Prison Handling Hit by Ousted Leader

COLIN, Neb., Sept. 10 — Eugene Morris, ousted head of the reformatory, today criticized the handling of Friday riot by his superior and board of control officials. Morris, in a scathing attack said that M. L. Wimberly and board administrative assistants Harold Larson had taken the advice of top members at the reformatory. Riot and fire would not have occurred, he said.

The staff members, Morris said, recommended that no force be used. A break in riotous strike which threatened into a full scale riot, a fire which caused \$25,000 damage, according to official tabulation today. Earlier officials had called damage at about \$100,000.

Wimberly, commenting on the riot attack, said: "I guess every man has a right to his own opinion."

Wimberly said he used restrained means and used force as a last resort to stop the riot.

He said he did not care to comment at this time.

Morris has advocated a "get tough" policy in handling rioters. He said this should be done before they get out of hand.

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Satellites Will Be Sent Aloft By End of '58

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Sept. 10 — The United States plans to launch six to 10 basketball-sized satellites into the atmosphere before the end of 1958, it was disclosed at the conference for the international geophysical year.

The disclosure was made to scientists from both sides of the Iron Curtain by Dr. Homer E. Newell, a U. S. naval research laboratory rocket expert. Newell outlined the American program for the 1957-58 geophysical year before a special committee to coordinate national plans.

Soviet delegates attended the meeting, but volunteered no information about Russia's satellite plans. A Russian expert said the delegation included no rocket experts. He added that he "had no information on that subject" when asked if any were expected before the conference ended Monday.

Twice during his report Newell appealed, without mentioning the Soviet Union which has announced it planned to launch satellites for cooperation in the rocket and satellite programs.

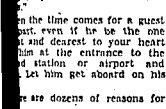

New Plan for German Unity Assures Peace

LONDON, Sept. 10 (AP)—The United States has suggested creation of a 14-nation security system designed to stabilize Germany and restore peace in Europe, officials here reported today.

Under the plan the United States would join with West European nations and the Soviet bloc in a mutual security treaty. It would demonstrate a readiness to help Russia in the event of danger from a renewed German attack.

The idea would be to quiet Russian fears about possible rearmament in Germany and to bring the Soviet government to the point of agreeing to free elections for an all-German government.

The proposed East-West security system would exclude Germany. But it is assumed a free reunited Germany would choose to enter the security treaty. It would be described as one of a number of security treaties which the western powers have under consideration to achieve the same aims—German rearmament and an end to the cold war.

Plane; Car in Headon Crash On Utah Road

SOLDIER SUMMIT, Utah, Sept. 10 (AP)—An automobile and an airplane collided head-on on 8,000 feet highway, injuring a Utah woman severely.

Of five others in the crash two received minor injuries and another was killed.

The accident occurred at the 8,000-foot Soldier Summit on the highway between Provo and Panguitch. The Professor Max Nicholas of Brigham Young University made a forceful landing on the highway.

Hit at High Speed

Unpleasant Side of Penicillin Is Stressed in Medical Meet

NEW YORK, Sept. 10 (AP)—Several medical scientists here suggested that the public be told something about the unpleasant side of penicillin so that the public will stop insisting doctors use it in order to get a shot of the stuff for the least little thing.

The medical profession has just about curbed the enthusiasms among its members who were shouting first and asking questions later. But patients still demand it and when a medical man refuses to do access, many of them act as though he ought to be divine.

The unpleasant side of penicillin is that some people are allergic to it. To some very few cases—comparatively speaking—it has produced the rushing, sledge-hammer kind of allergic reaction called anaphylactic shock which can be quickly fatal.

Dr. Sheppard Siegel of New York's Mount Sinai hospital, an allergy specialist, has been one of the leading brake-jerkers within the profession. A recent lecture of his at the annual meeting of the medical society of the state of New York was heard only by other doctors.

Speaking of antibiotics generally, he said he did not want to "instill fear"—he wanted to "suggest a proper discrimination." He concluded:

"Enormous quantities of these life-sustaining drugs have been employed all over the world. The ill effects due to allergic reactions affect but a minority of the vast numbers of patients who have benefited from them. Nevertheless, the profession must be aware of the possible peril of allergic reactions, especially of the severe form, in order to avoid them as far as possible and to treat them promptly and effectively when they do occur."

