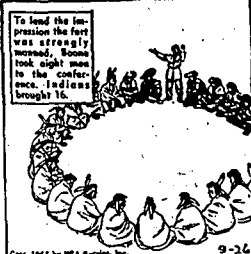

Ike's Illness Raises Question Of Who Will Take Over reins

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP)—President Eisenhower's illness has raised an ancient question: Who runs the government when the President is ill?

The Constitution provides that the powers of the presidency "shall devolve" on the vice president in case of the chief executive's death, resignation, or "inability to discharge" the powers and duties of his office.

But no legal body has ever decided what constitutes "inability" to handle the presidency. Nor who shall decide when a President is in such a state.

It was disclosed yesterday by White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty that the problem of finding someone to make decisions for the President, if he becomes "incapable," is under consideration.

Hagerty has asked Deputy Attorney General William P. Rogers for an opinion on "any action that might be necessary at any time for any delegation of powers by the President and if any are permitted."

Hagerty disclosed his action when asked what would happen if Mr. Eisenhower was not able to sign necessary official documents, or if his physicians refused to let him sign them.

Corn Silage Gets Top Crop Status

BOISE, Sept. 26 (AP)—Corn silage, which now utilizes about 16,000 acres in Ada and Canyon counties, is becoming a major crop for beef cattle feeders and dairymen in the Boise valley area, two county agents reported today.

Herman Huffer and C. D. Bechtold said production of hybrid corn for conversion to silage has grown rapidly during the past 10 years in the two counties.

Last year, they said, there were 6,500 acres of corn grown in Canyon county and another 7,000 acres in Ada county.

Fallout Gives Science Clue To Air Waves

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP)—There is some good news in fallout, the evil byproduct of nuclear explosions. It has given science a new tool, in the form of airborne radioactive tracer atoms, for mapping atmospheric movements which are the basic writers of weather.

The new tool already has been used in the United States. It will be used again during the 1955-56 International Geophysical Year (IGY) to help determine the role of the stratosphere in weather. America plays in generating the world's weather.

It will help settle among other things a scientific controversy over whether the Antarctic air is an atmospheric island, isolated off from the rest of the world, or whether it is a vital part of a grand circulation system affecting the entire planet.

When nuclear weapons go off, they spew into the air vast swarms of radioactive atoms whose course can be followed by ray detecting instruments. Such atoms, released during this year's tests in Nevada and monitored by specially equipped aircraft, have given meteorologists new information about trajectories of the winds which blow across the continent from west to east.

According to Dr. Harry Wexler, chief of the weather bureau's scientific services division, precise knowledge of such air movements at various altitudes is essential to understanding and predicting weather.

Scientists believe that both polar regions play a dynamic part in a massive worldwide circulation of air that possesses a momentum-to-momentum of energy equal to nearly seven million Hiroshima A-bombs.

The energy machine that keeps the earth's 5,000,000,000,000,000 (quadrillion) tons of air in constant motion is the sun. Sun-heated tropical air flows toward the poles. Displaced polar air flows back toward the tropics.

Both movements are transformed by the earth's rotation and contour into complex currents of which the weather-causing winds in any one hemisphere are but local eddies.

Speed-up Slated On Pipeline Job

BOISE, Sept. 26 (AP)—The Pacific Northwest Pipeline corporation has speeded construction work on its pipeline which is scheduled to bring natural gas to Washington next year, officials of the firm reported today.

The report said 75 per cent of the needed right-of-way from New Mexico through Oregon had been obtained for the line, and the firm has acquired about 11 per cent of its Washington right-of-way.

However, no right-of-way through Adams, Lincoln and Spokane counties in Washington had been acquired.

Rains, Floods Cover Central Parts of U. S.

Rain fell from the Mississippi to the Rocky Mountains today and heavy floods broke through several Texas cities.

The rains in Texas were the heaviest in nearly a year, measuring up to 10 inches from the Red River valleys' midsection southward to the Gulf of Mexico.

Thousands of persons were evacuated from their homes, and a heavy snow cover in the Ohio and Alabama were under as much as five feet of water. The maximum run-off also posed a flood threat in south Texas, where warnings were posted along the Sucre river and the Rio Grande covered the International bridge at Del Rio.

In Seattle, the death toll in the windward islands rose to at least 104. The storm, carrying top winds of 110 miles per hour, was roaring through the open Caribbean sea today, aimed in the general direction of the Gulf of Mexico.

In the west Pacific, the strongest typhoon of the season grazed the Philippines, and the storm's winds took off aimed at Tokyo. The storm packs top winds of 150 miles per hour.

The young autumn season was getting off to a brisk start in the country, producing high average temperatures from New England through the Great Lakes and across the plains into the Rockies.

The accompanying rains took the form of snow at times, with a heavy snow cover in the north on the ground at Lander, Wyo. A twin-engine C-47 twin-engine plane, flying from Cheyenne, Wyo., killing all seven airmen aboard.

Examiner William C. Costello issued his initial report. The initial decision became, in effect, a recommendation after the case was appealed to the commission, which heard oral arguments July 8.

An FPC staff official—not a member of the commission—was asked by a reporter to compare the handling of the Hells canyon case with other major cases of comparable nature.

