### Nixon Image Of Power Is Fading Away

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 (AP)—The image of Vice President Nixon as a strong, energetic president during the first days of President Eisenhower's illness — is fading fast.

Administration officials, after looking around, have decreed that the political reality of the situation is that the vice president has no greater authority today than the President's heart attack.

Nixon has been promoted to a position of new prominence because he is first in line to the death or incapacitation—but only his legal position remains unchanged.

The fact that Nixon is not in a position to make final decisions is given by law to the President was underlined by today's setting of the national security council in which Nixon assumed the role of presiding officer in the absence of the President.

The council came into being in 1947, during the administration of Harry S. Truman. The National Security Council is the government organization that sets the policy of the United States and appraises the objectives, commitments, and risks of the United States in relation to our national and potential military power, and the national security.

The purpose of making recommendations to the President is to coordinate the policies of the various departments and agencies of the government in connection with the national security.

### Theoretically, Doctors May Pick Men Prone to Heart Ills

NEW YORK, Sept. 29 (AP)—It is theoretically possible for medical scientists to pick out a person whose name may have a heart attack like President Eisenhower's.

The rub is that medical science after putting a finger on that person while he was in excellent health, wouldn't know precisely what to do in order to head off the attack.

The authority for these statements is Dr. Paul D. White and his associates in one of the most thoroughly detailed studies of coronary arterial disease ever made, a study which has the marks of a classic.

Dr. White is such an eminent heart expert, it will be recalled that he was called in at once when the President was stricken. The results of the study were published only last year and are not known outside of medicine.

He and his associates found so many significant clues that they felt justified in the "hope" that for every man who has a heart attack is not far distant when doctors "grow" to heart attacks but will be able to prevent those persons from having them.

As of now pre-selecting is theoretical, not practical. However, the study seemed to demonstrate that neither smoking nor drinking nor diet has much if anything to do with preparing the person for the attack. Indeed, there was no one thing or a few, simple things, to pick out a person who is likely to have an attack, one would need to take all the following things into consideration and balance them against one another:

- (1) That person's sex, which would have to be masculine—out of 100 coronary blockages, 98 to 97 are in men; (2) His body build; (3) The structural details of his body; (4) His heredity; (5) How his body chemistry deals with its own chemical products, such as fat, especially a fat ingredient, cholesterol, and uric acid.

### Tunisia 'Deal' Is Victory for Cairo League

CAIRO, Sept. 29 (AP)—France's new deal for Tunisia and similar results promised for Morocco represent a victory for the Cairo North African Liberation Committee.

Composed largely of exiles, the committee includes representatives of independence parties of Morocco, Algeria and Tunisia. Formed in Algiers in 1946, the committee's aim is independence for all North Africa. In practice, however, its members have adopted a common attitude with France toward the road to freedom.

When as a group of exiles who fled from Tunisia in 1946, the committee has set up a world-wide propaganda machine which has maintained liaison with resistance groups inside their respective countries and have stirred their propaganda with frequent uprisings across North Africa.

The committee has had centers various times in New York, London, Paris, Pakistan, India and elsewhere. The Arab press and radio have given strong support that he would announce willingness to accept renunciation.

The Tunisian wing of the committee has practically disappeared on Cairo following the French unilateral convention granting local autonomy and formation of the first Tunisian cabinet.

### Sky Scanner Used to Map "Hot" Clouds

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 23 (AP)—A new kind of telescope can tell you the size, shape and potency of some radioactive clouds, an atomic energy commission scientist has said.

Named the Sky Scanner, it sweeps the sky and pulses every time an X-ray from the cloud strikes its eye. The resultant pulses are used to draw a picture of the cloud, and its direction.

The scanner was described to the American Chemical Society by Dr. O. Victor Beard, director of the health and safety division in the AEC's Idaho operations office.

Scanners, used in groups of two or more, are proving extremely useful in helping track movements of radioactive clouds of radioactive fumes coming from the stack of an atomic reactor at the national reactor test site in Idaho, he said.

They can be used to calculate how fast the clouds are being diluted as it is carried away by wind. A safe rate of dilution can be checked. As more atomic power plants arise in the atomic age, this checking could help keep radiation at harmless levels.

The scanners wouldn't be much if any help in tracking radioactive clouds from atomic bomb tests. After a bomb cloud has traveled a very short distance, its radioactivity is so diluted that it would be below the level the scanner could detect.

At a distance of a mile the scanner would have to be looking at X-ray activity equal to 13 pounds of radium, in order to see it, Beard said.

