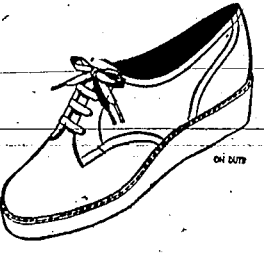

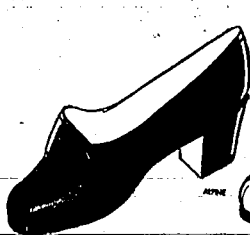

American Experiment in Communistic Living Fared Well for 11-Year Period

GRANDVILLE, Utah, Oct. 15 (AP)—A community once was called a communistic form of life flourished in southern Utah for 11 years.

More than 500 persons live in Orderville, Utah, which was founded in 1874 when Brigham Young, leader of the LDS church, ordered a socialistic experiment be conducted in the town. Orderville, which was founded by the Mormon pioneer, had a long history of cooperation and cooperation.

Young's idea was more communistic than any plan yet devised by the church.

The system was called the United Order of Enoch and was based on the communitarian principle of sharing everything.

In each town a joint-stock co-partnership was organized to which all who wished to cooperate assigned their property in return for shares in the whole community, or that part which cooperated, was managed as a common enterprise with ecclesiastical direction of labor, supervision of investment and control over production.

Most of the Orders collapsed within a few months. But the one at Orderville endured for 11 years, primarily because of the 80 families in the town joined the Order and did their best to make it work.

The Orderville leaders divided all their economic property, both real and personal and valued at \$1,500,000, into shares. Each share was a personal effects such as clothing and books.

The people tore down all homes in the town and rebuilt them so that they were alike. They also built a common store and work shops and a dining hall.

Everyone ate in the dining hall at the same time. Women took turns being cooks and dishwashers.

Men did most of the work in the fields and shops, while the women made all the clothing worn by the townpeople and performed domestic tasks. All turned the fruits of their labor into a common storehouse and all shared equally in the proceeds.

Most of the residents practiced polygamy in accordance with the Mormon custom.

After five years, Orderville was able to buy equipment for woolen and lumber mills, a cotton gin and a furniture factory. Soon the town became almost 100 per cent self-sufficient.

Twice a year a group of wagon-traveling 300 miles to Salt Lake City to purchase the few supplies the town was not able to produce.

The assets of the community rose from \$12,000 in 1874 to \$60,000 in 1879 and \$99,571 in 1883. A small amount of money was given each family every year to buy personal effects.

The Order was returned by an annually elected board of management which consisted of a president, two vice presidents, secretary, treasurer and four directors. These men supervised the appraisal of property and the distribution of shares.

Force, made investment decisions, drew up schedules of wages, heard complaints and, in general, regulated the affairs of the Order.

All important matters were presented to the body of the Order at regular meetings and all things were done "by common consent" of everyone.

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Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Considering how some people handle guns, it's small wonder their enough life in Magic Valley to write about.

One Twin Falls hunter in the woods last week-end reported that two other hunters trained their rifles on him at a distance of about 1,000 yards, changed their minds and moved up about 100 yards and then faded from the gun barrels again.

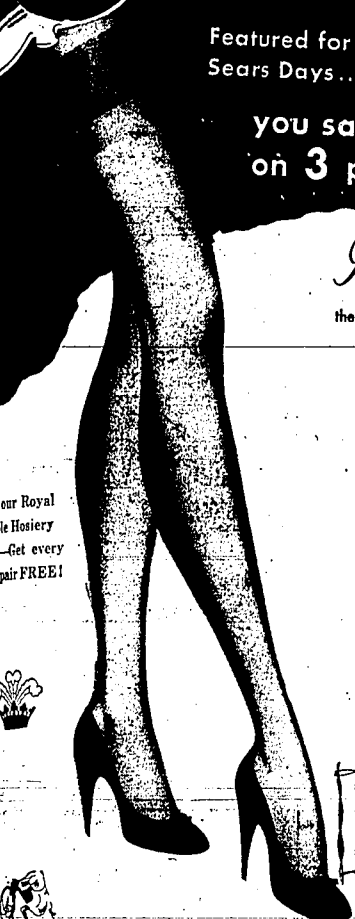

Chiefs Argue Party Stands On Big Talks

CHICAGO, Oct. 13 (AP)—Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler says the Geneva summit conference was a "huckster approach to foreign policy" by the Eisenhower administration.

