Persons Flee Town, Escape Deadly Fumes

GIBSON, La., Oct. 5 (AP)—The entire population of Gibson, a village of about 100 persons in southern Louisiana, fled yesterday to escape toxic, sulphurous ammonia fumes.

The alarm was sounded when a hose broke while the pressurized liquid ammonia was being transferred from a 100-gallon railroad tank car into a fertilizer firm's storage tank.

When the hose broke, releasing the pressure, about 3,000 gallons of liquid ammonia vaporized. The fumes rolled slowly over the village like a heavy fog.

Every man, woman and child left the town except for a man who used the lone available gas mask to make certain no one was left behind.

The Gibson telephone operator said that there were no known injuries or deaths.

Army to Foot Medical Bills On President

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP)—The army finally decided yesterday to stand all of President Eisenhower's medical expenses at the army hospitals, a move which will cost the army only for his daily food. The decision to treat President Eisenhower as if he were a regular officer on active duty was reached at the highest army level—it followed a series of conferences at which it was noted that the president, among other things, is a commander-in-chief of all the armed forces. Army officials said little thought was given to the bookkeeping element of the President's illness in its early days. Later some officials who had to keep an eye on bookkeeping rebelled at the issue but no clear decision was reached. The President was admitted to a military hospital in Denver on an emergency basis Sept. 24 just as the hospital would have looked after anyone else with a military or governmental connection in such a situation. The issue was resolved by Army Secretary Wilbur Brucker, after conferring with Gen. Maxwell B. Taylor, army chief of staff. The decision was made that the President would be a "designee" of the army secretary to receive hospitalization without reimbursement. Army regulations give the civilian head of the army authority to do this.

ATHENS, Greece, Oct. 4 (AP)—Premier Marshal-Admiral Alexandros Papagos, victor over Mussolini's forces in the Balkans and in the mountainous post-war battles, died last night. He was 71. The Greek war hero suffered a lung hemorrhage and died of heart exhaustion. He also had been ailing for months but his death now had been unexpected. The first person to be notified of his death was Foreign Minister Simeonos Kefauveros. Earlier yesterday, Papagos signed papers nominating Simeonos Kefauveros as provisional premier during his illness. King Paul and Queen Frederika also were notified and the royal couple drove immediately to Papagos' house. The funeral will be held Friday.

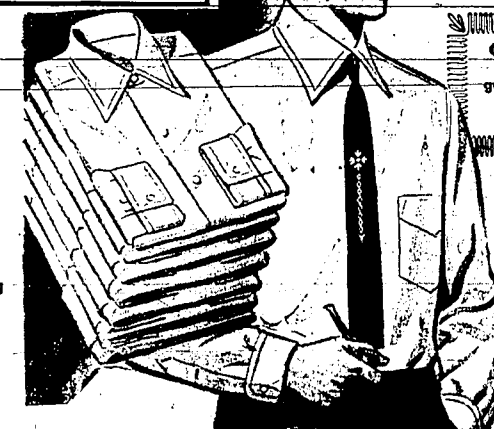

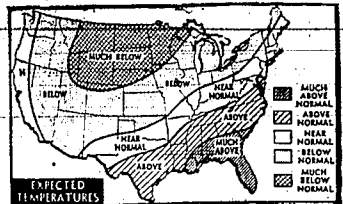

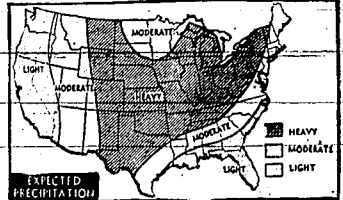

Islanders Ask 4-H Is Breaking Barriers to U. S. Okay to Regain Homes

TOKYO, Oct. 1.—The almost forgotten islanders of a small Pacific chain including historic Two Jims will ask the United States this month to "let us return to the homes of our ancestors."

Some 8,000 "displaced" natives of the Bonin Islands want to "go home to the homes of our ancestors."

The Japanese evacuated them to Japan more than 10 years ago during the closing days of the Pacific war. "We will not cause the American people any trouble," promised Taisuke Yokota, C. I. leader of the Islanders.

Yokota and Hosen Fujita will fly to Washington Oct. 15 as representatives of the Bonin Islanders to ask for permission to return home. They will be accompanied by a Japanese diet spokesman, member and a representative of the prime minister's office.

The United States has held on to the islands for strategic reasons just as it has occupied Okinawa and other Pacific possessions captured during the bitter island-hopping Pacific fighting.

Indonesia was a possession of The Netherlands for more than 300 years before it became independent in 1949.

4-H Is Breaking Barriers to Bring East and West Together

NAMPA, Oct. 5 (AP)—Budvard Kipling's comment about east and west never meeting is undergoing some changes these days.

And one of the factors responsible for the change is the National 4-H club, sponsor of the international farm youth exchange program.

That is the reason, says a club member, that David J. Flory is staying at the C. E. Flory home about eight miles north of Nampa this month, learning the technique of farming by machines instead of oxen.

"David" as he is called by the Florys, took to the idea readily, and is making plans to use some American labor-saving methods on his 94-acre farm in the high, dry central plateau of India, about 900 miles from New Delhi.

