\$55,000 Dam Project Work To Start Soon

BOISE, Oct. 20.—Directors of the Big Lost river irrigation district told Blaine Reclamation Engineer Mark Kulp yesterday that plans are virtually complete for a \$55,000 extension project on Mackay dam on the Big Lost river.

They paid a call on Kulp after arranging with a Boise bank for purchase of bonds approved earlier this year by voters in the south-central Idaho district.

Toy D. Merrill of Arco, president of the board, told Kulp that work would begin soon and be completed by late next spring.

Workers will raise the level of the dam five feet, increasing the storage capacity by 2,500 acre-feet to a total of about 48,000.

Clifford P. Twin Falls attorney, said the project is intended primarily to supply supplemental water for about 30,000 irrigated acres in the Big Lost river valley.

He said a search is still under way for an engineer to supervise the construction project.

There is a general speculation that Mr. Eisenhower, although making satisfactory recovery from his illness, would leave himself open to a surprise attack in the event of a Democratic victory.

Gov. Theodore F. McKinley of Maryland, one of the two Republican chief executives attending the 21st annual southern governors conference, agreed the GOP would have a hard time winning another candidate of Eisenhower's philosophy. He said this would be particularly true if the GOP candidate had an isolationist or reactionary background.

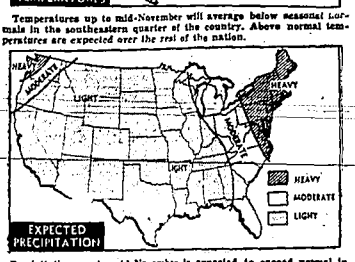

Management, Unions Hurt U. S. System

PAINE SPRINGS, Calif., Oct. 10 (AP)—A Yale professor says both management and unions are destroying capitalism.

Dr. Thomas G. Spates, professor emeritus of personnel administration at Yale, said the best way to remedy the current trend "down the road to disaster" is for both employers and unions to treat workers as the individuals they are.

"Employers and unions are destroying capitalism and the American way of life," he said. "The individual is being crushed by the machine."

Spates said that employers who sign contracts which set up the union shop are contributing to the destruction of capitalism.

"Compulsory unionism is inconsistent with both Christianity and the American way of life," he said.

He also criticized employers who guarantee annual wage increases on long-term contracts.

Employers who pay employees to become stockholders by matching any amount the employee invests also are contributing to the ruin of capitalism, he said.

"That's a damned sight closer to socialism and communism than it is to capitalism," Spates said, referring to the practice.

Dr. Thomas G. Spates, professor emeritus of personnel administration at Yale, said the best way to remedy the current trend "down the road to disaster" is for both employers and unions to treat workers as the individuals they are.

"Employers and unions are destroying capitalism and the American way of life," he said. "The individual is being crushed by the machine."

Spates said that employers who sign contracts which set up the union shop are contributing to the destruction of capitalism.

"Compulsory unionism is inconsistent with both Christianity and the American way of life," he said.

He also criticized employers who guarantee annual wage increases on long-term contracts.

Employers who pay employees to become stockholders by matching any amount the employee invests also are contributing to the ruin of capitalism, he said.

"That's a damned sight closer to socialism and communism than it is to capitalism," Spates said, referring to the practice.

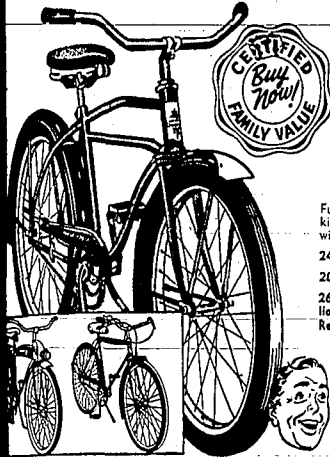

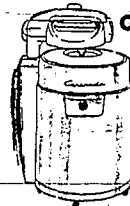

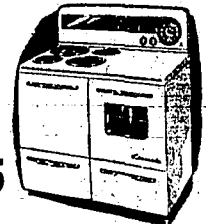

Actor's Quick Death Shocks Film Friends

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 20 (AP)—Actor John Hodiak's fatal heart attack stunned Hollywood's film colony already saddened by the recent deaths of four other movie stars.

Hodiak, a Pittsburgh coal miner son, pushed his way to the stardom in a career that began at the age 11, when he acted in Russian and Ukrainian plays in a parish. He was shaving yesterday morning when he collapsed suddenly and died of coronary thrombosis.

