## Government Eyes Younger Reserve Plan for Drafting

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—The government is considering a change in draft regulations aimed at getting younger men into military service.

The proposed change is prompted by the rising average age of draftees—now up to about 23—and is coupled with the administration's new military reserve program.

The proposed changes—designed to get more officials said the draft age men—are being circulated with the armed forces and other agencies for their comment.

The changes would not exempt early draftees from military service.

## Demos Ready Big Probe on Radar Leases

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—Democrats, leveling new "big business" charges against the Federal Communications Commission, today announced an investigation of a blocked \$4,000,000 radar lease contract between the military and private firms.

The probe is being led by Sen. James Eastland, Miss. Campbell has warned the air force it has no authority from congress to lease radar equipment to private firms.

The project would make the operation of radar warning stations virtually automatic.

The air force emphasized that work on the project will continue until the end of the fiscal year. One official said the government is not required to pay out any more money until the system is in operation.

The Burley girl was identified as Carol E. Gee, 18, recently a resident of Burley, Idaho. She was killed instantly when the car shot off a straight road and rolled down a steep embankment.

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### Power Policy Probe Begins By Committee

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—A subcommittee today opened a wide-ranging investigation into the nation's power policies. The committee will determine whether the nation's power companies are falling behind in their control of the nation's energy resources.

The subcommittee, headed by Sen. Arthur W. Clegg, Jr., of Washington, will hold public hearings on the subject in the coming weeks. It will also conduct a study of the nation's power resources and the role of government in the power industry.

### Chinook Runs Fall Down for Third Season

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 21 (AP)—Fishing interests and biologists expressed concern and puzzlement here today over the failure for the third year in a row of the Columbia river Chinook salmon run to live up to expectations.

They estimated the Columbia river salmon industry has suffered a three million dollar loss during the three years.

At Bonneville dam, about 90,000 Chinook were counted during the period from Aug. 16 to Sept. 18, about half the number that is considered a fair year.

Fred Cleaver, biologist for the Oregon fish commission, said it was possible that changing hydrographic conditions in the ocean accounted for loss of marked fish, but he added that exact cause was unknown.

Cleaver said that the early part of the run was fairly heavy but that what he failed to see was too late to post notices and call public meetings as required by law to halt river fishing.

Biologists said the depletion could not be blamed entirely on gillnetters, apartment or ocean troll fishermen. Some 1,600,000 marked fish failed to turn up in numbers.

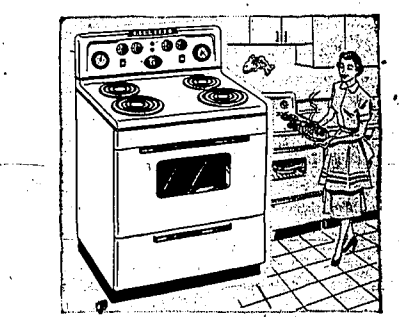

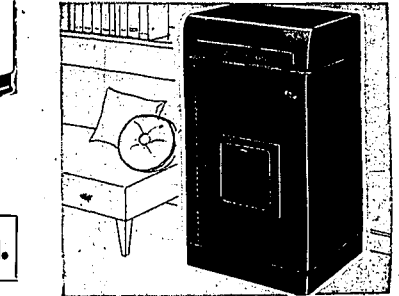

### Reds Failing With Plan to Hurt Defense

**By United Press**

It looks as if Russia will not get far in its new attempt to weaken the western defense system in Europe. On the contrary, there is every indication that the United States and its allies will continue to strengthen their position.

Chancellor Konrad Adenauer announced emphatically yesterday that despite the agreement he made in Moscow, he will proceed with the formation of a 500,000-man West German fighting force.

"The Kremlin's so-called 'new look' is just a phase of the cold war, and its aim still is to conquer the world for communism," he said.

In Madrid, Air Force Secretary Paul Quesada made it known that the United States not only will continue building its bases in Spain but may amplify its program.

In announcing their intention to give the Finnish military base gift which they compelled Ilmari Finland to base to them, the Russians in the United States to abandon their program.

General disclosure seems to confirm at least an indirect reply to the United States program in Spain.

