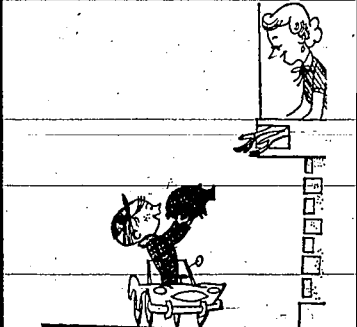

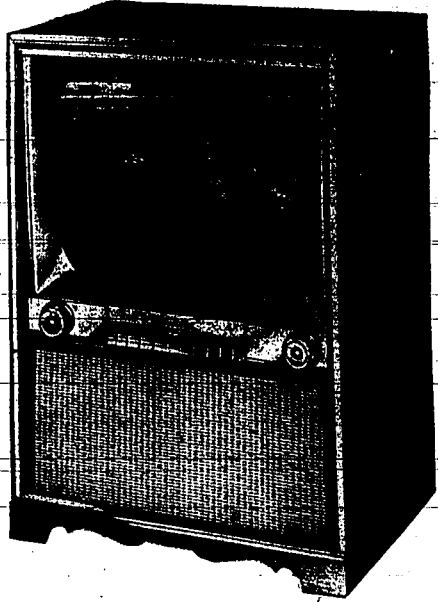



### Plans OK Federal Dam, Senator Says

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19—A Senate vote today has predicted that Congress will make the federal power company permits to build a dam in Hells canyon on the Snake river.

W. Kerr Scott said he believes the dam would make sure the Snake river basin is developed as it should be developed.

In addition to his address, Gauer entertained with a program of Swiss music and singing, including the world famous Alpine yodel. Gauer has had a colorful background, and his career reflects like a novel. Beginning as a cowhand, he worked hard to acquire an education, and is now a book publisher. Gauer said the most significant portions of Gauer's talk was the statement that the Swiss people have learned to love their native Swiss scenery and to appreciate all the good things they have. Gauer told his audience the people of his land are extremely fond of their mountain life. He said that the Swiss people are very serious minded and do not smile often. Commenting on the industrial output of the Alps, Gauer said his chief product was not watches, as many believe, but Switzerland's second largest industry is watchmaking. The Swiss make 65 per cent of the world's watches and 75 per cent of all the watch movements in the world. The mountainous Swiss industry is third in Swiss industrial output, said Gauer. Pointing to Switzerland's long history of remaining at peace, Gauer said the people were, however, ready for a war in 1914. Adding to this, Gauer explained that the Swiss build the highest standard of living in all of Europe.

### Nazi Forming Strong Party, Seeks Power

**By United Press**  
 The most dangerous Nazi still alive has just formed a new political party in West Germany. The Nazi is Otto Strasser, first an ardent follower, then the most hated enemy of Adolf Hitler.

His party is "The People's Movement for Unity and Freedom." Strasser hopes to pull together the many small right wing splinter groups now active in scattered Southern Germany's federal republic. He is looking forward to the 1961 parliamentary election.

A lot of things could happen in Germany before then. One of them might be the emergence of Strasser as a power in German politics, at the head of a strong nationalistic party.

That would be bad news. Strasser is a menace. He is an unrepentant Nazi even though he broke with Hitler in 1930. He is an excellent organizer. He has as many as 100,000 followers. He is now relatively inactive, spirit of German nationalism.

Strasser announced the formation of his new party at a time when it is plain West Germany is going to have some political problems. They are problems which will cause the western allies anxiety.

One of the best of 79-year-old Adenauer, now starting a long convalescence after an attack of pneumonia, is still in hospital. He is alive and functioning. West Germany is being headed by Konrad Adenauer, who is expected to him. West Germany might be plunged into political chaos.

There are some things which are like Strasser and Hitler to the fore.

**WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—**Speculation increased today that Dewey will be boosted by his supporters for the 1956 Republican nomination.