Funeral arrangements were to be made today after the arrival of Hodiak's sister, Mrs. Michael G. DeLoe.

Death came as the tall, handsome actor headed for new screen stardom after his movie career temporarily stalled. Critics were praising him for his performance in "Projecting Attorney in a New Suit," which opened recently throughout the country.

Other deaths which have rocked Hollywood since late summer were those of Clarence Muse, Susan Bell, Robert Francis and Laura Dean.

The career of Miss Bell, who died of cancer, and Hodiak, who died of cancer, and auto crashes, respectively, were among the most promising in Hollywood. Miss Miranda, the fiery Latin-American character, was now establishing herself as a top Hollywood performer when she died suddenly—like Hodiak—of a heart attack.

Although Hodiak's friends and family said he was healthy, and had no record of heart trouble, doctors explained that the actor had high blood pressure and there was "a bad family heart history."

"He was one of the most sensitive persons I've known," said his ex-wife, actress Mary Astor, who was with him at the time of Hodiak's death. "He was a magnificent husband, a tender and loving father and a far more brilliant, sensitive actor than anybody knew. He never wanted to hurt anybody and he never did."

The couple had one child, Katherine, 4. Hodiak and Miss Baxter were married in 1946 and divorced on Jan. 27, 1953.

Hike Is Expected In Smog Effects

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 20 (AP)—A health expert said yesterday that Los Angeles may be on the verge of an increase in lung cancer deaths among residents long and continuously exposed to smog.

Dr. Clarence A. Mills, professor of experimental medicine at the University of Cincinnati college of medicine, said in an interview that there is a 12 to 15 year lag between the beginning of exposure to air pollution in industrialized areas and a sharp upturn in lung cancer deaths.

"Smog in Los Angeles reached keen public attention in 1942," he said. "Therefore, this area now is entering the period in which the ill effects of air pollution are likely to be reflected in more deaths from lung cancer among permanent residents continuously exposed to heavy smog concentrations."

Secret Documents Indicate MacArthur Urged Speeding Russ Entry Into War

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—The Pentagon made public Wednesday long-secret documents reporting that Gen. Douglas MacArthur favored Russia's entry into the war with Japan as late as June, 1945—less than three months before the war ended.

MacArthur has said he was "most emphatically" against bringing the Soviet Union into the conflict at the time of the Yalta conference in February 1945, and would have said so if his advice had been asked.

The newly released documents, part of the defense department's study of Russia's 11th hour entry into the war, contain nothing either to confirm or refute the former Far Eastern commander's statement last March that his "views were not solicited for the Yalta conference."

In New York, MacArthur's office said he was out of town and not expected back until the evening. The office added that he is not expected to comment on the documents before Thursday at the earliest.

The Pentagon account says MacArthur said he was "most emphatically" against bringing the Soviet Union into the conflict at the time of the Yalta conference in February 1945, and would have said so if his advice had been asked.

Famed Doctor Receives Top Briton Medal

LONDON, Oct. 20 (AP)—Britain's monarch and prime minister yesterday honored Dr. Albert Schweitzer, who forsook fame four decades ago and became as the living legend of Lambarene.

This was truly a different sort of award for the French missionary, musician and philosopher who has spent half his life as a physician and friend to the poor and the lepers of French Equatorial Africa.

He had come to Buckingham palace with the French ambassador, Jean Chauvet, in a car flying the colors of France. Coldstream guards in scarlet tunics snapped to salute with their rifles.

Within the palace Queen Elizabeth II waited him for the formal ceremony investing the insignia of honorary member of the Order of Merit.

Only 24 living Britons may hold this cherished honor. The only other non-Briton to be an honorary member is President Eisenhower.

After yesterday evening, Dr. Schweitzer called at 10 Downing street at the invitation of Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden.

After the Buckingham palace ceremony, the shy doctor, who has been called to his embarrassment "the greatest man on earth," spoke with the British prime minister at a hospital he had set up in Lambarene in the equatorial Congo.

