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Officials Plan New \$45,000 Radio System

Sept. 8 (AP)—The Idaho examiners reversed an earlier decision and approved an expense of \$45,000 for revision of the state radio system and game department's equipment.

The proposal was turned down by the board last March, but was reconsidered by Gov. Robert E. and Andy Con. Graydon secretary of State Ira Meacham, third member of the board, at the meeting.

The department said it now had 100 units, which would be replaced by higher frequency rigs to the state.

The working radius of the units is 30 miles, the department requested did not specify how far the radio signals would reach.

The game department director Leonard said its new system would be a statewide radio system as presently operated by the police and highway department.

Leonard wrote the revised amount essentially to a system used on an area which would give local supervision and control on their areas, the said, and would facilitate law enforcement.

Power Plant Group Seeks Okay by U.S.

Mont., Sept. 8 (AP)—The Northwest Power company, which includes the Montana Power company, yesterday asked the federal government for permission to build a more than a million kilowatt hydroelectric power plant on the Snake river between Oregon and Idaho.

The project, owned and operated by private companies, would develop the river initially to 1,000,000 kilowatts of power, and 250,000 kilowatts would be available to Montana.

The project, including transmission lines, is expected to cost \$100 million. It would increase capacity and transmission for a license to operate major dams and plants at Pleasant Valley and Sheep, about the mouth of the Snake and Jimmah rivers, with the federal power by the new regional government.

Argentina's Big Oil Problem Causes Headaches for Chief

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 8 (AP)—President Juan Peron's decision that he can't go it alone in the oil business has backfired into one of his biggest headaches.

A proposed contract between Argentina and a U.S. oil company is drawing fire from members of the president's own Peronista party. Opponents hint the company is a front for the United States.

The agreement is bogged down in the Peron-dominated congress, and the deadline for approval is Sept. 30.

The contract would let Compania Argentina Argentina de Petroleo, subsidiary of Standard Oil of California, explore and drill for oil in Argentina under strict regulations, when there is an excess can the

Argentina has a tough oil problem. Its government company is not producing nearly enough to serve the nation. To expand the government monopoly would take millions of precious dollar reserves. The alternative? Let a foreign company come in.

The proposed contract gives Compania Argentina the right to build airports, roads, marine landing docks, communications and other necessary facilities. The company's concession is situated in Argentina's southernmost tip — a chilly, windswept stretch of Patagonia.

