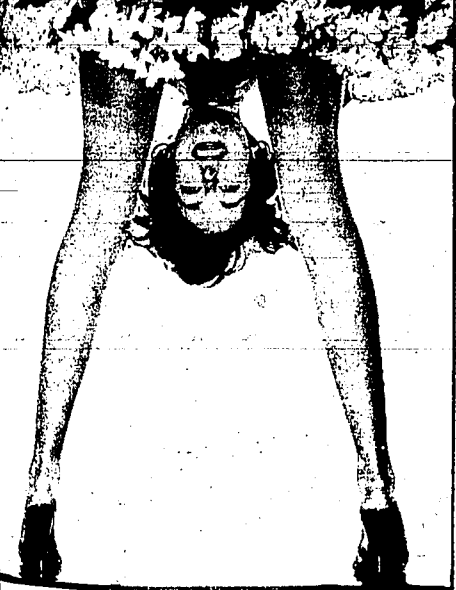

WELCOME ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

It will come as welcome news that the state highway department has called for bids for improving about on 5.7 miles of U. S. 30 in Twin Falls county.

The improvements will be made in the vicinity of what generally is known as the Banbury grade. Practically all of the dangerous curves in that area will be eliminated.

Work will start about a half mile north of the Summer Springs across the river. The new 5.7-mile stretch will be a 34-foot, wide fully paved highway.

Another feature of this new project will be a special truck lane on the upgrade side. This will be 2,700 feet long and will add 10 feet to the width of the main right-of-way.

Where Salmon Falls creek intersects the highway—once a stopping point on the old Oregon trail—a 100-foot wide, new 90-foot bridge, 16 feet wide, with a 15-inch safety curb walkway on each side.

For years this particular section of U. S. 30, which passes through one of Idaho's outstanding scenic attractions, has been sadly neglected. In spite of its importance as a part of a transcontinental highway, serving one of Idaho's most heavily populated areas, there has been little improvement since 1921 and little over a long period of years.

In the past, the explanation for all this neglect has been that the cost of improving U. S. 30 down the Banbury grade, along Thousand Springs, through Hagerman Valley, over the Malad river and finally up the Bliss grade would be prohibitive.

With the type of heavy road machinery now employed in modern highway construction, however, nothing seems to stop the engineers in their relentless drive to keep pace with traffic demands. The point is that they are talking and negotiating within the U. N., instead of fighting outside it, there persists the hope of arriving at a mutually agreeable solution.

That is the only excuse for the U. N. and, as a result, membership in it is still only the image of a dream.

VIEW OF OTHERS

AN IMMUTABLE LAW. The old law that two things are certain—death and taxes—apparently is being challenged in Utah.

The high point in a career spectacular for insurgency came last week when Lee announced that he would support the government in its attempt to force a supreme court test of the constitutionality of the government's taxing its citizens.

This was the first time that Lee had ever supported foreign nations through foreign aid programs.

The case of Lee vs. the United States promised to be a landmark in the history of the state. The case, it appears, more entertainment is in store.

**Light Dread Diseases Rank as Major Cripplers, Killers; Children Attacked**

BRINDGDALE, Oct. 22 (AP)—This is a far greater threat to health than any other disease. These leave vastly different marks on the body. Some are permanent disabilities which specialists do not know how to cure. Others are crippling but also in some cases are heart disease, multiple sclerosis, rheumatoid arthritis, diabetes, and polio. Many of these diseases are broken cannot be cured. Their economic cost to the nation is estimated in the billions of dollars.

Research in the cause and cure of these diseases has advanced today, the United States spends a little more than \$1 billion a year on research in government and private institutions. It has received more attention than any other disease in the past 20 years. The total cost of these diseases over the past decade has averaged about two million dollars a year. The National Institute of Neurological Diseases thinks the figure should be at least 10 million dollars a year.

