

Citizens Hope Prince Finds Bride in U. S.

MONTICELLO, Mont., Sept. 23 (AP)—His serene highness Prince Rainier III will fly to the United States this fall and all 21,000 of his subjects are hoping he brings back a bride.

A beautiful one, preferably, but more important, one with a yen to settle down and have children.

Monticello, the United States' favorite independent states and home of the famous Monte Carlo gambling casino, has a good record for wanting the 31-year-old prince to get married. As long as he stays single everyone here faces the possibility of paying income tax.

At present, Montegascque citizens pay no direct taxes and live in happiness supported by their oil industries and the tourists who come to gamble and look at the Mediterranean. But if their prince should die without a heir their principality will automatically revert to France—and French tax collectors.

The need to prevent such a disaster has become more acute in recent months. The tourist trade has been falling off, and in August the country's biggest bank had to close its doors due to the government's heavy losses in the failure of a commercial television venture.

Officially, the prince's trip to America Nov. 10 is for a medical check-up at Johns Hopkins hospital in Baltimore.

The last time Prince Rainier went on a trip his honeymoon was a disappointment to his subjects. All he brought home was 32 chimpanzees, gibbons, martlets and other animals and birds for a new national zoo.

Tale of Death Recounted as Remorse as

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 23 (AP)—It will go into the books as self-inflicted death. But that's only part of the story. Clark Oarum, a friend, died thinking he had killed a friend.

The federal bureau of investigation filed its report yesterday on the strange story.

The 19-year-old Oarum, of Whitebrooks in Uintah county, was driving a friend home last Sunday at 3 a.m. His car suddenly swerved and overturned.

The accident left the friend unconscious. He awoke to see Oarum gazing from the scene.

Indian trackers followed the trail of Oarum. They said they found where he slashed a wrist with a piece of broken glass from the car window. They located the spot where he sprawled in anguish on the ground and clawed the earth with his fingers.

They found where he braced a rope from strips of his nylon shirt. And they followed his tracks to a juniper tree, where he slipped the noose over his neck and tied his hands with two simple knots.

There they found his body Sunday afternoon, hanging by the neck, hands tied and knees touching the ground.

It was a self-inflicted death, the investigators concluded, due to remorse at thinking he had killed a friend.