British Labor Party Leader Plans to Quit

 "Dear old Clem" Attlee seems to have made up his mind to give up his 20-year leadership of the British Labor party.
 The 57-year-old reports from London that the modest, colorless little man who became a socialist by accident back in 1910 will announce his retirement when parliament meets next week.
 In any event, there seems no doubt that he has decided to go. It is expected that, when he does, he will give up his seat in the house of commons too, perhaps to become a peer and enter the house of lords.
 Attlee is 72. He suffered a heart attack last summer. He is tired out after years of riding herd on the highly undisciplined labor party, chronically torn by dissension.
 It is expected that aggressive, ahead Herbert Morrison, now deputy leader, will step into Attlee's job.
 But Morrison is 67. It is being predicted that he will act only as a place-holder for Hugh Gaitskell, the 40-year-old party treasurer. He is the up-and-coming man.
 They call Attlee a mousy, unspitting man and a political accident. But he proved himself a man of parts.
 Richard Attlee was not born into the labor party level of British society.
 He studied law, he went to an expensive "public school" and to Oxford university. He came out a conservative and a Tory.
 But it happened that a settlement house in London's East end needed a secretary and Attlee was looking for a job. Few Tories of his background ever even get to the east end. He saw for the first time the misery in which so many of his fellow Britons lived.
 Attlee was shocked and shaken. With a resolution in which he joined the labor party.

Demo Is Refuting Prosperity Claims

CHICAGO, Oct. 20 (AP)—Democratic National Chairman F. M. Butler ridiculed Republican claims of "peace and prosperity" at a Democratic rally here last night.
 "When 13 per cent of our population is being pinched by a drop in farm prices, when 13 million of our people are suffering a 25 billion dollar decline in farm income, when our businesses are suffering in the main streets and when 38 per cent of the automobile retailers are losing money," Butler asked.
 He said Democratic administration policies, such as NARTO, the Marshall plan and economic aid to foreign countries, had paved the way for peace.

Spouse Comment Told by Russian

NEW YORK, Oct. 20 (AP)—A visiting Russian journalist maintained yesterday that wives are wiser than husbands and that "as a rule, women under communism are as they are under capitalism."
 Anoull Vladimirovich Sofronov, manager of a soviet magazine, was among five Russian journalists who visited the Metropolitan Museum of Art.
 He saw a man copying an oil painting and asked him through an interpreter why he was doing so.
 "I want to prove to my wife that I can paint like the American," said Danial Dunlop, a cattle farmer from Williston, Minn.
 "All wives are the same," steeled Sofronov. "You have to prove everything to them."

Malayan Red Readies Meet With Enemies

SINGAPORE, Oct. 30 (AP)—The top-spoken young man who has seven years to expect to come out of the jungle within two weeks to talk peace.

He is Chin Peng, the 33-year-old Communist party and leader of the guerrillas who have kept the peninsula in turmoil since June, 1948. The chief ministers of the federation of Malaya and Singapore have agreed to meet him to arrange a conference. Malaya and Singapore have just been given representative government.

Chief Minister Tengku Abdul Rahman of Malaya and Chief Minister David Marshall of Singapore offered the rebel an amnesty on Sept. 28 ending the meeting.

It is as the result of this offer, approved by British military authorities, that the meeting with Chin is being arranged.

British authorities, who agreed only with great reluctance to the conference, fear Chin has everything to gain and nothing to lose. They expect him to go to the rendezvous not merely to listen, but to be heard.

They expect him to put forward his own peace terms—without the withdrawal of British troops as the first item.

Chin's position is strong. If his negotiations fail, he can take back into the jungle and continue the fight. Also, the fact that the chief ministers have agreed to meet him on neutral ground has elevated him to the status of a hero to many of Malaya's people.

China's men fight largely with British weapons which were parachuted to him during World War II.

Chin was Britain's most trusted guerrilla fighter against the Japanese.

It is believed he was a communist then, having joined the party in his teens.

Soviets Building First Spaceship

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30 (AP)—Russia started building a space ship early this year and plans to spend about 20 million dollars on the project, Aero Digest magazine said yesterday.

The aviation engineering magazine said the Soviet government has completed two of the three rockets that will power the ship, and together they are 150 feet long.

Parents Can Decide Soon on Whether Their Children Receive Salk Vaccine

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30 (AP)—Millions of American parents must decide in the next few weeks whether their children should receive Salk polio vaccine.

More vaccine is available now than ever before. And more children are eligible for the shots. But before any can be inoculated, their parents must give their permission.

The decision may be any one, especially in view of the recent controversy over the vaccine's safety and effectiveness.