Arthritis and rheumatic diseases: No. 1 crippler among chronic diseases. As distinguished from other causes. Affects some 21 million persons, more than one million of whom are permanently disabled. Causes of most maladies in this category unknown. More prevalent than cancer, heart disease, tuberculosis and hepatitis combined. More than 320,000 made unemployable each year, cost to nation: More than 700 million dollars a year. Research scourges.

Diabetes: More than two million afflicted; 62,000 new cases a year. This disease, which can cause blindness, is controllable to some extent by insulin and diet. The great need: More research. The economic loss: Nearly 10,500,000 man-hours a year. Tuberculosis: Deaths reduced 89 per cent since 1912. Still kills 20,700 a year. Some 25,000 TB patients die each year, among them 1,200 children under 15. At least 1,200,000 current cases. Production loss: 800 million dollars a year. Loss in future production caused by deaths: one billion dollars. Cash outlays by federal and other agencies: 620 million dollars a year.

Polio: Leading cause—of death of children among communicable diseases. Presently a crippling, however, 1938-52 case total: 30,871; deaths, 2,912. Once crippled, no cure. Of all cases 80 per cent recover completely, 14 per cent are severely paralyzed, and six per cent may die. Expenditures on research (as distinguished from large amounts for care and treatment): About 20 million dollars a year. Cost in lost production, blighted lives and parental anguish: Incalculable.

These are the great diseases: "The home of science is to make polio, at least, as rare as once-dreaded smallpox has become.

In 1954 the government received reports of only nine smallpox cases. And none of them, it said, fulfilled "the generally accepted criteria for a diagnosis of the disease that once was one of the world's great scourges."

### Non-Citizen Pensions Irk Texas Solon

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—Rep. Olin E. Teague, D., Tex., said Sunday he has reported to the House of Representatives the irking of non-Americans by getting U.S. pension checks in Italy and that Americans are planning for pensions of Chinese Nationalist soldiers on Formosa.

Teague, chairman of the house veterans affairs committee, said he is going to try to get the government to "take appropriate steps to insure that the money is going to non-Americans."

Teague apparently referred to the veterans administration payments to persons who have been in the U.S. armed services. He spoke in New York following his recent trip to Europe to look into matters handled by his committee.

The "The 6,000 pension checks are mailed each month to Italy for persons who are reportedly non-citizens of the United States." He said the checks average \$70 each, a total of about \$420,000 monthly.

Many of those getting the checks, he said, reportedly are World War I veterans. He said they are citizens, and some who have long since given up their American citizenship.

Teague also said he was checking into reports that the international cooperation administration is using the money to set up a pension program for soldiers retiring from the Chinese Nationalist army on Formosa.

### Judgment in Love Suit Is Cut by Court

SPOKANE, Oct. 22 (AP)—A \$200,000 judgment awarded Ruth Buck in a suit against her former husband's present wife for alienation of affection and invasion of marital rights was chopped in half Friday afternoon.

Judge Raymond F. Kelley cut the judgment, citing the "direction of the court," to \$100,000 for alienation and \$25,000 for invasion of marital rights. William E. Shupe, counsel for Ruth Buck, indicated she would accept the reduced judgment although the court said she would be granted a new trial should she refuse to accept the lesser amount.

The judgment, even after Judge Kelley's action Friday, is still the largest ever granted for alienation in the state of Washington. Attorney Carl Mayer and Victor J. Felice, representing Sylvia Buck, now estranged from her husband, argued that the previous 199 court-approved judgment in any state not approving punitive damages was \$25,000.

They argued that the judgment was "fantastic" and that, on its face, showed that the jury was motivated by "passion and prejudice." Judge Kelley said that the jury's award was "generous" but not so high as to indicate passion and prejudice. The case, he said, was unusual because the man involved, Vincent C. Buck, vice president of Western Culk, had a far higher earning capacity than is usual in such cases.

