## Finns Regain Naval Region From Russia

MOSCOW, Sept. 17 (AP)—The Soviet Union announced today it is returning the big naval base Porkkala to Finland because relations between the two countries are now friendly.

Premier Nikolai Bulganin announced the decision to Finnish Premier Urho Kekkonen at the opening of a negotiation session in Helsinki today. The Finnish said he hoped would result in extending the 1947 Finland-Soviet armistice to include the Porkkala region.

Bulganin said Russia will withdraw its forces from the Porkkala area.

The Soviet foreign ministry told reporters about it at a news conference.

### Double Agent Work Is Told By 2 Ex-GI's

FRANKFURT, Germany, Sept. 17 (AP)—Two American war veterans have said they worked as double agents in western Europe for six months in a self-conceived plot "to serve our country by infiltrating Russian intelligence."

They accused the U. S. central intelligence agency of "gross malfeasance" because it did not hire them as double agents after they voluntarily disclosed they had been in Russian espionage.

They said they have appealed to several U. S. senators for help and have asked permission to testify against the CIA at hearings.

Theo K. Hollie, 28, Los Angeles, and Gregory J. Lima, 30, New York, told newsmen the Russians paid them \$8,000 for spy missions ranging from a report on the U. S. military intelligence school at Oberammergau, Germany, to a visit to Belgium's largest arms factory, at Liege.

After these missions, they said, they went to CIA headquarters in West Germany last May and proposed that it use them to penetrate deeper into the spy apparatus on behalf of the United States.

The pair said last night CIA officials at first tentatively promised to finance a double agent project but after three months of investigation disowned them. The officials said they have no comment on the two men's story.

Hollie and Lima asserted they wanted an opportunity to bring matters in Washington. They said before the senate "watch-dog committee" in Washington. 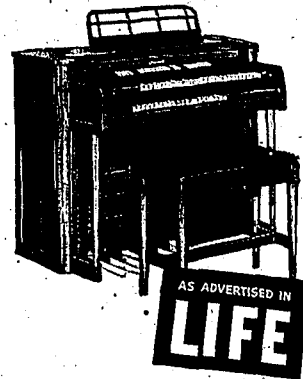

A diner may have anything he wants, but the management reserves the right to charge him anything it wants. I ran across my counterfeiting friend in a jewelry store where I had gone to make a lay-away plan for a diamond necklace. He said it was to be Mary's Christmas present. My friend was holding and admiring what looked to me like a gold-plated bone. "That looks exactly like a bone you have there," I said. "That's exactly what it is," he said, and then explained. "People who eat at L'Escoffier Room never take their steak bones home to their dogs," he told me. "Those of us who can afford a steak show to the world to prove that we did eat there. So we have the honest gold-plated and hang them on the wall—or, in case of lamb chop bones, made into a brooch for our wives. A friend of mine had the eyes of a L'Escoffier Room brooch trout head set with rubies and gave it to his only daughter for a wedding present. Beautiful rubies, too. Cost almost as much as the trout." # Negro States Negro Rights Being Denied

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP)—Civil rights of Negroes are being denied in defiance of the Constitution, Negro leaders today told a state assembly searching for a way to avert a federal suit.

The occasion was a Constitution convention meeting in the old supreme court chamber at the capitol. The state assembly met on the occasion of a national convention to determine whether statehood should be granted to the territory.

In an opening statement, Chairman Jennings D. Mo. said that in recent years there have been signs of a "lamentable indifference" to the rights of Negroes. He said that the individual rights guaranteed to all by the Constitution of the United States.

Spoken from all walks of life, the speaker said the Negroes are being denied the rights of citizenship in the form of statements surveying the status of constitutional rights in the 10th territory.

Mr. Wilkins, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, declared the nation is confronted with a choice between two paths: one that "practically throughout the country, Negro citizens are being denied the rights of citizenship."

Wilkins struck particularly at what he called "a calculated campaign of intimidation and terrorism" directed in numerous instances against Negroes who have urged the carrying out of the supreme court's decision in the segregation in public schools is unconstitutional.

# Telephone Girls Are Not Needed

BALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 17 (AP)—They did away with telephone operators in the Salt Lake City metropolitan area tonight at midnight.