The eye of the scanner is a small sodium iodide crystal mounted in a tube of lead an inch thick and a foot long. The tube can be moved automatically to make full coverage of the sky.

Pulses created when X-rays hit the crystal eye are amplified and recorded to draw a kind of chart indicating size, shape, X-ray intensity and direction of the cloud.

BOISE, Sept. 23 (AP)—U. S. highway work will be widened and streamlined for nearly four miles along the Salmon river north of Rigby, the state highway department announced yesterday.

State Highway Engineer Earle V. Miller said the project would cost about half a million dollars. The announcement came in an official notice to contractors calling for bids on the project.

Miller said the project would be for construction of the roadway and a surface treatment. It will connect with a construction project completed last year.

### Large Prune Crop Is Left Still on Tree

EMMETT, Sept. 23 (AP)—Idaho prune growers are leaving much of their crop on the trees because of labor shortages and a poor market, but market prospects for the apple and late peach crops are good, said a manager of the Gem Fruit union said yesterday.

"Prices on apples are starting off very good," George Yost told a reporter, "and late peaches probably will be good. The prune market has picked up a little, but there aren't enough pickers."

Earlier, employment security agency officials in Boise had predicted that Idaho would have enough farm workers to harvest the fall crops with little trouble, barring unseasonably cold weather.

Yost said the peach harvest in the Emmett area was just about over. "The Elberta crop didn't bring very much return, but the Jales were good," he added.

He said virtually all packing houses in the area were now operating again. Some closed down last week because of the depressed prune market.

Because of the labor shortage and low prices, he said, "if a grower had prunes and apples both, he just quit his prunes and went into the apples."

In Boise, A. C. Beeman, chief of research and statistics for the ESB, said some "pool shortages" might arise in the prune, apple and seed crop harvests of southwestern Idaho because of workers leaving about next week for steady work in the potato fields of central and eastern Idaho. But these shortages, he added, are not expected to be serious unless cold weather prompts farmers to rush the market.

In Twin Falls, Jack Price, manager of the Pacific Fruit and Produce company, predicted a "bumper" crop of apples and a bountiful year for peach growers in Magic Valley. He said peach growers expected a market for their large crop because peaches in 17 states were destroyed by frost.

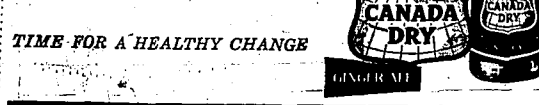

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 (AP)—Administration officials here today said President Eisenhower will be well enough by the end of the year to referee any administration arguments over new programs to be presented to Congress next January.

On the basis of past experience, experts said the chief executive's first hand will be most needed in the final stages of fiscal 1957 budget planning, preparation of new legislative programs and the state of the union message.

The budget was given as an example. Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey, in a budget-balancing mood, has taken a dim view of heavy foreign aid expenditures. Last year he was displaced by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, Principal Aid Chief Harold G. Stassen, and to some extent by Defense Secretary Charles W. Wilson, who had an agreement with a new Alan aid program.

Mr. Humphrey stepped in and settled things. Both sides gave a little and a compromise was reached. Experts believe that Humphrey this year will be in a more influential position than in any previous year.

The problem has not come up yet. Experts of all government departments are working overtime on their dollar requests for the 1957 fiscal year. But this work is on a preliminary level. It has not reached the point of requiring final decisions within the state, defense or other departments.

This situation was acknowledged by White House Press Secretary James J. Hagerly in Denver. He pointed out that government business, because of the time of year, is at a point where many matters that eventually will come before the President are in the preparation stage. Normally, he said, these matters would not come before the President for decision until possibly December.

This situation is particularly true because of the way the President operates the administration. He follows the army principle of staff work. Recommendations start at the bottom and come to the top, for the most part, only after they are ready for decision.

### British Governor Will Visit Peiping

HONG KONG, Sept. 29 (AP)—The colonial government announced today that Hong Kong Governor Sir Alexander Grantham will pay an unprecedented visit to neighboring Communist China next month.

The announcement said the trip will be a "strictly private visit." Grantham and his wife will be guests of the British chargé d'affaires in Peiping, Gen O'Neill, for about eight days, the government said.

Britain, one of the first major powers to recognize the new government, has maintained a charge d'affaires in Peiping for several years.

### Defense Chief Doesn't Favor Added Slashes

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Wilson was reported yesterday to have concluded after a new survey that it would be militarily unwise for the armed services to cut their spending any further this year.

