Blind Group Also Asking Unit's Probe

BOODING, Oct. 6—On the heels of an announcement by the State Blind association that it was entering the state to bring about an investigation of the state school for the deaf and blind at Gooding, two of the teachers who resigned Monday following the dismissal of the school's manager reported they had asked to be reinstated.

DC4 Smashes Into Wyoming Peak on Salt Lake Flights

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 6 (UP)—A United Air lines four-engined DC4 transport plane en route from Denver to Salt Lake City smashed into snow-covered 12,000-foot Medicine Bow peak in southern Wyoming today apparently killing all 64 persons aboard. The big plane, which had been reported overdue for more than three hours before its wreckage was spotted shortly before noon MST (3 p.m. EDT), appeared to have smashed into the towering peak at a 90-degree angle.

Westbound passengers described the crash and the plane as it tumbled, and that it seemed impossible for any of the 61 passengers and the crew, including the pilot, to have survived.

It was the worst commercial airliner crash in the nation's history. The worst previous occurred Jan. 28, 1940, when 58 were killed in the crash of a Northwest air line DC4 near Lake Michigan.

Capt. Melvin W. Conlin, Cheyenne, said he was on duty at the airport when the national guard F-40 jet fighter, which first spotted the missing airplane, crashed, and that it was a huge burned area around the crash site.

Conlin said he doubted that anyone could have survived.

French Think Noted Warrior Is Behind North Africa Battle

There seems good reason to believe that old Abd el Krim, the Lion of the Desert, is behind the present uprising in Morocco.

The statements are sponsored by the "North African Liberation Committee" which has its headquarters in Cairo.

It is in Cairo that Abd el Krim is living as the guest of the Egyptian government. French authorities are becoming convinced that he is directing the center.

A spokesman for the center said on Tuesday that the rebels in Morocco and Algeria, adjoining on the east, are now fighting as a "united, organized liberation army."

He said that the present uprising is commanded by an underground general staff.

Dispatches from Morocco have emphasized that the rebels who are fighting in all of French North Africa are the remnants of the old Moroccan fighting in Abd el Krim's old territory.

There has been fighting in French North Africa for some years. But the present uprising in Morocco is the first organized one in that territory since Abd el Krim led his warriors against Spain and then France in the 1920's.

Abd el Krim is old now—72 or 73—and his short, thick beard is white. His lips, the result of a wound he suffered in a leap year ago from a Spanish Moroccan cell window, are more pronounced. But his short body is still sturdy and he still has the burning eyes of a fanatic.

It was in 1921 that the name of Abd el Krim first became known around the world. He led his fighters in a rebellion against Spain. He routed the Spanish in the Moroccan desert.

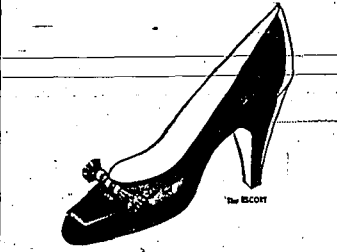

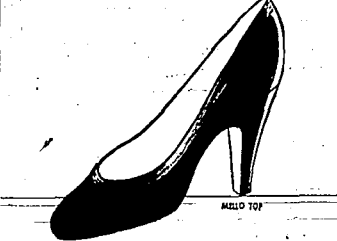

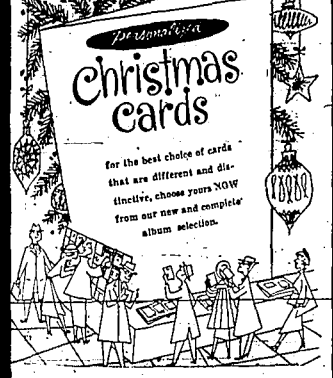

OPs Restate Ike's Strength For Elections

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (AP)—Some Republican strategists predicted today that President Eisenhower will be publicly endorsing any GOP candidate if he decides that such a move is in the party's best interests.

Even so, they said, Mr. Eisenhower by his private actions and words will have a commanding influence on the selection of his successor.

They said the GOP nominee will be someone strongly committed to the Eisenhower program.

Republican strategists also predicted that President Eisenhower will make a decision quickly on whether he will or will not seek a second term.

They said an endorsement might come as early as next week and should not be taken as a sign of weakness.

Some GOP informants were by no means sure, however, that President Eisenhower will take himself out of the running. Some thought he would decline to run, but that the only way to preserve Eisenhower's program and policies is to preserve world peace.

Mr. Eisenhower's earliest supporters and closest congressional aides said yesterday that the president can win reelection easily.