For allergic reactions, penicillin is the "problem antibiotic," he said. In his wide experience, he had classified four types:

1. "Delayed type," occurring at least five days after the penicillin shot. There are skin eruptions—usually hives—fever and pain in the joints. This is the reaction of an allergic person to the first exposure of an antigen, in this case, penicillin.

2. "Accelerated and immediate" type. Not nearly so common as type one. Occurs only in persons who have had penicillin before. It may come within seconds of the shot or one or two days afterward.

There may be itching, hives, labored breathing or asthma, chest and abdominal pains—or it may bloom into the complete picture of anaphylactic shock.

Type three are "spasmodic" reactions, mainly more severe forms of type one.

Type four is an eczema-like eruption of the skin, particularly the hands, feet, and groin.

All this indicates why doctors now almost always ask if you've ever had penicillin before and if so, what the reaction was. Dr. Siegel remarked that pediatricians "are

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (AP)—A special American Legion committee has termed "utterly without foundation" charges that the United Nations educational, scientific and cultural organization (UNESCO) is communistic.

Summarizing an 18-month investigation of the controversial U. N. affiliate, the six-member group said in its report:

"UNESCO is not favorable toward world government... is not atheistic and... is in no sense of degree communistic."

The special group thus placed itself at odds with the Legion's American Legion commission which has said it has evidence there are a number of communists sympathizers in UNESCO.

The 40,000-word report was made last May 5 to the Legion's national executive committee which is making the Legion's national representative to the U. S. commission for UNESCO. A printed copy of the report became available Saturday.

The report is destined for submission to the Legion's national convention in Miami, Fla., Oct. 10-12 where it may stir up a tight-rope acceptance or rejection.

Hearing Is Set On Insurance Firm "Mixup"

BOISE, Sept. 10 (AP)—A hearing on the complex business affairs of Zenland Empire Insurance company, an Idaho corporation, is scheduled for Sept. 30 in district court here.

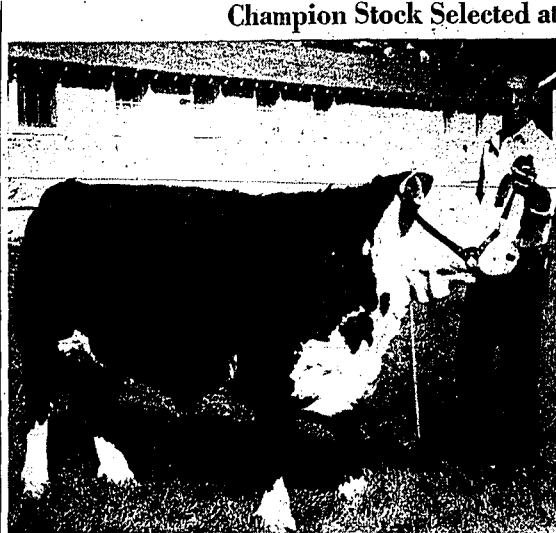

Huey Long's Political Empire Began To Die Just 20 Years Ago in Hospital

By JAMES MARLOW

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—An empire built to die, just a little bit, around 4 a. m., on Sept. 10, 1935, Saturday, it was Sen. Huey Long's political empire in Louisiana.

It began to die in Our Lady of the Lake hospital in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, after Long himself died there from a bullet wound, and before he was cold. It was in the hospital at the time.

On Sunday night, Sept. 8, 1935, he walked down a hallway of the Louisiana capitol, accompanied always by his bodyguards. Later he said this is what happened:

Dr. Carl Austin Weiss, a physician, walked up to Long and said, "The bodyguards killed Weiss to death on the spot. Long was taken to the hospital and died there at 4:10 a. m. Tuesday, Sept. 10.

Those bodyguards, who failed Long in the one moment when he needed them most, had surrounded him for years in Louisiana.

They were more than just runners and errands. They were on the police. More than that, they had the protection of Long, who was blisser than the state.

His was the most complete political machine in America in our time. He controlled, from the legislature and state police on down to the sheriffs in the parishes (counties).

Long's bodyguards had a long record of bending up reporters and photographers who worked for newspapers he didn't like. The ones they did not most were reporters on the New Orleans Times-Picayune, which had fought Long for years.

