OK Given For Plan On Relief

BOISE, Sept. 14 (AP)—Gov. Boise E. Smylie today approved a "revised and simplified" state organization for disaster relief and civil defense. 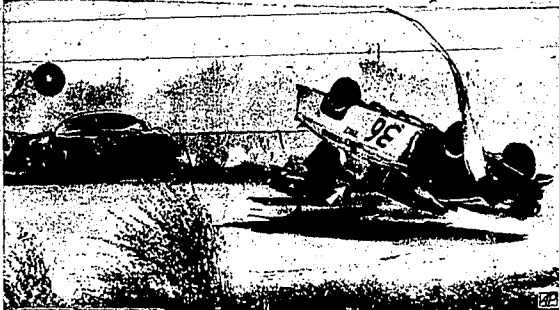

Animal Explosion? Following Flash Flood Excites Experts

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 14 (AP)—Eggs of a small water animal which apparently had lain dormant on the dry Mojave desert floor for more than 100 years hatched out in water from a flash flood and resulted in a "veritable animal explosion," a scientist said today.

Dr. James P. Welsh, assistant professor of zoology at Los Angeles State college, termed "incredible" the discovery of the animal, resembling a small version of the king crab, said it had lain dormant for 450 million years.

The animal is one to one-and-a-half inches long with 30 to 40 body segments surrounded by a sort of shell, with many legs tucked underneath. It is bright pink or white in color.

"I'd like to be the first guy with a watering can on Mars," Welsh said.

Welsh said he believed he had identified the animal as a type of water animal that has been dormant earlier since the creature is a genus aptly named *Archeobryozoa*.

The discovery raised much excitement because the creature is a water animal that has been dormant for 450 million years.

The animal is one to one-and-a-half inches long with 30 to 40 body segments surrounded by a sort of shell, with many legs tucked underneath. It is bright pink or white in color.

The animal's eggs are known for their ability to reactivate—being able to dry up and live that way until water comes along many years later. They have been found in other parts of the California desert and elsewhere in the world, but not after having lain dormant for so long.

Welsh said the small lake, only one to two feet deep, had become "packed" with animal and vegetable life in just two and a half weeks following the flash flood. He called it a "veritable animal explosion."

Welsh said two other theories about how the life came to be on the desert were that eggs were carried in on the wheels of the planes or on the feet of birds coming for water.

Part of the reason for the fast development, he said, is that the female can reproduce without mating.

Former Ruler Stumps Land; Wins Election

PHILM, fun-loving young Norodom Sihanouk of Cambodia has turned out to be a great ruler, the king, he said in the placid French into which his little Indochinese country is partly free measure of independence.

Last March 7, he suddenly decided to quit the king's business. Without an able government, Norodom decided his resignation to the country by radio.

He designated as his successor his 18-year-old father Norodom Sihanouk. He moved out of the palace and into his father's villa.

Norodom Sihanouk complained that his political enemies were trying to sabotage his policy of cooperating with the west and his program of political reforms. He decided to do something about it.

The Democratic party of Norodom's bitter political enemy, Song Sopha, a "reactionary" and "reactionary puppet," held a majority in the national assembly.

At a private dinner, Norodom said he would resign if the popular socialist community, and assumed a leadership.

In a private engine-red sports convertible, Norodom set out on a campaign speaking tour. He campaigned from one end of the country to the other, speaking in cities and villages and at crossroads.

Sometimes his audiences numbered thousands, sometimes he addressed little knots of 10 or 15 people.

The election for which he was running was held Sunday, Norodom paid every one of the seats in the assembly.

It was a personal victory for Norodom and his sensational one of the 23-year-old ex-king had made himself within six months a potent force in politics.

His victory is important also for the western allies. Cambodia's 2,221,000 people, 19 million people, have put themselves solidly in the camp of the western allies. They have voted for communism and against communism.

Way to Disarmament Is Given In Open Letter to Two Chiefs

NEW YORK, Sept. 14 (AP)—The Payment Plan writes an open letter to Presidents Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Bulganin:

Dear Mr. President and Premier Bulganin:
Both you gentlemen would like to end the world wide arms race. Well, I've figured out a way to achieve disarmament.



Wait now! Don't throw away this letter unread. The idea isn't quite as wild as it sounds.

