Salk Planning New Tests on Polio Vaccine

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 1 (AP)—Dr. Jonas E. Salk, discoverer of the polio vaccine, said today he plans to test a number of polio vaccine preparations that appear from laboratory tests to be somewhat more potent than those he worked with heretofore.

"It is not a new vaccine," emphasized the 48-year-old Pittsburgh bacteriologist. "Our prime purpose is to make the vaccine 100 per cent effective. To reach that goal it will be necessary to conduct a series of experiments similar to the studies on disease."

Dr. Salk said the tests will be made within the next few weeks in certain selected Pittsburgh schools on children enrolled in kindergarten or the first three grades. He made the disclosure in an article published by the Allegheny Medical Society.

"We are still trying to work out the most effective way to use the vaccine," said Dr. Salk. "We want to obtain information on antibody status in all children who were inoculated one or more times."

Dr. Salk said for the tests blood will be drawn from the finger tip of the youngsters to determine the presence or absence of antibody for each type of polio strain.

"Some persons have antibody, other do not," said Dr. Salk. "The object of these studies will help us evaluate the composition and levels of potency that will produce the highest proportion of individuals with antibody after a one or two dose course of primary immunization."

Draft of Youth In Work of CD Deemed Likely

BOSTON, Oct. 1 (AP)—A draft of the nation's youth may be necessary to strengthen civil defense because of "public apathy," according to Federal Civil Defense Administrator Val Peterson.

Peterson told the fourth annual conference of the U. S. Civil Defense Council "public apathy in an emergency attack upon the United States is widespread" and that the country can no longer rely upon the support of civilian volunteers.

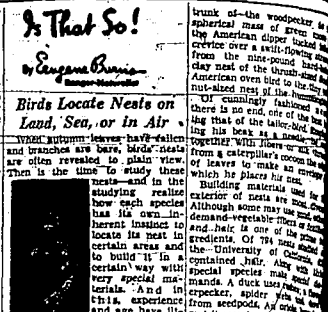

The broadcast made no claims of damage inflicted on the U. S. jets. It said they intruded over Taingtau and Hachiba island, then returned and flew over Taingtau area north northwest of Taingtau city. It said they then split into two groups.

According to the radio, patrol planes of the Chinese people's liberation army intercepted the four jets and they were fired upon by anti-aircraft batteries.

"The jets then flew off in a southeasterly direction from Taingtau," the broadcast said.

Pre-Typhoon Flames Level Nippon's City

TOKYO, Oct. 1 (UP)—Dying typhoon looses struck Japan a final staggering blow today with a wild whiplow fire that burned the heart out of Niigata city, 270 miles north of Tokyo.

A small fire that began with a short circuit at 3:10 a. m. was turned into a raging inferno within minutes as 45-mile-per-hour winds ripped Louisa's outstanding gusts drove the flames through downtown buildings and houses.

It was Japan's worst fire since the World war II air raids. Before it was brought under control seven hours later, the fire had devoured 1,200 buildings and destroyed an area totaling almost 100 acres.

Fire-was Japanese fled quickly and although scores of injuries were reported, only one person was listed as seriously hurt in sketchy reports from the stricken city.

Police said nearly 5,000 were homeless. They were getting help from the government and also some from the U. S. air force's new Boeing Nigata air base.

Rain started at 8:30 a. m. and the falling winds gave firemen a chance with 50 engines and dynamite to get the blaze under control.

The typhoon, dropping to storm force, raged over Hokkaido, Japan's northern island, at 45 miles per hour with winds falling to about 75 miles per hour.

In the last three days the giant storm has killed 31, left 41 missing, injured 1,000, and left a total of more than 197,000 are listed as homeless.

Retail Sales Expected to Set New Top

NEW YORK, Oct. 1 (UP)—October retail sales volume is expected to set a record \$13,000,000,000, up nine per cent over the same month of 1937, says management magazine said.

For the first eight months of 1938 retail sales volume is higher than in the same period a year ago, and all nine points to an even higher percentage gain during the final four months, the magazine said in its monthly forecast.

This fall does repeat the pattern of last year when the introduction of new automobile models coincided with the normal fall retailing buildup.

Sales Management said that strong sales expected report better than average performance for this October as compared with October, 1937, are Alabama, Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Idaho, Michigan, and Mississippi.