Chairman L. Judson Morhouse identified the speculation last night with a statement that any one of several men "in or out" of government could lead the party to victory if President Eisenhower does not run again.

Morhouse, speaking at a \$50 a plate GOP dinner at Schenectady, N.Y., said it is the potential candidates. 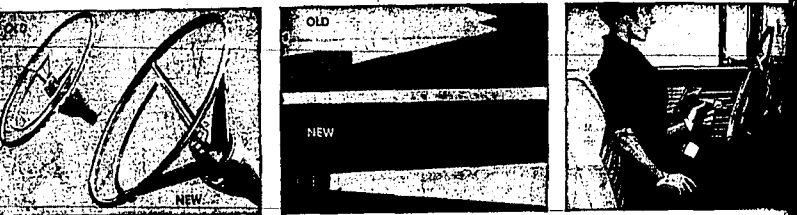

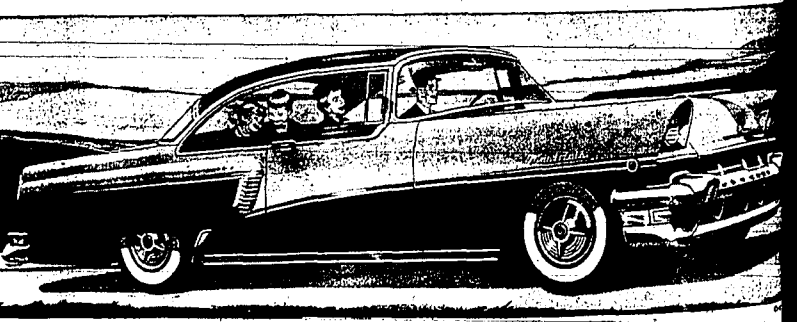

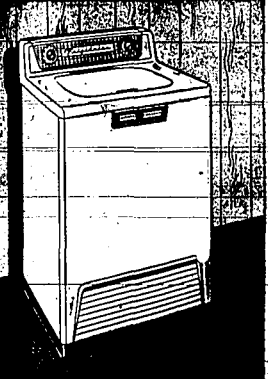

# Giant World's Fair Planned In Caribbean

**By The Associated Press**

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic, Oct. 18 (AP)—Down here in the Caribbean island that holds the bones of Christopher Columbus and the memories of Porfirio Rubinos, they're whipping up a world's fair designed to make even Grover Whelan jealous.

Whelan, the major domo of the New York World's Fair, which in 1939, didn't have—for one thing—the tomb of Columbus. For another, he didn't have the famed, tropical Caribbean—although he did have Long Island sound, which often is lined with outcropped palms of a different kind.

For a third, he didn't have the splitting atom. The Dominican Republic's 25 million dollar International Fair for Peace and Progress, which begins next Dec. 31 in this oldest city of the western hemisphere, will have the impressive United States "atom for peace" exhibit that made a hit in Geneva, Columbia—the well-known admiral of the ocean sea, and Rubinos, the well-known skipper of the matrimonial sea, both left here for new discoveries abroad.

Columbus-hit-the-new-world—at San Salvador, an island a few hundred miles off the coast, nearly 463 years ago. He arrived here, at the island he named Hispaniola, Oct. 12, 1492.

Columbus discovered the continent of South America. A prominent Dominican family, named fame in foreign lands by becoming the husband and wife of the explorer, Daniel de Barthelemy, Doris Duke, and Barbara Hutton, and maintaining a nodding acquaintance with Zsa Zsa Gabor.

Pan American World always brings a press group here on the junket, which Webster's Unabridged says is either: 1. A cream cheese; 2. A dish of awakened, flavoured milk set in moist jelly; 3. A sweetmeat; 4. A feast or banquet; or, 5. often saps, in the U. S. conspicuously, an outfit or pleasure excursion at public cost.

### Polish Sport Is Swindling; Cases Shown

WARSAW, Oct. 19 (U.S.)—The national office in Poland is swindling the government.