Frank Carlson, R-Kan., said he would speculate on whether Mr. Eisenhower will run again. But he said the president should decide to be re-elected.

West Diplomats Now Believe Bulganin Can Be Real Power

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (AP)—Some western diplomats are no longer as sure as they once were that Joseph Stalin is the dominating figure inside the Soviet government.

At least a few believe that the key man—the chairman of the board within the ruling group—may be Premier Nikoli Bulganin.

The distribution of power among Soviet leaders has provided a continuous guessing game for western diplomats and foreign affairs officials ever since Joseph Stalin died. Each contact between top Russians and western leaders therefore is carefully analyzed for signs of personal power positions.

The latest such occasion of substantial importance was the September visit to Moscow of West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano.

Von Brentano recently came to the United States and conferred with the American, British and French foreign ministers in New York as well as with state department officials here.

He is understood to have remarked in base conversations that Bulganin rather than Khrushchev was clearly the dominant figure in the negotiations.

Adenauer and his associates went to the meeting prepared to find Khrushchev playing a lead role and

doing the tough bargaining. Instead, they found that Bulganin took the lead in actually doing the talks and was extremely able and tough bargainer.

On occasion they gained the impression of great personal strength which, when necessary, could be very harshly used. There were times when Bulganin appeared to crack down on Khrushchev with a look of word disapproving something Khrushchev had said a moment before.

The impression gained by the Germans was at variance with that reportedly gained by Yugoslav negotiators when the two Soviet leaders visited Belgrade earlier in the summer. At that time Khrushchev was head of the Russian delegation because the Soviets seemed to be primarily interested in restoring working relationships between the Soviet Communist party, which Khrushchev heads, and the Yugoslav Communist party.

Even so, there was an impression that though Bulganin was head of the Soviet government, his personal position was not nearly as strong nor his prestige as great as Khrushchev's.

At the Geneva big four meeting in July, Bulganin headed the delegation and took the leading part in negotiations. That was strictly according to protocol, since the negotiations were among heads of government.

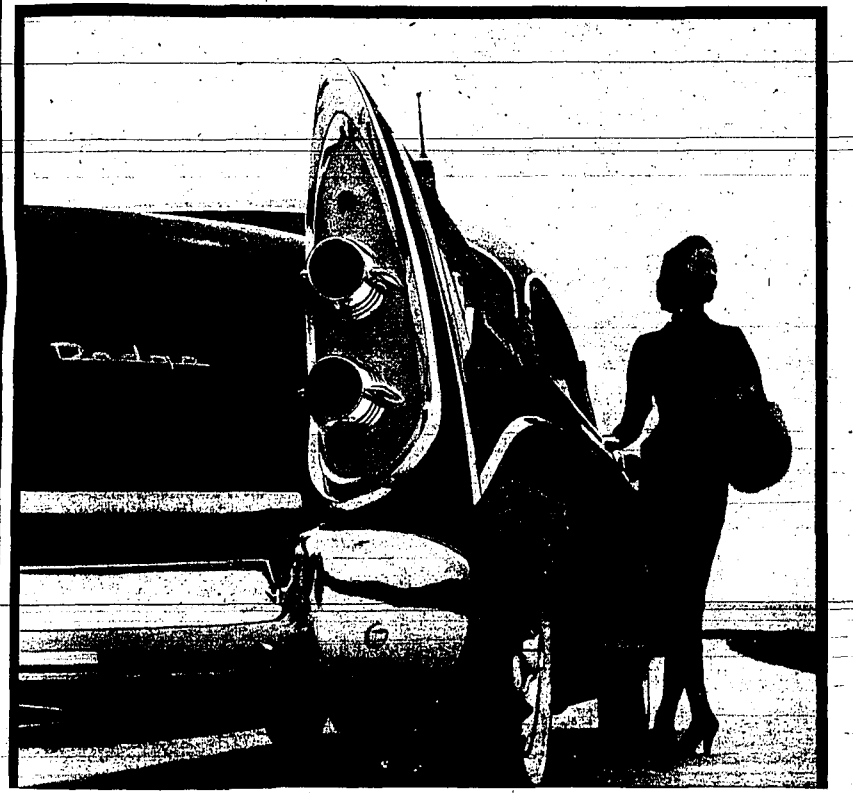

Continental's Display Here Due Oct. 21

The new Continental, described as the American counterpart of the British Rolls-Royce, will be placed on display in Twin Falls Oct. 21.