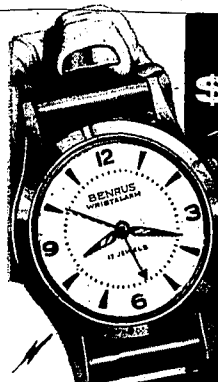

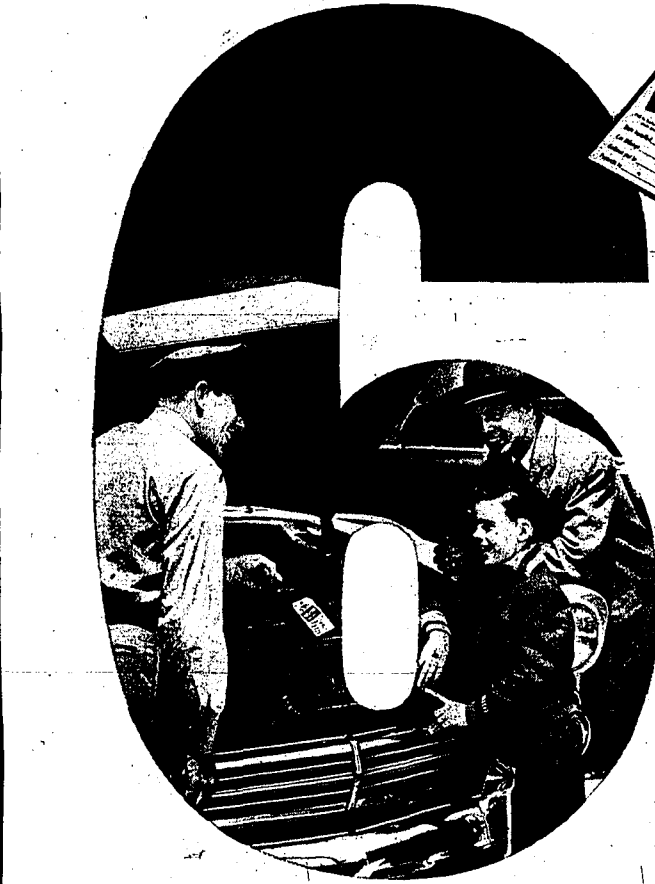

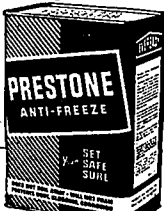

Youth Blinded By Shot From Angry Woman

JAMESTOWN, Tenn., Sept. 22 (AP)—A schoolboy was blinded in his right eye on his 15th birthday yesterday when an angry farm wife fired a shotgun into a crowd of youth because they shouted at her. Sheriff Clayton Upchurch said three other York Institute students suffered minor injuries when struck by the shotgun pellets. A Glasgow, Ky., doctor said Benjamin Pyle's eye was destroyed by one of several pellets which struck him in the head and neck. The sheriff quoted Mrs. Harrison, about 50, as saying the boys yelled to her as they passed going to a farm demonstration and again when they returned. Upchurch quoted her as saying she did not mean to harm anyone but "had to scare 'em." She fired into the rear of the army-style truck from a distance of about 60 yards, he sheriff said. Dr. Harold Robbins, teacher who was accompanying the boys, secured warrants against Mrs. Holt, charging her with felonious assault. He waived preliminary hearing and set \$4,000 bond pending grand jury action in January.

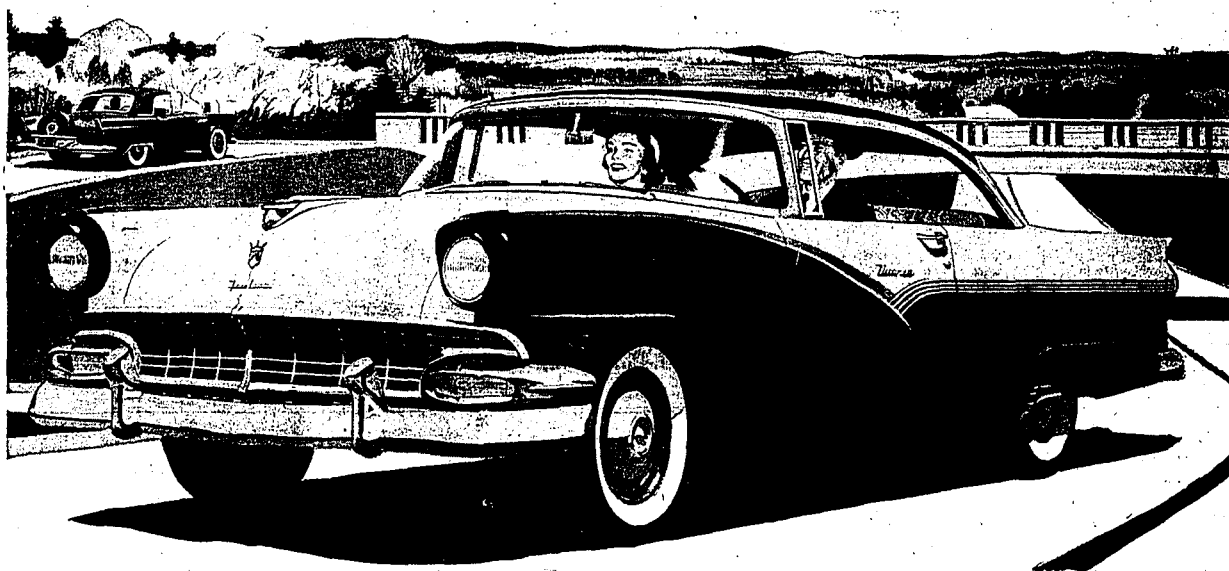

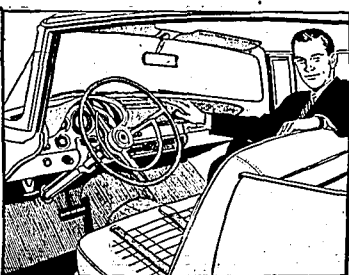

Price Support Program Seen Needing Time

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—Eisenhower administration advisers tonight at a closed conference yesterday to discuss measures which might be used to "buy time" for their program to stabilize prices.