None of Boyle's ideas could possibly be as wild as they sound.

Let me illustrate my disarmament theory with a story:

Once upon a time a poor Texas oil man, who had sent his air-conditioned Cadillac into town to have a new radio tuner replaced, was sought to buy a horse on which he could carry his day's earnings from the ranch to the nearest bank.

As prosperity had caused the elderly Texas to lose his boyhood seat, tired, slow, horse he could find.

Two Indians, Borehead and Eaglefoot, showed up with mounts for sale. Each swore by the Great White Father that his horse was the slowest pausing to get him air-conditioned.

How does this tale apply to the international armament race? Easy: instead of idling around acting a formula by which each nation can be trusted to disarm itself, why not simply agree to let all the suspicious nations disarm each other at the same time?

You, Premier Bulganin, pick your top military leaders and 1,000 trusted muscular communists commissars armed with crowbars, and send them to Washington. You, President Eisenhower, pick your top military chiefs and 1,000 crowd-carrying muscular Republican officeholders (including maybe a scattering of loyal Democrats to keep it bi-partisan) and send them to Moscow.

The other allied countries and nations in the Soviet would similarly exchange wrecking crews.

At a given signal these thousands of crowbars would go to work. Each crew would fan out across the potential enemy's countryside trying to destroy its military strength as fast as it could—beating up jet planes, tanks, gun stores, arsenals, atom

bomb dumps, and purely defense factories.

What a disarmament race! Daily progress reports on the extent of destruction would fly between the capitals, with each leader urging his crew in the other country to work harder with his crowbars and raise its barometer.

Would this program work? Never mind the cannon, gentlemen. In six months, east or west, there wouldn't be a cap pistol left in firing condition.

The only remaining problem would be to disarm the wrecking crews. That wouldn't be hard. They'd be glad to take away their crowbars.

Peace would reign, for a while at least, in a world disarmed. We could turn the Moscow war office into a vodka bar and the Pentagon into the world's largest hot dog stand.

Shall we give it a try? Sincerely,

Reds in U. S. Ask Court to Outvote Ban

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP)—The Communist party, asking the supreme court to strike down the 1950 subversive activities control law, today said it has been outvoted by the Geneva summit meeting.

A 270-page brief was filed preliminary to oral arguments at the court's fall term on the party's challenge to a government order for it to register under the 1950 act.

The brief said the 1950 law was enacted when the western world believed the Korean struggle was the opening campaign of a third world war. "This was the political estimate that underlay its enactment," the brief said.

Now, however, it added, this "justification for the outvote on the Constitution" has proved unfounded in Korea and said international peace has been restored.

The brief cited the international peace and the Soviet leaders were as sincere as in their desire for peace.

"The perspective of peaceful co-existence is incompatible with the premise of the act," the brief said.

Section two says a world community of free nations should be established a totalitarian dictatorship by use of treachery, sabotage, terrorism or any other means.

The section says the Communist organization in this country "is a clear and present danger to the security of the United States."

GOP Victory In 1956 Seen

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 14 (AP)—George H. Bender, R. O., says he believes President Eisenhower will see reelection but even if he does not the Republicans "can win with any good candidate."

"You only have to look at the opposition to see that we have better men," Bender said, campaign manager of the late Ronald Reagan's unsuccessful bid for the GOP presidential nomination in 1952.

"I believe the President is a man who has the confidence of the people and who will respond to that call," Bender said yesterday.

Bender said, however, that the Republicans can win the election without Mr. Eisenhower as a candidate.

If President Eisenhower is a candidate for reelection, Bender said Vice President Richard Nixon again would be his running mate "without question."

BOISE, Sept. 14 (AP)—The state board of education called on Dr. Burton Briggs, superintendent of the State School for the Deaf and Blind, for a report on administration of the school today at its monthly meeting here.