Vessel Rescues Plane and Crew

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1 (UP)—The freighter Harry Culbertson was rescued for San Pedro, Calif., today with a disabled Catalina flying boat, and the four crewmen who were picked up at sea 530 miles southwest of San Francisco yesterday.

The aircraft was hoisted aboard with only slight damage after pilot Clark Dixon, Danville, Calif., landed it unaided next to the freighter despite dense fog and waves. The plane was in route from Guam to Oakland, Calif., when one of its two engines cut about 100 miles east of Honolulu, too far out to turn back.

After it was clear he did not have enough fuel to reach Oakland, Dixon leaped the freighter's position by radio and landed near it while coast guard and six life-raft rescue-planes circled overhead.

Regional General Sets Idaho Tour

BOISE, Oct. 1 (UP)—The recently appointed commanding general of the sixth army area, which includes Idaho, will visit the Gem state for the first time Tuesday.

He is Lieut.-Gen. Robert N. Young, who has his headquarters in San Francisco.

Capt. Webster Parker, public relations officer for the Idaho military district, said Young plans to confer with Gov. Robert E. Smylie and inspect Idaho-military facilities.

Other speakers at the afternoon general address were Elder Spencer D. Jantz, H. O. Bingham, chairman of the council of trustees; Elder Eldred G. Smith, patriarch of the church; Elder Milton R. Hunter of the first council of society; and Bishop Carl W. Buchner, second counselor of the presiding bishopric.

New Idaho Plant Begins Working

The official, who did not wish his name disclosed, said he would like to see the record total of consumer borrowing were smaller. But he emphasized that "the public is improving."

The federal reserve board has reported that for the fourth straight month consumer borrowing hit a new all-time peak, reaching \$32,000,000,000 on Aug. 31. Of this amount, \$13,547,000,000 represented loans made to buy new and used automobiles.

It was the eighth month in a row that the volume of new loans for cars rose by a record amount.

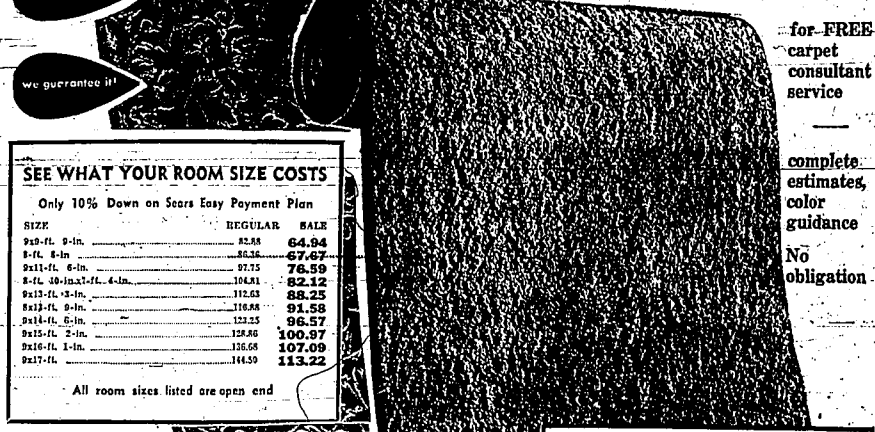

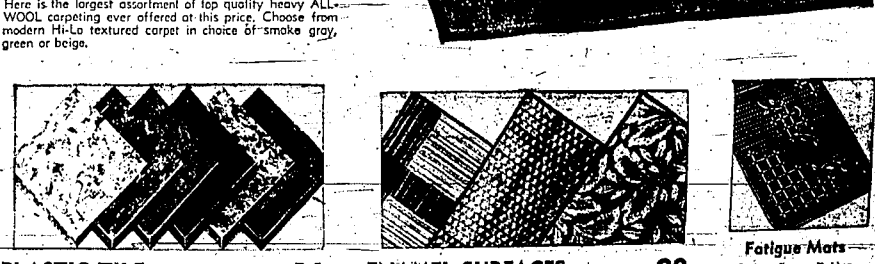

Zoning Rules Loom as T. F. Voting Issues

men obtaining more and better facilities for recreation and improvement of the town program as proposed by the Twin Falls planning and zoning commission. The planning and zoning commission has recommended the establishment of neighborhood shopping centers outside the downtown area.