For one thing, Spain's situation, at the southwest corner of the Pyrenees mountains, is strategically important.

For another, while communism might still become a threat in France and Italy, there is no communist problem in Spain.

### Tobacco Itself Is Absolved of Cancer Blame

GRAND FALLS, Mont., Sept. 21 (AP)—An authority on cancer of the mouth and throat says tobacco itself is not a factor in causing cancer of the lips and mouth.

"Actually," said J. S. Bernier, "as far as lip and mouth cancer are concerned, tobacco isn't a factor any more than our cigarettes were made of silk."

The chief of the oral pathology branch of the armed forces institute of pathology, Washington, D. C., talked to Montana and southern Alberta doctors and dentists attending a two-day seminar on oral cancer.

"Some factors associated with smoking however stand out as having a high association with cancer," Bernier said.

He named the presence of cigarette ash in the mouth as one factor and the heat in the mouth generated from smoking as another. The pipe smoker might seem to face the greatest danger, he said.

Bernier said 90 per cent of the persons afflicted with cancer of the lips and mouth are smokers. But he said also that 90 per cent of the people in America smoke.

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### Both Parties Ready to Utilize Large Sums for TV Facilities

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—The Democratic and Republican parties were ready to spend a whopping \$10 million each to carry 1950 presidential campaign arguments into millions of American homes by way of television.

Advance estimates from the two party headquarters indicate TV costs will be the largest single item in the campaign budgets, with each party spending for television about double the amount spent in 1948. The money will come from treasuries of the national committees and committees and allied citizen groups.

By law, the national committees may collect \$200,000 each for the campaign. But each party can sidestep this limitation by having state organizations and other groups pick up the check, and this is what will happen next year, unless the ruling on spending is raised.

The Republicans already are dickering with the networks for favorable TV spots next fall, particularly in the last six weeks of the campaign. The best are the evening hours when families gather had their dinner and are relaxing before bedtime.

The Democrats haven't yet begun negotiations with the networks, according to Democratic publicity chief Sam Bingham, but they do not reserve time for in advance of the campaign stretch drive.

Party leaders in 1952 had little or no experience with television as a campaign medium, and this lack of experience was expensive.

In the heat of the campaign, critical times arise when party leaders consider it worth almost any price to get their story to the people quickly and dramatically. But it's a costly thing to buy TV time on short notice because it means paying a "pre-emption" fee to the producers who gave up the time—in addition to the regular network costs.

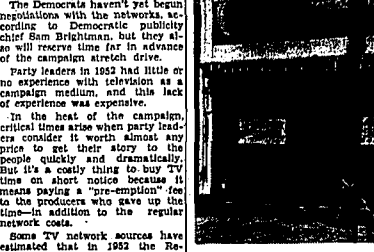
Some TV network sources have estimated that in 1952 the Republicans spent more than \$20,000 in buying up expensive time on short notice. Such a moment came when Republicans rushed Richard Nixon (now the vice president) to the air waves to explain a campaign fund given him by a group of private citizens.

The Democrats had their own emergencies but their extra costs weren't as heavy as the Republicans'. And it is no secret that the Democrats must guard their money a good deal more carefully than the Republicans.

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### Science Uses New Drug on Africa Insect

**BUKAVU, Belgian Congo, Sept. 21 (U.S.)**—No insect in the world has stood up under a more concentrated attack by the human race than Africa's tsetse fly. So far, the tsetse fly has won.

But scientists have reported to the Lederle-Sikorsky medical expedition crossing the dark continent by helicopter that a new drug is going to be used in an effort to get the upper hand over the insect that has made an area of Africa as big as Europe unsafe for human colonization.

A vast part of Africa is infested with the tsetse fly, which is the carrier of the parasite trypanosomes. This parasite causes sleeping sickness, which is fatal to domestic cattle and man.

Dr. Said Kiliany of the Cairo Expedition Medicoale said he hoped to arrange tests of the new drug in the African tsetse fly. In preliminary experiments the new drug has shown hopeful results in clearing trypanosomes from the blood.

The tsetse fly itself has survived the most ingenious of man's weapons.