One of three or four Idaho dealers to handle the car, Joe Thelen, president and general manager of Thelen Motors, Inc., Twin Falls, says that the new car, manufactured by the Ford Motor company, is the most expensive production car ever put out—a luxury car so costly it will be shipped to dealers in special fleets—land designed and it was deliberately chosen to make it the ultimate in luxury for people who can afford the best.

The car is the new version of the old Lincoln Continental. It no longer has the Lincoln prefix and was revived by Henry Ford II and his brothers, William Clay and Benson as a tribute to their father, Edsel. The old Continental, produced from 1940 to 1948, was the biggest individual contribution to the Ford's line of cars.

Every possible luxury feature except air conditioning was put into the car as standard equipment. Air conditioning will cost extra.

Much of the work on the car is done by hand with the electric factor being whether the work can be done better by hand or machine, not by production cost. Even the glove compartment and trunk are carpeted with the same soft rayon-nylon carpeting that is on the car floor.

A special chassis design permits the low-slung design. The cars are only four feet, eight inches high. The spare tire mounting on the trunk deck and long hood-six feet long—were retained from the general styling design of the old Lincoln Continentals.

Colors and trim were conservative, because the company said it believed people who can afford the cars will be conservative in their taste.

The upholstery is the most expensive—most options being leather. The special imported leathers are kept in humidity-controlled rooms until they are out for installation to prevent any possible cracking, scratching or discoloration.

The metal-finishing and painting of the car body, Ford said, takes longer than it takes to completely assemble the industry's high-volume cars.

The cars, which will be on sale Oct. 21, have been designed, the company said, "for an exclusive market—the prestige market—consisting of persons with good taste who want an automobile embodying distinction, luxury, dignity and quality."

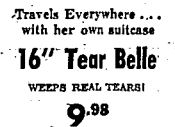

Senborn P. Collins, Las Cruces, N. M., said in an interview that a report indicated only 1,013 men had volunteered since congress enacted the reserve force act in July. Uncle Sam Has Yet to Settle Claims of Japanese Citizens

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6 (AP)—Uncle Sam has not yet settled claims of over 65 million dollars brought by Japanese-Americans and Japanese who were uprooted from their homes on the Pacific coast during World War II. The last chapter remains to be written in one of the most controversial areas in American history. The enforced relocation of the 100,000 persons-of-Japanese birth or ancestry took place 18 years ago. The government has admitted they have money coming to them for their personal business and property losses. An act enabling them to file claims was passed in 1948. Yet more than 3,000 claims remain unsettled. A congressional committee came here recently to see what could be done about speeding up the payments. The Japanese—both U. S. citizens and non-citizens—were considered "security risks" after the Pearl Harbor attack, when the Japanese war department said they might commit acts of sabotage or espionage. It has since been argued that there were motives other than national defense in the mass relocation. Morton Grodins, in his well-documented book "Americans Betrayed," charges that some California farmers played an important role in getting the relocation carried out. The farmers wanted to rid themselves of the competition of their hard-working Japanese neighbors, according to Grodins. The first congressional committee that looked into the matter gave the "Nisei" citizens and aliens a clean bill of health in a 1948 report. "Despite the suspicion in which they were held there was not one recorded act of sabotage or espionage which was attributable to them," the committee said. "Moreover, the percentage of enlistments in the armed forces by those of Japanese ancestry exceeded the nationwide percentage where the average casualty rate of the American army was less than 25 per cent, the casualty rate of the 42nd regimental combat team, composed entirely of Japanese-Americans, was 30.8 per cent. "No other group of regimental men during World War II won more than three presidential distinctions. "The President's commission on civil rights branded the mass relocation one of the most serious moral crimes in U. S. history. "A Japanese evacuation claims act was passed in 1948—but it called for formal adjudication of all claims and proved to be too burdensome. In 1951 congress amended it, authorizing informal compromise set-

tlement of all claims of \$2500 or less. Practically all of these so-called "small and petty" claims have been settled. Of 23,924 claims filed amounting to 12 million dollars, some 21,000 were settled at a cost to the government of 23 million dollars. The claims that remain unsettled are chiefly large ones. Congress limits these claims to involve "substantial legal problems" which must be handled "lest the whole claims program drag on, unsettled, for many years at great administrative expense to the government." Drugs to Stop Clots in Blood Are Available

NEW YORK, Oct. 6 (AP)—There is a whole family of drugs that prevent clotting of blood in your arteries and veins.

Since atherosclerosis like President Eisenhower's began with a blood clot and the most dangerous possible complication is the formation of another clot, these drugs command the esteem of thrombosis sufferers.