Informants said Wilson had assured Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey and Budget Director Rowland Hogue that the defense department would continue every effort—"look under every log"—for more economy, as Humphrey has asked all government departments to do.

But they said the Pentagon chief also informed the administration's fiscal leaders that the only way savings approaching a billion dollars could be brought about in the military establishment would be by:

- 1. Cutting down the numerical armed forces strength, called the "force level."
- 2. Reducing contracts for planes, ships and other weapons and equipment.
- 3. Through a combination of both.

Wilson took the stand against a further cutback in spending after reviews of the situation with each of the service secretaries, top military commanders and his own fiscal experts.

### Colonel Sued By 2 Airmen For 'Slander'

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 29 (AP)—Two enlisted airmen who have sued a colonel for slander for spreading the rumor that they had received scores of letters from other GI's applauding their action and some offering money for their suits.

The \$10,000 damage suits were filed by Alvin J. John P. Croman, West Lynn, Mass., and Alvin J. Lewis, Marysville, Pa., against Lieut.-Col. Walter Callahan, New York City.

They grew out of an incident at Tinker air force base near here last July 6. Callahan's attorney has filed a motion to dismiss the suits and Federal District Judge W. A. Wallace is expected to rule within 10 days or two weeks.

Both Croman and Lewis said they had been admitted to no harsh discipline or different treatment since they filed the suits against Callahan.

"Our own officers always treated us okay," Croman said. "The enlisted men on our barracks are all trying to do the same thing. We were right and urging us to go ahead."

Friendship shown  
Callahan, they said, had been friendly toward them since the incident that triggered the suit. He was transferred earlier this month to Westover field, Mass. The air force said he requested the transfer prior to August because of the ill-will of his wife and son.

The slander action accused Callahan of curbing the two airmen in the presence of other persons.

According to Croman's petition, Callahan told him "You (obscenities) don't do anything but ride around on your fat (obscenities)."

Miller's suit accused the officer of saying: "You (obscenities)" with no provocation on the airman's part.

Details Given  
Croman says the incident occurred when he and Miller were serving as air police. He was on duty and had inspected Miller's post at the hangar entrance when Callahan came out and ordered him to move a jeep parked there.

Croman said he replied: "I'm sorry, sir. I am not authorized to do that vehicle without a trip ticket." That was when Callahan lost his temper and allegedly cursed the soldiers.

Brooded Over Incident  
Croman said that neither he nor Miller replied to the officer's remarks. But he brooded about it and decided to consult an attorney about his rights. He was advised he could bring suit for slander under the soldier's and sailor's relief act.

The airman said most of the letters they have received are from servicemen who encountered the same situation but were unaware they could do anything about it.

Croman, a Catholic, said he had no particular convictions about use of profanity, but "I just don't think an officer should address an inferior in that manner," Miller, Methodist, agreed.

- 1. Avoid self-diagnosis. You can save yourself needless fear and anxiety by having a general check-up at least once a year. If there is something wrong with your ticker...
- 2. Avoid over-exercising, particularly if you're over 40. Strenuous activity can't hurt a healthy heart, but there is a real threat when the heart is diseased or damaged.
- 3. Avoid over-fatigue. Get enough rest and proper vacations. Get heart works around the clock. When you rest, you place a lighter work load on the heart.
- 4. Avoid over-weight. Eat sensibly. Excess weight puts extra work on heart and blood vessels.
- 5. Avoid and treat respiratory infections promptly. Statistics show there is a 13 per cent increase in deaths from heart, circulation and respiratory diseases during the coming cold months. That's because pneumonia, bronchitis and the like put a heavy strain on the heart and circulatory system.
- 6. Avoid worry. Don't burden yourself with needless anxieties. Particularly if you have heart disease, don't worry. It won't help.

