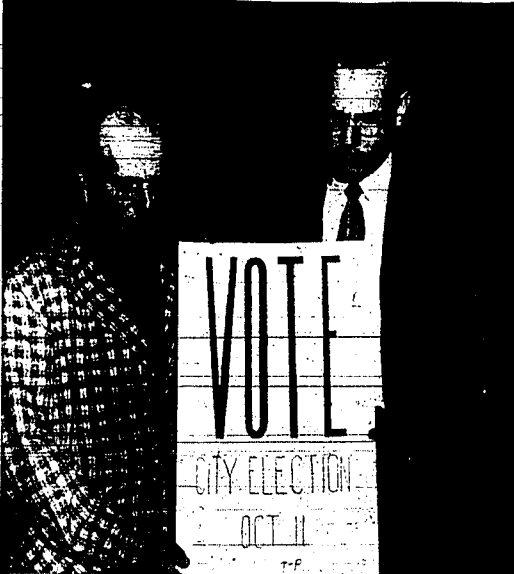

Sun's Energy Tapped to Get Power Yields

AMERIGUOUS—On Oct. 3, an engineer flipped a switch here and turned the energy of the sun into the operation of a telephone system.

This was man's newest victory in his efforts to tap the inexhaustible source of all the energy at his disposal and put it to use turning the wheels of his industries.

By the time the morning sun had risen over this town 135 miles south of Atlanta, Bell Telephone engineers had completed installation of a square frame-like thing atop a power pole. The gadget, resembling from the front a big coin slot card, was a solar battery.

The battery, first successful device for converting the sun's energy efficiently into electricity, contains 43 silicon cells. Each of the cells converts as much as 11 percent of the energy it receives from the sun directly into electricity.

It converts a 3,000-watt amount of light—a candle or a flashlight will act the silicon cells to making power from the flame.

Israeli Envoy Attacking Arm Deal by Reds

UNITED NATIONS, Oct. 4 (AP)—Israel protested vigorously yesterday against the deal by Arab negotiators to transfer the Golan Heights to the Arab state.

Embassador Abba Eban, Israeli chief delegate to the U. N. assembly, said the deal for the Golan Heights is a "concocted bargain" in weapons of death.

"In the name of our region's threatened security we are moved to appeal to all peace loving states to avoid rewarding Arab belligerency with arms," Eban said, "disturbing the military balance on which the peace of our region has been generally reached for more than 20 years in the closing round of general debate in the assembly."

"It is indeed hard to comprehend how any government which values its moral position can give or sell arms to governments whose primary international objective is to harass, beset, intimidate, and if possible destroy a neighboring state with which they refuse to establish peace."

Eban said Israel stands at the heart of the middle east crisis. He urged the Arabs to join Israel in regional harmony and co-operation.

The Arab answer was given by Ahmad El-Sukaiti, Syria, who accused Israel as "imperialism." He said that Israel "is a state has no room in our lands."

Smylie Slates Meet to View Issue of Age

"There are individuals in every community who have real concerns about problems of environment, recreation, health and all of the factors affecting the development of children," he said. "There are also many such individuals who have advanced and a desire to do something about the problems of the aging. There are innumerable other stimulus of interest and concern to our citizens."

"Some of these good citizens are organizing themselves in representative communities and merit all of the encouragement and help you can give them. Others have tried to offer and need only leadership and guidance to become active and effective."

Insurance Firm Agrees to Halt Misleading Ads

BOISE, Oct. 4 (AP)—State Commissioner of Law Enforcement Earl S. Koehler said yesterday that the Idaho manager of the Farmer's Insurance group had agreed to halt what he called a "very misleading" type of advertising.

He told newsman he had contacted Honore S. Deal of Boise to protest the wording of a company advertisement which alluded to the state's new motor vehicle safety responsibility act.

The ad, placed in a Mountain Home weekly newspaper Sept. 29, told motorists "You may lose your right to drive . . . New law can take away your driver's license even if innocently involved in an auto accident—unless you're properly insured."

Koehler said the ad dealt the "a blow" to the state's new insurance law for compulsory auto insurance.

Stolen Plane, Suicide 'Try' Horrify City

NONSTOPPING, Sweden, Oct. 4 (AP)—A Swedish airplane mechanic terrorized this city last night in a stolen plane which he threatened to crash in a suicide attempt into the home of his just-divorced wife.

The novel "suicide" attempt ended, however, when the plane crashed into a powerline just outside of town. The mechanic, whom police said never piloted a powered aircraft before, escaped with a strained shoulder and minor facial bruises.

He took a taxi back to town and was arrested by waiting police at the city limits.

Officers said the 24-year-old mechanic, whose wife recently divorced him, telephoned his suicide crash threat to the airport control tower here before he took off in the stolen aircraft.

He flew directly to the city and for some 20 minutes terrorized the population by skimming at low altitudes up and down city streets.

Police cars and ambulances raced through the city in pursuit awaiting the crash. They stood by at emergency stations when the plane buzzed out of the city limits to wrap itself around a powerline.

Police refused to identify the mechanic "pending" court action. They said he attempted to commit suicide last Friday but bystanders pulled him out of the river.

The officers said that the mechanic had some experience in gliders but never flew a plane before last night.

Witnesses to Get Expense From Group

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (AP)—A senate subcommittee expressed surprise today over the \$1700 expense claims of 14 Wall Street brokers and businessmen for appearing as witnesses.

The brokers and businessmen are entitled to expenses and the senate anti-monopoly subcommittee will pay off.

But subcommittee staff members conceded they were taken "back by the claims because rarely in the past have big businessmen put in for expense money. They said many businessmen take offense at the suggestion they should collect money for appearing as witnesses.

Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney, D. Wis., acting subcommittee chairman, described the claims as unusual. He declined further comment, saying "they are entitled to their fees if they want them."

The brokers and businessmen were involved in an investigation of a controversial merger plan between two Northwest power companies—Puget Sound Power and Light company and Washington Water Power company.

Most of the brokers were stockholders committee for Puget Sound Power and Light company, which sent out a letter to stockholders backing the proposed merger.