Commenting on the shopping center issue, Koutnik said Saturday that in his opinion the prosperity of suburban shopping districts will contribute to the prosperity of the city as a whole. The Citizens Progressive party, he stated, is in favor of Twin Falls commercial and industrial development.

"Twin Falls is growing in spite of itself," Koutnik asserted. "We are not certain in the long run whether Twin Falls, and we must decide whether Twin Falls is to grow from a look into a city in an orderly and planned manner, or whether we are going to permit the chaotic, sprawling development evident in other cities where planning was not undertaken."

Newsday stated: "Twin Falls was created to serve the agricultural area around it and the service that Twin Falls businessmen can offer farmers and stockmen must keep pace with Idaho's agricultural development."

Haney stated Saturday that most of those who are opposing suburban shopping districts in Twin Falls do not know what such shopping districts look like.

"Modern, big shopping centers are attractive, small business communities that are planned to be part of the residential areas in which they are situated," Haney said.

One of the chief opponents of the Citizens progressive party's stand on neighborhood shopping centers is Kenyon Green.

"Apparently changes are necessary as cities grow larger," Green said, "but I am not completely satisfied that the changes so far outlined in Twin Falls will prove satisfactory in the long run. Considerable more study is necessary."

"I am opposed," Green continued, "to converting beautiful, beautiful streets into shopping centers. Commercial avenues into pass-ways—main streets—A-bellies—a way can be made to meet the needs of a growing city without damaging its city entrances which often bring pride to the citizen."

Also opposed to "unlimited" commercialization in Twin Falls is L. Z. Bartlett, chief of the fire department. "I believe the biggest part of our shopping area should remain downtown," he said. "I should prefer to see the downtown shopping center developed in an orderly and planned manner."

Loren, running for reelection, stated that he favors zoning laws which will protect the home-owner's property from the infringement of business. "When the population of Twin Falls increases by another 20,000 I will be in favor of a shopping center such as is proposed for the development. At the present time, however, I oppose a large shopping center as close as I would like to the downtown business district. With a population increase of 20,000, a shopping center a mile east and a shopping center of the city might prove more practical."

Contrary stated that "if the people of this neighborhood shopping centers, that's what they should have." He added that when those who are opposing the shopping centers "have proved they are needed" he would support them. "Meanwhile," he said, "I am viewing the question with an open mind."

"Olson stated, 'I have not had the opportunity to talk to a sufficient number of home and property owners and the business interests when the establishment of neighborhood shopping centers would affect. In my opinion, city commission candidates are run on behalf of the people, not for any one faction or group.'"

Burkhardt, now a member of the city commission, said that he was "in no position" at this time to come out for or against the proposed shopping centers.

"I am in favor of anything that serves the good of the community," he stated. "We have appointed members of a planning and zoning commission to make recommendations and I believe they have done a good job. I might not personally approve of some of their recommendations."

Fire Prevention Week Slated In Twin Falls Starting Oct. 9

A. F. Nelson, chairman of the city board of commissioners, has proclaimed Oct. 9 through 15 as Fire Prevention week in Twin Falls.

"Thousands of fires and hundreds of millions of dollars in property are lost each year through fire and fire prevention programs have proved effective in communities throughout the nation," Nelson called upon the citizens of Twin Falls to "organize effective programs in their homes and businesses for reducing the needless waste caused by fire."

A committee under the chairmanship of Donald Somers has been set up to assist the fire department in making the public conscious of the fire hazards in their homes.

Fire Chief L. Z. Bartlett reminded citizens that if the residents of the area "affected favored them" they would "approve them." "I have no bones to pick with anyone; this is my home and my first concern is the welfare of the people of Twin Falls."

In response to inquiries on his views on the shopping center issue, Bartlett said that he had "no comment at this time."

Boyd stated that he favors neighborhood shopping areas to a certain extent. He associated that traffic congestion in the downtown district makes it necessary to establish outlying shopping centers.

"I am in favor of shopping centers in the Lynwood development and in the area of Shady's market," Boyd said. "I believe that the present growth of the city is such that it can support both the downtown district and outlying shopping centers."

