the heart of some cities there are actually empty classrooms. But a classroom can't be picked up and moved to where it's needed.

School construction has left a heavy tax burden on hundreds of thousands of suburban home-owners. A record of 60,000 classrooms have been under construction this year, but many are ready for occupancy.

But education officials point out that the rate of construction is being kept pace with the annual increase in enrollment. It doesn't mean to cope with the next year's record of school buildings become obsolete and have to be condemned.

Construction of each new classroom costs \$35,000, on a nationwide average. Most of the cost must be absorbed locally, or through state aid. Federal aid is available only for schools built on government property.

As enrollment hits a record 33 million this fall officials will be having to make the best of a bad job. About 40,000 of them don't have college degrees. The rest have specific training in teaching.

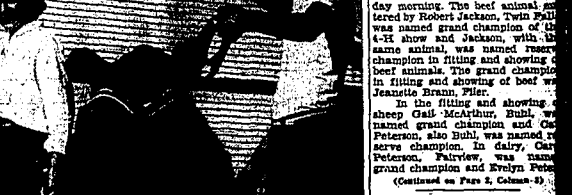
Peak Is Passed in Judging Event at T. F. County Fair

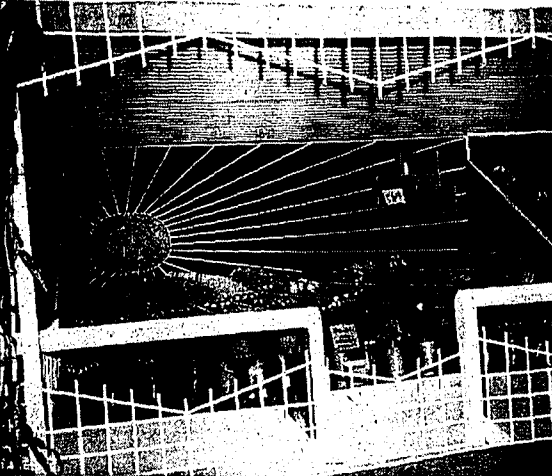

DENVER, Sept. 2 (AP)—President Eisenhower, about to a renewed wave of speculation over his 1956 plans, today began a carefree week-end golfing reunion with old links companions of the Augusta (Ga.) National Country club.

The President—at least publicly—ignored the wave of conjecture that followed a White House announcement yesterday that GOP chairman of all 48 states will fly here late next week for a breakfast session with Mr. Eisenhower.

The unusual move was interpreted generally as the first official indication that Mr. Eisenhower will be identified directly with the 1956 campaign, regardless of his role in it.

But to all outward appearance, the President's attention was for the time being at least, more on the golf greens than the ballot box.

He had an informal evening with the Augusta delegation after their arrival last night and spent the night at the Brown Palace hotel in downtown Denver. It was his first night in Denver away from the residence of his mother-in-law, Mrs. John B. Doud, since he began his extended work-and-play vacation here Aug. 18.

The Augusta group, headed by Chief Roberts, New York investment banker and chairman of the Augusta National club where the President frequently enjoys brief golf vacations, arrived by private plane.

The delegation, numbering about two dozen, will be the President's week-end golfing guests and will exchange hospitality with the chief executive at informal evening get-togethers.

Indians Have Worry About Youth Crime

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (AP)—While white men worry about wayward sons and daughters, so does American Indian.

Duvenile delinquency on Indian reservations is not only increasing but on some reservations is growing faster than among non-Indians, a Senate report released yesterday.

Poverty, disease, "rural slums," broken homes, illegitimate children, child desertion, lack of law and order enforcement—all these run through the report.

Through it all, too, was that old taboo of the Indians—intemperance.

The report is based on a study of 77 convictions involving juveniles among the 4,000 Indians of the San Carlos Apache Reservation, Arizona in 1954. 59 of them were charged with "disorderly conduct."

The 239-page report was based on hearings held by the Senate subcommittee to investigate juvenile delinquency, headed by Senator J. W. Fulbright, D. Tenn. The report was based on a study of 77 convictions involving juveniles among the 4,000 Indians of the San Carlos Apache Reservation, Arizona in 1954. 59 of them were charged with "disorderly conduct."

The report also mentioned poor health conditions, inadequate welfare services, lack of local leadership and community action on reservations.

Some of these troubles, it said, can be traced to the breakdown of the guardian-ward relationship and the "fumbling, inconsistent, incomplete federal policy on Indian affairs, over the past 100 years, has completely reversed itself in the three major, periodic Indian affairs."

Earth Picture Is Shot From 100 Miles up

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (AP)—The navy has found out what you would see from a rocket 100 miles above the earth.

Navy photographers have developed a composite view, taken from an actual rocket showing 1,150,000 square miles of the earth's surface. They believe the picture establishes two "airies" for the navy.

All of Texas and parts of nine other states appear. The horizon extends about 2,500 miles from Omaha, Neb., to the lower gulf of California in Mexico.

The navy believes this is the largest earth area ever photographed from one spot at one time.

A hurricane 1,000 miles in diameter circles Rio, Tex., appears in the upper left hand corner. This is believed to be the first composite photograph of a hurricane, the navy said.

The photograph is made up of 210 frames from 16mm color motion picture film. The rocket was fired by the naval research laboratory, Washington, D. C., at the White Sands Proving Grounds, Las Cruces, N. M., on Oct. 5, 1934.

Japan Envoy Says Neutral Course Fatal

NEW YORK, Sept. 2 — Japanese Foreign Minister Mamoru Shigemitsu said yesterday that a neutral course would be fatal for Japan and pledged friendship with the United States "through sunshine and storm."

"There are no other two nations in the world that enjoy such a warm friendship as we do today," he said. Shigemitsu addressed business leaders in the Waldorf-Astoria hotel shortly after his arrival from three days of talks with Secretary of State Dulles and government officials in Washington.

The two nations issued a joint statement agreeing to set schedules "for the progressive withdrawal of United States ground forces as Japan's own defense capacity increases."

Shigemitsu proposed a six-year plan for building up Japan's ground forces to 380,000 troops. U. S. officials hoped for a goal of 330,000.

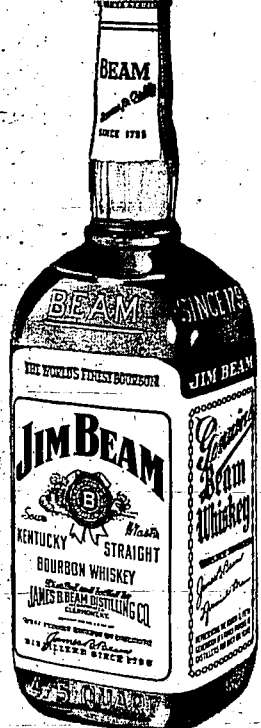