"He's a smart young man," Flory said, as he watched David handle a tractor with expert precision. "He wants to know about everything we do to get ideas to take back with him."

And David, smiling, pure-white teeth when he smiles, vowed that "if I am going to use some of your labor-saving devices and also your methods of irrigation when I get back to my farm."

Speaking precise English, he explained that back in India, it takes a full-time work of one man to irrigate a farm.

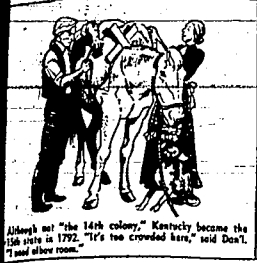

CHICAGO, Oct. 5 (AP)—A relatively new "no-bandage" treatment of severe burns in children—described as potentially important in an atomic warfare—allows up to 75 per cent reduction in hospital bills for such cases, the American Academy of Pediatrics was told yesterday.

Welch of Harvard medical school and Boston City hospital said children having burns involving from 15 to 70 per cent of the body's surface can be released from the hospital in three to four months, compared with "a year plus" under the conventional method of applying compression bandages.

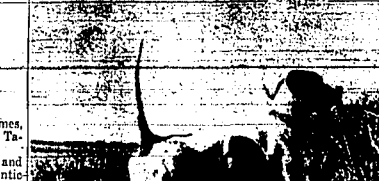

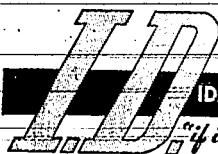

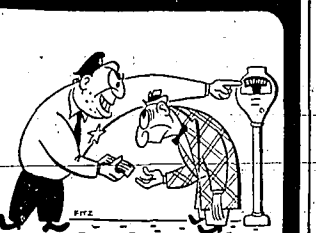

Executive Seeks Support of Public as Snake River Boy Scout Council Grows

The Snake River Boy Scout council has nearly doubled its enrollment of Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts in the past 10 years, necessitating an elaborate and systematic public support of the council's work, according to Hal Grizzle, Snake River council executive. The Snake River council will launch a \$30,000 fund drive on Monday.

Magic Valley district chairman, Grizzle says the Snake River council since 1945, Grizzle says that the Boy Scout enrollment has increased more than 90 per cent in the last decade. In 1945, 184 Cub Scouts were enrolled, compared with 233 in 1955.

In 1945 Cub Scouts totaled 184; Boy Scouts, 105, and Explorer Scouts, 137. In 1955 the totals were Cub Scouts, 346, Boy Scouts, 236, and Explorer Scouts, 318.

In 1945, Grizzle states, 189 Boy Scouts and 105 Explorers went to summer camp. In 1955, 346 Cub Scouts, 236 Boy Scouts and 318 Explorers went to camp. Grizzle says that the "increase" in the number of Scouts is due to the fact that more than 1,200 11-year-old boys will soon be eligible to become Boy Scouts, Grizzle says. "Our facilities, however, will not permit us to enroll half of them."

Within two years we must be prepared to accept another 1,000 Boy Scouts and leaders at summer camp. In addition, day camps must be established for our other half of them.

"Our Council office, the office staff of which consists of one secretary, is already overloaded," Grizzle continues. "The office is responsible for accounting 1,000 training materials, bulletins and must keep permanent records for each of the Council's 4,500 Scouts and leaders."

Grizzle points out that during January years the Council handled more than \$50,000 of public money, all of which must be accounted for monthly and audited every quarter. The council employs three professional executives, for every 1,000 boys and leaders. Within the Snake River council, the head of each full-time executive is more than 1,500 boys and leaders.

According to Grizzle, plans to improve the Magic Valley scouting program include special trips to the Mountain Home air force base and the Philmont Scout ranch for Explorer Scouts, and the organization of emergency service scout troops.

With the cooperation of the air force, Explorers will be trained in the use of radio equipment and will build transmitters in each Scout district.

Although a boy pays only \$5 a year to be a Scout, Grizzle points out, the cost of maintaining the boy in active Scouting status is approximately \$10 a year. This sum covers the cost of operating camp, conducting activities and training, and payment of office and insurance expenses.

Grizzle emphasizes that the strength of Scouting lies in its volunteer leadership. "It is estimated," he says, "that the average volunteer leader in Scouting contributes more than 200 hours a year. With approximately 1,000 readers in the Snake River Council, this means that Magic Valley youngsters are contributing more than 200,000 hours of instruction and fun to the welfare of boys in the area."

Magic Valley counties within the Snake River council area include Twin Falls, Cassia, Minidoka, Blaine, Gooding, Jerome and Camas.

French Fight Rebel Forces In Mountains

HAHAT, Morocco, Oct. 5 (AP)—French troops battled rebel mountain forces Tuesday in the fourth straight day of scattered vicious clashes in eastern and northern Morocco.

A major battle appeared to be brewing a few miles south of the Spanish Moroccan border. There was no official estimate of the numbers involved, but unofficial accounts for the scene said the area was in "full bloom."