"They're wonderful, all right," but they have a second edge and this edge is no less sharp than the first one.

What satisfaction is it to a doctor to save a patient from coronary thrombosis only to lose him to hemorrhage? When you deprive the blood of its ability to coagulate, you're robbing the body of one of its prime life-preserving mechanisms.

For that reason there is unanimous agreement in medical science that the anti-coagulant drugs must be used only in dire emergency and then with the greatest possible caution.

Indeed, there is one school of experts, though, which does not consider a coronary thrombosis like the President's dire enough to justify the use of these drugs.

Dr. Paul D. White, the eminent heart specialist called to the President bedside, has often expressed an ultra-conservative view. He's against their use except in the most advanced cases.

The body itself is keenly interested in keeping the blood stream flowing. A substitute for fibrinogen in the liver by the action of vitamin K (spinach, cabbage, cauliflower and broccoli are all rich in this vitamin) called prothrombin.

When prothrombin encounters thromboplastin, which is to be found in body tissues and the blood cells, it becomes enzyme thrombin, which causes red blood to coagulate. It does it by combining with fibrinogen, a globulin protein of the blood.

Plans to form fibrin, a fibrous protein. It forms a kind of network. Blood corpuscles are caught in it and so they stop.

The anti-coagulant drugs interfere with this chain at one point or another. Some of them, for example, can be "recovered" quickly by administration of another drug.

By the giving of vitamin K, for example, to neutralize the action of the drugs which interfere with the formation of prothrombin in the liver.

Dr. Alphonse McMahon, a well-known medical educator and specialist in the treatment of President Eisenhower's kind of heart attack in the technical journal, "Foreign State Medicine." He found that many doctors opposed the routine use of the anti-coagulants, while equally prominent clinicians favored their routine use.

But in the "poor risk" cases their use is generally accepted by all. In one large group of cases of all degrees, they reduced mortality from 74 to 15 per cent, and the complication of a second clot 20 per cent to 11 per cent.

However, should they be used if the patient shows "insufficiency" either of liver or kidney function or if the patient also had any other disease involving the chance of hemorrhage, Dr. McMahon said.

Law to Block "Tapping" of Jury Sought

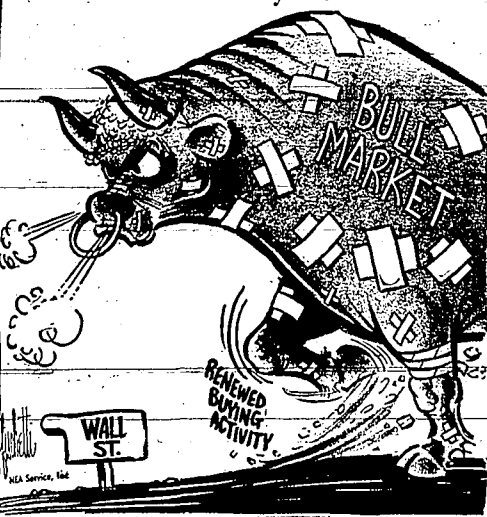

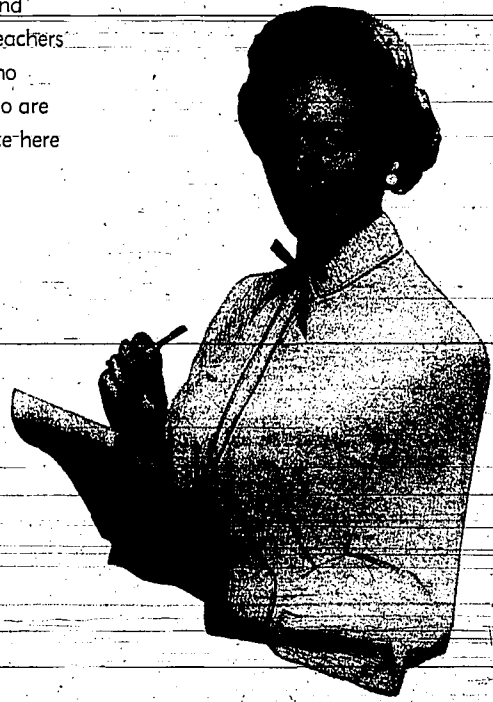

Pork Is Seen As Good Buy In Food Mart

By The Associated Press
Pork is on the bargain counter in the nation's food stores this week.

Lots of pork are the particular favorite, with prices down from a week ago nearly everywhere. A lot of emphasis is being put on smoked hams, too. "They're an economical item right now," one meat specialist commented.

