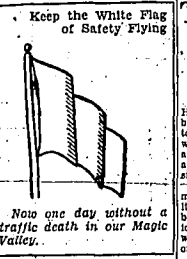

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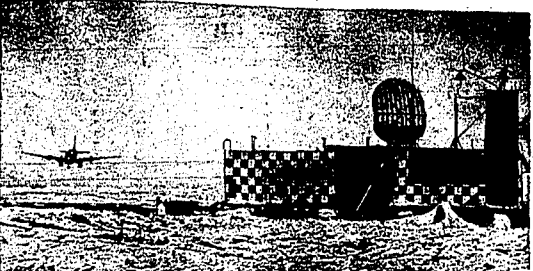

**DEMOCRATS QUANDARY**

How to attack the Eisenhower-Republican administration is the 1956 campaign preoccupation of Democrats with an unusual political problem.

The logical, number one target of the outis in any election has always been the President. In the past time the President, like a gentle, unarmed and guileless mahout, rides and drives the old GOP elephant which the Democrats would have believed was maneuvered to the driver's just aim at the right side of the elephant.

President Eisenhower has set for himself a personal political policy of inspirational leadership. So far, he has not shown leadership. Not even in the 1954 elections when he accused the "misrepresentation and demagoguery."

Mr. Eisenhower has decided to ignore all such attacks. This is not on him. And they are directed at how it should be done.

Mr. Truman, Democratic National Chairman Paul Butler and other party leaders favor direct criticism of the President himself as a responsible head of his administration. They would blame him personally for all his party's shortcomings.

Other Democrats—largely the congressional contingent—think that the wrong party they point out that the 1954 elections were won by the administration and the Republican Congress.

This would mean laying off the President for fear of a political backlash by the hearing a popular leader. It would mean concentrating the criticism on the boys in the back rooms, where they say the President's high principles are not so scrupulously observed.

For example:

The deal on the Dixon-Yates contract has not been heard. Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee can be counted on to develop that to its fullest political implications in furthering his own candidacy for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Senator Sherman, the assistant to the President, has so far successfully defied the Kefauver committee on revealing his role in this business. But the operations of the President's civilian chief of staff may yet come under further probing.

Senator Harry Cain's recent revelation that Governor Adams told him, "to hell with the merits" of his criticism of the administration's security program, provides the Democrats with a usable political line.

But a team that you're expected to play on it, Adams told Cain, according to his Collier's piece. The implication is that all Republicans must think as the White House staff does. But can the President be held responsible for all the actions of his subordinates?

Rep. Joe L. Ewins, D., Tenn., started a house small business committee investigation of the independent agencies of government just before congress adjourned.

But it offers considerable political possibilities for exploring the role of the White House staff in steering the divisions of supposedly quasi-judicial agencies.

This would get into the changing pattern of decisions coming from federal trade, federal communications, federal power, securities and exchange commissions, and the national labor relations and civil aeronautics boards.

It is here that the Democrats think they have the best opportunity to develop their case that the GOP is still the party of special privilege-for-big-business, regardless of who's at the head of it.

In the 1954 elections, Republican National Chairman Leonard Higgins and Democratic National Chairman Stephen Mitchell signed pledges to run clean campaigns, without personal smears. But the promises weren't kept for long.

But assumption now is that the 1956 campaign won't be any cleaner, in spite of any "in-off-ice" sentiment.

**Care of Your Children**

By ANGELO PATRI

The first and the most important thing a teacher has to do, is one thing that means success or failure in his work, is understanding the children and youth he teaches. There are many peculiar children to test the teacher's patience. They are not the type who are especially important to their parents, themselves and their teachers.

The good children are either very bright or the untried or the ones soon indicate their deficiencies and are taken care of in the special classes. The children who are not so bright are the ones who are usually overlooked by the teacher with a result that they lose a great deal of their power in the classroom.

Children who are intelligent enough to want to do differently the usual routine tasks are resentful. Their minds are not satisfied with the nervous system, a precious possession, one that often uncovers rare talents. School is a dull, boring and it is such pupils break.

The professional teacher will study the rubricaker for his understanding. ### Welker Flays U. P. Plans to Stop Services

LEWISTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—Proposal of the Union Pacific railroad to drop regular passenger train service between Lewiston-Moscow and Pacific lined and interlocking cities is called "an outrage and a disgrace" by Ben Herman Welker, U. P. general agent here.

Mr. Welker asked the Idaho public utilities commission for permission to eliminate two passenger trains between Lewiston and Ayrer and Moscow and Ayrer. The two branch trains connect at Ayrer with the mainline "It is unworkable to me," Welker said, "that the Union Pacific, which enjoys a monopoly of direct passenger service to Idaho's fourth largest city and to the seven-county area involved in eastern Washington and north central Idaho with a population of more than 114,000."