As the tension increased, France's resident general, Gen. Pierre Boyer de Laubeuf du Moulin, appealed for peace. Cautioning against plunging the protectorate into civil war, he said he was seeking a solution acceptable to all.

The fighting was principally in the Rif mountains between Tala and the Spanish Moroccan border, some 150 miles west of Hahat. But there were scattered skirmishes in the Rif and in sparsely settled areas and the French were hardpressed to stem the violence. Such attacks were a new experience for the French in Morocco, since the violence previously had been confined chiefly to large centers.

The French posts were reported isolated. The tribal raids began a few hours after Sultan Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafat, with a strong push from the French, left his palace in Hahat and flew to the international city of Tangier. The sultan's removal was part of a French plan for Moroccan reforms.

Truman Gives Version of Famed Fight In Third Installment of His "Memoirs"

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP)—Former President Truman struck a new blow in his bitter-remembered "inside story" of his rivalry for the 1946 Democratic vice presidential nomination.

He said that although he (Mr. Truman) was the late President Roosevelt's choice for the No. 2 spot on the Democratic ticket, Byrnes telephoned just before the convention and "told me that President Roosevelt had decided on him as the new nominee for vice president, and asked me if I would nominate him at the convention."

"I believe," Mr. Truman said, "that Byrnes knew that the President had named me at the time he called me."

Mr. Truman's version of one of the most sharply-disputed chapters in American politics was contained in the third installment of his memoirs published by Life magazine.

Byrnes, who was to become Mr. Truman's secretary of state and later governor of South Carolina, was the late President Roosevelt's top White House assistant in 1941. Mr. Truman was a Missouri senator and had won re-election as head of the senate war investigating committee. With Vice President Henry A. Wallace and Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, they were leading prospects for the second spot on FDR's fourth-term ticket—a job that was later to lead to the presidency upon Roosevelt's death in 1945.

Mr. Truman said that unknown to him, FDR met with Democratic party leaders "far in advance" of the 1944 party convention, and told them that he preferred Truman over Wallace, Douglas or Byrnes. At the meeting, Mr. Truman said, the President wrote a longhand note to Democratic National Chairman Robert Hannegan saying "Bob, it's Truman."

"At the same meeting," Mr. Truman said, "the (FDR) instructed me to notify Byrnes of the decision."

Mr. Truman said he had no idea at that time that FDR had tapped him, and on the basis of Byrnes' phone call he "took it for granted" that Byrnes was the choice.

Mr. Truman said he told Byrnes he would be glad to place his name in nomination "if the President wanted him for a running mate." He said he stuck by his pledge and tried to line up support for Byrnes at the convention, even after Hannegan, labor union leaders and others "put pressure on me" to seek the post.

He said he "continued to react" until FDR, in a telephone call to Hannegan which Mr. Truman could overhear, asserted that Mr. Truman would "break up the Democratic

party in the middle of a war" if he turned down the nomination. "I was completely stunned," said Mr. Truman. "I sat for a minute or two and then got up and began walking around the room. 'Well, it said finally, 'if that is the situation, I'll have to say yes, but why the hell didn't he tell me in the first place?'"

Other highlights of the third installment of the Truman memoirs: 1. In May, 1945, soon after he became President, he sent Harry Hopkins to Moscow with instructions to use "a baseball bat" if necessary to persuade Soviet Premier Josef Stalin to bring Russian forces into the

war against Japan as "fast as possible." This was after the Yalta conference at which Russia had promised to enter the Pacific war in return for concessions in Manchuria.

2. He estimated that the senate war investigating committee, which had headed, ward the American taxpayers 15 billion dollars and saved countless lives in the armed forces by exposing waste, inefficiency and "cheating" on specifications in production of arms.

3. The important functions of congressional investigating committees have "suffered violence" at some hands since his day as an investigator, and "too often, in recent times the committees have been used for publicity." His own committee worked "without fanfare." By contrast, he said, the methods of the house un-American activities

committee at one time were "the most un-American thing in America."

4. In a letter to his mother, told him of a forthcoming social engagement with the general "who then commanded allied forces in Europe," Mr. Truman said: "Monday I saw Gen. Eisenhower, a real man."

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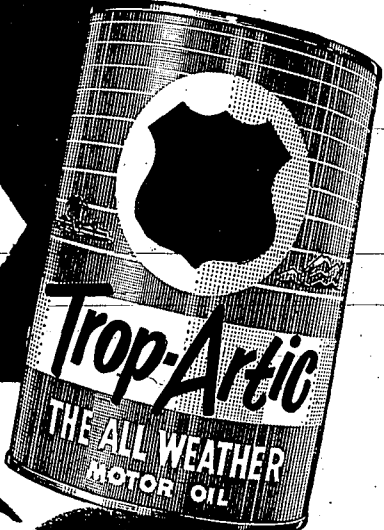

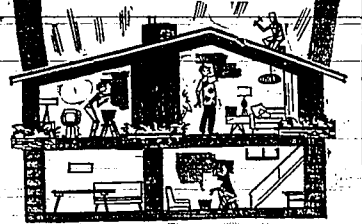