In making their choice, parents are advised by their private physicians and local public health officers. But the government itself has thrown its full support behind the vaccine.

Here are some of the many questions parents have been asking, and the answers—based on the views of Surgeon General Leonard A. Scheide and the U. S. public health service.

Q—Is the present Salk vaccine safe?
A—The vaccine now being prepared under rigid new government standards is as safe as science can presently make it. The risk of the vaccine giving a child polio is considered "negligible." Since the standards were put into effect May 22, there hasn't been a single case of polio linked with the vaccine.

Q—Why is the vaccine considered safe now?
A—Because the new safety standards require more tests during the production process, tests of increased sensitivity, and tests after the vaccine has been bottled. And, as an extra precaution, the government—in addition to the manufacturer—now tests the vaccine.

Q—What caused the strange outbreak of polio last summer among children who received Custer vaccine?
A—A four-month government investigation failed to prove exactly what happened. The assumption is that live virus got into some Custer vaccine because of the inadequacy of the government's safety standards then in use. These standards have been overhauled.

Q—How well did the vaccine do in the mass inoculation program in this year?
A—Among the seven million children who received shots, preliminary tests showed the incidence rate among vaccinated children was 25 to 30 per cent below the incidence in the same age group. In almost all the data assembled so far, the percentage was 50 per cent lower among vaccinated children.

Q—How long do Salk shots provide protection?
A—This question has not yet been answered. Salk has reported, however, that in some of the children he vaccinated a high degree of protection was maintained for as long as 30 months. But some top experts believe a mild live virus will have to be developed to provide longer immunity.

Q—How severe was the polio season this year?

Cyprus Seen As New Top Danger Area

NICOSIA, Cyprus, Oct. 30 (AP)—The new civil governor and commander in chief of Cyprus, Sir John Harding, is expected to visit this little island which has been a hot spot since the Greek Cypriots and the Turkish Cypriots gave to the island a new status of passive hostility against Harding.

Mr. Harding, a former British leader of the island's Turks, is watching the Greek Cypriots' leader, Archbishop Makarios, who is leading from his hide-out the Greek gangs which are assassinating British and "collaborators" and blowing up government buildings.

It is the most tangled situation which Cyprus has faced in its 5,000-year history.

Britain wants it. Turkey says that it will give it up. Turkey may have it. Life proceeds fairly normally in the cities. But there is an atmosphere of oppressive fear. And the atmosphere of fear is apparent in the increasing number of British troops, the strong forces of Cyprus-Cypriots-politicians and the intelligence corps which is trying to root out the terrorists.

It is not in the country that the atmosphere of Cyprus becomes really apparent.

Britain is determined to keep Cyprus because it is becoming a most important military base, a base important the entire Middle East from Turkey to Pakistan.

New Atomic Particle Found Can Annihilate Basic Matter

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 30 (AP)—Discovery of a remarkable new atomic particle which can annihilate the basic building block of all matter has been announced by Prof. Ernest O. Lawrence, famed nuclear scientist.

Long sought as a means of explaining some of the mysteries of the physical universe, the particle was produced in the University of California's multi-billion volt bevatron by a team of experts in radiation research.

A joint announcement of the find also was made by the atomic energy commission which financed the \$15 million dollar bevatron.

Although the particle is a potent annihilator of matter as we know it, it poses no threat to the material universe, no instrument that could be made into a disintegrator of matter.

In Washington the AEC said the discovery was "a big step forward in man's effort to understand and thereby control his physical environment."

One of the most valuable results, it added, is that the finding eliminates some of the uncertainty about nuclear theory. It does not change existing ideas about the makeup of atoms but "reinforces and solidifies atomic theory."

Dr. Willard P. Libby, acting AEC chairman, said there will be no immediate practical application and that nobody could predict when the discovery would lead.

Its main value, said Professor Lawrence, is to open the way for an exciting new round of atomic discoveries. He added that it clears up some existing theories about the nature of matter.

The new particle is called the antiproton, or negatively charged proton. It is the counterpart of the positively charged proton which constitutes the nucleus of the hydrogen atom.

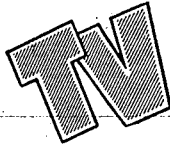

Actor Shows His One-Man Religion Film

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 20 (AP)—Lawry Ayres gave up acting two years ago, and today he is making the reason for his long absence from the screen—a five and one-half hour one-man movie on religion.