The communist regime winks at some of the tricks. They say it will cut the stamp tax on the inventory of the Poles turning over a fast loy.

Those who get away with something are regarded as local heroes and soon become the main topic in a country short of manpower and trying to industrialize while maintaining a high rate of unemployment. The government simply lacks the cops to curb the swindlers.

Shopkeepers cheat on taxes and often cheat the customer on prices, too. The official party press reported for instance that a flying squadron checked 30 shops in Siettin and found only three with correct books.

City clerks are always selling the peasants the rights to collect tolls on the highways in the mountains. Often they are party men and the peasant never knows beyond doubt if he has been dealt fairly with government backing or not.

Shopkeepers who know the law and the spirit of both by some shady, frequently brilliant, coup. Court decisions are full of such instances.

The most able swindlers deal in scarce commodities. They manage through some clever use of materials and in most cases can prove that the swindler's used the stolen materials in the long run. Warsaw chuckled for weeks over one case. It concerned a man who searched for aluminum to make medals for Roman Catholics. He knew it was useless to ask the government for a priority.

Finally, the man discovered that the two-gram coin was used for the purpose. He corralled as many as he could and made a million medals. He pocketed the fortune. The security police suddenly discovered a remarkable shortage of two-gram pieces and traced the case.

The manufacturer was arrested and tried. The court ruled that he had broken no law. Indeed, it pointed out that he had even paid his taxes properly. He was acquitted.

Swindling is rife.

The government and the party often issue appeals on the theme that the Poles who cheat the regime is cheating himself because it is "the people's government." The words fall on pretty deaf ears.

### U. S. Developing New Fast Crafts

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 19 (U.S.)—The new U. S. military planes with speeds approaching 1,000 miles an hour were reported yesterday by Dr. Smith J. de France, aeronautical scientist, in a speech prepared for delivery here before the Air Force association.

Dr. France said a revolutionary aerodynamic design principle has added 100 to 200 miles per hour to the top speed of these new planes.

Dr. France is the director of Ames Aeronautical Laboratory—Moffett field, a major government facility for aeronautical research.

Dr. France identified the new jet in the air force's Convair F102 and the navy's Grumman F9F1 Tiger.

### Russian Airlines Will Install Jets

MOSCOW, Oct. 19 (U.S.)—Russia is planning to start using jet passenger planes on its internal air lines early next year.

Gen. Vladimir Zakharov, vice chief of Soviet civil aviation, said plans had been completed for use of jet liners following conclusion of two years of experiments.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (U.S.)—Dr. Carlos Davila, secretary general of the organization of American States (OAS) and a former president of Chile, died here today.

### Few Conveniences Noted for Life in New Frontier Outpost

CHURCHILL, Man, Oct. 19 (U.S.)—Take a look at life in this town on Hudson bay, an outpost of the Canadian frontier.

Milk is 40 cents a quart, gasoline 5 1/2 cents for an imperial gallon. Plumbing is mostly outdoors. Summer brings black flies and mosquitoes. Winter brings numbing cold.

And when you die they have to carve your grave with dynamite.

Yet some 850 persons call this town home.

Ocean-shipping—freighters from England—carry out wheat in summer and make jobs. Construction of radar defense lines farther north has turned the town and nearby Fort Churchill into a bustling operations headquarters. There's even some whaling—a 12-foot blubber which brings \$12 at a rendering plant.

Building sites would make a city contractor shudder. They are strewn with three-rocks—some as big as a small house—beneath the tundra. Only two or three feet below the surface the ground is frozen solid the year round. Excavation is impossible; buildings rest on a gravel pad hauled in by truck. Lots are selling for \$80 to \$100.

Because of the cold, permafrost pipelines run along the surface. When cold weather sets in the house supply is cut off and householders must haul their own water or pay 75 cents for a barrel delivered.

Fuel oil sells for \$14.50 for a 25-gallon drum and coal at \$24 a ton. Electricity is 12 cents a kilowatt hour.