A new dialing system was in effect, enabling almost all users of the 130,000 telephones to dial any other telephone in the area without the help of an operator to make the connection.

Only an extreme cross-area call requires the assistance of a long-distance operator.

# Japanese Homes Hit by U.S. Plane

TOKYO, Sept. 17 (AP)—J. L. Haines, Malibu, Calif., suffered face lacerations and a cracked rib when his private jet fighter plane ran off a runway and crashed into two Japanese houses yesterday.

A marine announcement said the houses were destroyed but there were no reports of any casualties.

The accident occurred as Haines attempted to take off from the Niigata air force base, north of Tokyo.

# Six Are Killed

LOVING, Tex., Sept. 17 (AP)—Six persons on their way to high school football game were killed last night when their car collided with a heavy truck loaded with oil field equipment at an intersection east of Loving.

The dead persons were all from Breckenridge, Tex., and were on their way to the Breckenridge-Wichita Falls football game at Wichita Falls. Everyone in the car was killed.

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# 'Target' Cities Are Chosen in Defense Tests

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP)—The civil defense administration announced today it has invited 19 of the nation's "target" cities to participate in a program of using its defense surplus materials for testing survival plans for, or in event of atomic attack.

The FCC said the selection of the 19 cities is merely a start and they will not be the only cities eligible to participate in the program.

The plans, financed by a 10 million dollar congressional appropriation, will be drawn up by local officials working with federal civil defense teams.

Cities named by the administration are New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, Boston, Baltimore, Cleveland, Detroit, Milwaukee, St. Louis, Houston, Atlanta, Los Angeles, San Francisco (including the Oakland area) and Denver.

How many cities will be able to undertake survival studies, or how many can be completed with the proposed funds has not yet been determined, the FCC said.

Civil Defense Administrator Walter Peterson said that with these studies, we have reached a point in our struggle for civil defense where we can feel we are launching a realistic approach rather than an aspirational survival under a bomb attack.

Scriven declined to name any choice for the Democratic nomination at a press conference here today. He was "too busy" to endorse any Democratic party presidential hopefuls at this time.

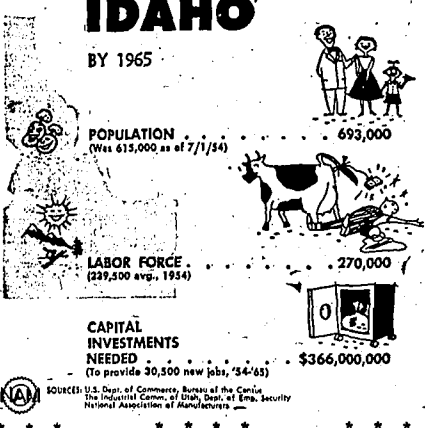
But asked if he would accept candidacy for president or vice president if either were offered him, he said he would not be surprised if it would be possible for him to change his mind.

### U. S., Soviets Ready Stands In U. N. Meet

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 17 (AP)—The western powers and Russia, at odds for a decade in the U. N., will take moderate but firm courses in the U. N. assembly convening Tuesday.

One of both blocs is to obtain as much assembly backing for their projects as possible without provoking the Geneva pact to unusual giving major concessions. The Americans are hoping for unanimous approval of President Eisenhower's arms inspection program.

This is a consensus of the views of important delegates from the western and eastern camps as top statesmen of the world converged on U. N. headquarters today because in the past both sides began blasting away early and the fighting kept up through three months of debate.

Secretary of State Dulles and Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav Molotov are slated to make the most eagerly awaited addresses in the general debate beginning at 10:30 a. m. Dulles will be the lead-off man. Molotov may hold his speech until next week. Analysts say the U. N. view on major issues to come before the assembly is as follows:

1. The United States, backed by Britain and France and a majority of the 49 U. N. members, will sustain an expected Russian attempt to seat Red China.

2. Debate on disarmament will be held up until the big four foreign ministers meet in Geneva Oct. 27. Once that meeting is over, the Americans will drive for a resolution embodying President Eisenhower's proposal, made at Geneva in July, for the United States and Russia to exchange military blueprints and aerial and ground inspections. This is expected to be expanded to any other countries desiring to take part.