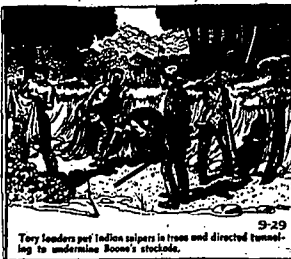

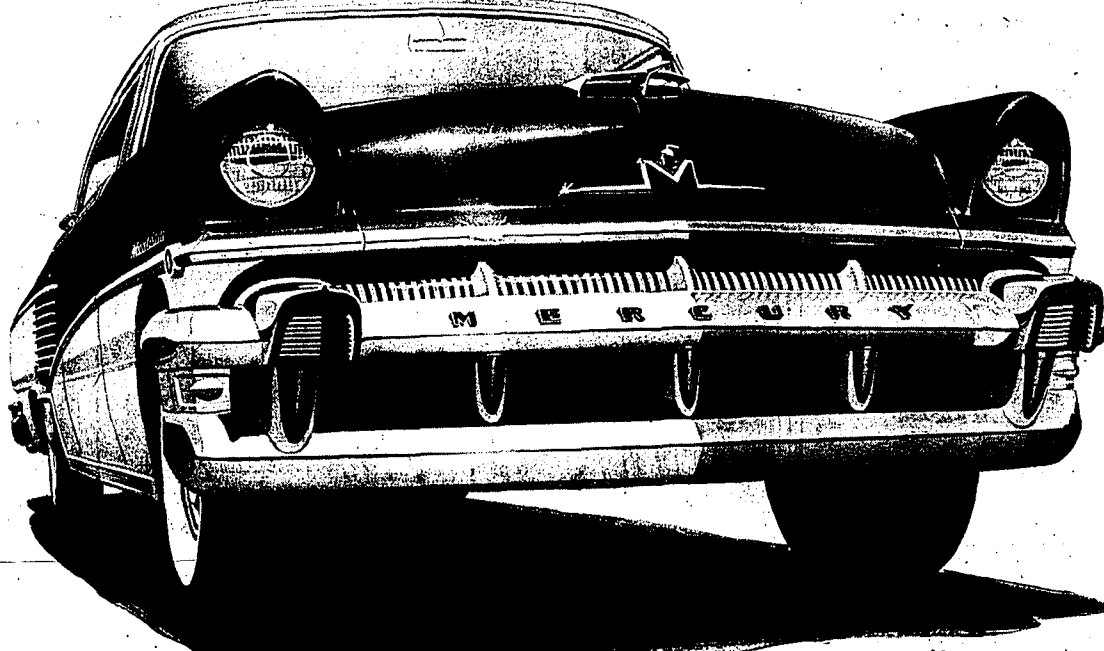

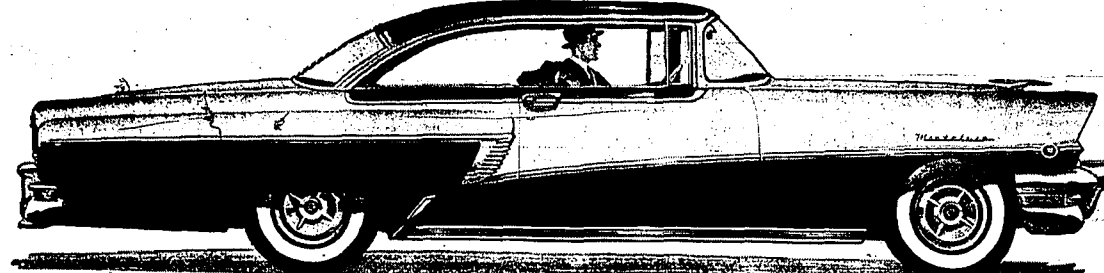

### Top Specials Are Cited on Cuts of Meat

Housewives will be pleased with what they find in the meat sections of the nation's food stores this week-end. Prices on many cuts will be down from a week ago and there will be unusually good buys on a couple of items.

The emphasis will be on pork. Wholesale prices on that meat came down quite a bit last week, and now the food store operators are passing these lower prices along to consumers.

Loins of pork will be a particular favorite as a week-end special. They will be down four cents a pound in some stores and even more in others.

Pork chop prices are being cut nearly everywhere, with reductions averaging around four to six cents a pound from a week ago.

Other pork items mentioned as specials by a number of stores: Smoked picnic, fresh ham and pork shoulder roast.

Broiling and frying chickens are going to be prominently featured, too, and some markets will have special low prices. There'll also be specials on stewing chickens. Prime rib prices will be about the same, but a few stores will have a little extra.

Legs of lamb will be unchanged or a bit lower in price. There will be some good buys in lamb chops.

Beef prices will be up a couple of cents in some regions and down a bit in others. The same will be true of butter.

Potatoes, onions, eggplant and peppers are the best buys in vegetables. Produce men comment that the small and medium size peppers offer the best value.

