New Violence in Algeria Flares; Faure May Fall

Oct. 18 (AP)—Premier Edgar Faure won a vote of confidence in the national assembly by a unofficial count of 257 against 113. The vote seemed to have been from the ranks of cabinet members who favored his domestic stability and international prestige. Faure's victory was a setback for the National Front, the party of Algerian extremists who had failed to win a vote of confidence in the referendum in the Saar and threaten France's place in the world. Faure's foreign ministers conference later this month.

Oct. 18 (AP)—Reports of serious new nationalist activity in Algeria reached Paris today as the national assembly gathered to decide whether to overthrow Premier Faure's government.

Rebel groups ambushed a bus and its military escort yesterday at El Mizer pass, on a main highway leading to Algiers. Five of the African armed guard and 10 Europeans aboard the bus were killed in the bloody attack. The bus was carrying 400 passengers, many of whom were believed to be Algerians.

A violent storm boiled in from the Pacific ocean last night dumping tons of water on coastal towns. The little coastal state of Oaxaca, was reported out of communication and "practically all under water." More than half of Jalisco and Michoacan states were inaccessible by land or air with torrential downpours continuing and flood waters churning higher.

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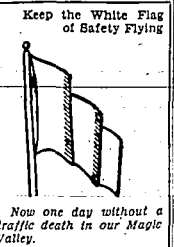

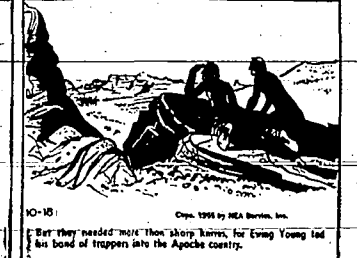

Powerful Political Organization Gives Okays for Three Democratic Hopefuls

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—The National Chairman of the Democratic Action has okayed the three leading Democratic possibilities for next year's presidential nomination.

The national chairman is Joseph P. Kamp, Jr., Washington, D.C. He was unable to disclose any Republican candidate who would please his organization.

Any of these, if nominated, could cause ADA to lose its base of influence.

ADA listed in alphabetical order the three Democratic candidates: Gov. Averell Harriman, New York; Sen. Estes Kefauver, Tennessee; and Adlai E. Stevenson, Illinois.

Attempt Is Made To Finish Strike

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18 (AP)—Federal Conciliator Arthur Vial today announced that he had met with company and union representatives in continuing attempts to bring the strike to a close.

A 45-minute meeting between the union, Telephone and Telegraph Workers and the CIO Communications Workers of America ended yesterday in failure.

The CWA represents 17,500 of the 22,000 telephone company employees who left their jobs in northern California and Nevada a week ago yesterday to back demands for higher wages.

As negotiations dragged on with the union in failure, Vial said he had met with San Francisco and Oakland staged demonstrations before telephone company offices yesterday.

Pilot Saves Self And Jet Aircraft

TOKYO, Oct. 18 (AP)—A U.S. air force pilot escaped unharmed and saved his jet airplane today when he made a daring landing in a rice paddy with a dead engine.

The pilot, Capt. Manuel P. Grace, Tucson, Ariz., guided his P-50 Shooting Star to a rough landing after the jet flamed out.

"He probably saved the government \$75,000 to \$100,000," a far east air force spokesman said.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 18 (AP)—Republican National Chairman Leonard Hall said yesterday President Eisenhower might wait until shortly before next year's presidential nomination convention to say whether he intends to run again.

Touring Delegate Given Russ Post

MOSCOW, Oct. 18 (AP)—Vladimir Malinich, who headed the Soviet agricultural delegation which visited the United States last summer, has been appointed minister of agriculture.

Malinich was greatly impressed by American farming methods and his report on the American tour has been widely published in the Soviet press.

In his new post, he was expected to put into use some of the techniques he learned on the trip.

Contact Asked

TOKYO, Oct. 18 (AP)—A left-wing politician told Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama today that Russian leaders want Japan to send a "responsible government representative" to Moscow to settle outstanding issues between them.

The report was made by Masaru Nomoto, a member of the new Socialist party and a member of the house of councillors.