3. Despite protests of the African group, the United States will oppose pulling London in Algeria on the assembly agenda. It will abstain on the question of debating the Moroccan case, France is firmly opposed to having either problem aired here.

4. The United States has not made firm its position on Cyprus but hopes some way can be found to ease the tension among the British, Greeks and Turks.

### Continued Rise in Idaho's Population Predicted; Many Opportunities Seen

PORTLAND, Sept. 17 — A continued rise in population is forecast for Idaho through 1965, in a special study of the northwest research council of the National Association of Manufacturers.

A population of 693,000 and a labor force of 270,000 by 1965 opens up opportunity for the state and its citizens, the NAM report pointed out.

"However," the NAM report warns, "such an increase in population and labor force brings responsibilities as well as opportunities. The expected increase in the labor force of 130,000 additional workers by 1965 will require the capital investment of some \$366,000,000 to provide these new workers with jobs."

The NAM stated that it takes an average of \$12,000 to create a single job in industry today.

"Present federal tax laws, which can take up to 32 percent of a corporation's income and up to 51 percent of an individual's income, don't leave sufficient capital in the hands of business firms and individuals to allow for saving and investment. It is this saving and investing that makes jobs," the NAM explained.

The NAM has completed a tax program which would reduce proportionately all tax brackets above the basic rate to a ceiling of 25 percent in both corporate and individual income taxes is achieved.

The NAM tax plan, labeled "100-25-25," would provide an economic growth program for economic growth would bring tax relief to all persons having a taxable income of over \$1,000 a year.

wartime production rates and the former "rigid parity" law.

The accused administration opponents of making a "political football" out of the farm price issue.

Later, at a 400-n-plus dinner of Indiana Republicans in Indianapolis, Nixon predicted that Republicans will get a bigger share of the union labor vote than in 1948.

"It is time to take sense on the farm issue and to stop the demagoguery," Nixon told the big crowd. "There has been too much of the tendency in recent months to make a political football out of this issue."

"The new flexible parity law cannot by any stretch of imagination be held responsible for the drop in prices. Almost two-thirds of the drop took place before the Eisenhower administration took over in 1953.

"The cause of the drop in prices is not the law but the market. If we want to get at the cause of the drop in prices, we must find a way to reduce the surplus."

"On the production front, a new flexible parity formula has been adopted, so farmers will not be encouraged to grow crops in excess of the national need. On the consumption front, we are finding new markets for farm products."

Nixon noted that President Eisenhower, in a campaign speech at the 1952 National Republican convention in Minneapolis, promised farmers full parity.

"That was the position of the President in 1952. It is his position now," Nixon stated. "And the farmers of America can be sure of this: Eisenhower in his administration are working unceasingly toward the goal of carrying out the promise made in 1952."

In a news conference before his Washington speech, Nixon told reporters the administration's long-range farm program is:

1. Full parity in the market place for farmers.
2. Maximum freedom for farmers from government controls.
3. An ever-increasing amount of living for farmers and the American people.

## Union Leader Doesn't Okay Terms; Raises

CHICAGO, Sept. 17 (AP)—The nation's railroads today offered pay raises and a health-welfare plan to about 245,000 operating employees. One union official called the offer inadequate.

The concession, in essence, was an acceptance by the carriers of recommendations by a presidential emergency board Aug. 1 for settlement of disputes affecting firemen, engineers, trainmen and switchmen.

A general raise of four cents an hour was proposed, and four cents per man hour worked would be paid by the railroads for the health-welfare program.

For switchmen only, proposals were made to provide an additional 12 1/2 cents an hour for those who work six or seven days a week when they shift to a five-day, 40-hour week.

Switchmen already on the 40-hour five-day week would receive 8 1/2 cents besides the general increase. They received a four-cent raise when they shifted to the shorter work week.

The general raise program was immediately termed "inadequate" by Vernon W. Satterwhite, assistant president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen which represents 175,000 employees.

Henry E. Gilbert, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, representing 60,000 who are threatened to strike, said "we are studying the proposals" and no comment would be made before Monday.

