### Official Defends Anti-Polio Shot

**WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., Sept. 24**—Salk polio vaccine as now manufactured is both safe and effective and "has" already reduced the number of new polio cases in the country, Dr. Leonard A. Scheier, U. S. surgeon general, reported.

Only two to three per cent of the children who took part in field trials last year and received the first shot of Salk vaccine this year have been afflicted, he said. The normal incidence is 10 per cent among first and second graders.

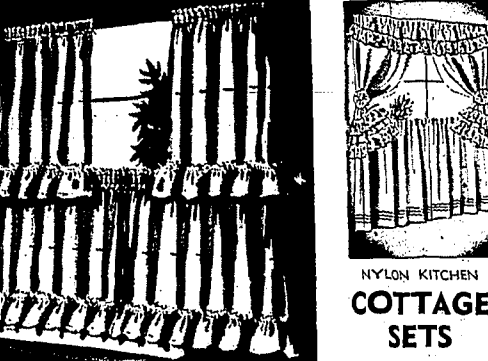

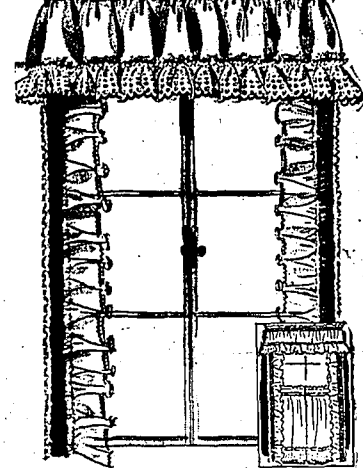

BOISE, Sept. 24 (AP)—Public health officials here today warned Boise and other county communities and their health departments that they are inviting a "rat plague" by making food, water and garbage readily available to the rodents.

### Jerome Farm Youth Wins \$600 Award in Arc Welding Contest

JEROME, Sept. 24—Bill Laird, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Laird, received a national honor this week when he was selected as top winner of \$600 in the welding awards program offered by the James F. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation, Cleveland, O.

The program is offered to high school students who are farm or ranch residents to encourage study and thinking on the use of arc welding in farm operation and maintenance.

Carver, local instructor, who spent many hours in assisting Laird with his project, was pleased with the announcement. Another Jerome youth, LaVern Neave, also won a sixth award and \$25 in the contest. Both boys have been active in FFA under the leadership of Luther.

Laird, 19, is attending Idaho State college this year and is taking a three-year course at the vocational school in radio, electronics and television. He has been mechanically minded all his life and in 1953 won the state farm electrification contest and \$100. This past summer he has been employed at Blithop's as a mechanic.

Laird's project was an automatic poultry feed mixer where he constructed at a cost of \$35 plus \$65 for the motor. He made the mixer when a senior in high school.

He lived with his family on a 25-acre irrigated farm near Jerome. The need for his mixer grew out of his poultry project. In his junior year he had about 125 Astra-White pullets and last year 200 Barred Rock pullets. However, he found that with low egg prices he could not make much profit.

He stated that he could not do anything about the low egg prices but he thought he could do something about the high cost of prepared feeds. He found that he could mix his own mash and save about \$2 per hundred and have higher quality feed. With this he started to build his own mixer in an ag shop at school.

By looking over many junk yards, Laird was able to secure much of his material and thus build the valuable mixer at a small cost. He gives much credit to his ag teacher for assisting him with his project. He spent approximately 200 hours in completing the project but it paid off with the winning of this outstanding award.

Neave, 16, is a junior in high school and entered as his project a combination machine trailer and wagon, an A-frame bar, a Fresno and a small utility trailer.

Neave lives on a 60-acre farm nine miles east and two miles south of Jerome. He is a "rock-land" and plans to farm with his brother when he completes high school.

Luther pointed out that this con-

test is one of many contests and opportunities offered to boys making the ag course.

Luther also stated that the company sponsoring the contest will send another check to the Jerome high school in the same amount of \$600 matching that won by Laird to be used to improve shop facilities.

**Board Acting To Halt Farm Price Decline**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)—The War Relocation Authority's special farm advisory commission today acted to halt falling farm prices. The commission's secret recommendations are expected to form the basis of the new farm program the administration has promised to send congress next year.

The 11-member bipartisan group wound up a two-day meeting yesterday on the politically explosive subject.

None of the members would say what took place. When questioned, they kept their answers deliberately vague. But it seemed certain from what little they did say that the commission had not produced a final solution to the farmers' cost-price problem.

One spokesman for the group said the members had approved some proposals, vetoed others and put still others off for further discussion at another meeting in December.

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra C. Benson said earlier that he would have "very specific" recommendations now to ease the farmers' lot by the time congress reconvenes in January.