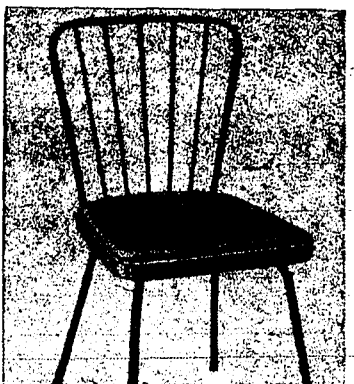

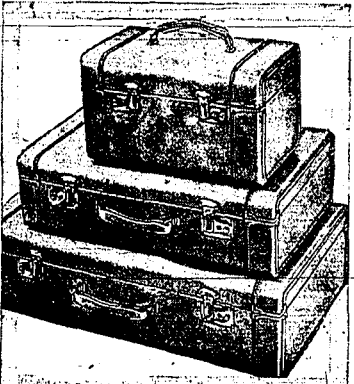

Former Sultan Sidi Mohammed Ben Youssef, whom France ousted in 1953, is giving Premier Edgar Faure's government in their hands. Faure has given himself until next Monday to solve the grave that has cost nearly 300 lives in less than two months. Faure is trying to get agreement from the island of Madagascar for a "plan" for limited some "role" for that 158,070-square mile African protectorate. As part of his plan, Faure wants to ease out the present sultan, Sidi Mohammed Moulay Arafat, whom France installed on the throne of the "fortunate empire" two years ago. But he does not want to restore program, the Moroccan national sultan may not. They want Mohammed Ben Youssef back. Mohammed Ben Youssef succeeded to the throne as a 10-year-old boy in 1927. He played along with France until, after World War II, the nationalist spirit which swept the eastern world reached Morocco. He began to go nationalist. He lives there in luxury at a resort hotel with his four wives, his boy of concubines, and his extensive entourage. A movie lover, he watches private showings of American films. Mostly they are ancient westerns and Tarzans. While bearded, heavy-browed Moulay Arafat, 66, didn't especially want to be sultan. Immensely wealthy, a gentleman farmer and a scholar, he enjoyed a quiet life. He liked to visit the bazaars and chat with fellow farmers over prices. Unfortunately, he got to like the sultan business. He backed in the sunlight of prominence, and the state processions with an attendant holding a big green umbrella over him and four men marching on each side of him, whisking off the flies. Now Faure has to induce Moulay Arafat to give up the throne and Mohammed Ben Youssef not to take it back. 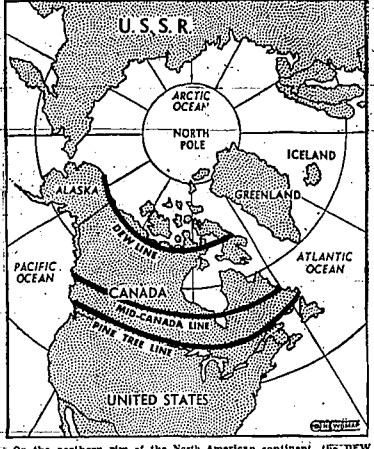

Teachers and education officials at Tsunomyia asked theaters not to show "Blackboard Jungle" because the "reckless behavior of some American youngsters" portrayed in the film might corrupt Japanese youth.

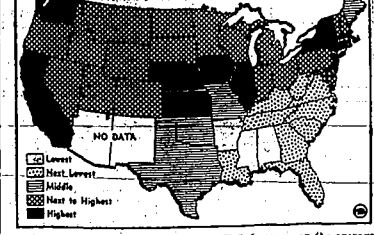

FRANKFURT, Sept. 8 (AP)—Frankfurt Mayor Walter Kolb today held a reception for the Salt Lake Tabernacle choir at City hall.

America Talks Disarmament, Will Match Soviet Strength

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 (AP)—The world got a happy jolt when President Eisenhower, last July in Geneva, proposed the United States and Russia swap complete military information and inspect each other's areas from the air to prevent cheating.

The suggestion—added to Eisenhower's statement to the Russians that this country is willing to agree on arms reductions—may have seemed to many like the big break at last in the disarmament log jam.

And it may well be. But any agreement between this country and the communists on disarmament probably will mean for a long time a very limited kind of disarmament, not a stripping to the bone.

Eisenhower has never said how far the United States would be willing to go in disarmament. That is something which would have to be worked out and would depend on how far the Russians want to go. But the balance of power in the world today—the force which keeps the Russian and Red Chinese from kicking over the traces—is this country's ability to his agreement at once with planes and nuclear weapons.

Eisenhower could hardly throw away that power by offering to disarm the United States to such an extent that it couldn't protect itself and its friends from a surprise attack.

Before the United States does any disarming at all it would have to be sure the Russians did the same. That means some system of inspection, from the air or otherwise, to make cheating difficult if not impossible.

Harold Stassen, Eisenhower's specialist on disarmament, is talking about it with the Russians in the United Nations committee meeting. As far as is known they have not even come close to agreement.

The new secretary of the air force, Donald A. Quarles, indicated in a recent speech that this country has no intention of any time soon abandoning its power to keep the Russians in check.

He said it was the communists' respect for this country's strength which led to their cordiality at Geneva and it is only by maintaining its strength that we can follow up the developments at Geneva with concrete results.

Jungle Ruler Loses Life to Protect Mate

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—A gallant black panther, fighting but still full of jungle courage, fought to the death with five lions to save his mate at the Brookfield zoo.

Visitors watched in horror yesterday as Snowball, a 12-year old panther, was taken to the cage arranged at five lions who had been let into his cage by mistake.

Snowball never had a chance. A single blow from a huge lion's paw broke his back and he was dead within minutes. But his mate, snarling furiously from a ledge in the cage, was unharmed.

Driven Away

The lions were in the panther's cage for only eight minutes before zoo attendants, using bars, poles and streams of water, forced them from Snowball's mangled body.

Zoo Director Robert Bean said Snowball's appearance sprang into battle to save the life of his mate and himself.