They worked on Long and his bodyguards early on the morning of Sept. 10, when we heard Long was slipping. We sent the hospital. Arrangements were made with the hospital to let me in. I couldn't have gone in without the bodyguards.

Bodyguards stood shoulder to shoulder on the hospital steps. Thirty or 40 of them sat in the lobby, and two more cutlessly went around trying the basement doors and examining the back stairs.

They seemed afraid, even with

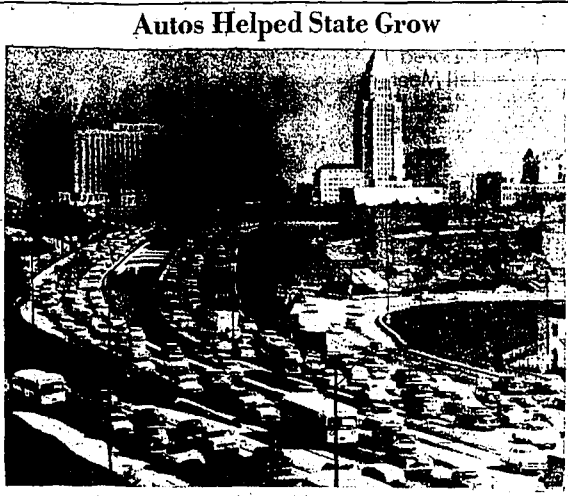

GOP Leaders Urge "Ike" to Run in 1956

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (AP)—Republican state chairmen have told President Eisenhower they are counting on him to run for reelection.

Winding up a campaign "school" here, the state party leaders approved unanimously a message to that effect.

In a telegram to the President at Denver the state chairmen praised Mr. Eisenhower's leadership and "superb achievements" in office.

"We are looking forward to supporting you again in 1956," they said. "We like Ike better than ever."

The message was proposed by Samuel E. Bodine, Republican chairman for New Jersey. Ezriler, Bodine had indicated he would propose a resolution appointing directly to the President to run.

Asked why the more indirect appeal was agreed on by the chairmen, "I think this is probably a stronger appeal than it would have been stated directly."

The party leaders who sent the appeal also heard an expert tell them that Mr. Eisenhower cannot be expected to sweep the rest of the party into office in 1956 despite his popularity.

The expert, Hal Short of Portland, Ore., said that a general GOP victory in 1956 will take heavy work in 1952, when the Republicans narrowly won control of congress despite Mr. Eisenhower's landslide victory.

Short said this is because Democrats far outnumber Republicans. He said the only way the GOP can win a national election is to pick up votes of both Democrats and independents.

Young Cyclists Convinced U. S. Still Likes Ike

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (AP)—Two young Republicans fished a 4,000-mile bicycle tour from the West coast and said they are convinced that President Eisenhower is the people's choice for reelection.

The youths — Russ Phares, 23, Philadelphia, and Dave Grebner, 21, Long Beach, Calif., both students at California state polytechnic college — started out from Long Beach July 16.

Phares said they undertook the trip to find out what people were saying and thinking about Mr. Eisenhower. He said that along the way they picked up letters and petitions urging Mr. Eisenhower to run again.

GI Loan Law Aimed to Aid War Veterans

Builders, real estate dealers and other persons selling homes to veterans with the aid of GI loan guarantees are reminded by the veterans administration of a law which makes a veteran-purchaser liable for triple damages when he has been forced to pay more for a property than the official appraisal price set by the VA.

Arnold Helwege, veterans administrator here, explains that under the loan provisions of the GI bill, easy payment for a home over and above the VA's appraisal of "reasonable value" is prohibited, and criminal statutes provide fines up to \$1,000 and prison terms up to one year for willful violation of the law.

Helwege says the law makes the risk of overcharging a veteran even greater by allowing federal courts to assess the seller three times the amount of this overcharge, plus costs and attorney's fees. The damages are payable to the veteran.

Overcharges in GI housing purchases usually are avoided for through "side deals" or under-the-table payments which are not shown in the papers submitted to the VA, Helwege says.

Any subterfuge which is used, he warns, is a violation of federal statute. Investigation of reports of various side deals are made by the VA, particularly with regard to closing costs and newly required down payments.