McCutchen, who twice flunked his spy school cooking test, was asked to describe:

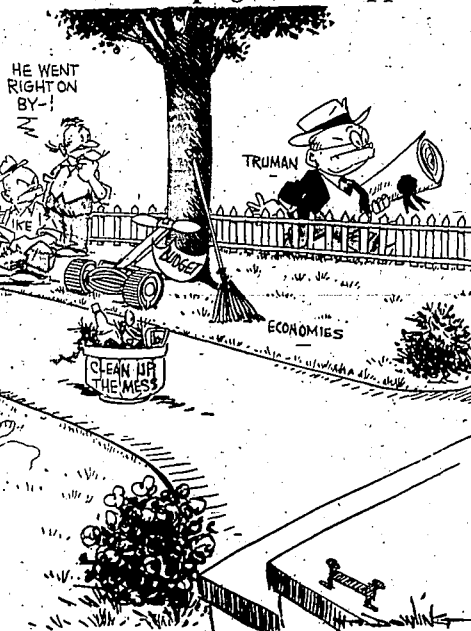

Levies Upped By Panel for Blaine County

HALLEY, Sept. 14.—The 1955 state a valuation, livestock disease control, county city of Halley and school levies are up slightly over 1954 levies. The Blaine county commissioners announced Monday when they approved levies for the year.

The county school levy remained at 80 cents and the teacher's retirement levy at 10 cents. Halley raised its levy from \$2.45 to \$2.05. Bellevue's levy remained at \$2.90 and Ketchikan's at \$2.

The Carey fire protection district levy remained at 80 cents and the Carey flood control No. 2 levy at 30 cents. Halley and Bellevue cemetery maintenance districts retained their 20 cent levy and Carey kept its levy of 10 cents. The Kelcham cemetery district dropped its levy, which was 10 cents last year.

The maintenance and operation levy for class "A" school district No. 61 was raised from \$2.40 last year to \$2.80 for 1955. The 20-cent bond levy last year was dropped, all bonds having been retired.

The commissioners sold, at public auction, lots 9 and 10, block 9, in Halley to Theron Butler for \$400.

Turncoat Will Return to U.S. From Chinese

ALDEN, Minn., Sept. 14 (AP)—The mother of turncoat American Olin Richard Tennison, 23, Alden, Minn., she has received a letter from him saying he is coming home from Peking, China.

Mrs. Portia Howe, who made a dramatic flight to the far east in December, 1950, in an attempt to see her son and persuade him to come home, said she received the letter yesterday at her farm near here.

She quoted it as saying, "No matter what I say, I'll be one day."

Tennison was one of 21 American prisoners of war who chose to stay in Communist China instead of accepting repatriation. Three others have already returned.

Mrs. Howe quoted the letter as saying in part: "I am coming back to the states, coming home."

"I won't be long now. On the 23rd of August a representative of the Red Cross general agency came and guaranteed that it wouldn't be too long. He said preparations were already being made."

"My request was to leave China. I first asked to go to India, China. It wasn't possible then to go home. Judging from the world situation, I'll probably be going home."

"Mother, I want to explain a possibility which I hate to admit. Perhaps you won't be able to understand. The reason I'm leaving is that certain weaknesses in my character make it very uncomfortable and impossible to stay."

"Once I'm in Hong Kong I have two alternatives. One is to stay and the other is to go to India. To be sure, here in the safety of China, I feel certain that I'll stand for the truth. But I also know that others wanted to tell the truth after they left his dirt."

"Why I am coming back is indeed a big question. I am not entirely sure myself, but there is one thing for certain—no matter what I say, I'll get up my way."

"Mrs. Howe, a devoutly religious woman, said the letter came as a surprise. She said none of his recent letters hinted he might come home."

Mrs. Howe said the letter was post-dated Aug. 28 from Tsinan, China. Tennison was captured in South Korea May 18, 1951, when he was 17 years old.

A skin-diving clergyman who has lived along the Amazon river in Brazil, searched for a sunken gold mining town and photographed marine life along the ocean floor is living in Twin Falls.

The Rev. R. R. Cronk, pastor of the Seventh Day Adventist church here, had a varied and colorful career in his church work. Before arriving in Pocatello in 1951 as pastor of the Adventist church there he spent five years

his parish were 40 churches. He was Sabbath school teacher and home missionary secretary. Early this spring he assisted in the search for three fishermen who drowned near American Falls. He used a diving suit for the search.

"The Rev. Mr. Cronk says one of his most exciting adventures was an underwater search for the gold mining town which was wiped out in a primitive area of Idaho in 1905 as the result of an avalanche.

The gold mining town disappeared in 1905 when an avalanche roiled down the mountainside, damming the outlet of a river and inundating the town.