A fluke of chance led to Snowball's death. He and his mate had been moved from their regular cage while it was being cleaned. Ten minutes before feeding time keeper Cecil Aldridge, 37, let the five hungry lions into the cage.

Didn't Look

"I just didn't look first to make sure the cage was empty," the sorrowful keeper said.

Snowball and his mate were lying on a ledge when the big cats attacked.

The panther tensed, his muscles standing out under his sleek black coat. His long tail twitched.

Then in a single graceful jump of split-second timing, Snowball leaped at the advancing lions.

Other Spring

Snowball went down under two of the lions. Then the others sprang on him with vengeful claws. The panther was probably dead within seconds, witnesses said.

Bean said Snowball might well have been the victor in a head-on fight.

The more agile panther could easily have rolled over his back, leaping away with all four paws and 20 claws. Any big cat which gets into this fighting position, regardless of size, can rip his opponent to ribbons, Bean said.

Fast Prime

But Snowball was past his prime. Raised in the Sumatra jungle, he was brought to the suburban Brookfield zoo with his mate in 1941 at the age of 3. Now, at the moment of his last battle, he was 12 years old—the equivalent of a 60-year old man.

The lions were young and husky. Each one weighed about 100 pounds to Snowball's 175. Their average age was 4 or 5 years—equivalent to a 20-year old man in the prime of life.

Snowball was a beautiful beast, despite his age. His species is known as a black leopard, although it is commonly referred to as a black panther. His body was practically coal black and it was sleek and lithe.

Education Officials Told by Official

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—There will be 1,687,000 more students enrolled in schools and colleges this fall than last, but there will be fewer teachers and a still acute classroom shortage.

This picture of the school situation was reported today by education commissioner Samuel M. Brownell.

He said the total number of students enrolling this fall will be 32,687,000. The number will keep increasing, he predicted, and by 1964 the enrollment will reach an estimated \$1,500,000, a 50.3 per cent increase over the year.

Brownell said that grade and high schools will be short 141,300 teachers and 280,000 classrooms this fall.

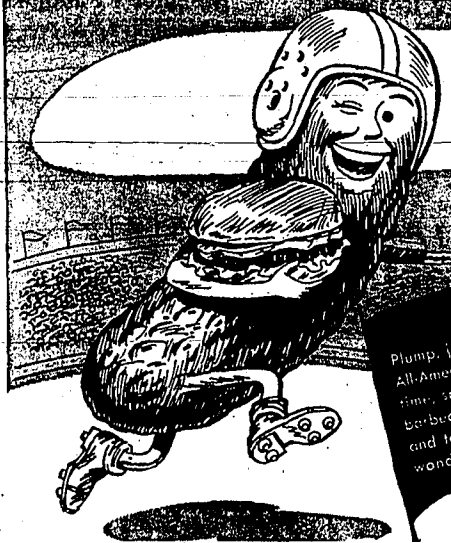

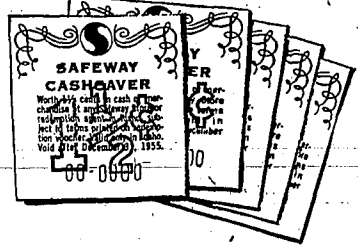

State Reports Healthy Jump In Tax Takes

BOISE, Sept. 8 (AP)—A healthy bounce in state income and cigarette tax collections—plus an increase in oleomargarine taxes—were reported for the months of July and August by state tax collector P. F. Neill.

In his monthly report to Gov. Robert F. Smylie, Neill said personal and corporate tax collections increased from \$100,261 to \$274,000—a 274 percent increase—during July and August of this year compared to the same two months last year.

The increase for cigarette taxes for the same two corresponding periods was from \$228,890 to \$377,250, or \$148,360, the collector said. Smylie said both increases could be attributed, in part, to legislation enacted by the 1933 legislature—a withholding tax and a boost in cigarette levies from three to four cents.

The first quarterly withholding reports are not due from employers until Oct. 1, the governor noted, but he said some larger corporations in the state have been filing their reports on a monthly basis since the start of the current fiscal year. Oleomargarine tax collections, according to Neill's report, jumped \$223,119 during the two periods. Beer taxes slipped by \$16,533, while the highest motor tax was down \$1,854.