The Republican national chairman, Leonard W. Hall, countered in a debate last night that President Eisenhower and his cabinet have brought America peace and prosperity.

"Nowhere in the world is an enemy soldier shooting at an American boy today," Hall said.

The chairman of the Republican and Democratic national committees offered contrasting views on the present domestic and foreign problems—and their effects on the 1952 election to the annual meeting of the Illinois state chamber of commerce. A national radio network broadcast the hour-long debate.

"This whole huckster approach to foreign policy is damming our own position," Butler asserted. "The Republicans were so eager to make Geneva look successful that they glossed over most of the real problems during the meeting at the summit this summer between Soviet Premier Khrushchev, British Prime Minister Eden and France's Premier Faure."

"Looking back on it, everybody now agrees that all the peace publicity brought about a premature ending among the Russian powers with the result that the Russians have turned Geneva into a complete success."

In my opinion, as a result of Geneva, the American people and the people of the free world are not as militant today. We have not strengthened our position ideologically."

On taking office, Hall answered, President Eisenhower "recognized immediately that the Korean war had no end and took steps to face it."

He said the governments of Guatemala and Iran were friendly to the Soviets when Eisenhower was elected, but that the former has been replaced by friends of the United States.

Korea, Hall said, seemed "almost an endless war."

" Dwight D. Eisenhower went to Korea, and soon after the Korean war came to an end. I think that is a tremendous accomplishment. "They (the American people) have this peace and prosperity."

Butler said in answer:

"Mr. Hall may say the party won the peace in Korea, but the terms were such that Senator Knowland, the then GOP atomic majority leader, called it 'peace without honor.'"

Hall said the Korean war might not have happened if the Truman administration had recognized that communists were behind the Chinese civil war—not agrarian reformers.

"Yes, I think there was a bipartisan foreign policy in Europe," Hall said. "You could say that the vice was fair dealer that there was a communist in Asia."

Automaton Is Seen as Boon For Workers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15—Director Robert W. Burgess of the census bureau today forecast that automation will contribute to a steadily expanding economy with more jobs, better pay, and less work.

Burgess, in testimony prepared for a congressional hearing on automation, said machines already have taken over much of man's drudgery and promises to take over much more.

He said this may lead to "serious short-run dislocations" in particular fields—in other words, unemployment—but that in the long run automation will "facilitate and promote the general expansion."

Burgess said employment statistics show that scientific and technological advances create more new jobs in some fields than they wipe out in others. "The telephone industry is a good example," he said, "because of the equipment, but in 10 years it almost doubled its employment."

He did not expect the further development of machines to reduce the number of jobs over the long term. "If you have a machine that does a job, you must have a man to run it," he said. "In my judgment, the new jobs will be less arduous, more satisfying to the individual, and better paying."

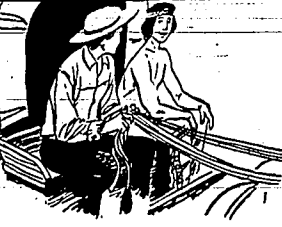
The substitute is calling experts in many fields of automation on jobs and the economy generally. "Among other things," he said, "it shows how they define the subject. Generally automation is considered to be the latest phase of continuing process of technological development with new emphasis on electronic control that guide machines in their work."

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Health, Intellectual "Center" Eyed for Tired Businessmen

ARFEN, Colo., Oct. 15 (AP)—Are you a tired businessman?

If so, maybe you're a candidate for the Aspen Health Center, high in the Colorado Rocky Mountains.

But first, in addition to being tired and wanting to get over it, you must be (1) In good health, physically and mentally; (2) Important to your business; (3) Willing to absorb as part of the rest cure some actual crackling culture, such as philosophical reading and discussion and perhaps even some classical music; and (4) Willing to flex your muscles lightly in some setting up exercises.

The Aspen Health Center is a project of Walter F. Paepcke, wealthy Chicago industrialist, an evangelist of the idea that the nation's businessmen need to do more than just make things and sell them.