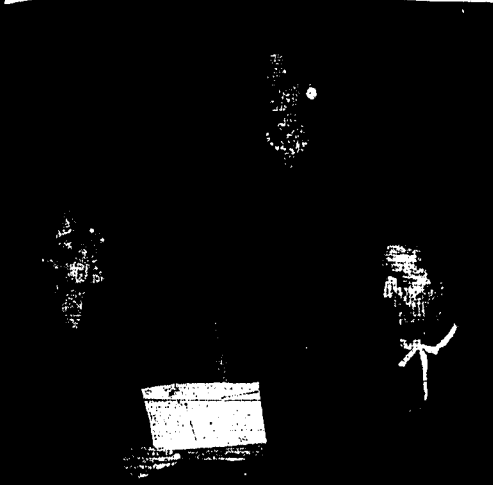

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—The chairman of Americans for Democratic Action said today it would be "cruel (and) cruel" of the Republicans "to pressure" President Eisenhower into standing for reelection.

Chairman Joseph L. Rauh told the New York City chapter of ADA that "no man, particularly one who has served this country with such outstanding devotion for so long, should be asked to endanger his life in public to satisfy the clamor of greedy politicians."

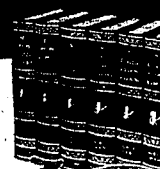

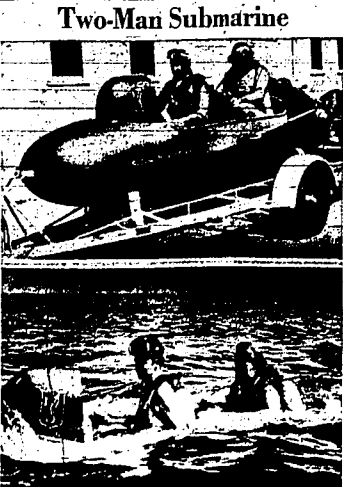

Experts Giving Advice on Means to Minimize Chances of Heart Attacks

NEW YORK, Oct. 1—How can you care for your heart, to minimize your chances of a heart attack? Living a full, active, good and sensible life may be a main rule.

No experts can lay down "sure hard and fast rules. Not enough is yet known about the fundamental cause of the heart-attack process.

But they do have tips. And some authorities are finding good reasons to doubt many of the beliefs most of us hold about heart attacks. Beliefs such as these:

"That exercise is bad, and after 40 you should stop work down."

"That tense business executive are most likely to sudden death from heart attacks."

"That most heart attacks follow exertion—golf, tennis, shoveling snow, the dramatic incidents you read or hear about. Instead, half of all attacks appear to come during sleep and resting."

"That we should blindly follow the advice to 'take it easy' to avoid heart attacks."

"That hard work kills you."

"That playing golf on Friday had anything to do with President Eisenhower's heart attack the next day."

You can easily find differences of opinion among heart experts. Here are some of the challenging new viewpoints:

Dr. Paul White, famous Boston cardiologist who attended Eisenhower and speaking of golf's going:

"My own feeling is that golf has been often wrongly blamed, that those who play golf and have an attack at 45 if they hadn't played golf. We don't think that exercise itself is responsible."

"In fact, I am of the impression that it really helped to delay the onset of this attack than to cause it. Of course, very severe accidents or strains may have a precipitating effect, but they aren't the fundamental cause."

In a talk a couple of years ago, Dr. White said:

"The general warning to stop all vigorous exercise at 40 seems to me to be ridiculous and, more likely than not, actually lead to an increase of coronary arteriosclerosis."

"This is the disease process in which fatty deposits form in the inner lining of arteries, narrowing them. Heart attacks usually come when a blood clot is trapped in such arteries and blocks the flow of nourishing blood to the heart muscle."

Heretofore, Dr. White has said, plays a part. There's some evidence that too rich a diet can be involved. Aggravating factors may include excessive, prolonged nervous tension, excessive overweight, excessive tobacco use.

As positive measures, he mentioned conscious effort to acquire equanimity, habits of relaxation and repose, and a program of health exercise."

Dr. Arthur M. Maaser, well known New York City cardiologist, says:

"Be your age. If you're 60, don't act 40."

Avoid obesity. Avoid excessive

smoking and drinking. Avoid infections, and if you get them, knock them out with wise drug treatment. Be physically active. After 40, take less strenuous exercise. But don't choose inactivity.