The net increase of all taxes, which goes to the general fund, amounted to \$185,374. Neill also reported a \$637,633 increase in special fund taxes, resulting mostly from a boost in motor license taxes from \$3,478,640 to \$7,016,023.

Huge Revival Is Shown for U. S. Religion

NEW YORK, Sept. 8 (AP)—Six out of every 10 Americans are church members today, compared to less than two out of 10 a century ago when the United States supposedly was at its peak of Victorian decorum. These statistics are drawn from the wealth of data on church membership in the continental United States compiled by the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. and soon to be published in its annual church yearbook for 1934. The yearbook's figures are drawn from the official reports of more than 250 religious bodies including Protestant, Roman and Old Catholic, Jewish, Eastern Orthodox and Buddhist congregations. They cover in most cases the year 1934 and even greater totals exist at the present time. Whatever legends linger concerning America's religious fervor in the colonial and Victorian periods, the yearbook's statistics apparently show that this country is today engaged in the greatest religious revival in its history. The yearbook says that Protestant congregations gained 1,248,717 members in 1934 for a total of 33,403,332 and Jewish congregations increased by 500,000 for a total of 1,500,000. Percentage-wise increases for the three major faiths were: Protestant, 2.7; Roman Catholics, 2.2; Jewish, 10.0.

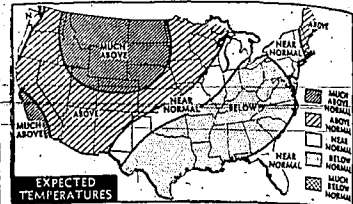

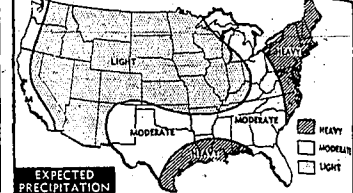

Chemist Tests Can Point Out Poison Fungi

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—A fully qualified chemist fully equipped with tools and chemicals can now identify, positively and beyond the least shadow of doubt, a poisonous mushroom.

To detailing this advance of science, the American Chemical Society recalled that through recorded history, three emperors and a pope have been among the countless victims of mushrooms which didn't look poisonous but were. And some 50 persons are killed by poisonous mushrooms in the United States every year.

Three chemists at the University of Florida—S. B. Block, R. L. Stephens, and W. A. Murrill—have worked out the positive test.

Three kinds of mushrooms, all members of one mushroom family, the amanitas, and closely related, are said to cause 90 per cent of the mushroom poisoning deaths. Block, Stephens, and Murrill have isolated their poisonous substances, identified them, and published the quite complex techniques by which any other chemist can do the same.

But nothing should alarm eaters of the common mushroom, sparsate campestris, which is the one cultivated and sold commercially. As a matter of fact, most varieties of mushrooms are non-poisonous. The trouble is that only an earnest student of fungi can distinguish a non-poisonous variety from a poisonous kind with absolute certainty 100 times out of 100.

The non-student should leave wild mushrooms strictly alone. Incidentally, a "dead stool" is a mushroom to science. This is the popular term for a poisonous mushroom.