When asked whether the commission had discussed the "very specific" proposals Benson promised, the spokesman said only that members talked about some "long-range problems" and about some "immediate steps" that would be taken.

A December meeting would give the commission time to relay to Benson his specific recommendations. When the members complete their recommendations, they will be sent to Benson in the strictest secrecy.

### Farm Bureau Raps Politics In Aid Plans

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)—The American Farm Bureau federation says "pleas for reason" in combating sliding farm prices are being lost amid the swirl of "political charges and countercharges."

The big farm organization berated "politicians" of both parties in a weekly newsletter mad public Friday, saying their verbal exchanges were "very confusing" to farmers.

Democrats have been criticizing the Eisenhower administration for the farm price setbacks, saying GOP agricultural programs are inadequate. Republicans say the price drops were brought on by farm policies of previous Democratic administrations.

Declared the Farm Bureau: "Farmers discovered last week that they may be the No. 1 issue for both Democrats and Republicans. . . . From every corner of the land came charges and countercharges. But pleas for reason got little, if any, attention from spokesmen for either party. Politicians after politician used rural America as the sounding board for promises for better things for agriculture—or to behoove the interests of disaster."

### Will Ike Run in 1956? Tip-Off May Be That He Has Kept Campaign Team of '52

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (UPI)—President Eisenhower runs for a second term, a few telephone calls and a mere push of a buzzer button at the White House can summon for the 1956 campaign virtually the same political brain trust which mater-minded his election in 1952.

The key members of the old team are in Eisenhower's "kitchen cabinet" or else they're close at hand and available. "All we need is the go-ahead signal," one of the group said. "We can assemble very quickly a smooth organization in which every man is familiar with the job he's to do."

Right now, the President is keeping everybody guessing. Sometimes he drops a teaser which could be interpreted to mean he will run again. And then again he raises a doubt. When is the President likely to indicate his intentions? One man in the position to know or at least to make an educated guess says the tip-off very likely will come in next January when Eisenhower's name is expected to be entered in the New Hampshire presidential preference primary to be held March 14.

If Eisenhower spoke out as Theodore Roosevelt did back in 1903 when there was considerable speculation about "Teddy" seeking a second term, Roosevelt said: "Of course, I should like to be reelected President and I shall be disappointed if I am not. . . any strong man fit to be president would desire re-nomination and reelection after his first term."

Still even though he has not spoken out, there are some people close to Eisenhower who are confident the President feels much like Theodore did. Assuming these men have sized up the future correctly, this is how Eisenhower's campaign organization is likely to shape up:

As national chairman, Hill is expected to have the title of "campaign manager," the role occupied in 1952 by Arthur Summerfield who then was national chairman and now is postmaster general. Hill is thoroughly familiar with the inner workings of a presidential campaign and he was one of the top GOP advisers to Eisenhower in the last race.

Adams, now White House "chief of staff," probably would slip into the same spot he occupied three years ago—that of close personal adviser and constant companion to Eisenhower, and the chief contact between the President and the national committee.

Campaign advisers: The GOP's top strategist, . . . There is reason to believe that such political experts as Rep. Richard Simpson of Pennsylvania, chairman of the house GOP congressional campaign committee, and Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona, head of the similar senate committee; Sen. Everett Dirksen of Illinois; Sen. Frank Carlson of Kansas; Rep. Walter Judd of Minnesota; Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell, Jr.; Postmaster General Summerfield; Secretary of the Interior McKay, and others.

Another Eisenhower campaign would be designed to give more help to GOP congressional candidates than in 1952. The Republican thinking at this point is that Eisenhower can be reelected without much trouble—but the main problem will be to elect a Republican congress.

Have there been any discussions at the White House about a campaign organization in the event Eisenhower runs? "Nothing formal," one source said. "There's really no need to discuss it yet. If Ike runs, then all Sherman Adams has to do is push a button and summon most of those who were in the 1952 campaign. The others can be brought back by picking up a telephone."

What about the remarks by Eisenhower that younger men should be groomed to take over the top responsibilities in government? Did he mean that Vice President Richard Nixon should be groomed to take over his job?

The man across the desk grinned: "There's been talk of grooming the younger man for Ike's job. But you notice that nothing has been done about it."

