BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 22 (AP)—Provisional President Lonardi issued a decree today dissolving the Argentine congress. All 34 members of the senate were members of the Peronista party, while there were eight members of the opposition radical party in the lower house, out of a membership of 165.

Lonardi's new government hit the airwaves with a concentrated campaign intended to calm the troubled nation and urging rebuilding of the split country through the "spirit of Peronism."

1955 Sugar Beet Limits To Be in Force During 1956, Government Says

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP)—The agriculture department announced today that 1955 limitations on sugar beet production will be continued next year.

U. S. growers will be allocated about 350,000 acres, the same this year. Planting shares will be given individual growers. They must comply in order to be eligible for subsidy payments authorized under sugar control legislation.

Under the sugar law—designed to stabilize prices and supplies—domestic producers are limited to about 30 percent of the nation's estimated needs. The balance of the market is divided among foreign and foreign producing areas.

Growers fell about 48,000 acres short of planting their national allotment this year largely because of unfavorable weather in some areas.

The cool air moved slowly southward over the northern Rockies and into northern sections of the plains. Temperatures were generally in the 30s and low 40s Thursday morning.

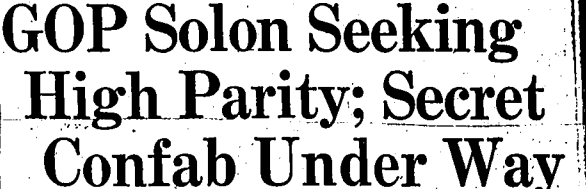
Lost Hour for Sleep Will Be Found Sunday

Banker Denies Role in Power Merger Plans

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP)—Wall street banker yesterday denied any role in the power merger plan, but admitted that he had received for a merger of two North-west power utilities in order to obtain more underlying buying for fuel.

The witness was Walter C. Gruber, a Wall Street banker and a member of a "board of directors" of investment houses, claiming to represent interests of the Puget Sound Light and Power company. The committee was formed in 1942 to work for a merger of the Puget Sound company of Seattle, and Washington Water Power of Seattle.

Both Gruber and another member of the stockholders committee testified that they had no knowledge of the monopoly subcommittee that neither they nor their firms owned any stock in the companies.

Senator O'Mahoney, D. Wyo., immediately called for legislation to prohibit disclosure of financial information by members of "so-called stockholders committees" and to influence the stockholders.

O'Mahoney is temporary chairman of the monopoly subcommittee, which is expected to report today into the general subject of utility mergers.

Warnings Set for Liquor Violators

BOISE, Sept. 22 (AP)—C. Warner Mills, state liquor law enforcement director, today issued a warning that anyone who violated the law would be guilty of first-time infractions of Idaho's liquor laws.

He said that if infractions are discovered the operator will be given a ticket warning him that he has violated the law. If a second violation is made in six months, he said, would be liable to immediate action.

Refugee Family Bound for Idaho

NEW YORK, Sept. 22 (AP)—One refugee family bound for Idaho is expected to arrive in New York tomorrow.

The refugee relief program of the department of state will send the family to Idaho, where they will be housed in a camp. The family consists of a father, a mother and three children.

220 Register for Cancer Sessions

BOISE, Sept. 22 (AP)—Some 200 persons, including 120 nurses and 100 doctors, have registered for the post-graduate cancer symposium, which opens today.

Dr. Raymond White, chairman, said that for the first time in Idaho's medical history the two largest hospitals are holding a symposium on cancer.

U-I Skating Rink Bids Are Opened

MOCCOON, Sept. 22 (AP)—Bids were opened at the University of Idaho business office yesterday for proposed all-steel skating rink and adjacent facilities on the campus.

Bids will be studied and reviewed by the board of regents at its October meeting here. The estimated cost of the rink is \$227,000, and of John Z. Thomas, \$229,500.

Divorce Sought

Lola M. Hurlanek filed suit for divorce from John L. Hurlanek in district court Wednesday morning. The couple was married in Twin Falls in 1922. Hurlanek is seeking a divorce on the grounds of mental and physical cruelty.