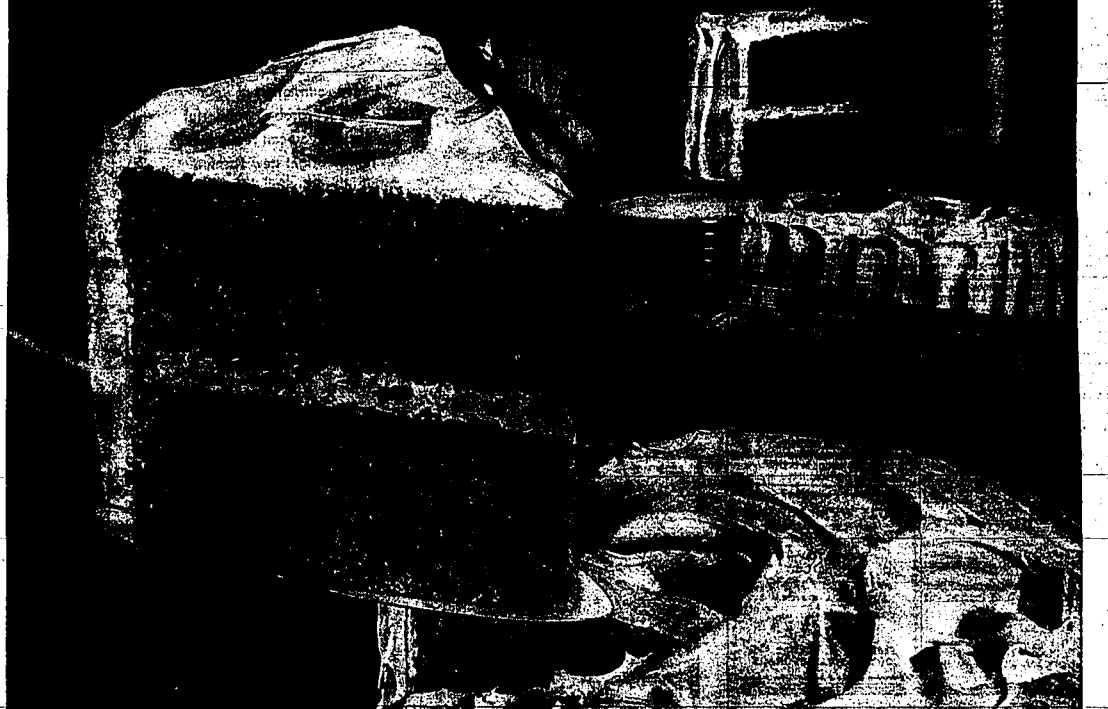

GOP's Admit Worry About Crop Prices

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—The Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall today worried state-party leaders he looks for a serious action to solve the problem of falling farm prices.

Mr. Eisenhower promised farmers a fair share of the income, Hall said. "In my opinion the administration has met other problems and it will meet this problem."

Talking to reporters after the first session of a campaign school for GOP state chairmen, Hall said the farm problem was one of many raised at the closed-door session.

"It is a problem," Hall conceded, "we don't know yet how much of a problem. So far as we are just beginning to hear from congressmen now that we are back home."

He did not know of any specific steps planned by the administration to meet the problem. They were highlighted last week by an agricultural department announcement that farm prices had dropped two per cent in the preceding month.

GOP state chairmen from farm areas conceded they felt they added that farmers don't blame President Eisenhower for the price decline.

Population Boost Slates Problems

MACKINAC ISLAND, Mich. (AP)—Businessmen should get ready to meet a myriad of problems caused by a population "explosion" in the area according to a Los Angeles, Calif., official.

J. Howard Edgerton, president of the United States Savings and Loan League, said businessmen should not wait for these problems to burst upon us before we make provisions for their solution.

"I hope that no businessmen is so blinded by the bright light of the staggering social, political and economic problems that will surround the extraordinary increases in population during the 1950's," Edgerton told a Michigan Savings and Loan League meeting.

Edgerton said the population rise will intensify problems involving schools, transportation and housing and make them "increasingly prominent in the arena of political controversy."

Blackjack Trees Uses Are Found

NORMAN, Okla. (AP)—Many a curse has been flung at the blackjack oak tree by Oklahoma farmers, but a University of Oklahoma scientist has taken the tree apart molecule by molecule and says the wood may have value after all.

Dr. Arthur C. Shread, associate professor of chemistry, said he bought 20 acres of the poorest land he could find near Norman. It was covered with blackjacks.

He burned the blackjack wood and spread ashes as fertilizer in his garden. His potatoes grew and thrived, paying little attention to dry weather.

There is one other use for the blackjack which Dr. Shread is not recommending for Oklahoma. It provides an excellent fuel for certain distilling processes that occur in a well-known home industry. But federal reavers from moonshine stills.

Pitfall of POW Psychology Is Noted In New U. S. "Code of Conduct" Rules

WASHINGTON (NEA)—There is a pitfall for the services in the new "code of conduct" for U. S. prisoners of war which has just been proclaimed by President Eisenhower, officials said.

It is explained by a high ranking army officer:

"For the first time in the history of the army we will concentrate on training troops how to be model prisoners of war. Yet becoming prisoners of war is the last thing in the world we want to happen to them."

"The danger of too much emphasis on training for possible capture by the enemy is that it might be giving the men a POW psychology. If we order it we are getting the ideas across that capture is a normal thing to expect in combat. Yet the code is to train troops to assume that victory is the only normal result of combat."