Agriculture department officials took up the problem at a quarterly meeting of the national agricultural advisory commission. They expressed concern that political leaders and farmers might not be willing to give the program enough time to show whether it is effective unless the decline in farm income is halted before next year's election.

Democrats and some Republican leaders have been sharply criticizing the administration's farm policies, claiming they are inadequate to prevent an agricultural depression. Some of these critics want the government to push farmers up by raising price support guarantees.

At the same time the federal reserve board's monthly bulletin said yesterday that despite a decline in farm income the general financial position of farmers remains relatively strong.

The article, prepared by the reserve board staff, blamed crop price declines on big crops in recent years, overhauling surpluses owned by the government and an agricultural program in federal price support levels for this season's grain harvest.

It added that although price support levels have been reduced below the point at which the federal government hoarded crops in recent years, the support levels "remain much higher relative to parity than prior to World War II."

Parity is a price standard calculated to be fair to the farmer in relation to the cost of things he must buy. Crop support levels are a percentage of parity.

The reserve board said per capita farm income has not declined as fast as the total national income. This, it said, resulted from a reduced number of farmers using more productive equipment and from the fact that each farmer is today producing more than in the past.

Turkeys Attack Injured Farmer

IOWA CITY, Ia., Sept. 23 (AP)—A 25-year-old farmer, attacked by a flock of 200 turkeys while he lay helpless after a tractor overturned, remained hospitalized here yesterday with serious injuries.

News released says the turkey, weighing 25 to 30 pounds, was speared at his body and face and leaped on him while he lay beneath the tractor for three hours Thursday. The tractor caused a spinal fracture.

Gas Laterals Lines Sought In Northwest

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—An official of Citizens Utilities Company yesterday said the federal power commission will be asked to authorize Northwest Pipeline Corporation to build lateral lines to connect its main line with Idaho and to supply it with gas.

The question of the lateral pipeline was raised by the commission's examination of a hearing into various proposals for increased gas deliveries to the Pacific Northwest.

Citizens is one of several companies proposing to build gas lines to the Pacific Northwest. It is owned by the G. O. Gibbs, Stamford, Conn., vice president, said his firm does not believe it would be feasible to buy gas from the Pacific except at the boundaries of the communities it proposes to serve.

If citizens were to build the 200 miles of lateral pipeline at a cost of slightly more than \$1 million dollars, he said, it would price the gas too close to competing fuels.

He contended, however, that it would be economically feasible for the firm to build the connecting lines to the main line.

Gibbs said citizens is asking the commission to allocate it \$3,352,252, 50 cents of gas annually from the Pacific.

It proposes to initiate natural gas service to Sandpoint, Post Falls, Marsie, Bonanza Ferry, Mullan, Ketchikan, Kellogg, Wallace, Wardner, Smelterville, Oxbow, Poirault, Crest, Catalina, Kingston and Troutburg in Idaho, Colville, Cheney, Deer Park, Chewelah and Newport in Washington.

Firm Files Two Causes of Action
BURLY, Sept. 23 (AP)—The United States company has filed suits in district court against Royal B. Nakano and Ross M. Nakano for payment of all from July, 1952 to 1954.

The oil company claims the first amount of \$407.75 has been due since July 25, 1952, together with interest at 10 percent.

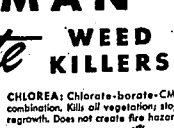

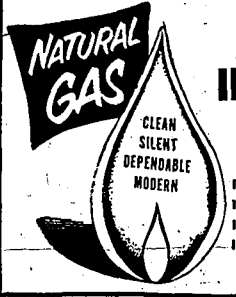

Color Testing Can Discover Body Tumors

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—The public health service yesterday announced a simple color test which it said makes easy the detection of a tumor associated with a variety of diseases, including leukemia.

