There's only one in the orchard. Many fruit growers, fearing a late frost last spring, did not thin out the blossoms. When the frost didn't come, the branches became loaded with fruit. The result is that some of the apples this fall will be smaller than usual although full flavored and with plenty of color.

Jack Price, manager of the Pacific Fruit and Produce company here, said the crop of apples in Magic Valley really will be a "bumper crop." He said, too, that peach growers in the area experienced an especially beautiful year. Not only did they have a large crop but they had a market for the crop.

Peaches in 17 states were destroyed by frost, setting the scene for profitable returns for Magic Valley growers, he said.

Some fruit growers here have peaches to harvest and the demand for fuzzy fruit is high, good in Magic Valley and just about everywhere, he said.

Full Story of Ike's Illness Not Yet Told

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—The full story has yet to be told of what happened over a span of almost 12 hours between the time President Eisenhower suffered a heart attack in Denver and the time he was taken to a hospital.

So far, only scanty reports have been given the public about the hours of his illness. Physicians say they are puzzled and somewhat mystified by the chronology of what took place.

After the tracings were taken and the heart attack confirmed, why the President permitted to walk with assistance, to walk downstairs from a second floor bedroom, across a porch, down another flight of stairs, and then into the hospital.

Other doctors questioned on this point gave the same reaction: Surprise that the President had been allowed to exert himself by walking even with assistance—when it was known he was suffering from coronary thrombosis.

There is speculation here that perhaps Eisenhower himself refused to be carried from the home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. John S. Ford, and placed in an ambulance.

There was some speculation, too, that an initial effort was made for political reasons—to minimize any seriousness of the President's case but that it soon became impossible.

Airline Plans Jet Flights in Service Soon

NEW YORK, Sept. 27 (AP)—Eddie Rickenbacker, who learned his flying in the lumber woods, announced today Eastern Airlines is moving into the jet plane age and will be flying 500 mile-per-hour transports by 1957.

Rickenbacker, board chairman of Eastern, said the airline would spend \$20 million dollars for new equipment in the next five years and that 125 million dollars of it would go for 20 huge jets capable of flying from Chicago to Miami in two hours.

Rickenbacker said that Eastern had not yet made a final choice on the jet transport it will buy. He said the company was still studying the Boeing 707 and the Douglas DC-8.

But Eastern has specified a giant jet-liner capable of accommodating 80-100 passengers on luxury flights and up to 130 on aircraft flights.

The \$100 million dollar expansion program was said by Eastern to be the largest ever undertaken by any airline in the history of aviation.

WASHINGTON—Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey wants to check the current inflationary movement for fear that the "Eisenhower property" will be inflated by the Republican campaign in the eve of next year's presidential election. As always, politics as well as economics, influence decisions on money, credit and tax policies.

Both Humphrey and federal Reserve officials are concerned over a high boom in mortgage and short-term credit accounts—which are winding up within a few weeks. There has been nothing like this phenomenon in American history.

It presents no threat under present conditions of high wages and employment, but it could become a policy-economic calamity in event of a contraction of the business situation.

MILD RESTRAINING PRESSURE—Both treasury and the federal reserve have brought mild and indirect pressure on banks and brokers that have raised redoubtable rates, increased the amount required for down payments on homes, and shortened the terms of mortgages. But these checks have had only slight effect.

"The money managers at Washington do not want to make it last longer. Here are the political conditions behind their decisions:

DANGER OF UNABATED CURRENT TRENDS—If current trends continue unabated—that is, excessive lending, spending and investing—the economic structure may become shaky later this year or in 1939. BUSINESS TO THE RESCUE!

For a long time, many in the business community complained that the government was doing too much for the average citizen in the way of welfare programs. They objected to the government's expansion into new fields.

But a telling point in reply was made by the late Russell Davenport, sometime magazine editor and associate of Wendell Willkie. He once declared that businessmen might have forestalled this expansion if they had taken the initiative themselves in welfare matters.

It is extremely heartening to observe, therefore, that the country's business leaders have not been found wanting in their response to a great new national need.

On the contrary, they have leaped into the critical breach with imagination and intelligence, and already are making an important contribution toward the preservation and growth of America's colleges.

The plight of the colleges, particularly those which live on private endowment, is serious. Postwar inflation has rocketed their costs and lessened the purchasing power of their endowment income. Their traditional sources of new money, bequests from personal fortunes, have tended to dry up as heavy taxes blocked the further building of such accumulations.

Some of our greatest institutions are numbered among these private schools. The crippling of their facilities, or of the ability of qualified students to attend them, would severely handicap America in its efforts to help advance the frontiers of knowledge.