"The astonishing thing," said Kiliany, "is that the female tsetse lays less than two eggs a year—not hundreds of thousands of eggs as you would expect. Yet it resists all efforts to exterminate it."

They've tried breeding sterile males so no offspring would follow a mating. They've tried killing some with cyanide gas. They've tried spraying with insecticides. But the tsetse keeps on living," said Kiliany.

The sleeping sickness carried by the tsetse is believed to be a commoner new disease for domestic cattle and human beings. It tends to kill them. But when it attacks and other game native to Africa don't die from it, probably because their species have been exposed to it for hundreds of thousands of years.

Doctors believe any amount of effort to eradicate the tsetse fly is worthwhile for economic and humanitarian reasons. A victory in the fight would open a new-improved area to economic development.

Africa remains a hostile territory, health-wise, for the foreign traveler. He must take anti-malaria shots, boil his drinking water, watch his food carefully, sleep under mosquito nets, and wear boots.

"I don't have any choice," Yearston said. "There's no way I can get the money. I don't own the property."

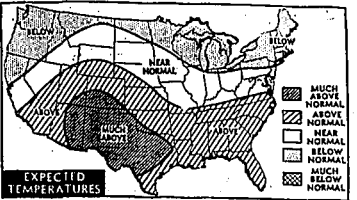

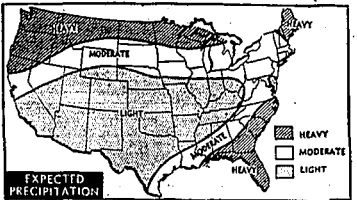

### 2 New 'Birds' Are Added to U. S. Arsenal

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 21 (AP)—Two new "birds" have been added to America's defense arsenal.

The air force and navy gave the public its first look at two new guided missiles used in defending against enemy aircraft. The missiles are named "Falcon" and "Sparrow." They were displayed at the American Rocket Society meeting here.

The Falcon is a ground-to-air, six-foot long missile developed by Hughes Aircraft company for the air force. The Sparrow is a 12-foot long air-to-air missile developed for the navy.

The Falcon is fired from a ground mount and guided by electronic controls, while the Sparrow is fired from a plane.

Also shown for the first time at the rocket society meeting was a rocket-propelled sled, capable of running on a track at a speed of 1,000 miles an hour. It was built for the air force by North American Aviation company and has been used at Edwards air force base, Calif., for testing ejection seats and parachutes at supersonic speeds.

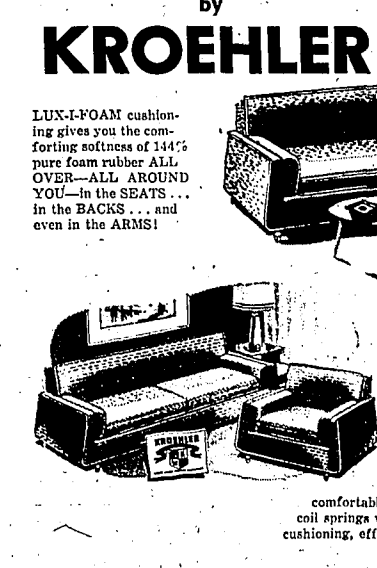

### Arthritis Drug Gets Blame for Toxic Element

NEW YORK, Sept. 21 (AP)—A professor of medicine has figured out that 24 patients have died during the last few years after taking phenylbutazone, a drug which is widely used for arthritis and related diseases.

Dr. Edgar F. Maurer, associate clinical professor of medicine, University of Southern California, found that 1,176 other patients have suffered distressing "side" reactions, many of them very serious and long-lasting.

He got his figures by putting together everything which has been reported concerning the drug in the medical literature. He found 26 reports. These reports covered 3,234 patients. Thus almost one-third of the total had "reactions of varying degrees of severity, from easily reversible water retention to death."

His points were: Phenylbutazone is "chemically similar" to aminopyrine, a drug which had to be abandoned because of its "disastrous effects on the bone marrow." Phenylbutazone, too, has a large toxic potential which now is well established. These poisonous effects have been observed in the skin, the gastro-intestinal tract, the liver, kidney, bone marrow, "as well as in other organs."