Consecrated

HELENA, Mont., Sept. 22 (AP)—A score of archbishops and bishops with more than 300 lesser priests and nuns yesterday attended consecration of the cathedral in Helena, where J. P. Tope as coadjutor bishop of Spokane.

Bureau Keeps Check on TV Weatherbirds

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—The weather bureau has been quietly checking up on television's growing weatherbirds.

The tentative conclusion: Most of them stick pretty close to official forecasts, and give the public generally reliable information.

But a few self-styled experts in the field have shown meteorological guess work on their audiences—sometimes with unfortunate results.

The most glaring case which came to the bureau's attention occurred during hurricanes in the northeast pool-pooled an official warning of heavy rains. The rains were heavy, all right—in fact, much heavier than the weather bureau itself expected—and flash floods inundated a wide area of the east.

A number of irate citizens wrote the bureau after hurricane Diane, demanding that it crack down on TV weathermen and weather girls who tamper with the official forecast.

The bureau replied that television weather announcers are not government employees. The bureau has no legal authority to censor their broadcasts, or to prevent them from substituting their own opinions for the considered judgment of its professional staff.

Authorities concede privately, however, that the bureau itself does not exert a certain amount of discreet, informal pressure to get broadcasters to keep broadcast positions in line with the official forecasts.

'Equal' Phase In Negotiation Noted in Talk

LONDON, Sept. 21 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan said today when diplomacy is entering a new "long haul" phase of "negotiation from equality" with Russia instead of "negotiation from strength."

In a major policy address, Macmillan said that in the 1950s the west's power can no longer be used "even for bargaining purposes as a superior weapon."

"This phase will be a very testing one," he said, "it is not negotiation from strength" but negotiation from equality.

"We must rely on moral power. Material strength, though essential, cannot do it alone."

He said a long-term policy of patience in this era of international stalemate might produce a renascence of peace from "those dark ages in which we are condemned to live."

Macmillan chose a luncheon of the Foreign Press Association as the forum for delivery of his 4,000-word speech, one of the longest he has made as foreign secretary. Diplomats from many countries attended, along with world journalists.

"We wanted a baby for three years, and prayed for her," Mrs. Erwin said. In the Erwin household, everything must be neat and in place, so eager hands can find the baby oil, the diapers, the nipples and the baby's clean clothes.

"We usually get more on her than I can handle," Mrs. Erwin said. She feels sure feeding will be easier once everybody gets more practice. Bath time and play time are favorites for Ruthie. The Erwins use baby oil instead of powder to avoid getting the powder in the baby's eyes. They bathe her face with soapless water to guard against acids that could sting the eyes.

When Ruthie begins to crawl, Mrs. Erwin plans to equip her with little bells so they'll know where she is. Once Ruthie begins walking is another problem, one the Erwins feel sure they can work out. The signal for play-time is the tap of Erwin's cane when he comes home from work at his clear stand in the Montgomery county courthouse.

First Grade Decrease Seen; Enrollment Generally Hikes

By The Associated Press
School enrollment are up from last year all over Idaho, but some schools report a decrease in the number of first graders.

Twin Falls schools, however, reported a record 584 beginners, topped by seven the previous high mark set in 1953. Total enrollment in the Twin Falls schools was listed at 4,719, compared to 4,538 last year.

A record-shattering total of 3,069 students was reported by the Ketchikan school district, compared with 2,842 at the same time last year. Among those reporting increases were Moscow, Ashton and Orofino. Ross Barney, assistant superintendent of public instruction, said several superintendents with whom he talked reported a similar situation.

Barney said most schools had apparently found enough teachers to handle their record and near-record enrollments, despite a large number of last-minute resignations.

First reports on boundary county schools indicated a record enrollment of 3,022 youngsters, an increase of 101 over last year. Moscow had a total of 1,576, compared to 1,469 last year, but the first grade dropped from 187 to 179. The first grade at Orofino dropped from 122 to 110 while total enrollment climbed from 552 to 576.