Paepcke, chairman of the board of Container Corporation of America, started 10 years ago building this center about 10 miles from town into an intellectual and cultural center.

Sparked and financed to a great extent by Paepcke, the non-profit Aspen Institute was dedicated to the improvement of human relations. The health center will be an institute project.

The institute has sponsored a program each summer of music, lectures and films, bringing a collection of the world's most famous speakers, educators, musicians and artists in other fields.

But Paepcke felt that this was not enough. So he hit upon the idea of the health center, first called a spa but changed because the word suggested "arthritis old men," as Paepcke put it.

was drawn up for the weary worker. Those accepted, and the screening would be rather sharp, would stay for two weeks minimum at the center.

There they would have gymnasium facilities and be expected to take exercise, probably calisthenics, but little of no competitive sports which might forestall the relaxation sought.

The center, which will cost around \$250,000, and is expected to be completed next March, also will provide steam baths for the tired executives. The program would not be rigid, the idea being for the men to relax, enjoy the mountain scenery, walk along the rippling streams, all un-

The men would live in comfortable chalet type hotel units, some of which already have been built. The cost of attending likely will run around \$300 a week. Classes will be no less than 20 and fewer than 40 in the beginning.

Any man—business executive, labor leader, government worker, farmer—is eligible. But he must be tired, well, and important.

Paepcke emphasized that the course is for well-men: "We are not going to try to do anything about the sick," he declared.

The advisers had many suggestions. "This should be more of a maintenance program," Dr. Stevens observed. "It can be neither a diagnostic nor treatment center. It may be that young athletes in business need such a program more than the older businessmen," he said.

'Elimination' for State School May Be 'Wise,' Claims Writer

Editor, Times-News: The state doesn't waste all the public money it is given. I can tell that by riding the roads, going at the capitol building and visiting the Blackfoot home of the mentally ill. That it is possible that we are wasting a great deal of money that none of us are aware of, I am thinking of the affair that the state school is Gooding. Without entering into the right or wrong of the situation, I should like to raise a few questions.

Methods of teaching the blind and deaf vary even more than normal teaching. I have listened to several good students of education lately. At least one has spent a great deal of study in other states, and recently on "special" education as it is or should be practiced in Gooding. Many of the states known as leaders in this field have almost eliminated "special" schools for the deaf and blind. Those unfortunate kids are treated as nearly as possible as if they were normal. And it gives a great lift to the pupils.

Personally, I doubt if I would send a child of mine to Gooding. In teaching I had two blind boys, one of them a successful Twin Falls lawyer. The other was just as well when death intervened. Both boys, I thought, were very happy in their work. It is merely a suggestion, thinking out loud, but it might be wise to greatly minimize the state school and eventually eliminate it. I don't pretend to know; but I do know that any investigation should be by a highly qualified and disinterested person who lives in this century.

The tuberculosis hospital at Gooding comes under much the same heading. Right while the legislature was busy handling over the appropriation to "improve" and expand the hospital I happened onto two or three very thorough students all of which seemed to indicate that special tuberculosis hospitals are of very doubtful value. Should there be such a thing? A lot of authorities think not.

But scattered institutions offer delightful horse trading for legislators. It's a grand thing for a Gooding county legislator to trade a new bed in the Orofino institution for a

Bird Lovers Win Victory For Friends

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 (AP)—Bird lovers have triumphed over the powerful strategic air command in their fight to protect the winter home of the almost-extinct great white whooping crane.

The air force announced yesterday that it has abandoned plans to expand the danger zone around a flash bombing range off the south-east coast of Texas where the birds winter.

The Canadian government, bird societies and even the U. S. fish and wildlife service had protested that the bombing activities of the air force in the expanded area would lead to extinction of the rare whooping crane. There are only 32 of the birds left.

The air force decision ended the controversy. But the air force announcement made no direct mention of the whooping crane. It said only that there had been a conflict of interest "between military requirement and private interest."

That was its way of saying the crane lovers had won.

Early last summer SAC proposed extending the "surface danger zone" of its Matagorda bombing and gunnery range off the Texas coast near the national wildlife refuge where the whooping cranes spend their winter. It was contended the cranes would not be affected any more than they are now.