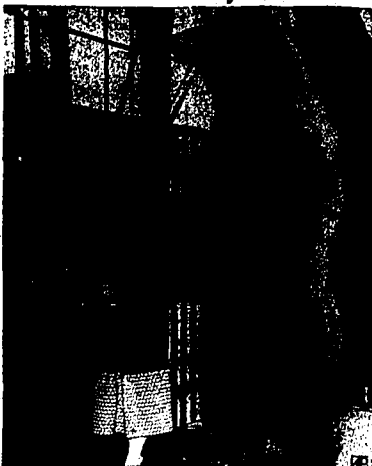
Lettuce is back in the list of good buys. Others: Escarole, spinach, sweet potatoes, cabbage, cauliflower and topped beets, cauliflower. Corn is in lighter supply and good quality ears are somewhat higher. Cucumbers, carrots and squash are moderately priced.

Apples are an outstanding buy in fruit. Almas are cheap and prunes are reasonable. Cantaloupe prices are about the same as a week ago while honeydews are higher, with a wide range in price.

Peaches are not too plentiful. Quite a bit of riper stock is coming to market and can be picked up at reasonable prices for immediate consumption.

Fruit specialists rate oranges, grapefruit and lemons as moderately priced.

### New York Is Opening Plan On Sanitation

NEW YORK, Sept. 22 (AP)—Ever since novelist Edna Ferber returned from a European visit in 1953 and remarked that New York was a "sacch on the face of our country," city fathers have been making sporadic but not too successful attempts to clean up the metropolis.

There had been other drives for civic cleanliness prior to Miss Ferber's stinging remarks but they too had bogged down in the mire of public apathy.

Another campaign—probably the most ambitious to date—is now under way. It began in the dirty wake of still another "keep our city clean" drive that started March 16 and finally petered out despite a first tough policy that marked its inception.

During that campaign, the city fined some 50,000 persons more than a quarter of a million dollars for violation of sanitary laws.

The latest effort to retake Miss Ferber's 1953 claim that streets were covered with garbage, parts of the city were rat-infested and Central park was unfit for a self-respecting goat is based on the theory the public must be educated.

To do this the sponsors have planned a vast advertising program headed by the slogan, "A Cleaner New York Is Up to You."

Newspapers, radio, television and other media have been asked to contribute \$1,000,000 in advertising space for a nine-month period beginning Oct. 1. The Young and Rubicam Advertising agency will run the campaign as a public service.

The Yanks did all the arguing in the game. The most violent protest was registered by catcher Yoni Berre on Jackie Robinson's steal of home. Jackie got in ahead of the pitch, but Yoni thought he slid wide of the plate.

Billy Martin got caught trying to steal home in the sixth and when he jumped out of the dust, it was difficult to tell whether he was mad at catcher Roy Campbell, umpire Bill Summers or himself. He finally walked off calmly.

Yankees' catcher Yoni Berre, who had been in the game since the first inning, was hit in the head by a line drive from Duke Snider, who had hit a home run since Friday, and "I feel fine, but I'm just in one of those slumps that hit everyone."

The slump ended abruptly in the third when the Duke smashed one of Ford's offerings into the right field seats.

The theory that Snider can't hit lefties is far off. He has done just as well against them as he has against right-handers.

When Robinson hit his triple, it was painfully apparent how much he has slowed down. He had to slide to beat the throw, a couple of years ago, he might have tried to stretch it to a homerun.

His steal of home merely proved the old saw that you've got to get the jump on the pitcher, which he certainly did.

Incidentally, it was Robble's 13th steal of home in his career and the ninth in world series competition. Last player to do it was Monte Irvin of the New York Giants in 1951.

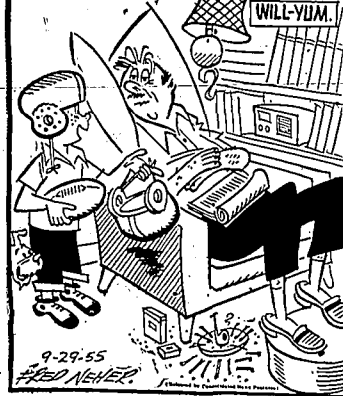

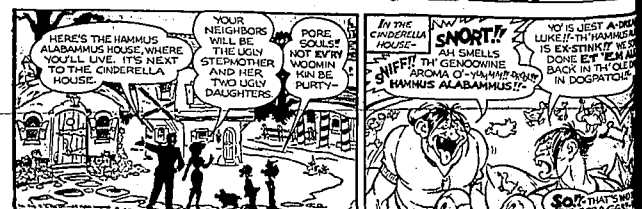

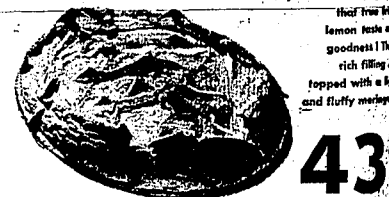