Cost Increases For Newsprint

NEW YORK, Oct. 18 (AP)—St. Lawrence Mills of Canada, which supplies newsprint to 300 newspapers in 35 states in this country, announced today it is increasing the price of its product \$3 a ton, effective Nov. 1.

The increase will raise the price of newsprint in New York from \$100 to \$103 a ton. Delivered prices across the country vary only a few dollars from those in New York.

The price of a newsprint price increase came Oct. 5 when, Sir Eric Bowler, chairman of Bowler Paper Corporation, Ltd., said that the industry needs additional revenue to meet rising labor costs and expansion programs.

New Outlook Is Asked for Safety Work

CHICAGO, Oct. 18 (AP)—Neil J. Dearborn, president of the National Safety Council, yesterday urged 12,000 delegates at the 43rd annual national safety congress and exposition to take a new approach to safety education.

Dearborn said the public must be shown that "the primary function of organized safety work" is to encourage and help the individual to behave safely for his own protection and to compel him "by public opinion" to do so.

He said this would change the approach to safety campaigns from "a matter of purely individual expediency" to "a social and moral cause."

Statistics compiled by the council, the convention sponsor, show there were 90,000 deaths from accidents of all types during 1954, a five per cent decrease from the 1953 total.

Safety Council figures show 25,000 persons were killed in motor vehicle accidents in 1954.

"Memorial" Out

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Oct. 18 (AP)—The new Argentine government moved today to erase another "memorial" to the 10 years dictatorship of Juan D. Peron, the "shrine" of the late Eva Peron.

It was announced that the body of the wife of the deposed Argentine "strongman" will be removed from its tomb in the headquarters of the general confederation of labor. It will be turned over to the next of kin for re-burial, the announcement said.

English Show New Craft for Fast Services

LONDON, Oct. 18 (AP)—Britain today disclosed its answer to the latest American jet passenger plane designs—a "double-bubble" turbo-prop transport that carries 105 passengers at 425 miles per hour.

Vickers-Armstrongs released the design and British European Airways announced the first orders for the double-decker "Vanguard," a challenge to the American Lockheed Electra.

British airlines immediately dubbed the Vanguard "double-bubble" because of its two-deck design. The Vanguard will be built by the same firm that developed the original turbo-prop aircraft.

The Vanguard is the first all-British airliner sold to American carriers. Peter Marzfield, chief executive officer of BEA, said the Vanguard will carry 93 to 105 passengers, according to class, and will initially operate at 400 miles per hour. It is expected to be in service by the end of 1956.

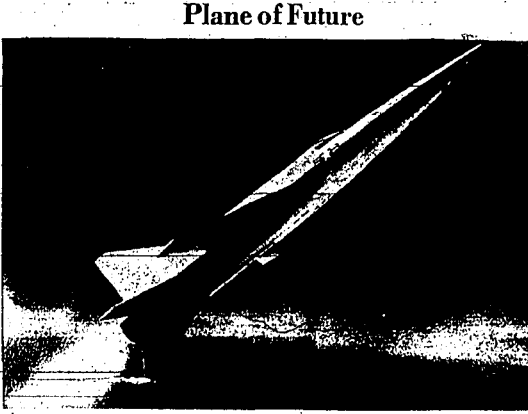

Plane of Future

Botany Called Good Help for Uranium Hunt

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 18 (AP)—Uranium prospectors put down your Geiger counters and sign up for a botany course.

Leslie C. Wheeler, botany professor at the University of Southern California, has returned from his second trip to the rich uranium mining area of east central Utah and southwest Colorado with this word: "Vegetation clues leading to the site of uranium may save endless wandering over difficult terrain with a Geiger counter."

"Studies show that certain plants grow only in selenium-bearing soil. And, because in the Colorado plateau uranium is often associated with selenium, the prospector can save himself many hours of search by looking in the areas where these plants grow," Wheeler said.

Juniper and pinyon pine may indicate uranium on some types of soil, he said. Certain species of locoweed indicated selenium, suggesting the presence of uranium.

Wheeler said the Utah species of the weed grow from eight inches to two feet and have green leaves, with white or pink flowers. The weed has a brittle aroma—something like sulphur and garlic.

Uganda Convicts Want to Help in Returning King Celebration

KAMPALA, Uganda, Oct. 18 (AP)—Convicts in the local jail tried to join in welcome home ceremonies yesterday for returning King Frederick, Kabaka of Buganda.