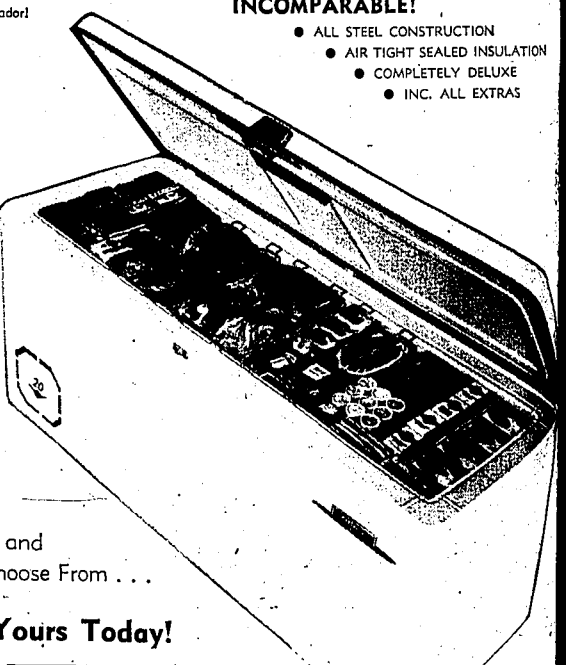

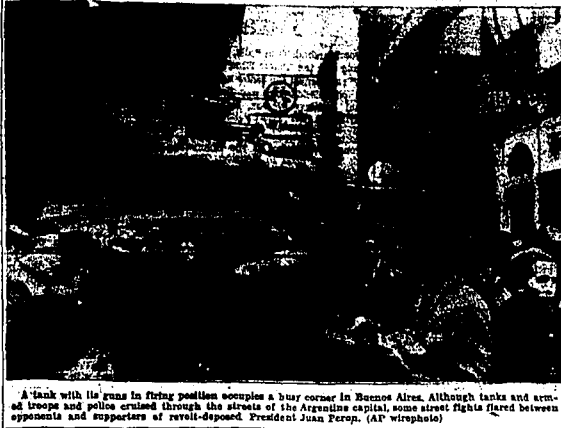

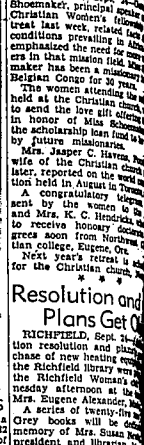

## Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Idaho is going to have a new tourist attraction, partly through the efforts of a TWIN FALLS man.

Walter Blaylock, through associations with John Goddard, California explorer, was introduced to travel on "white water" last year when he took a trip down the Colorado river in a rubber boat. The trip convinced him Idaho, with some of its unspoiled rivers, should have as much to offer as the Grand canyon.

Mrs. and Mrs. J. R. White, Los Angeles, who have been running boat trips on the Colorado river for a number of years, became convinced Blaylock's convictions might bear investigation and planned three trips this summer for Idaho rivers. To show his faith in what Idaho has to offer, Blaylock signed up for all three trips.

The first trip was on the middle fork of the Salmon river, the second on the river of No Return and the third was through Hells canyon on the Snake.

Even though the three trips were of an exploratory nature, the Whites had no difficulty "recruiting" crews. Eleven persons took the trip down the middle fork while nine each were on the River of No Return and Snake river trips.

As a result of the trial runs, Mrs. and Mrs. White plan to run boat trips on the three rivers every summer.

By comparison to the Colorado river trip, none of the three Idaho trips is as dangerous although there are three rapids in Hells canyon that will equal or surpass anything on the Colorado. Mrs. White said Beauty, however, is the drawing card for the other two trips.

The first crew left McCall on Aug. 22 by airplane and flew to Indian creek on the middle fork. The equipment brought in by airplane included even the rubber boat.

Another appeal of the middle fork trip, Mrs. White explained, is the remoteness of the area. She said few persons get that far back in Idaho's wilderness. The middle fork is not a rough river and the water is not deep. The current is swift enough to carry rubber boats along at a fast clip. The trip was planned

for seven days but Mrs. White said future trips will take only five days. The trip ends at the River of No Return as the second trip begins. This one, originally designed for eight days, will be cut to seven in the future. Mrs. White said that both the middle fork and the River of No Return run through high canyons and that the fishing on the middle fork is especially good.

Although the Whites have been running trips on the Colorado river for a number of years, Mrs. White said she saw most wild game on one trip down the River of No Return then she has seen in all her trips on the Colorado. Much to their pleasure the travelers saw three black bear in their eight days on the river.

For the Hells canyon run, the boats were put into the river at Robinson and came out at Lewiston. This trip, planned for five days this year, will be reduced to four as soon as regular runs are set up.

Of the three trips, Mrs. White said the Snake river is the roughest and probably would be better suited for travelers who want excitement rather than scenery. None of the three is what she would call dangerous, though, and the crews experienced none of the "dunkings" river boaters usually receive in descending the Colorado.

Blaylock was dumped from his boat a couple of times but the tumbles were caused by sudden twists of the boat while he was fighting rather than by the swift water.

"The water in the middle fork is too recommended for bathing," he said. "It's too cold."

Conversely, several hot springs were encountered along the River of No Return.

In contrast to the cold water on the middle fork, the water in the hot spring is so hot, it isn't recommended for bathing either," Blaylock said.