Retailers stocked up on pork because hog quotations are down around the lowest levels in 10 years. What's more, it looks as if prices will drop further because marketings are due to increase in November and December.

If pork doesn't catch your fancy, you'll find a good variety of other meats on the list of special. Prime ribs of beef will be a feature in many stores, along with steaks of all kinds and chuck roast. Frying chickens will be available in some areas at lower prices. And there will be specials here and there on veal shoulder roasts.

There won't be many stores featuring legs of lamb. Prices on this item will be about the same as a week ago.

Eggs will be cheaper in most places with grade-A whites trimmed down to four cents a dozen. Butter will hold around week-ago levels.

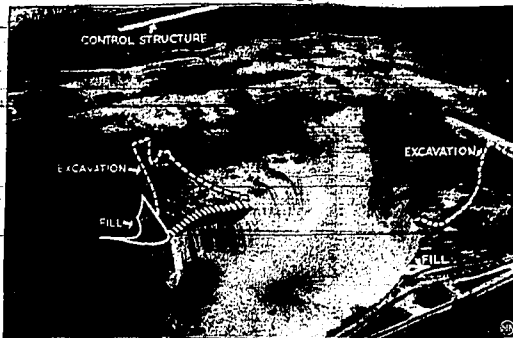
The U. S. department of agriculture has come up with a list of the best buys in October, based on plentiful supplies and reasonable prices. On the list are pork, beef, hollers and fryers, canned meat, cheese and other dairy products, vegetable fats and oils, lard, apples and grapes.

This, incidentally, is national fish week. The National Fisheries Institute says it looks for a 15 per cent increase in fish consumption in this country in the next five years, largely because of the growing popularity of easy-to-prepare frozen foods such as fish sticks, fish files, breaded shrimp, scallops and portion packs.

In the produce market, potatoes and onions are described as the outstanding buys in vegetables. Good buys include lettuce, egg plants, peppers, sweet potatoes, cabbage, beans, cauliflower, spinach, escarole and arctic.

Carrots, pascal celery and cucumbers are listed as moderately priced.

Niagara Falls' Looks Will Get Beauty Treatment for Future

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont. (INEA)—Niagara falls is having its face lifted. To make sure that the future falls will look as magnificent for future honeymooners and world tourists in the years to come, the United States and Canadian governments are doing a \$175,000,000 beauty job on the crest of the waterfall. It is expected to be completed by 1957.

When the French missionary and explorer, Father Louis Hennepin, first saw the Niagara falls in 1678, the drop into the Niagara river was almost 1,000 feet further than it is today. Since records of the crest of the waterfall have been kept since 1784 the falls have receded 545 feet, more than half of this in the first 78 years.

Use of the falls for hydro-electric power has slowed down the recession considerably. Once the falls was an unbroken line of water falling from Lake Erie into the Niagara river. Gradually rocks fell off and two sections were formed, the American falls and the Horseshoe falls. The former is in the United States, the latter straddles the international boundary.

In recent years there have been a number of rock slides which have left more spots in both falls. Ice floes have also carried away sec-

electrical power generation, then greatly needed on both sides of the international border, but it also maintained the natural level-of-water. In fact it increased the flow over the American falls, enhancing its appearance considerably.

When engineers on both sides of the river began studies of how to obtain more electric power from Niagara falls and at the same time fight erosion, water surface and river-bed surveys were so difficult that conventional methods were out of the question.

The steep cliff surfaces and the turbulent waters meant that hydrogen balloons and helicopters were used to provide sky-hooks from which to hang survey equipment. In one section on the American side of the river trees and a narrow channel required an even more ingenious method of surveying. Searchlights with 800 million-candle-power were used and engineers found their figures by taking measurements of water reflection from the searchlight beams.

On both the United States and Canadian sides of the Horseshoe falls, rock and earth will be excavated, 24,000 cubic yards on the U. S. side,

and 64,000 cubic yards on the Canadian side. This will allow the waters to flow over sections which have till now been only partly under water.

Near these excavations small areas will be filled in as well and have concrete retaining walls, so that visitors will be able to better see the unbroken crest of the Horseshoe falls.

On the Canadian side of the falls, a control structure will be built, a concrete dam-like structure which will divert the water into a tunnel, where it will be released over the falls. This will help to control the amount of water falling over the crest, and sections near the shore will be filled in to provide better viewing points from which to see the plunging waters.

A start on "lifting" the face of Niagara falls was made during the second world war when a weir was submerged on the Canadian side of the river about 1 1/2 miles upstream from the falls. This weir not only provided more water diversion for