### Chairman for GOP to Face Rugged Year

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—The roof fell in on Leonard W. Hall when President Eisenhower suffered a heart attack. Before that, there was a rocky glow in the sky for Hall. Now he can't see what lies ahead.

As chairman of the Republican national committee it's Hall's job to lay the foundations for a Republican victory in the 1956 congressional and presidential elections.

His counterpart, Paul M. Butler, chairman of the Democratic national committee, has the same kind of job. It's a thankless job for both any time. But Hall's looked easier than Butler's before the President fell ill Sept. 24.

The Democrats have no sure shot candidate for the presidential nomination in their convention next summer, even though at the moment Adlai Stevenson may seem to hold an edge.

And before the convention is over the scramble among Democrats may bust the party wide open. But Hall, a lifelong politician who at 55 is genial and almost bald, saw nothing like that in store for his party. On the contrary, in early September, he was in a spot Butler and many other "professionals" must have envied.

To hear his talk, he was confident Eisenhower would win again. If Eisenhower did, with his immense popularity, he seemed a year ahead of time to have much better than a 50-50 chance of winning.

And if Eisenhower won he might again, as he did in 1952, pull the Republicans control of congress once more. The whole Republican party felt the way Hall did.

Then the President was stricken. Now Hall merely, and not too confidently, speaks about the possibility that Eisenhower may run.

If he had to bet privately, he'd guess he'd bet Eisenhower won't run. So Hall, an ex-judge and seven times a congressman, faces a tough year, just as tough as Butler's.

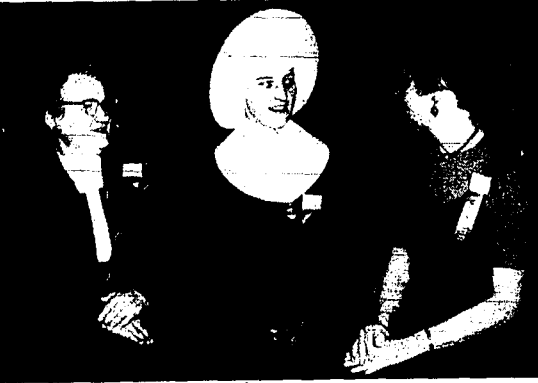

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—Senator Mansfield, D. Mont., yesterday told the interior department the landless Indians living on Hill 57 in Great Falls, Mont., are federal wards, and a responsibility of the government.

In a letter to interior secretary McKay, Mansfield said the situation of the more than 200 Indians is "deplorable" and that he hopes to find "an additional source of assistance for these Indians in the not too distant future."

Orme Lewis, a former assistant secretary of the interior several weeks ago wrote the Montana congressional delegation that it is the department's position that the Hill 57 Indians are not federal wards, and that many of them are Canadian citizens.

Lewis said the Indians originally were invited to Great Falls by the community to work there and that the responsibility for helping them belongs to the city.

Mansfield said in his letter to McKay: "Information obtained from local sources in Montana indicates that these Indians or their immediate families were abandoned wards and have been on the rolls of the federal government and are citizens of the United States, not Canada, with possibly one or two exceptions."

Sen. James E. Murray, Congressman Lee Metcalf and I intend to pursue this matter further in an attempt to discover if there is a sound basis on which these people base their claim as wards of the federal government."

Mansfield asked McKay for information on four points:

A bill to provide federal assistance for unemployed Hill 57 Indians failed to pass at the last session of congress.

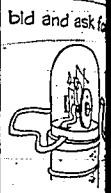

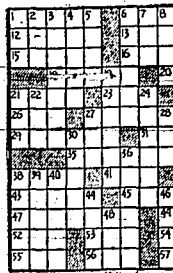

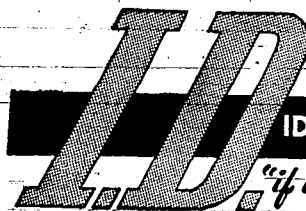