The government is an obvious source of funds, and indeed actually is allotting considerable amounts to U. S. colleges for research in special fields.

But the nation's top educators have feared further government support as probably signifying political control. In the interests of surviving and yet preserving academic freedom, they have appealed to the great corporations as the last potential source of funds.

Best of all, a high proportion of the grants have been without strings, leaving the schools free to spend the money, as they see fit.

But college needs in this next decade are enormous in the billions, and annual business contributions now come only to around \$10 million dollars. What our business leaders have started so well they must greatly enlarge upon if America's colleges are to match the country's growth and stay free.

WATERFRONT STRENCH

The recent activities of the dockworkers' union, the International Longshoremen's association, like those of past years, are a perfect example of how not to conduct a labor organization.

Wildcat strikes, work stoppages engineered in defiance of court authority, vendettas against legally constituted administrative bodies, these are just some of the devices the country has known.

It is worth recalling that in 1953 the American Federation of Labor tossed the I.L.A. for refusing to rid its ranks and leadership of corruption. Though the union has changed a few top men since then, the AFL still does not welcome it.

In the intervening years, the lawmakers of New York and New Jersey enacted a tough law designed to cope with dockside crime and racketeering in New York City, where the union's worst depredations had been concentrated. And they set up a bi-state waterfront commission to carry out the law.

The I.L.A. now is bucking this commission, pretending that it represents a dictatorial rule over the union's activities. In truth, the union leadership is enraged because the new law gives the waterfront agency the chief power once exercised by the labor bosses—the right to control dock hiring.

Investigation showed that union hiring agents took "kickbacks" from workers they put on, padded payrolls, hired criminals and other undesirable. They also connived in rackets sometimes joined in by waterfront employers.

Lately the union has been trying to bypass the waterfront body by appealing to the governors of New York and New Jersey to hear its grievances against the commission. After some shilly-shallying, they refused to undermine the legally established commission.

Next the I.L.A. spread a strike order all along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts, in an obvious effort to drag in the federal government. Washington failed to rise to the bait.

Chief union gains in the settling of the latest strike was a "face saving" promise of a citizens' committee investigation.

The I.L.A. is suffering continued ostracism from the ranks of legitimate labor organizations. It deserves to be more and more penalized for its flagrant defiance of authority.

Unhappily, it is not only the union but the huge port of New York that is suffering. Recent labor law suits have put the port to a halt. It has driven millions of dollars worth of business away from other less troubled ports—most of it unlikely ever to return.

If the I.L.A. does not soon right itself, there will be far less dollars either to steel or earn fairly in the great port where it has fastened its ugly rule.

PLUCK FOR AUTO HORNS

Every man and woman comes up with an idea that contains the seeds of pure genius and promises to be as big a boon to mankind as the toothpick industry. In fact, the man who has the idea, who is so far, so often, from being a genius, keeps up all from being what dead in all.

Such an idea comes from the Covington (Ky.) newspaper, which suggests that auto horns ought to be made of wood. The idea is that wood, being a natural material, would be more readily accepted by the public than the metal horns now in use.

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Such an idea comes from the Covington (Ky.) newspaper, which suggests that auto horns ought to be made of wood. The idea is that wood, being a natural material, would be more readily accepted by the public than the metal horns now in use.

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Illegal Killing Of Big Game Hurts Expert

By ROBERT MUSEL
Nairobi, Kenya, Sept. 27 (AP)—An expert on the big game of Africa says that the elephant is being killed for its ivory at a rate that will wipe out the animal in 20 years.

The expert ground from the horn of the elephant is believed to be the most valuable of all the big game animals in Africa because of its use in the manufacture of ivory. In other parts of the world, the ivory is used for the manufacture of piano keys and for the carving of ivory that is part of the trade of the East.

So eastern merchants are financing the primitive tribes who do the killing. The ivory is then smuggled to the coast where it is sold to the world market. It is estimated that the ivory trade is worth \$100 million a year.

The expert says that the ivory trade is the most important source of income for the primitive tribes who live in the interior of Africa. He says that the ivory trade is the only way in which they can get their goods to the world market.

Typhoon Rips Two Jima Base

Illness of Ike Could Be Aid To Stevenson

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—Democratic campaign strategists predicted today that Stevenson's illness will boom Adlai Stevenson's presidential chances and help the party keep control of Congress.

The strategists gave their predictions primarily on the basis of the conviction that Mr. Eisenhower's illness will prevent him from being a candidate next fall.