The Rev. Mr. Cronk and a companion found the location of the sunken town. He donned diving equipment and went to the bottom.

"I found what I was looking for," he said. "I saw buildings, furniture, but in moving about I stirred up some silt and couldn't see a thing. I got panicky and got caught but I remembered what I had taught my swimming pupils and about being calm and I backed out and soon freed myself," he said.

Following the sunken town episode, he went to Puget sound in Washington to do skin diving and take colored photos of undersea life.

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI One of the modern notions in educational circles is speed in reading. Often I wonder why this speed is necessary in elementary and secondary schools. I can quite understand why speed in reading, on occasions, can be necessary for a scholar, one who must consult many books day after day. But children, who are just learning to read? Reading is the most important study in the elementary and secondary schools and it is not being taught as it should be in these days of speed. Their story values, their stimulating quality, their cultural values are about zero. But they can be read speedily. As if that were important. What is important in these beginning classes is time, worthwhile content, and thorough instruction so that the children learn the right words, the phonic elements of the words and get the meaning of the content so that they have a story to tell and the ability to tell it. Reading should do more for a child than giving him a vocabulary. "Run, Jim, run." To get the values that reading ought to give, the reader should offer good literature—and I hold that when the right Hen, Chicken Little, etc. literature, are good literature. When a reader is confined to a selected number of titles, the quality of the good story comes in, teaching the right words, the phonic elements,

and getting the meaning of the story back from the children. This teaching, a thorough teaching, should continue through the secondary schools. If it is properly done in the beginning, carried on by grade, there will be little need of remedial reading. Holding a soap watch on children who are trying to learn a subject, any subject, is to rob them of what would never come up if time were allowed the pupil to learn and create at his own rate of speed. In deed, that is the only rate he will learn at, pressure notwithstanding. Time pressure creates confusion in the mind of any worker. Certainly it should not be used on beginners. University scholars are supposed to have reading skills that allow them to pick the paragraph, the heart of the paragraph, on sight, but that is a little too much to ask of beginners. Useful habits are the groundwork for happy living, and add to mind and character. Dr. Parr explains how to encourage your child to be helpful in reading. Idaho Senator Gives Opinions After Meeting With Red Chief

The United States senators called on Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev in the Kremlin yesterday in the following dispatch, Sen. Henry C. Dworshak, R., Id., tells of the interview and of some of his impressions of the Soviet leaders.

By HENRY C. DWORSHAK

MOSCOW, Sept. 14 (AP)—As the climax of my five-day visit in Moscow I was pleased to join with four senatorial colleagues for a two-hour visit in the Kremlin with Premier Nikita Khrushchev and Communist party first secretary Nikita Khrushchev.

The correspondents have already reported on the discussions which took place.

They emphasized the resumption of trade relations between the United States and the Soviet Union as the basis of a better political understanding.

When the question of the common front was presented, the two Soviet leaders made a forceful defense of the communist ideology and declared they considered nothing more honorable than to bring about a communist society which they deem better for the individual.

Secretary Khrushchev did most of the speaking in a forceful, impressive manner. Premier Bulganin, who is dignified and suave, frequently smiled and nodded his approval and interjected occasional comments.

These Soviet officials apparently were proud to remind our delegation that the iron curtain has been lowered and that travel by Americans is being encouraged. Khrushchev asked us "what kind of a curtain there is in the United States" with the stringent restrictions on our citizens.

He added: "You are accustomed to things like this—we are not."

Throughout the conference I felt that these two Soviet leaders had obtained their positions of leadership by virtue of their abilities and their devotion to communism as a highly desirable pattern of political and social organization.

While discussing trade relations it was apparent the two leaders were interested in buying machinery and machine tools and possibly some surplus agricultural commodities.

However, they stressed that because of inability in the past to procure such imports, the Soviet Union had been compelled to become self-sufficient.

There is also the aspect of psychology if the Soviet Union were to import extensive foodstuffs from the United States. Soviet citizens have undoubtedly been encouraged to believe that it is not essential to bring in imports of any kind.

It is quite apparent the people of the Soviet Union want peace, not war. They are friendly and cordial and only the future will disclose whether it is possible to relieve the tension which has marked relations between east and west in recent years.