The 2,300-pound Vicki, who escaped from an amusement park on Sept. 11, was cornered after she led the posse a wild, lumbering chase over the countryside several miles from downtown Charlotte.

Southwest Demo Likes Stevenson

ALBUQUERQUE, Sept. 22 (AP)—Ben. Clinton Anderson, D. N. M., said yesterday Adlai Stevenson had only to "swear his hand, and the Democratic nomination will be his."

Anderson also indicated that Stevenson can win. Anderson said that the Democrats can beat the Republicans again just as they did in the off-year election. He said Eisenhower is not invincible.

Anderson placed one qualification on his support of Stevenson. He said, "If a candidate I am backing should advocate a farm policy I am against, he would lose my support."

Ebbidon-Smith looked at the 18 doors and decided the matter was not within his jurisdiction.

Truman's Version of Tongue-Lashing He Gave Top Russian Put in Article

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP)—Harry S. Truman's version of the tongue-lashing he gave a top Soviet diplomat was laid last night in a personal account of his first days in the presidency.

When Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov presented the sharp language, Truman said he informed the cabinet leader:

"I said to your ambassador and you won't get talked to like that."

Life magazine published the first installment of Truman's memoirs in its current issue. It includes a report on the former President's face-to-face meeting with Molotov at the White House April 23, 1945.

Truman said he was concerned about Russia's refusal to carry out Yalta agreements to bring certain democratic leaders into the Lublin or Warsaw provisional government in Poland and pledge it to hold free elections to choose a permanent one.

Life will publish the first volume of the memoirs in five installments and the New York Times and St. Louis Post-Dispatch will serialize them. The first volume comes out in book form (Doubleday and company) in early November. Another volume will follow in January. Truman reportedly is getting about \$600,000, spread over a period of years for tax purposes.

Truman writes he, appointed James H. Byrnes secretary of state in 1945 because there was no vice president; and "he didn't want a man who had never held an elective office in line of succession."

Byrnes succeeded Edward R. Stettinius in the post.

But, Truman said, there was another reason, "involuntarily personal." Byrnes, he said, "had felt he was the logical choice for Franklin D. Roosevelt's running mate in 1944, and was undoubtedly 'deeply disappointed and hurt' when Truman was picked instead.

In fact, Truman went on, Byrnes asked me to nominate him and give him my support before the convention ruled otherwise."

"I thought my calling on him at this time might balance things out," Truman commented on the appointment. Byrnes quit the cabinet in disgust in bitter exchanges of criticism and Byrnes supported Dwight D. Eisenhower for President in 1952.

Truman gives an account of his first trans-Atlantic telephone conversation with Winston Churchill, then the British prime minister, in which they agreed to reject a German surrender offer in April, 1945, unless it was unconditional and offered also to Russia.

He praises the late Republican Sen. Robert A. Taft as a "highly ethical, straightforward and lovable man." He described Taft as a "violent partisan" with a "sense of dynasty."

Testing Time Is Coming for Price Boosts

NEW YORK, Sept. 22 (AP)—Price wars—starting at the production level in the summer—are now beginning on consumer items. Testing time lies just ahead.

Automobiles, gasoline, television sets, hats, floor tiles—only a few manufacturers in these fields have raised prices this week. And the parade of higher prices continues in fields that consumers encounter only indirectly and later on after the boosters raise production costs—electric transformers, oil field equipment, bleached asphalt pulp, nickel-chromium alloys.

Testing time will come when the consumer reacts. Manufacturers argue that prices must go up because the cost of labor and industrial materials have gone up. Retailers argue that one of the chief reasons for the booming demand for consumer goods has been price paring that offered the public a better value than the demand could shrivel under the frost of higher prices this fall.

But, administrators warn, that the consumer will do. But both expect to know the answer before many more of the price news this week makes good reading for the consumer.

Heavy supplies of meat pouring into Midwest markets have been lowering wholesale prices there. The agriculture department estimates that the meat supply is currently 14 percent greater than last year. Slaughter of cattle and the production of beef last week was the largest in the history of the slaughter—the highest since March.