The danger of creating a "POW psychology" is aggravated by the tactical doctrine which is being developed for the event of atomic warfare. It calls for the maximum dispersal of small troop units.

Under this condition the temptation and opportunity to surrender will be great. No clearly defined front line will exist and many units will appear to be hopelessly surrounded in long periods of fighting before the outcome of a battle is decided.

The victory will depend on the ability of all of the scattered units to continue fighting longer than the enemy.

The marine corps is also aware of this problem. And, although it isn't quite so serious a matter to the air force and navy because of the type of warfare they wage, training experts from these services will be part of the code.

The special committee which drew up the new code, headed by Carter Burgess, assistant secretary of defense for manpower, was also keenly aware of the danger of creating a "POW psychology" merely by making such a code. This accounts for the second paragraph of it which reads:

"I will never surrender of my own free will. If in command, I will never surrender my men while they still have the means to resist."

All of the services have begun an

will they have to take an oath to live up to it.

"We prefer to have them understand it rather than merely be able to recite it word for word," Gen. Hull explains.

To achieve this all of the services are expected to devote some time to study of the code during basic training. "And from then on until a man gets into combat he will not be permitted to forget it," a high army training officer promises.

Already plans are being made to indoctrinate the troops with the facts of the code by motion pictures, lectures and through training manuals.

"A specific recommendation by the committee is for the creation of special courses which will teach American soldiers all of the tricks and techniques on the ways and means of resisting enemy interrogators."

The officers of all services will also be given special instructions on how to continue to exercise their authority under POW conditions. This is expected to be done at the service academies, at officer candidate schools and in other officer schools.

The code committee cited instances of the failure of officers to maintain discipline, take proper command of the men in their camps and get camp conditions as clean and livable as possible. Many POWs died because of this failure by some officers.

Another effect of the POW code will be the possible rewriting of several parts of the uniform code of military justice to spell out POW crimes in more specific detail. The present lack of clear legal language on POW crimes has caused confusion in the prosecution of some of the men charged with violations during their capture in Korea.

A final recommendation of the code committee is for an effort by the department of defense to get an

improvement of the teaching of the principles of democratic government in U. S. schools.

The committee found that many communist interrogators knew more about the machinery of the U. S. government than their U. S. prisoners. This put the captive American at a disadvantage.

The department of defense will seek the aid of the department of health, education and welfare in this effort.

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U.S. Expected To Act, Free War Captives

The population of the Sugamo prison in Tokyo may be reduced radically soon as the result of Japanese Foreign Minister Shigemitsu's visit to the United States.

One of the main reasons for Shigemitsu's visit was to seek the United States release of the 210 men still held in its hands.

Shigemitsu says it isn't quite right to sack Japan to return for a possible future and political leaders are still confined for taking part in the last one.

Both Shigemitsu and his chief, Premier Ichiro Hatayama, feel strongly about this.

The cooperation will be even closer, and Japanese enthusiasm for rearmament will be intensified, if the United States makes the gesture of releasing some of its prisoners it still holds in Sugamo.

In addition to the 210 still held by the United States, there are 347 others. Australia has 149 of them. The Netherlands 111, Great Britain 80. The remaining seven, "Class A" criminals, were sentenced by an international court.

Japan wants all of them, including the "Class A" men, given their freedom. It will not be surprising if the United States is first to act.

Survival Plan Is Studied for Cities in U. S.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 (U.P.)—The federal civil defense administration is studying a nationwide effort to prepare detailed "survival plans" for America's key "target cities."

The plan, which will vary from city to city, are designed to speed the evacuation of the downtown population in case of atomic attack.

Congress gave the agency a special appropriation of \$10 million to finance the plans, which will be drawn up by local officials working with federal officials.

Although no timetable for starting the project has been set, civil defense administrator Val Peterson has indicated New York will be one of the first cities covered. Milwaukee, St. Louis, Philadelphia and cities of medium size will come next.

A Chicago project will be discussed within a few months, the federal civil defense administration said.

Air Force Police Make Speed Test

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 8 (U.P.)—Air policemen at Offutt air force base, home of the strategic air command, are testing their new trap.

The servicemen have set up a contraption employing a spotlight and mirror, a chart and a stop watch.