"These reactions," he continued, "do not appear to be related to dosage or duration of treatment. They may occur after the drug has been withdrawn. There are no known methods of predicting an impending reaction. At present there are no specific means of treating reactions that have appeared."

If the drug were curative, "a modicum of risk might be justified," he said. But it isn't curative—it's a pain-reliever. He then told his medical readers that a far greater awareness of the risk taken in its use.

### Fire Department Makes Own Gun

WENOHKA, Okla., (AP)—Wenohka firemen have built a "water gun" which would make small boys stare in disbelief.

The big portable squalter, designed for use at large fires where regular hose pressure could not throw water far enough, is capable of projecting a stream of water 175 feet at the rate of 350 gallons a minute. Unlike a hose, one man can handle it.

Fire Chief Todd Coley said the gun would have cost \$342 if purchased from a manufacturer but was built for only \$40 with scrap materials.

# Moore, Marciano Sidelined For Day by Storm Threat; Both Heavier Than Expected

NEW YORK, Sept. 21 (AP)—Rocky Marciano and Archie Moore, sidelined for 24 hours by the empty threat of hurricane Ione, weighed in heavier than expected Tuesday for Wednesday's heavyweight title bout at Yankee stadium. The tickle dame Ione scared Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing club, into announcing a one-day postponement in mid-morning. Shortly after the noon weigh-in, the sun peeked through and skies cleared. It would have been possible to have held the fight as Ione edged out to sea.

Hundreds of calls from out-of-town ticket buyers who wanted to be sure before they left home prompted Norris to order the postponement. The weather man predicted Wednesday would be fair with the thermometer hitting the 75-degree mark. Because the fight falls on Wednesday night it will be pushed back 15 minutes to 7:45 p.m. (MST) to avoid conflict with the usual Wednesday television show, a middleweight bout at Miami between Bob Dykes and George Johnson.

There will be no change in arrangement for the big bout, except the new starting time. The bout will not be seen on home television but will be beamed into 136 theaters in 92 cities and four veteran hot spots on theater network television. It will be carried on network ABC radio. IBF officials reported the advance sale was "between \$600,000 and \$700,000 with few refunds asked. Promised a perfect day for the fight, they hoped to sell an additional 100,000 tickets at the gate. It appeared that the original estimate of 50,000 people and \$250,000 might be topped, despite the postponement.

Marciano, unbacked in his 49th career, remained a 17-5 favorite to blunt the bid of the 38-year-old lightweight king, after the weigh-in and postponement. Marciano, grinning for the camera men, hit the scale at 180 1/2, and Moore came in at 185. Moore, however, was expected to weigh 187 and 185, 185 or 186. However, Moore said he was "satisfied" with his weight. He was up as high as 192 1/2 for Bobo Olson June 30 so it shouldn't make much difference.

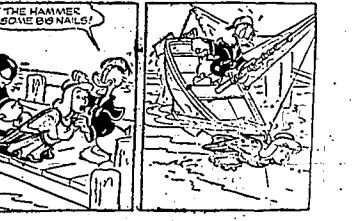
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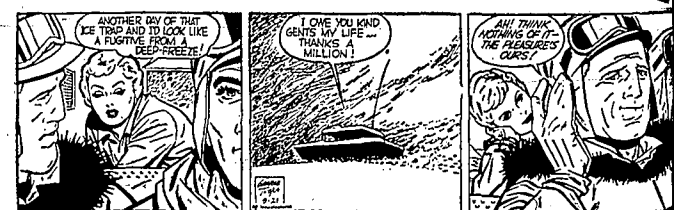
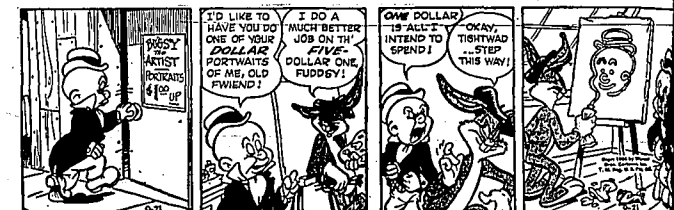