Studying 1700 persons who had coronary, Dr. Maaser and his associates found 52 per cent of attacks came while these people were sleeping or resting; 21 per cent at ordinary mild activity; nine per cent in moderate activity, except for walking; 16 per cent in walking; and 2 per cent during unusual or severe exertion.

As for occupation, the analysis showed attacks occurring "with equal frequency in all types of occupations and all types of society."

Dr. Theodore G. Klumpp, president of a New York pharmaceutical firm:

"We don't wear out. We run out. To run is to appear the—major evil is the excessive decline of physical, mental and emotional activity in adult life in relation to what it was in youth."

His opinion is that common sense activity to keep all body organs and glands working efficiently combats aging and combats development of the artery disease process.

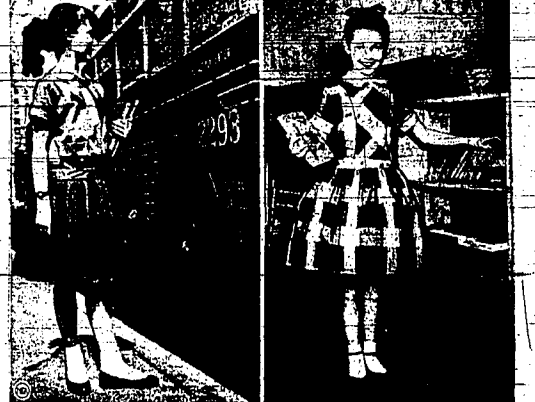

Mamie Bears Strain Under Bedside Vigil

DENVER, Oct. 1 (AP)—Mamie Eisenhower, who had a heart condition herself, apparently is bearing up well under the strain of maintaining a round-the-clock vigil near her husband's bedside.

Doctors are keeping an unobtrusive watch on her, too, to make sure that she doesn't overtax her strength.

Mrs. Eisenhower hasn't left Philadelphia Army hospital—and has no intention of doing so—at least another week—since the President was taken there after a heart attack last Saturday.

She has a room directly across the hall from the chair, and there are no other patients on this floor.

Every day for four times a day, Mrs. Eisenhower crosses the hall. Sometimes it's just for a chat. Sometimes she has breakfast or lunch from a tray while sitting in a chair.

Doctors have been reading to the President a bit. Presidential Press Secretary James B. Hagerly told news writers that Eisenhower hasn't been reading any newspapers but the first lady has sometimes read to him.

Mainly, he said, it has been "editorials expressing the hope of the President's speedy recovery."

Along with the papers, Mrs. Eisenhower has been reading to him President Kennedy's and other well-known messages that have delighted the White House—from over the world. When the messages arrive, Hagerly said, many of them are relayed to Mrs. Eisenhower and "she will pick out some" to read in whole or in part to the chief executive.

Among them, Hagerly said, were messages from such Soviet leaders as Premier Nikolai Bulganin, defense Minister Georgi Zhukov and Communist party chief Nikita Khrushchev.

Apple from members of the family, the doctors, and White House and hospital staff members, the President is having no visitors. But occasionally a secret service man sticks his head through the door to say "hello."

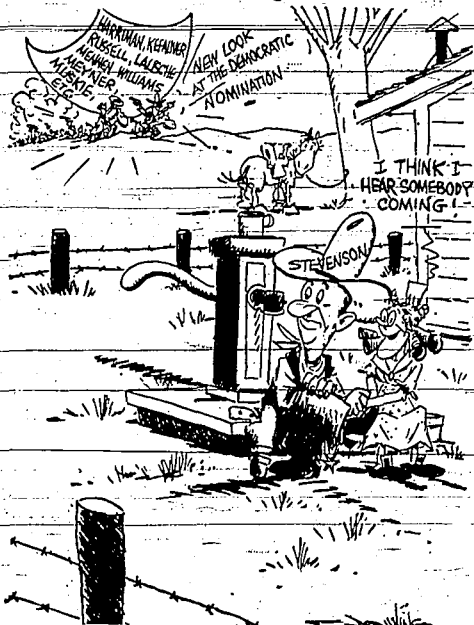

President's Inactivity May Cause GOP To Alter, Revise Basic Farm Programs

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (AP)—The possibility that President Eisenhower may not run again has cast an air of uncertainty around future Republican farm policies.