The spotlight is directed at the mirror from across the highway. When an automobile breaks the beam, an officer without moving the road clicks on the stop watch. The chart tells him how fast the car is going, comparing the time it took to cover the area between the beam and policeman.

Cities Will Spend More Upon Plans

CHICAGO, Ill.—Cities are spending more for looking ahead.

The American Society of Planning Officials reported that the percent increase in the number of cities spending \$20,000 a year for planning purposes over the past three years.

The group said that the average expenditures for planning services in 1954 was 24.1 cents per person. The range goes from \$1.33 per person at Palm Springs, Calif., to 11 cents per person at Holland, Mich.

Improvement Can Backfire to Slum

CHICAGO (U.P.)—The National Association of Housing and Redevelopment officials warn that civic improvements can backfire into creation of new slums.

The organization said that slum clearance projects, new highway construction and slum projects can create new slum spots by failure to plan for the relocation of uprooted homes and business.

World Without Male Possible, Says Two Research Scientists

EAST LANSING, Mich., Sept. 8 (U.P.)—Consider a world without men; the women are father and mother of children.

This is theoretically possible—but most unlikely—based on experiments with a frog world where females have been eliminated. The males produce all the young tadpoles.

"The males all became egg-producing females but were still genetically males."

When the eggs from these sex-reversed frogs are fertilized by sperm from their brothers or from other male frogs, all the young tadpoles are of male constitution.

But any desired percentage of them can be induced to become "females" by adding a tiny amount of the female sex hormone to the water in which they live. One week of hormone treatment produces the change of apparent sex for a lifetime.

At this point, for procreation of the colony of frogs, the true genetic females are no longer necessary. Theoretically it might become possible to do this same thing with animals or conceivably with humans, Witcible and Chang said.

A more likely possibility is pre-termination of sex at will in stock animals, to be sure of producing male or female offspring.

If human sex were tampered with like the frogs were, the human male might become unnecessary.

If human embryos could be treated hormonally as were the frogs, only girls would be produced. Some of them might also be induced to have some male characteristics, to contribute the male share of fertilization, but they would not be changed into men. Genetically they would still be females. No true males would be necessary.

Japan Official Eyes Fight on Defense Items

TOYOYO, Sept. 8 (U.P.)—Foreign Minister Shigemitsu returned from Washington today to face a political storm raised by rumors that he had agreed that Japanese troops in the future could be sent overseas.

Shigemitsu, in a brief statement at the airport, again denied making any commitment in talks with U. S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and other American officials to send Japanese soldiers outside of Japan for Asian defense.

The U. S. state department also has reported that no such pledge was made.

Shigemitsu held a brief press conference after conferring with government leaders including Chief Cabinet Secretary Ryuzo Nomoto and Foreign Office Adviser Masayuki Tanii.

The foreign minister said he believed he had fulfilled his mission to Washington "to exchange frank discussions with American leaders for the purpose of deepening friendly relations with the United States."

Curb on Red Visits Asked By Politician

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 (U.P.)—Rep. Joe Holt, R., Calif., urged today that the United States limit the number of Russians visiting this country unless the Soviet government explains satisfactorily why he was detained at a Soviet airport in the Black Sea last month in Moscow on Aug. 31.

The 31-year-old Holt said he is willing to wait a reasonable time for a Soviet answer to the state department's "vigorous protest" over his detention by a red army officer.

But if a satisfactory explanation and apology are not forthcoming, he said, the state department should take steps to curtail the freedom of Soviet delegations coming to this country.

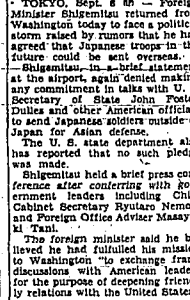
As the matter stands now, he said, the exchange program between the two countries is strictly a one-way street. "We allow thousands of Russians to enter this country, while Americans are allowed to see many things they want to see."

Holt, who spent 15 days visiting Leningrad, Moscow and Kiev, said, for example, that he tried unsuccessfully throughout his stay to visit a factory in operation. But he said that practically all his Russian guides would let him see were museums and statues.

He also complained that Russian guides discourage ordinary Soviet citizens from talking to American visitors.

"You can't reach the people," he said.