It was understood the air force withdrew its plan just ahead of a planned vote-up-the-army, which has jurisdiction over the area. The arm engineers recently held a hearing on the issue at Port Lavaca, Tex.

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 10 (AP)—Arthur V. Watkins, R., Utah, last night challenged Utah Gov. J. Bracken Lee's charge that the Eisenhower administration is acting unconstitutionally.

The issue broke out in a state caucus here. Lee was one of the speakers. Watkins said he was there "merely to make a few remarks." But later he said Lee's "demand" was "unreasonable."

Lee recently announced he was going to hold back some of his 1935 income tax in order to get a ruling by the U. S. supreme court on the constitutionality of foreign gifts.

During Lee's talk the Republican governor, in his second term of office, said the national debt was "ferocious"—over \$10 billion dollars.

Watkins retorted that this was not true. It was "less than 500 billion dollars."

Lee said the "pete-time" living of money for foreign nations is not "right" now under a Republican administration, nor was it under the Democratic.

Watkins asserted that these foreign commitments were made at a time when the Eisenhower administration was in power.

"We are live up to our treaty," he said.

He added the income tax is the law of the land and we have to live up to that.

Lee said he "felt the constitutional rights of the American people are being violated continually, and the only thing between freedom and the rule of law and slavery is the Constitution."

Watkins said the present administration is "the most constitutional we have had for a long time."

He said he was not sure if the delegation to the conference was acting unconstitutionally. If that were true, the Utah delegation and the President should be impeached.

"It is not true," he said.

Lee said afterward he had obtained figures from Sen. Harry P. Byrd, D. Va., and that the debt is 270 billion dollars in contingent liabilities, or debts incurred that have not yet been paid.

"This is not true," Watkins replied. "This is not true. The national debt includes all contingent liabilities."

Courses Are Designed to Give Doctors "Over-All" Concepts

BALTIMORE, Oct. 15 (AP)—The doctor who can't see his patient for the gall stones is not the sort the University of Maryland likes to equip with a diploma and a license, and sent out to treat alling humans.

Consequently, the university's school of medicine has added to its curriculum a course believed to be the only one of its kind in medical education.

The course, called "man and his environment," is a stimulating catch-all patch work thought designed to broaden the outlook of the student, doctor and to help him to become more than a mere mechanic of the human body.

"This human side of medicine is drawing increasing attention in the training of young doctors, often lacking the forms of having senior students 'all in' with family doctors at work in general practice clinics or child care program.

The Maryland college, however, undertakes to broaden the student's outlook at the very beginning of his medical training.

at alabaster across the dividing lines of educational departments and gives the embryo physician related information in anthropology, economics, history, physics, genetics, psychology and other subjects.

Dr. William S. Stone, dean of the school of medicine, says it should give perspective to the student's view of humanity. It is expected to arouse his interest in the many different forces which influence the behavior of the individual and the ideas of a human being.

It should extend the range of the medical student's background in undergraduate days in college.

The course is taught in the freshman year and is required of all students. It consists of two-hour sessions of lectures and panel discussions each Saturday by experts in widely varied fields.

Dr. Stone maintains that the student in medical school concentrates so intensely on the details of human structure and function that he may fail to develop over-all perspective on the subject of his chosen work.

A series of 31 lecture and panel talks, it is hoped, will lead the student to constructive curiosity about human problems and their solutions.

The basic idea is that a doctor is far better equipped if he considers not only the diseases he must treat but the act of individual patients and the factors which have influenced their illness.

The experts who will appear before the freshman medical students come from educational and governmental institutions throughout the area.

The course was developed by a committee of medical men headed by Dr. Walter van Buzark.