While the throbbing of hundreds of tribal drums filled the air, 400 prisoners in the Buganda government jail near the Kabaka's palace rioted demanding their release to join in the celebrations.

"They tried to break the warders' faces and tried to storm the prison gates," it was reported.

The warders bludgeoned the prisoners back into their cells in a fierce fight in which 18 prisoners were wounded and one killed. British administration police were called in to maintain order in the prison.

That was the only unhappy incident reported in wild celebrations going on all round Kampala, commercial capital of Uganda.

Throbbing drums, the wild cries of African dancers and the tooting of antelope horns kept the parties going all full pace last night. Overhead, fireworks splashed the sky with streaks of silver, red and gold.

Tension built up in Uganda during the past week as thousands of people flocked to Kampala and Entebbe for eight days of dancing and feasting.

The British government withdrew recognition of the young monarch in 1953 when he opposed plans to federate his kingdom with other provinces of the Uganda protectorate. He returns now under a new agreement which leaves him fewer powers and places more responsibility on the Kabaka, his parliament.

Youths Ready For Saturday Working Date

NEW YORK, Oct. 18 (AP)—Across the country today, 221 thousands of teenagers will tear themselves away from dance recitals, football, put on old clothes and go to work.

They'll dig potatoes on Long Island, fruit in California, wash windows, polish cars, rake yards, saw wood and scrub floors. They'll clean and clean in all the 48 states.

And everything they earn—about \$500 altogether—will go to the Pilgrim Fellowship, schools and hospitals all over the world.

Every day is the annual "work day for Christ" in the Pilgrim Fellowship Youth organization of the Congregational Church in America. While it is only one of many youth programs carried on by churches of all denominations, it is one of the most unique and fastest growing.

From its beginnings only five years ago the "work day" idea has grown to include more than 700 different groups of high school boys and girls who volunteer for a day's work once a year and turn their earnings into the Pilgrim Fellowship youth mission fund.

This means they have worked to help pay for hospitals, churches, missions as a mission in India, or for books for a youth training center in Germany.

The odd jobs in groups of two or three, or descend in larger numbers into orchards and fields, wherever a job can be found.

The returns vary. Some boys and girls at Bethel, N. Y., have earned as much as \$4.00 in their kitty for their day's work last year while a group at the First Congregational Church at Manhattan, N. Y., with 355 youths on its rolls, raked in \$1,000.

The success of the annual work day may lie in the same youthful impulse toward "gung" companionship which has led to such a high rate of delinquency when lacking guidance.

Mrs. Arthur W. Evans, wife of the minister of the Chatterton Hill Congregational Church at White Plains, N. Y., believes work day and other Pilgrim Fellowship projects throughout the year satisfy a desire among teenagers to do things in groups.

"Boys and girls who would never think of doing a lick of work around their own home seem anxious to do it for someone else when the rest of the gang is involved," she says.

Mrs. Evans has 20 teenagers in her Chatterton Hill group, all of whom had jobs lined up in advance of work day. They "advertised" in the church newspaper.

Argentine Propaganda Battle Is Aimed at Big Labor Group

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 18 (AP)—A battle royal for men's minds is going on in Argentina. The outcome could decide whether this nation builds democracy from the ruins of shattered Peronism or reverts to dictatorship.

A press campaign is trying to persuade the working man still feebly dedicated to Juan Peron that he can get along even better without the fallen president—and free besides. It is being conducted by the provisional government set up after rebels ousted Peron last month.

It's an important propaganda job and a tough one. Without at least the passive cooperation of these people, achieving stability will be difficult. Peron has a 10-year head start in drilling into their minds the idea that he was the only one capable of leading them to the better life.

Argentina's General Confederation of Labor (CGT) claims six million of the country's 19 million citizens. The CGT was Peron's big fist.

In 1945 a day-long strike and demonstration by the CGT forced a military clique which had arrested Peron to free him. That show of mass support hosted Peron into the presidency the following year.

New Council for Morocco Meets

RABAT, French Morocco, Oct. 18 (AP)—Morocco's newly formed regency council, appointed to take over duties of the sultan after his banishment, held its first meeting yesterday and asked for broad support from the local population.