### Big Game Hunting Popular; Laws Help Animals, Hunters

By The Associated Press  
Who says that the average man who dreams of big game hunting had best stick to dreaming? Right now, this fall, he can hunt in more states than he can't. Yes, big game, too: bear, elk, moose, wild boar, turkey, wild sheep, mountain goats, just name a native species.  
And one variety or another is within a comparative easy reach no matter where the hunter lives, from New York to Los Angeles and Seattle to Miami.  
There's only one catch, and it's a familiar one: In some of the handiest places, you'll find that most of the nation's 16 million hunters have decided to hunt the same spot at the same time, from the woods.  
There's still plenty of wild country, of course in the United States and Canada. If you wanted solitude badly enough, in Alberta, for instance, you might hunt any or all of the big game varieties mentioned from now until Dec. 31 and not be seen by another hunter even if you looked for one.  
But the big problem for hunting and game managers alike has been the ever-increasing pressure on

available lands and available game populations.  
What may be the eventual answer has been evolving in the western states during recent years. It is controlled hunting, and it means more sport and better sport, but for fewer hunters at a time.  
This is the way it works: In Arizona, Wyoming, Montana, Utah or Idaho, for instance, the wildlife experts decide how many antelope or buffalo or elk can be harvested from their herds and still maintain the balance between the number needed for breeding stock and the carrying capacity of the range.  
Then permits are prepared for the surplus number of animals, and hunters may apply for them. When all applications are in, a drawing is held, and the lucky hunters have the same range to themselves for long, comfortable hunts. Because the managers want the surplus animals harvested, some of the seasons stretch out into months to assure hunter success. In the case of exceptionally rare harvests like those on buffalo and moose, successful permit applicants aren't eligible to try again for a period of years.

## AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

*"Forgiveness is a Two-Way Street"*

Pastor, Valley Christian Church

One of our problems in religion is to forgive those who do not forgive us. For instance, all my life I have been taught that it was a sin to forgive anyone who had wronged me. I have found that certain people who are stiff-necked and pride-filled and they are not conscious that they need forgiveness at all. Therefore, even though I tried to forgive them I did not succeed.

The very love that is inherent in Christian teachings also presented a problem that seemed insoluble. For I was to love everyone. That meant I was to love a bully and the one on whom he was being bullied. But how could I love a bully who was harming one smaller than himself and protect the defenseless individual at the same time? My first reaction is to stop the unequal encounter but that takes physical violence against the bully who I must love and forgive.

The answer, of course, is that I have misunderstood the meaning of Christian forgiveness. I cannot forgive anyone by myself. Forgiveness is not a one-way street but a two-way street. There must be forgiveness on all sides but on my part at all times but I cannot forgive unless there is a penitent, humble person seeking my forgiveness.

The prodigal son could not be forgiven by his father while he remained in a far country living in selfish independence. Only when he turned to his father and repented and found fulfillment and forgiveness in his father's presence could Jesus forgive whenever possible, but with the Pharisees and the Sadducees who were pride-filled, always right, never penitent or humble, hard as nails, crust as hell, he said it is better that a millstone be hanged about his neck, and he be cast into the sea.

Again he said, Whited Sepulchre, outwardly appearing beautiful, but inwardly full of dead men's bones, and of all uncleanliness. So you outwardly appear righteous to men, but within you are full of hypocrisy and iniquity.

Jesus was not forgiving here but it wasn't because he did not want to forgive but because there was no penitence on the part of those stiff-necked Pharisees.

That he was willing to forgive is proved by the last Verses of this twenty-third chapter of Matthew. Here we find him saying, "O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, killing the prophets and stoning those who were sent to you! How often would I have gathered your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you would not! Behold your house is forsaken and desolate. For I tell you you will not see me again, until you say, 'Blessed be he who comes in the name of the Lord.'"

So when those who are so against him can claim him as their savior they are forgiven, but they must come to him penitent.

Many times we say Jesus forgave the cross but this is not so. He prayed that his Father would forgive them for they know not what they do. He could not forgive because they were not penitent. But when they were penitent then he wished his Father to forgive them.

Yes, the Christian attitude is to forgive and forgive, for Jesus' objective in all cases, was the redemption of the lost. But even He had to resort to harsh words and to a card as a lash when evil remained unpentent. Repent of your sins that Jesus' willingness to forgive might find expression and release.

Each of us need both a willingness to forgive and a penitent spirit for from time to time we will be on different sides of this process.

Sometimes we will be the forgiven but other times we will be the forgiver. And Jesus said the measure you give will be the measure you receive.

Forgive men their trespasses and I will forgive you your trespasses. So it behooves us to constantly have the spirit or willingness to forgive in our hearts.