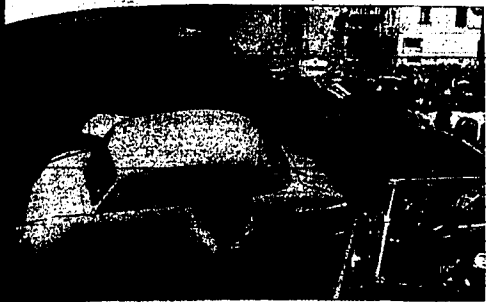

Out Safety Campaign Scheduled To Stop "Runaway Truck" Accidents

DETROIT (AP) — The Interstate Commerce Commission is launching an all-out safety campaign to prevent runaway truck accidents. The commission says that in the first half of 1955 fatal accidents jumped 23 per cent, approximately 850 persons were killed and 117,000 injured. This has followed a 15 per cent increase in truck accidents in the first three years of the truck death rate has increased. However, it continues to be the rate for general passenger vehicles.

should be so arranged that failure of any part on, or associated with, one axle of the vehicle or combination will not reduce the effectiveness of the brakes on any other axle.

It is this problem which the ICC and the industry hope to solve.

The ICC regulations "may" set emergency brakes which will automatically stop a trailer when it separates from the tractor. But there is no standard rule calling for brakes which will work on both of the units if one goes out.

In other words, if the brakes on the front tractor go out through loss of air pressure or for some other reason, in most instances the driver has no way of applying brakes on the rear trailer.

The question now being thrashed out is whether to agree on a system which would put what amounts to separate emergency brakes on each axle, or merely separate brakes on each unit.

Cost is not a major concern. Installing a separate brake system on new trucks is said to be a negligible cost. In trucks already in use it will cost in the range of \$100.

On the part of the industry the ICC hopes to increase its enforcement staff enough to halt truckers from driving more than the 10-hour maximum—with eight hours of rest between—and get them to observe state speed laws more carefully. Those are the two worst infractions, according to ICC safety experts.

On its part the industry is going all-out for safety by extended courses for drivers and better maintenance.

Automatic transmissions are becoming increasingly popular among drivers and are being heralded as a major safety innovation. They at least bring on the driver, leave him more alert, and actually permit meeting schedules with reduced top speeds.

Toll Roads to Feature New Safety Device

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 18 (AP)—When it's opened next summer, Indiana's new east-west toll highway final link in an 875-mile hookup between New York and Chicago will have one safety feature that no other present toll road has.

It's a deciding equipment built into the roadways at toll stations, where motorists will pay their fees as they leave the road.

Working something like an ice skating rink in reverse, the freezing process will be carried out by heat-circulating pipes buried in the concrete. Skids as cars brake to a stop have been hazardous on toll roads in cold sections.

Another safety feature will be the paving of the road shoulders with blacktop having a surface especially roughened to create a rear foot line, awakening any drowsy driver whose car drifts from the roadway.

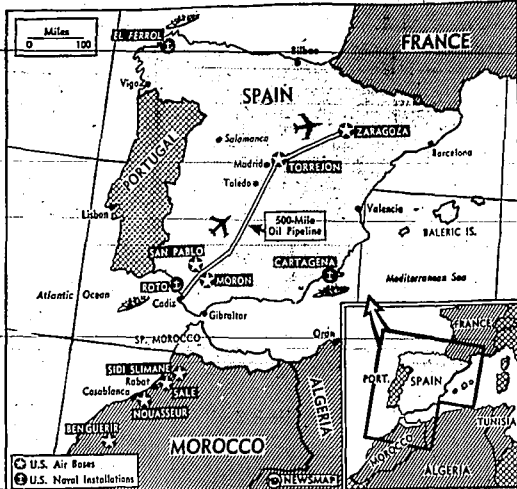
The Indiana road will resemble the newly opened Ohio Turnpike in many respects, although the Indiana right-of-way will be 300 feet, compared to 400 for Ohio.

Both roads have scooped-out dividing strips between driving lanes. The Indiana road will have a minimum distance of 56 feet between lanes, enough to greatly reduce headlight glare.

The state's 65 miles-an-hour speed limit will be enforced on its toll road even though it is designed for speed-up to 80 miles an hour.

Engineers say motorists will save 25 minutes an hour and 25 minutes faster on the toll road than on the best free highway in the state. They'll pay at the rate of 1 1/2 cents a mile.

Private Plane—Automobile Designed— Will Work From Land or From Water

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Oct. 18 (AP)—A private plane designed to operate off land or water—or be driven like an ordinary automobile—is being built here by a World War II pilot who was the first man to test the new vertical takeoff plane in flight.