## VA Suggests Self Help for Vet Trainees

Veterans starting school this fall under the Korean GI bill can avoid financial trouble by taking along enough money of their own to see them through their first two months of training, according to Arnold Helweg, Twin Falls veterans administrator.

Under the law, it takes about two months for their first GI allowance checks to reach them, Helweg said. They will cover every month of training completed, as long as coming attendance certificates with the VA.

Helweg said allowances must be paid after the end of each month of training, but he is getting intelligent cooperation from the department of agriculture, Turner said in an interview.

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### Ban on Talk Is Explained At U. N. Meet

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17—The atomic energy commission today acknowledged it prevented Nobel prize-winner Hermann J. Muller from presenting a paper at the conference because it dealt with atomic energy.

The AEC said the Indiana university professor was barred from reading his paper because it contained material "referring to non-essential uses of atomic energy—namely the bombing of the Japanese city of Hiroshima."

"The paper could not properly be presented orally since such presentation would undoubtedly lead to the discussion of the Hiroshima experience," the AEC said. "Under the rules of the conference as established by the United Nations, discussions were to deal exclusively with the peaceful uses of atomic energy."

However, the AEC added that Dr. Muller's paper on the effects of atomic radiation on heredity will be published in full in the permanent records of the conference.

Dr. Muller told the Washington Post and Times Herald in a telephone conversation from his home that he thinks he was barred from the conference because the AEC wanted to spotlight the dangers of atomic radiation.

Muller told the newspaper he went to Europe early in the summer hoping to attend the U.N. conference. But he said the AEC sent him two letters while he was in Europe saying the U.N. had not "questioned" his presence.

Dr. Muller said the AEC's action was "a gross violation of the spirit of the conference." He said he had written the AEC several times asking for a reconsideration of its decision. He said he had also written the U.N. secretary-general, asking that the AEC's action be nullified.

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### Editor Flays U-S. Rule on News Curb

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17—J. R. Wiggins, executive editor of the Washington Post and Times Herald has sharply criticized new defense department rules designed to limit the release of economic and technical information by defense industries to the public.

Wiggins, who is also chairman of the Freedom of Information Committee of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, said in a statement last night that the regulations "threaten the access of American citizens to the facts about the nation's defenses."

He said the rules "menace the democratic process."

"The defense department suggested that defense industries 'exercise considerable caution' in releasing economic and technical information even when it bears no military secrecy classification. It said such information as contract awards, production methods, plant expansion and capacity, and research data, should be withheld from the public, a standard for the release of information to which no people who mean to govern themselves ought to consent."

"All information is of some possible use to an enemy," Wiggins said. "Literally followed, this rule would mean no information about war defense expenditures absorbing most of the national budget on the wise use of which national survival may depend."

He said the defense department has long had authority to classify as secret information "involving military security." But he said the

### High Price Support Wing of Demo Party Grabs Controls

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP)—The far-reaching influence on the high price supporting wing has grabbed the control wheel in determining strategy of the Democratic party on the farm issue—at least until the party holds its big convention next year.

What this wing does during the next six months could well have

stored as a means of bolstering support of the Truman era re-

set up a special committee to review the farm situation in the light of the approaching campaign and to outline strategy in attacking Eisenhower administration farm policies.

Former Secretary of Agriculture

Claude R. Wickard was named chairman of this committee. Wickard, who served as secretary under both former President Roosevelt and Truman, is a staunch advocate of high price supports. And he had been making speeches bitterly criticizing the administration and the secretary of agriculture, Ezra Taft Benson.

Another named to the Democratic committee was former Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan. He is the author of a controversial farm plan advanced in 1934 which would have provided even higher farm supports than were authorized under the "wheat" and law repealed last year.

In addition, Brannan proposed broad use of government subsidies to achieve a dual goal of high returns to farmers and cheaper food for consumers. The plan was never accepted by congress, but farm leaders generally agree that it still has many supporters.

The Wickard-Brannan element is opposed in the Democratic party by a group headed by Senator William F. Anderson of New Mexico, himself

a former agriculture secretary, and Edward L. Tamm of Florida. This group helped push the administration's flexible support program through congress.

These two wings clashed over the price support issue at the party's national convention in 1932 with the high support group coming out on top.