The tumor is known as a metastatic carcinoma, which originates in the small intestine and spreads to other abdominal organs, particularly the liver.

The announcement said the tumor originates in tissues which normally produce small quantities of a substance called serotonin.

With the tremendous increase in serotonin-producing tumors which constitute development of the tumor, many times the normal amount of serotonin is produced and discharged into the blood.

The new test is a technique for determining this abnormal overproduction of serotonin. It was developed and applied by Dr. Albert Siderman, lecturer at Washington, D. C.

Required for the test, which can be run in a few minutes, are a small amount of urine, water, and three fairly common chemical reagents. The ingredients are combined in a particular sequence in a test tube.

A purple color reaction indicates the presence of carcinoma.

Patience Is Advised to Those Who Get Peeved at Today's Congested Highways

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—Those who fret at the traffic that clogs almost every major highway were handed this simple solution: Stick around. By the year 2000, everything should be better. By then, a family may drive pleasantly from coast to coast and never see a traffic light.

President Eisenhower, a man who does not spare the horsepower on the automobile trips between here and his Gettysburg, Pa., farm, said in a statement to the American Automobile association:

"I hope all of you will continue to speak up again and again for prompt action on a highway adequate for modern living."

So, to learn what you are speaking up for, let's look into the future with J. P. Buckley, chief highway engineer for the Automotive Safety foundation.

First, a diagnosis by our highway doctor on what's wrong with what we have now.

"Much of it," Buckley said, "was built for the horse and buggy era." Only a relatively few miles, he said, have been built with the modern car in mind.

Still, enough has been done for Buckley to make these predictions about 200 A.D.:

Automobile traffic will increase fantastically, but because of fine expressways, there will be little congestion.

On these expressways cities will be bypassed or the road will be so built that it will hardly be necessary to slow down.

There will be no traffic lights (hurry, hurry!) on these major roads.

Large lakes will be bridged. Mountain ranges will be tunneled.

Opposing traffic will be separated. One-way streets and highways will be the rule.

Street? Snow? It will melt as it hits the highway.

Headlights? Won't need them on major roads. They will be illuminated as bright as day.

Disabled cars—major source of clogs today—will be whisked away by helicopter.

Cities will use three-level highways. Underground parking will be common. New office buildings will have parking facilities on each floor.

Timber Lands Sales Policy Being Set up

BOISE, Sept. 22 (U.S. Gov. Robert E. Smylie said yesterday the state land board expected to formulate a policy for the pricing and sale of insect-damaged timber and other lands suitable for use in by-product production.

Returning from a state land board tour, Smylie said "several major timber interests in north Idaho" were interested in establishing pulp mills, but no exact locations had been selected.

Smylie said the board inspected insect-damaged stands of spruce and cedar on the Hunt creek drainage along the east shore of Priest Lake.

The board talked with representatives of timber companies about getting this timber out while it is still usable, the governor reported.

The governor said the board would probably call in an expert consultant regarding establishment of a state park on Indian creek bay, where Indian creek runs into Priest Lake.

He said the state owns land stretching back about a quarter of a mile from a white sand beach which could accommodate some 1,000 people.

"It is one of the few remaining good beach areas on the lake available for use as a public park," Smylie said.

Frost Helps Potato Crop

IDAHO FALLS, Sept. 22 (U.S. The season's first frost brought smiles to potato growers in the Idaho Falls area yesterday.

A mass of cold air sent temperatures down to 29 degrees here Thursday morning, nipping some areas potato vines.

Potato growers explained the spruds need to remain in the ground about a week after the vines are frozen before they are fully mature. Temperatures must sink to 28 degrees or lower to blacken the potato vines enough for the maturing process.

So barring a premature freeze, potato men don't mind the cold. They say this year's crop is ready for a vine-killing frost.

The full effect of Thursday's frost, however, is known for a few days.

During World War II, as much as 20.7 per cent of the U.S. crop production was sold as chis or frozen, but the percentage has dropped to seven or below in recent months.