Dr. J. P. (Skeets) Coleman, and he has incorporated some of the features of the vertical takeoff plane in the new combination auto-plane. Called the Aeromarine, the new plane has a delta wing, a pusher propeller, sweepback, Coleman became familiar with the delta wing advantages as engineering test pilot for the Convair division of General Dynamics corporation. He was assigned to the vertical takeoff fighter designated by the navy XPY-1, but better known as the Pogo.

In November, 1954, Coleman became the first human being to make a transatlantic flight from vertical takeoff to level flight and back down to a vertical "tail-sitting" landing in the Pogo. He was chosen the outstanding aviator of the year and awarded the 1956 Harmon International trophy.

A 215-horsepower Franklin engine driving a pusher propeller mounted above the wing set on a cabin will power the Aeromarine. It will have a range of 800 miles on 80 gallons of fuel and a top speed of 220 miles an hour. Cruising speed, with a payload of four-to-five passengers, will be 200 miles an hour.

Coleman says the 2,500-pound plane will be able to lift itself off a run of only 800 feet, landing speed will be 57 miles an hour.

Wingspan will be 25 feet and overall length is 38 feet. For operation as an automobile, the wing will fold twice on each side, near the fuselage just inboard of the twin vertical fins. As a car the width will be 65 inches.

The primary consideration in the Aeromarine was to design a good airplane that could operate off land or water. Coleman says "designing the plane to operate as a medium performance car was secondary. We were satisfied with a 50-mile-an-hour top speed on land because anything more might have interfered with its performance as a plane."

Power for land operation will be fed to the two main wheels of the bicycle landing gear from the engine. The front wheel will be fully steerable to give complete ground control.

Water landings and takeoffs will be made on a single, free-floating hydro-ski mounted underneath the plane's water-tight hull, Coleman says. The ski, like the landing gear, will be fully retractable.

Coleman says he expects wide acceptance of the plane by industrial firms looking for a versatile, efficient aircraft. "We plan to concen-

trate on this market first," he said, "but the Aeromarine will appeal also to the weekend pilot who flies for pleasure or sport."

Yards apart, moves cautiously into the area. In the lead is an Algerian sergeant-in-the-ranks—a tough, stubby French paratrooper lieutenant.

A woman standing in a doorway flashes a smiling glance over her shoulder. The black veil is one of mourning for the exiled soul.

A little mother, with the floor of spices laid out on tiny cloths before him, squats with his back against a wall and stares in unblinking hostility.

A group of elders ostentatiously ignores the patrol, and hardly moves to permit it to pass.

But a barefoot boy of about seven dashes from a group of ragged children and impulsively shakes the sergeant's hand. A little girl of about five smiles at him as he greets the children in guttural Arabic.

"These are the only friendly greetings the patrol gets, the ones from the children."

The killings go on between the patrols, which move through different streets every two hours.

Most of the victims are native police and informers.

The favorite terrorist weapons are pistols. But lately sub-machine gun attacks have been increasing.

The French colonials shut their shops on strikes, as a "warning" to French authorities. At their mass meetings, orators about the French men at home are imbeciles and denounce the government of Premier Edgar Faure. Once the settlers themselves "go in riot"—in retaliation against terrorists, and did some terrifying themselves.

French captain who thought that when he fought in Indochina he was stationed for a time at the point where twice as many of his men died as in any other theater. 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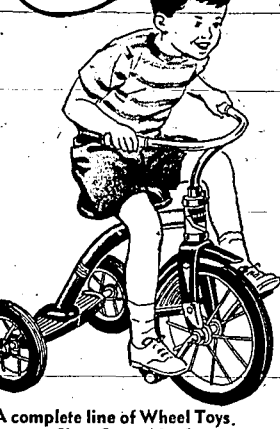

