The plans probably will involve government purchase of pork products.

They were the eighth and ninth Americans in Hong Kong since the Communists took over the mainland in 1949.

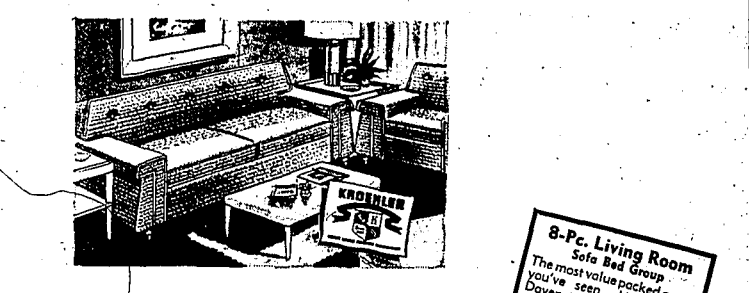

CAUTION ON CYPRUS

If ever an issue called for caution and moderation it is the question of the island of Cyprus, which now is under discussion in London among representatives of Great Britain, Greece and Turkey.

Unless reason prevails, the world may witness another explosion of violence on this Mediterranean island whose history goes back to the roots of Western civilization. Such an outbreak might gravely damage the fabric of the West's solidarity.

Cyprus, third largest island in the Mediterranean after Sicily and Sardinia, is an island of 8,000 square miles. It is the site of the British rule. Currently it is also the site of the Middle East military command.

But about four fifths of the island's 500,000 people are of Greek origin, and the other fifth Turkish. A strong movement exists to give these people the right to choose their political future.

In 1959, an unofficial plebiscite conducted by the church showed 95 per cent of the Greek Cypriots favoring union with Greece. Last December the United Nations received a request for assistance in settling the issue, and the general assembly recommended a "four-point plan" for the "time being."

Unquestionably, if nothing happens meanwhile, the U. N. will be asked again this year to act on the matter. The London talks would seem to be an effort to forestall U. N. review by achieving some headway among the interested powers.

Britain thus far has refused all demands for self-determination in Cyprus. The arguments are several, but the chief one is that Britain must keep control of the island to safeguard its military establishment there.

It has offered the Cypriots a "constitution," and suggested joint use of the base by Greece, Turkey and Britain, most likely under NATO auspices.

The Turks support the British. They are said to fear Greek control of Cyprus for strategic reasons, since it lies just 45 miles off the Turkish coast. They claim a natural interest in the island because of its 100,000 Turkish citizens.

Some evidence exists that Britain earlier consciously enticed Turkish opposition to Greek demands, and apparently extremists in Turkey have inflamed popular opinion so that Greek-Turkish relations are now as tense as ever.

Greece simply asks that a date for a plebiscite, whose outcome is a foregone conclusion, be set for some definite time within the reasonable future. At the same time, the Greeks would assure Britain unrestricted use of its present Cyprus military base, and offer in addition other military rights on the Greek mainland.

On its face this proposition looks utterly fair. It deprives Britain of the right to control over the Cypriot civilian population, which thereafter could be expected to be more rather than less friendly to the British military.

Clearly others in the West can see little sanity in a bitter quarrel over strategic interests among three powers already bound together in the broad, vitally strategic community of NATO.

There must be a way to protect these interests without indefinitely suppressing the aspirations of the Cypriots. As the British should have learned in Iran and elsewhere, unimaginative delay can do irreparable harm.

The beginnings of a real solution, rather than another temporary expedient, ought to emerge from the London talks on Cyprus.

### Spain Grants Okay to Seek Armada Gold

MADRID, Sept. 20 (AP)—The Spanish government has granted permission to a group of Americans to search the floor of Vigo bay for a 116 million dollar fortune in gold and silver.

No one doubts the treasure is there. It went down with a fleet of Spanish galleons more than 300 years ago. The question is whether the Americans, headed by John S. Foster, Jr., Southampton, N. Y., can find it in the mud and bring it to the surface.

Potter, an engineer and U. S. navy veteran in his early 30's, believes modern equipment and techniques can extract the gold and silver from the resting place under 30 feet of mud. Divers in the past have brought up part but not all of the treasure.

The history of the treasure goes back to 1562, when a Spanish armada headed for the port of Cadiz with the product of three years of digging in Spain's mines in Mexico. The French fleet was expected to destroy the treasure ships.