The first duty of the four-man throne council, whose members were agreed on only Saturday, will be to appoint a premier to form a government representative of all shades of political opinion. This government then will negotiate with France for a turnover of many local governmental functions.

Ben Sillane, former paasha of the holy city of Fez, has been mentioned as most likely candidate for the premier's job.

Kefauver Has Not Yet Made Plans for '56

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—Sen. Estes Kefauver said yesterday he has not made up his mind whether he will run for president in 1956.

The Tennessee Democrat called a news conference and listed a number of Democratic leaders in various parts of the country.

Kefauver said he would decide and announce his decision within a "reasonable" time. But he indicated that he is in no hurry.

He told newsmen his decision will not be "materially influenced" by similar decisions to be made by President Eisenhower and Democratic Adlai E. Stevenson.

Stevenson was in New York today for a conference with Sen. Herbert H. Lehman, D. N. Y., a supporter of Stevenson and a possible holdout if the New York delegation sees to the Democratic convention pledge to Gov. Averell Harriman. A spokesman for Lehman said the senator may have something to say about the Democratic-presidential nomination in a week or so.

Kefauver's statement did little to clear the political air. He did make clear that he is not considering the vice presidency and that he will run for the top job or not at all.

Benson's Ouster Reported Sought

CHICAGO, Oct. 18 (AP)—Republican leaders "are trying to find a way for Agriculture Secretary Benson to resign," Senator O'Mahoney, D. Wyo., said yesterday.

"Nothing Benson has done has had any effect in stopping the fall of farm prices," O'Mahoney said at a press conference. "And Republicans are looking for a farm price squeeze a little difficult."

O'Mahoney quoted Benson as saying he will not resign from his flexible farm price support policy.

State Disposes Of Land Tracts

BOISE, Oct. 18 (AP)—The land department reported yesterday it had sold 169 acres of grazing land near Emmett for \$8,000, about twice the appraised value.

PARIS, Oct. 18 (AP)—Playboy Emperor Bao Dai announced today he had "fired" South Viet Nam Premier Ngo Dinh Diem who has called a referendum in an effort to end Bao Dai's role as chief of state.

An estimated three million South Vietnamese will vote Sunday on whether to oust the absentee emperor or the prime minister. Diem is expected to win a resounding vote of public confidence.

Bao Dai announced that he has withdrawn from the mission he got Diem 18 months ago and that the "full powers given the Roman Catholic emperor apparently was making a last desperate effort to minimize the damage to the emperor's power in the South Viet Nam state. Diem is equally determined to force him out."

Land Record Checkup Set


WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—The government is going to modernize its public land records for the first time since it began them in 1812. That is the real check-up on the general land office.

Director Edward Woolley of the bureau of land management announced yesterday a award of a \$108,400 contract to York, Pa. Tabulating Service to get the job started. It will keep punch, verify and sort some six million tabulating cards and make them into a central document index. This job is to be completed by June 30, 1956.

A second phase of the modernization calls for a total revision of the basic federal land records for the 17 western states over a period of five years at an estimated cost of five million dollars.

"The modernization program will constitute the first innovation since 1812 in a records system that has become badly antiquated," Woolley said.

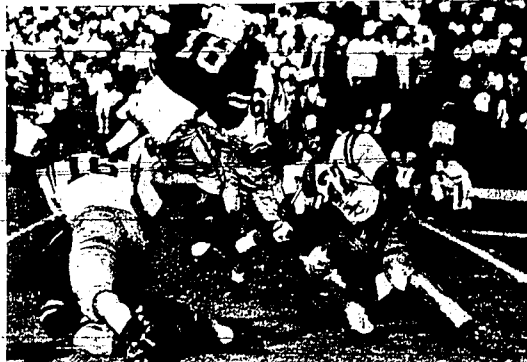

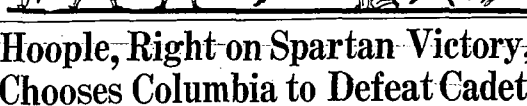

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"Power Loss" Future Cited By Rene Coty

By United Press

President Rene Coty has given his fellow French leaders an earful, warning that they had better end their long political spree. Unless they do, he told them, France is going to lose its position as a world power.