Political and farm leaders generally agreed that as long as the President occupied the party driver's seat, most Republicans would stand firm behind the new farm program Congress wrote into law at Eisenhower's request.

This law features flexible farm prices supported as contrasted with Truman's era high, rigid supports, greater dependence upon farmer initiative and greater governmental efforts to boost farm markets.

The GOP program has been under sharp attack by Democrats and some Republicans who contend it is inadequate to assure prosperous conditions for farmers. Recent declines in farm prices and income have injected the program into the preliminary skirmishing for next year's presidential campaign.

But now that Eisenhower's illness may keep him from seeking reelection and even from exercising a vigorous role in determining future party policies, there is speculation that the Republicans may change their thinking on the farm issue and come up with new policies designed to prevent a possible farm vote revolt next year.

By the same token, the position of Ezra Taft Benson as secretary of agriculture would appear to be somewhat weakened by the political possibilities of the President's death.

Should President Eisenhower die, a slide against seeking reelection, Benson and his programs doubtless would face much stronger opposition within the GOP than at present.

While agreeing that perhaps the present party farm policies might be a handicap in next year's election, many GOP leaders had taken the position that Eisenhower's popularity would carry the party to victory again anyway.

But should the Republicans have to turn to someone else for their standard bearer, there undoubtedly would be a strong demand within the party—particularly from militant farm belt Republicans—that the party greatly modify the programs so as to make them more appealing to farmers.

The next two or three months could well be critical ones for Benson and his program. Even while Republicans were going on the assumption that Eisenhower would be their candidate again, the party leaders—including those at the White House—had reached the conclusion that emergency or temporary measures would be needed to strengthen farm income before voting time had year.

Week before last, Secretary Benson announced that specific recommendations would be submitted to Congress to accomplish this, but he indicated that there would be no abandonment of present policies. He indicated an attempt might be made to boost farm income by paying

farmers subsidies to take surplus land out of crop production. Heavy surpluses were blamed for farm income declines.

"The recommendations promoted by Benson must be agreed upon before the end of the year. If they are to be laid before Congress at the beginning of the session, it is quite conceivable that these recommendations may have to be arrived at without the President's active leadership. It appears possible that his physicians may pressy insist the President's activities for weeks ahead—a development which could well leave to others the final making of decisions on farm matters.

In this connection, reports circulated that Benson would like to see a new administration take over the reins of power. It is possible these reports might exert stronger influence on Congress, with Eisenhower on the sidelines, than if he were actively engaged in administration policy-making.

JAKARTA, Indonesia, Oct. 1 (AP)—The threat of red rule over Indonesia's 70 million people appeared to end on the heels of a vote in the country's first national elections. The Communist party was running a poor fourth in Jakarta.

Though it will be weeks before the nationwide results are known, the Muslim National party took a strong lead in returns from the capital and several big cities in the central island of Java and the island of Sumatra.

The nationalists were running second in Jakarta, but were reported taking the lead in the city of Bandung in west Java, with the Communist second and the Muslim third.

The Communist headquarters here was claiming a landslide in Socerabala and a sizable lead in central and east Java, which were regarded as red strongholds, but there were no actual returns to substantiate the claim.

Indonesia, sixth most populous nation of the world comprising the sprawling islands of the former Netherlands East Indies, opened the voting Thursday, but the election machinery moved slowly. The voting was for 200 members of parliament. It will continue in stages throughout the 3,000 islands making up the republic.

One More "R" for Education Urged By School Chief

POCATELLO, Oct. 1 (AP)—Alton B. Jones, state superintendent of public instruction, told a district teachers convention here that in education as well as everyday life, a fourth "R" was necessary to the three R's—Responsibility.

"You can have reading, writing and arithmetic but cannot have them all unless you can fasten responsibility all the way through the classroom and into the higher units of government," he said.

Jones said he believed the committee education conferences which were called by Gov. Robert E. Smylie in preparation for the White House conference on education have been an acceptance of lay responsibility.

"A person may have all these attributes—and—many—wrong—and—headed for destruction just as this blind man. Now—let's take a look at the word, salvation. My dictionary defines it as "deliverance from danger or evil, especially from sin and penalty." There it is in plain English!