"There has been no allegation by the railroad of financial loss in operation, only that these two branch line passenger trains themselves have not been making the customary profit of the other operations of the railroad. If the railroad should be successful in stopping its passenger service to Lewiston and Moscow, a precedent would be established under which we could expect it to become a freight hauler only throughout all of Idaho, with the expansion of the mainline, transcontinental trains."

"Idaho is a growing state and on the threshold of great progress in industrial expansion, but I doubt if major industries are going to choose communities which will even offer passenger train service."

### After Combined Total of 87 Years of Railroad Service, Two Friends Retire

Two longtime friends have retired from the Union Pacific railroad after a combined total of 87 years with the company.

James P. Ryan, 70, Buhl, stepped down from his caboose Saturday night at the local depot with the practiced ease of 43 years, waved his signal lantern, received the return signal from the engineer and said, "Well, that's my last highball."

On hand to greet him were his wife, his dog, Patty, numerous U. P. officials and his long-time friend, W. H. Renfro, 70, Shoshone, who is retiring after 42 years with the railroad.

Ryan started work for the railroad in 1910 as a brakeman. After one year he was promoted to conductor and held that position for 44 years. For the past 10 years he has made his home in Buhl.

His run for the past 10 years has been between Twin Falls, Buhl and Wells.

Ryan worked on the Hill City-Shoshone-Ketchum run. He joined the railroad in 1913 and began work as a brakeman. In 1918 he was promoted to conductor and held the position until his retirement.

Renfro is married and has lived in Shoshone for several years. He was born in Centralia, Kansas, and came west with his parents when he was a boy. Ryan was born in Montpelier and grew up there. He and Renfro became acquainted several years before they joined the railroad.

Mr. and Mrs. Ryan plan a trip to California and Oregon they are planning for several years.

### Mental Cases Aided by Use Of New Drug

NAMPA, Sept. 12 (AP)—The superintendent of Idaho's state mental school told a special delinquent meeting that tests with a drug from India had produced "relaxation and improved disposition" in a group of mentally retarded youngsters.

Dr. H. H. Ramsey, superintendent of the school in Nampa, described the drug as the derivative of a root of a plant grown in India. He said he used the rauwolfia alkaloids in experiments on youngsters known to be "moody, destructive or disturbed."

"Its use produced relaxation and improved disposition with no side effects," he told the closing session of the 1955 intermountain regional conference of the American Association on Mental Deficiency.

Ramsey said, however, that experiments with the drug on epileptic patients showed it did not reduce or prevent seizures but that it did help patients "make a more rapid readjustment after the seizure."

Phillip D. Sallinger, of the Montana state training school in Boulder, also spoke on the drug. He said his experiments showed no marked increase of the intelligence quotient of patients through use of the drug, but that in some cases the drug actually lowered the I. Q.

### Animals Are Sent Into Stratosphere

SOUTH ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 12 (AP)—The air force today ballooned more live animals into space, hoping to complete a series of tests in two weeks ago when a timing device failed to destroy a balloon as scheduled.

A pressurized aluminum gondola carried about 40 live mice, three live guinea pigs and some live tissue cultures into the stratosphere to test their reactions to bombardment by cosmic rays.

The balloon, dubbed the "Charlie D" for an air force sergeant who worked on the project, was launched from fog-enshrouded Fleming field here and soared high into space.

The electrical instruments were scheduled to end the flight this afternoon, cutting away the gondola which will parachute to earth and destroying the big plastic bag inside.

Previous tests, except for the one where the timer failed, have ended with the animals being returned to similar tests last year, the only noticeable effect of the cosmic ray exposure was darkening of the pigment cells in black mice, causing part of their hair to turn gray.

### President Views Education Needs

DENVER, Sept. 12 (AP)—President Eisenhower, thoroughly impressed by his first tour of the air force academy, wondered today if the cadets had enough time to learn all they needed to know.

After visiting the academy's temporary installation at Lowry air force base here and talking with its faculty yesterday, the chief executive appeared to be pleased with everything he found.

The president said that in his day, a "boy straight from the plains" could learn enough in high school to handle the normal duties of citizenship. But now, he said, he had doubts that anyone could get enough education in the same number of years to meet the "complications" of modern living.

Mr. Eisenhower said he believed a proposal by Dr. James B. Conant, former president of Harvard University, had a lot of merit. The Conant proposal calls for a two-year junior college in every locality to supplement the local high school.