He reported:

A decision in the Roanoke Rapids, Va., case was reached in nine weeks, compared with 11 weeks in the Hells canyon case. The time lapse between the decision and the order for the former case was three days, compared with a week in the latter case.

In the New York Power Authority case, involving the B. Lawrence river, the FPC reached a decision in eight weeks and got out an order in five days.

The calendar in the Kings River, Calif., case shows an examiner's decision was filed Dec. 3, 1948. The FPC issued a license Nov. 8, 1949, a rehearing was held March 2, 1950, and a modified license finally issued Dec. 19, 1951.

The official said the time shows a wide variance in the time lapse between the decisions and orders. In many cases the orders are issued within a few days. In others not for weeks.

In one Montana Power company case the time lapse was nearly 10 weeks.

Although the lapse in the Hells canyon case was seven days, commission employees had only five days to work on the order because a week-end was included.

Attack of Ike Is Reviewed By Specialist

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—(The) specialist said today that the news from President Eisenhower's medical room added up, from the medical viewpoint, to very little news.

They spoke not in criticism nor in praise, but in detail and in detail and in detail about the incapacitating illness of the 68-year-old president.

This area, medically, is an infarct.

If the area of dead and dying tissue is not too large, it often "heals" and the heart muscle functions effectively. Dr. Paul D. 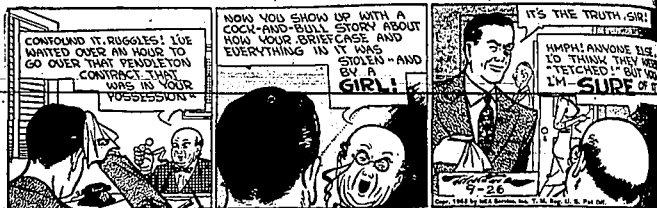
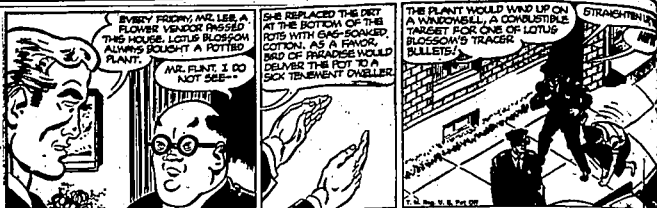

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Saarland Will Soon Be New Tense Region

A tiny pocket of territory nestled between France and Germany is likely to become the hottest spot in Europe soon. It is the Saarland, most prosperous and most thickly populated area of Europe. Its people are German speaking and of German stock.

Into its 9,000 square miles 960,000 people are crowded—958 to the square mile. Its wealth lies in its coal fields.

Saarlanders are to vote on Oct. 23 whether to give themselves a "European" status pending the final signature of a German peace treaty. They vote "yes" they will open a new chapter in their history, which dates back to Roman times.

Remaining has been under French since July. It has been getting steadily more heated. There have been some violent anti-Communist meetings and there may be more.

Leading the fight for Europeanization is party, Jovial Johannes Hoffmann, who is the Saar's prime minister.

Hoffmann also is foreign minister, minister for European affairs, public works minister, reconstruction minister and minister of education.

Opposing are the leaders of three pro-German parties including Heinrich Schneider, unrepresented in the Bundestag. He is showing him in a brown-shirt uniform in Berlin in 1954.

The Saar vote is being held in pursuance of an agreement made between West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and Pierre Mendès-France, then premier of France. Adenauer has appealed to the people of the Saar to vote for Europeanization in the interest of European unity. At the same time he opposes Hoffmann personally. He says the Saarlanders after accepting the new status can throw Hoffmann out and elect a new government.

The Saar has been tied economically to France since the end of World war. Its importance to France lies in its enormously rich coal mines which fit in with the iron mines of French Lorraine.

The French-Saar tie would be maintained if Saarland accepted European status. But the Saar would be governed under the auspices of the western European union. The WEU is the framework within which West Germany allied itself to the west.

It Saarlanders vote "yes" in the plebiscite it will be a personal victory for Hoffmann, the avowed newspaper editor who fought the German made history for years and tried to stall during the war to escape the Gestapo.

Hoffmann is a strong believer in complete European economic cooperation. A most unpretentious man, he plays cards with a group of old friends each Friday night at a hotel in Saarbrücken. His nickname is "Jomo." He has been threatened with death for his views on the Saar's future. But he does not frighten easily.

Nazi Admiral Gets Release From Prison

BERLIN, Sept. 26 (AP)—The four occupation powers today released former German Grand Admiral Erich Raeder, 70, from Spandau prison because of his age and health, a British spokesman announced.

Raeder, who planned the invasion of Norway, was sentenced to life imprisonment as a war criminal and placed in Spandau prison with other top Nazis.

He was sentenced on Oct. 1, 1946 by the four-power international military tribunal at Nuremberg.

His impending release was announced by a four power communique which said:

"The governments of France, the Soviet Union, the United Kingdom and the United States of America have decided to release Erich Raeder from Spandau prison on Sept. 26 on account of his advanced age and the state of his health."

A British spokesman announced shortly afterward the aged admiral had been freed.