Spain and France at the time were allied against England. Holland, and an Anglo-Dutch fleet was blockading Cadiz. The treasure ships sailed from Cadiz, further north on the Atlantic coast of Spain, and began unloading the treasure.

The Anglo-Dutch fleet commanded by Admiral Pieter Rooker attacked the treasure ships and speared to Vigo, sweeping down on the French and Spanish ships in the bay. Some were sunk and some were looted.

Potter and his associates, including William W. Washburn, a New York lawyer now living in Madrid, have made an exhaustive historical study of the fate of the treasure and are convinced that 116 million dollars worth of gold, silver and jewels remains to be salvaged.

The Spanish government, which hands out salvage contracts sparingly, has just given Potter the green light for a salvage operation with the provision that the treasure belong to the government.

The government then will return to him 50 per cent of the value of the treasure and 40 per cent of any value exceeding that figure.

**Publisher Hopes Exile Is Ending**  
NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—The exiled publisher of the Buenos Aires newspaper, La Prensa, said last night he hopes to return to Argentina soon to resume publication of the daily.

Galina Paz, who fled his homeland to Uruguay in 1931, made the statement after hearing the news of the fall of Juan D. Peron's government.

Galina Paz said he believes the new Argentine government would agree quickly to restore "all stolen property" to former owners. His 85-year-old newspaper was seized by Peron's forces in 1931. The publisher said he had not received any compensation for it.

### Bonn Cabinet Accepts Terms With Russians

# Juan D. Peron, Now Ousted, Studied Mussolini's Tactics and Used Them

Juan D. Peron picked up many of his political ideas from Benito Mussolini.

He tried to make speeches from a balcony to his followers massed in the streets below. Peron watched the Argentine military attacks in Rome, and learned. He became a Fascist in uniform.

Like Mussolini, Peron is a tall, slender man and he had a great deal of success exactly what he would like to see.

When Guy Ray, U. S. congressman, reproached him for his anti-American speech Peron said: "You must stop talking to me about the people I'm talking to."

Peron is handsome in a florid way. In recent years he kept his hair black by the use of dye, but he is in his build, tending to be in middle age.

He is a sports enthusiast. During his military days he had been an excellent boxer and aviator and he looked over Argentina and inspected everything that favored the development of sports in the country.

After visiting American general called on Peron he had a speech for them. First he asked them for giving him some of their valuable time. Then he said he would like to see them.

Peron is a man of few words. He would like to see the South American countries who are not in the health for the world. He would like to see them go to work.

The average businessman from the United States thought that was very much. Indeed, and was in line to consider Peron a misanthrope or misrepresenter figure. It was overlooked that Peron himself had got a 125 million dollar loan from Uncle Sam in 1951, though he insisted it was not a loan but a "credit".

Peron has absolutely no conception of a free press. He knew that for he had confiscated the great independent newspaper La Prensa which was printed in Argentina. He was contrary to his wishes. He

couldn't understand why the same thing wasn't true elsewhere.

One U. S. ambassador after another would be met with Peron's request to "do something" about the unfriendly attitude of the American newspapers toward his regime. He couldn't believe that Washington couldn't change the editorial policy of the leading U. S. newspapers if it really wanted to.

Peron was very skillful at playing off opposing elements against each other and eventually liquidating both.

His entrance on the political scene was due to the revolution of the Argentine army in 1943. But despite that he set out to do every-

thing he could to cut down the power of the army. The big Campo de Mayo just outside Buenos Aires was reduced sharply in number of detachments and armament. The naval air base at Punta del Indio had enough gasoline to mount a full scale attack against the capital city. He limited the number of cannon, machine guns, trucks and tanks assigned to the various regiments. Also he screened carefully the officers and set up an elaborate spy system to watch over them.

I had so dozen or so talks with Peron during the time I was assigned to Buenos Aires. On most of the visits I found him smiling and amiable and trying to convince me that he was a great lover of the United States. He also insisted he was strongly anti-communist. He

would make references to the strength of the communists in Brazil and Chile and then point out that in Argentina he had cut down their force to almost nothing. Actually, the communists gained in strength under Peron because his hatred fitted perfectly into their strategy. He told me last year that he had weakened the Communist party "not with my speeches but by giving them something." By that he referred to the wave of pay increases he put through by government decrees which had won the voice of the workers.