While a candidate next fall, Stevenson would have a Democratic opponent in running. The Democratic strategist said some potential Republican candidates for the house and Senate will be reluctant to take on a candidate who has been in the hospital for so long.

As for Stevenson, these strategists said he would win the election. But the withdrawal of the challenger is certain because of Stevenson's heart ailment—leaves Stevenson as the man to beat, they said.

These Democrats, party professionals who have not been Stevenson's supporters, also are of the opinion that Stevenson's illness may, by making the back-breaking physical demands of the presidency, do some good for the ambitions of New York Gov. Averell Harriman. They point out that Harriman is only a year younger than the President.

2 Solons Open Debate Series On Dam Plans

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Sept. 27 (AP)—"Agreed: The John Day Dam bill is the public interest," was the topic debated here last night by two members of Oregon's congressional delegation.

Representative Coon, R., Ore., who introduced in the last session of Congress a bill calling for "partnership" construction of the proposed 1,150,000 kilowatt Columbia river project argued the affirmative case for 15 minutes.

Then Senator Neuberger, D., Ore., who favors federal construction, took the negative side. The debate resulted from Neuberger's challenge to Coon last April after Coon had accused Neuberger of not reading or of failing to understand the bill.

Heart Attacks Not Fatal for U. S. Leaders

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—No U. S. President ever has died of a heart attack while in office. Of the seven who died in office, three were victims of an assassin's bullet, two died of pneumonia, one of typhus and one of a massive cerebral hemorrhage.

They were: William Henry Harrison, died a month after taking office, on April 4, 1841, of pneumonia.

Zachary Taylor, died of typhus, July 9, 1850.

Abraham Lincoln, died April 15, 1865, a day after he was shot by John Wilkes Booth.

James A. Garfield, died Sept. 19, 1881, more than two months after he was shot by Charles J. Guiteau.

William McKinley, died Sept. 14, 1901, eight days after he was shot by Leon Czolgosz.

Warren Harding, died of pneumonia, Aug. 2, 1922.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, died of cerebral hemorrhage, April 12, 1945.

U-I Enrollments Above 1954 Mark

MOSCOW, Sept. 27 (AP)—Fall enrollment at the University of Idaho started yesterday and it appeared the predicted five per cent increase in students this year will be exceeded.

Shortly after noon, the number of registered totaled 3,312 and many late registering students and all graduate students were still to go through the lines.

Last fall, the total at the end of two weeks of registration was 3,249.

Prospecting-Happy World Is Good Place for Burro Owner

If I only had a place to keep them, I'd start buying up burro as fast as I could, in the hope of cornering the burro market, you know.

If such a scheme strikes you as foolish, then you're a bore. You're a bore in the times, much less a step with them.

Not since the days of the old gold rush, when every body and his brother took to prospecting in the earth, has prospecting been so hot as it is today.

And when you think of prospecting, what else do you think off? Burros, of course. They go with prospecting the same way Debbie goes with Eddie, hot and polka with gravy and promises with politicians.

All prospectors need burros. They need standard equipment, every bit as vital as a beard, a frying pan, and a pickaxe. Let a man go out to prospect with a burro and he would have thousands and thousands of prospectors at his mercy.

A man with acres and acres of burros wouldn't have to worry about the prospecting fever dying down. The search for uranium and other riches shows no sign of slackening and if it did, science is sure to keep coming up with demands for new products of nature.

As proof of that, I quote Alexander Greenfield, research director of a company working on nuclear power for airplanes. The big problem, it seems, is to protect the occupants of the plane from radiation without using lead or other heavy materials.

Experiments are being made with hafnium, Greenfield said. "This is a rare earth, one of the best absorbers of neutrons yet discovered. But so far as has been determined, hafnium is not plentiful."

It is only a question of time until people get hafnium happy. As soon as word gets around that hafnium is needed, and will bring a big price, the woods and hills will respond to the picks of the hafnium hunters. And they'll all need burros, with the exception of the very few who can afford jeeps and helicopters.

As soon as enough hafnium is found there'll be a cry for another critical material, hafnium, maybe or hafnium. Or hafnium. Or hafnium.

We're in an age where there's no telling what will turn out to be vital.

Boise Plant Is Ordered to Hold Labor Election

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—The national labor relations board said yesterday it has ordered a collective bargaining election among employees of Swift and company as its last unit in Boise, Ida.

OBAN, Scotland, Sept. 27 (AP)—The west-to-east section of the first trans-Atlantic telephone cable system was completed last night.

The final splice was made aboard the British cableship Monarch and linked Newfoundland and Britain by submarine telephone cable.