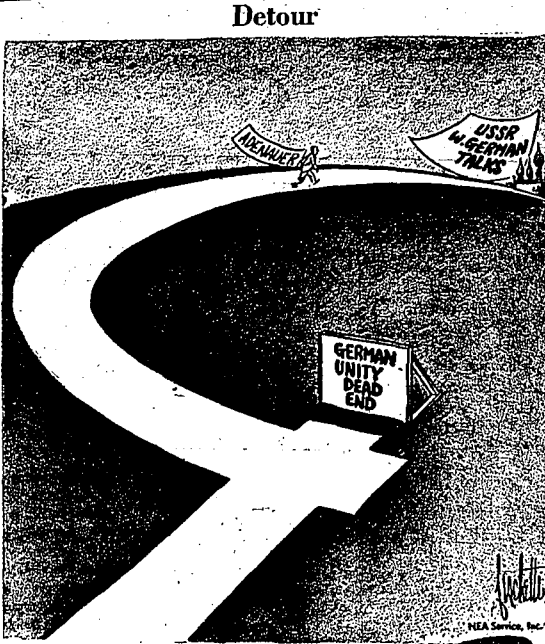

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Answer Told To Questions On Sky Area

Here are some questions which are often asked me:

1. "What do you think about flying saucers?"

It seems that these little aerial scorpions are not attracting much attention at present. There was a spell a few years ago when numerous people were reporting sightings. My personal opinion is that 99 per cent of all these can easily be explained. I have many times been called from bed to see one of these rare objects only to find that it was Venus or Jupiter or a bright star at low altitude dancing and flashing various colors due to atmospheric disturbances near the horizon. But too many reliable persons have reported "unexplainable" to dismiss all as "imagination."

I have long thought these are of great importance which have not been made public. I haven't yet been convinced that they are space ships from other planets.

2. "Is it likely that other bodies in the universe besides the earth are inhabited by intelligent beings?"

It seems to me to be quite likely. All the stars are suns, but so distant we have no means of knowing whether they have planets revolving around them as has our sun. But it seems unreasonable that out of the billions and trillions of suns ours would be the only one surrounded by planets. And it would be strange that out of almost countless worlds, our earth would be the only one inhabited.

The earth is no longer considered the center of the universe. Just because we happen to live on it is no reason to think it is favored above all worlds.

3. "Does it seem possible that life may exist on the moon?"

It is generally believed that the moon is an absolutely dead body. Being so near the earth, our telescopes can see the details of its mountainous surface quite distinctly. There seems to be no air or water on the lunar surface, therefore life such as we know could not exist there. Occasionally some observer has reported a variation in coloration on the floor of some crater.

4. "What is the difference between a comet and a meteor?"

Persons reporting a bright meteor sometimes call it a comet. The two are similar in that they appear in the sky and often have long tails. A comet appears stationary among the stars at the instant one is looking at it, and may be visible for weeks or months before distance takes it beyond our sight. A meteor moves swiftly across the heavens and is gone within a few seconds.

Actually the two objects have little resemblance. A comet is usually many millions of miles from the earth and its tail is millions of miles long. A meteor is a relatively small object, heated to incandescence by friction within our atmosphere at heights of from 20 to 70 miles above the earth's surface.

AWOL 20 Years, Man Attempts to Rejoin U.S. Army

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 10 (AP)—LeRoy Van Camp tried to reenlist in the army and wound up under military guard after he told recruiting officers he had been absent without leave 20 years.

Van Camp, in answering routine questions by the recruiters, casually mentioned he quit the army in 1915 at Ft. Douglas, Utah.

"The pay was small," he said, "only \$21 a month along with room and board. I applied for a dependency discharge because of my wife and two babies. One day they told me my discharge papers had come through and I could pick them up the next day."

"I don't know why I did it, but I decided to pack up that same day and to home. And I did." Van Camp, 43, was taken to near-by Ft. Leavenworth and placed under military guard pending a check of his records.

Judge Acting to Prevent Damage

BOISE, Sept. 10 (AP)—Federal Judge Chase A. Clark ordered the government Friday to take special precautions against unnecessary damage in building an access road through the mining tracts of two landowners in the Clearwater national forest.

After a hearing at which the owners appeared, he issued an order giving a federal contractor permission to build the road despite the objections of the two, Charles H. Johnson and Virgil Burch.