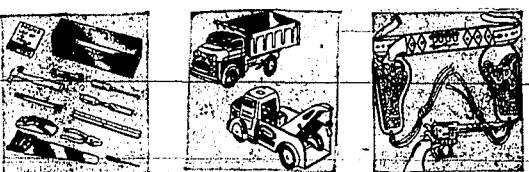

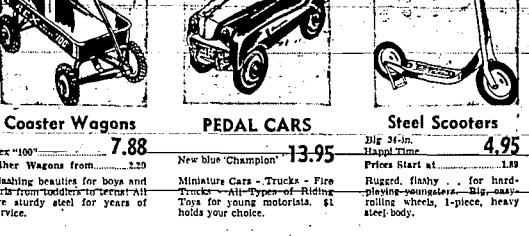

Hikes Shown On Property; Back in 1855

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 (AP)—100 Years ago in Washington, D. C., real estate values must have been on the upgrade in the nation's capital a century ago. At the start of 1855, newspaper advertisements offering property for sale always carried a price tag, also contained like a fine location, a well out back supplying arborvitae and cooking water, and comfortable shelter of the cow and the carriage horses.

But in mid-October of 1855, the real estate ad took on a different tone—chick-smoked-of-a-seller's market. Places for rent and sale could be "rented by appointment only," and instead of a price tag, the seller was often content to say that a home was "available."

It was a little different in the matter of dry goods. Perry and Rogers, a prominent Washington merchant, was proud to say it had a line sale on 40 pieces of fine cloth. One of the items was a "chick's yard—well-worth—24 1/2 cents a yard—article for children's wear." The cloth was used for other purposes than wrapping the bottom of a baby.

The Washington Intelligence conducted a letter to the editor column. People wrote in complaining that there were not enough hitching posts in the city. One reader said he had "the very devil of a time finding a place to tie up his horse."

Along this same line, the Intelligence printed an editorial from the Cleveland Herald, which declared: "Encouragement of female fiddling is very well, but the danger to which is that we Americans often tend to run every new thing into the ground."

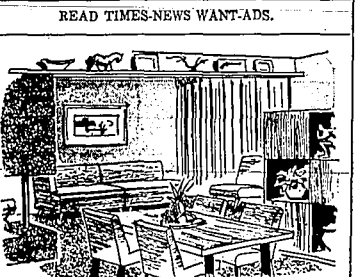

Human Appendix Study Shows Uselessness, Danger of Organ

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—If 50,000 human appendices can't be wrong, then it's uselessness in the human body is matched by an equally amazing ability to get the body into trouble.

For 32 years now hospitals in three cities have been making their surgically-removed appendices, giving that organ such a concerted exposure as few organs have ever had. The study has just been called off, with the 50,000th appendix. Inside the 50,000 the scientific explorers found such items as bubble gum, lead shot, tooth picks, screws, nails, fish and chicken bones, needles, wire pins, bits of plastic pins and pieces of assorted metals.

They also found members of 10 different families of fungi and 18 varieties of parasitic worms. Appendices had been affected by 25 specific diseases, not one of which is a disease of the appendix primarily.

Twelve kinds of benign tumors were found, and 16 kinds of malignant ones. And there were 18 different ailments which had originated in the appendix—ailments which aren't appendicitis.

Yet the 50,000 provided no reason for anyone who has never been troubled by his appendix to start feeling troubled now. Something like half the 50,000 were found, on close examination, to be "within the realm of normalcy."

The final report was made by Dr. Donald C. Collins of the College of Medical Evangelists, Los Angeles, in a technical journal of the American Society of Surgeons.

There had been 23 previous reports over the 32 years, each dealing with separate phases of the new appendectomy lore.

The hospitals were in San Francisco, Rochester, Minn., and Los Angeles, and the United States Army medical department cooperated during the war. Each appendix removed—was subjected to minute scientific examination. The findings, together with microscopic samples and slides, were sent to Dr. Collins.

Similar study there has been nearly a thousand-fold reduction in the hospital mortality for instances of acute appendicitis in the last 27 years. "The specific reduction was from 13.00 per cent mortality in 1925 to 0.01 per cent in 1952."

Speaker of June 1, a very useful discovery yielded by the 50,000 was an unreported finding of histoplasmosis, a fungus disease of the appendix. That is a kind of fungus which causes histoplasmosis and which older medical references classify as "a fatal disease." However, the study revealed that there are benign forms of histoplasmosis, that is, when found in the specific appendix studied.