"He said that parliament must end a situation in which a French premier is harassed and tormented from the moment he takes office until he resigns or is overthrown."

The "situation," he said, is radical constitutional reform which will give France the political stability it has lacked for 40 years.

In giving his admonition, Coty stepped safely from his accustomed role. The role is that of a non-political chief of state. Coty is not a chief executive. His job merely approximates that of Queen Elizabeth II than that of President Eisenhower.

Coty gave his warning in a speech Saturday. He had in mind the fact that Edgar Faure, France's last premier since the end of World War II, gave a critical vote of confidence today.

Coty must have thought deeply before he spoke. He usually is content to remain in the background as he is supposed to do, as the 16th president of the French republic. He presides over cabinet meetings and he formally appoints France's ministers. "He also is chief of the armed forces."

But the cabinet and the national assembly—which corresponds to the British house of commons—run the country.

The cabinet is directly responsible to the national assembly. Coty, and actually the national assembly, not Coty, makes the president's appointments and dismissals.

Presidents of France are elected not by popular vote but by parliament in joint session.

Ex-President Defends Job Of Committee

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18—Former President Herbert Hoover said yesterday the second Hoover commission on government reorganization "never divided on political grounds" and did not pack its water resources task force with "special interests."

His views were summed up in an article in the November issue of the Democratic Digest, publication of the Democratic national committee.

The Digest criticized the Hoover commission in its September issue. It invited Hoover to give his side when he "questioned the conclusions" of the Digest analysis.

"The Democratic magazine had 'stacked' commission task forces in an effort to 'turn back the clock' of government policy. It said he excluded public power advocates from a resource task force. It said further that congress failed to act in that last session on any major recommendation of the commission."

Hoover in his reply said the commission set up to find ways to increase efficiency and reduce expense of government, determined at the start that "party politics" should not enter into its conclusions. He said he never heard anything of a reference to political party effect of any conclusion.

He declared he inquired into party affiliations of task force members was ever made, although he said they did embrace members of both parties, as did the commission itself.

"The water resources task force was not packed with special interests," he wrote. "It comprised 15 engineers, five lawyers, three governors or former governors, and a public accountant. They included members of both parties."

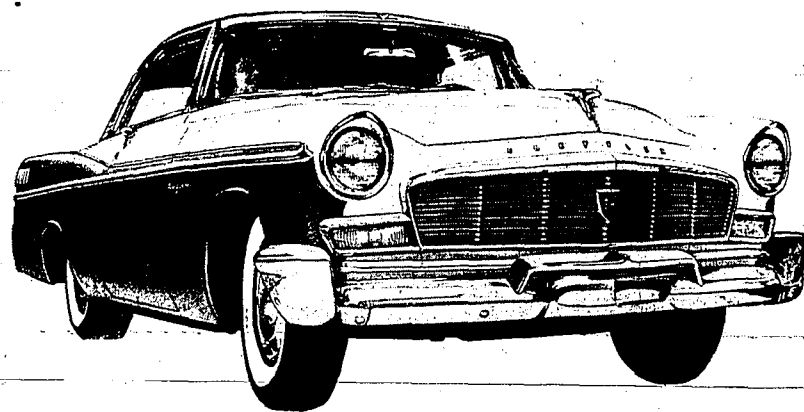

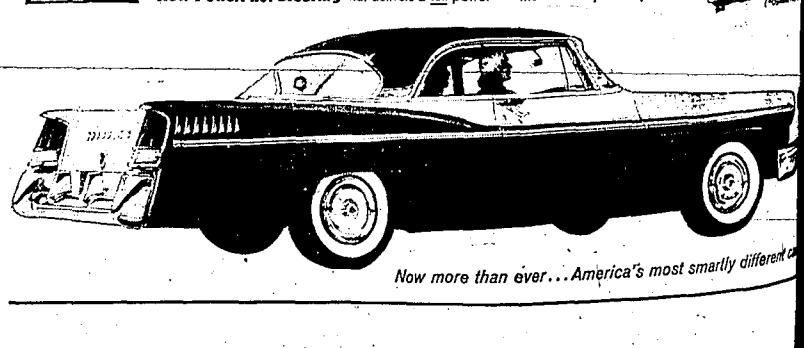