Many people in the United States had the idea that Evita, Peron's virtuous wife who died three years ago, was the more dominant personality of the two. I do not agree. I think that she had great influence over Peron, but I also think that he used her for his own purpose—often to do dirty work he didn't want to take the responsibility for himself.

Peron's regime wrecked the economy of the country, spending all that had been accumulated before he took over and all the income during his administration. If rumors are correct, much of the despoiled money in the prison fund for the future also were spent. First through his brother-in-law and later through his brother-in-law's associate, Jorge Antonio, Peron was supposed to be in on the pay-off of almost all the important business done by the Argentine state. Diesel locomotives could not be bought for the railroads which Peron nationalized.

Frozen meat could not be sold to Peron or exported to the United States without Peron getting some share of the take. He is supposed to have a large fortune staked away in Switzerland.

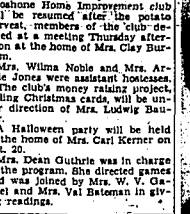

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Hurricane Ione's tardy arrival in New York today threatened a 24-hour postponement of tonight's Rocky Marciano-Archie Moore heavyweight championship fight, richest of the decade.

Responding, Marciano's strict defense of the title against light-heavyweight champion Moore would be made at Yankee stadium Wednesday night at 7:45 p.m. (MST).

Such a delay would be another frustration and perhaps a costly one for the long-awaited 3-year-old challenge, who figured to be bothered far more by the waiting than placid Marciano.

New York's share of the hurricane was originally expected Monday night. But the bureau explained that Ione's slow progress delayed the heaviest rain and winds until today.

The bureau's forecast for tonight read: "Clearing with slowly diminishing winds." It was explained that the clearing could not be pin-pointed, but indications were that clearing would begin in the late afternoon or evening.

A representative of the International Boxing Club said, "If the weather clears, the fight will be held as planned; but if the clearing occurs in the evening, the fight would not have time to dry out."

The weather bureau's forecast for Wednesday was "fair with moderate temperatures."

It was not until last October that he even got a fight in Miami Square garden, although he had been a top-flight boxer for 14 years, and had taken the light-heavyweight title of Joey Maxim in December, 1923.

### Chinese Reds Free Seventh Yank Civilian

HONG KONG, Sept. 20 (AP)—An American British prisoner of war, freed by the Chinese Communists almost five years ago, crossed the border to freedom on his 57th birthday anniversary yesterday. He was reunited here with his wife. It was his 6th birthday anniversary.

Rev. Levi A. Lovgren, Cherry Grove, Ore., was the seventh American civilian freed by the Chinese Reds during recent negotiations with the United States at Geneva to release American civilians still in China. Three American Roman Catholic priests—Father Frederick A. Gordon, Somerset, O.; Joseph E. Hyde, Lowell, Mass., and the Rev. James G. O'Connell, arrived yesterday on the train from red Canton. They had been held under house arrest most of the past year by the Chinese Reds.

Father Gordon was accused of sheltering counter-revolutionaries, Father Hyde of spreading propaganda and Father Joyce of collecting information on military activities. The Rev. Mr. Lovgren, who was arrested in Chungking in January, 1945, and sentenced to 10 years on charges of spying, said in an interview: "I am a missionary. They accused me of being an agent. I was not. ### Lost Hunters Are Found in Mine Tunnel

GONOGOTOWN, Colo., Sept. 20 (AP)—Bodies of two Kansas uranium hunters were found early yesterday in the black depths of an old mine which they hoped to strike rich. An 11-man mine rescue squad found Glenn Dew, 33, and Melvin Bellow, 45, both Ulysses, Kan., seated side-by-side leaning against the wall of the tunnel. The bodies were 5,000 feet from the entrance to the long abandoned mine. The shaft was believed to extend only 200 feet farther into the mountain side.

Searchers said it appeared the men stopped for rest, pulled off their oxygen masks and died unaware of what was happening. There were no signs of struggle for a 1 1/2 hour period. Another crew was dispatched into the body blackness of the time-worn shaft with stretchers to remove the bodies. The search started 8:30 p.m. last Thursday when two companions reported the men missing. They had not returned at the mine entrance. Around the clock searchers volunteered their services to keep following the tracks of the missing men deeper and deeper into the poison-strewn mine.

### Britain Roused By Tale of Two Diplomat Spies

LONDON, Sept. 20 (AP)—A foreign office statement that two missing British diplomats presumably snuggled secret documents to Russia touched off stormy demands yesterday for tightening Britain's defenses against Soviet spies.