He scrapped together his own earnings, said goodbye to the dizzy world of the cinema city and began an eight-month tour of 17 countries. He took only a 16-mm camera and one assistant. They accomplished the surprising feat of a film documentary on the world's great religions, capturing Christianity.

Ayres collected so much material he wound up with three movies, totaling five and one-half hours, and a book, "Altars of Asia." He's taking the films on tours around the country, beginning with San Francisco Oct. 31, as his "contribution to peace."

While his fellow actors were discussing their latest movie successes over late meals the other night, Ayres proudly previewed his production for film executives. Now, he said excitedly, "there's talk of the films playing in the best theaters."

Low speed quietly watching his friends file into the projection room, Ayres looked on with a certain pride. In recent years the one-line star of the "Dr. Killdeer" series has been devoted to religious work. He lives alone in a Laurel canyon in public ways in the best of health.

"I made this film because I hoped it would add a grain, a little contribution, to our understanding of our Asiatic neighbors, and that is so important now," he explained.

"I feel people should know more about Oriental religions because religion is such a factor in Oriental thinking. These films show the religions, the ideal of a billion and a half persons—that's three-fourths of the world's population."

Ayres filmed "authentic music and religious chants." He appears in the three films as he interviews religious leaders. Editing the films took him a year.

"I don't whip out a narration on religion like you do a story," he said. "I had to check each scene with an expert. One of my relatives pronounced a word. I had to be authentic."

And when will he return to acting?

"Oh, no, I have too much to do," he said. "I've given up acting for the time being. Next year I'll do a film on Christianity—and that will be a two-year project. You can't eliminate any act or denomination."

Series of Aptitude Tests Is Envisioned To Help in New Scholarship Program

BONN, Germany, Oct. 20 (AP)—made his first report to the board of "aptitude tests" may have to replace the conventional tests of "book of knowledge" to choose candidates for the unprecedented number of college scholarships to be offered in the United States.

Dr. Konant, for 20 years president of Harvard university and now U. S. ambassador to West Germany, believes the new scholarship program announced last month is a "very splendid development" in American education.

One of the most significant implications of the scholarship program in Konant's view, is the necessity to work out a satisfactory method for selecting candidates.

Because such a large percentage of American youth is enrolled in high schools—much larger percentages than in most European countries—it may be necessary to devise special methods for selecting scholarship students, he said.

Instead of using methods which are quite orthodox in Europe, where the examinations are based on the content of school courses, it may be necessary to conduct some form of aptitude tests.

"Such tests would bring out the real capacities of the student and reduce the hazards of the particular type of schooling methods to which he has been exposed."

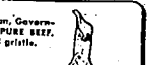

Woman Tells Of Living in Slave Camps

(Mrs. Erika Glasser Wallach is the last of the "disappeared" Polish women who were imprisoned in a Soviet Russian slave labor camp. She was the wife of Paul Fisher, a Washington bank employee, who was killed in the war with Adolf Hitler. However, Mrs. Wallach still faces the problem of getting a passport.)

SHOSHONE, Oct. 20—The Russian authorities brought me back from the Vorukla labor camp to Moscow several weeks ago and told me with apologies that my imprisonment was a mistake.

All I can say now is that I am happy to be free to walk about the city—alighting, going where I like, seeing films and plays, and planning a reunion with my mother, husband and children.

I do not want to discuss my prison experience for, as you know, there is a Russian saying, "Turna ne karui," which means prison is not a resort.

It is certainly no picnic. It is no pleasure to be a labor camp inmate, but I cannot complain about my treatment.

I was released and cleared of all charges with apologies from the Soviet authorities. Now I just want

to plan a quiet simple life with my family.

My husband, Robert Wallach, a Washington bank employee, was overjoyed when informed that his wife was free and is returning to him. However, Mrs. Wallach still faces the problem of getting a passport.

(Mrs. Wallach and her two children in the United States.)

She is not an American. She is a native of Germany. But now, it is understood, she has no citizenship anywhere.

(Washington officials recalled that she had been temporarily granted a visa—entry into the United States before. The grounds for this action were not disclosed. Furthermore, they noted that she once was closely associated with Noel and Herta Felt, Americans who elected to remain in Russia rather than return to the United States after being freed from jail in that communist nation.)

Please do not consider me a martyr or a heroine. I want bygone to be bygone and to forget. I am