### Food Beliefs Are Blasted By Dieticians

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 22 (AP)—So you've been skipping meals as a good way to reduce weight or perhaps eating olives and oysters in the belief they'll make you more virile? If so, you're wasting either your will power or your time, says the American Dietetic association.

Have you always thought junior bread a thick steak after a strenuous afternoon on the football field because protein needs are increased with physical activity?

Theoretically, the association's food and nutrition experts. They add that it just isn't true, either, that steaks thicken the blood, or that cheese is constipating.

There were on a long list of food fallacies drawn up by the association's community nutrition section. The executive board of association, in convention here, has resolved to establish a program of providing the public with sound food and nutrition information.

Offer Cooperation The national organization wishes to cooperate with its affiliated state associations and local chapters to help the public in combating food misinformation, said Fern C. Giesler of Chicago, president of the association.

The nutrition authorities are appalled by the amount of phony food beliefs swallowed and digested by so many Americans. Who, for example, doesn't believe that fresh milk, potatoes and bread themselves, are fattening—or that fruit and fruit juices are not fattening?

Why, the members of the American Dietetic association, providing correct beliefs?

Neither do they accept the old saying that fish is brain food, or that fresh pork in summer will make one fat, that celery is good for the nerves, or that garlic pills help your memory.

The association's community nutrition section also has drawn up a list of groups responsible for spreading false information about food.

The salesman who distorts facts to sell his product and the professional person who falls for out-dated beliefs are on it, along with many others.

And so is grandpa.

### Engine Repairing Helped by Color

CHICAGO, Ill. (AP)—A method of simplifying auto and aircraft engine repair has resulted from research at the University of Illinois—a color identification for complicated engine parts.

Another part of the method is a "lock and key" system of designating each part so that no other part is quite like it.

Prof. Lawrence Stolow, U. of I. professor who conducted the research, said the two principles could be put into practice with little change in present equipment and would save thousands of hours spent in training assemblymen, mechanics and repairmen.

### \$35,000 Needed To Begin Farm

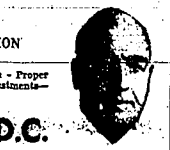

Students will be expected to bone up on three debate topics:

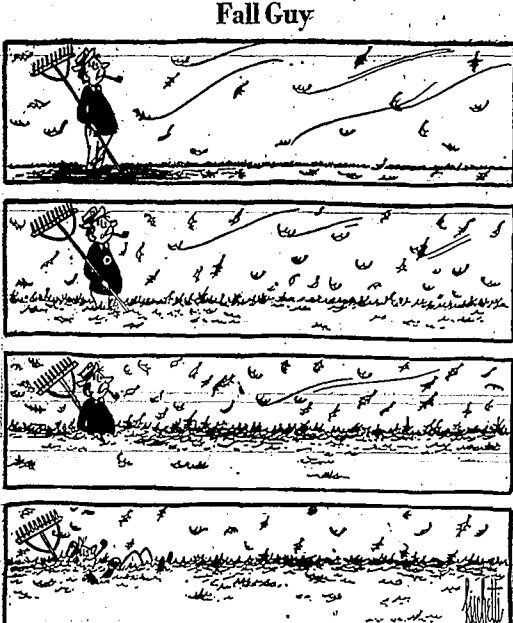
**"Resolved: That the educational privileges granted to veterans of the Korean war be accorded to all qualified American youth."**

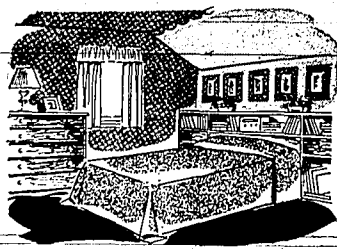

### Stalin's Fear of Foreigners May Have Halted Atom Plan

**WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (U)—**Marshall Stalin's fear, or suspicion, of foreigners, poking around his life but may have held back control of the atom bomb for years.

The defense department reports this week—on American efforts to get Russia into the war against Japan—Jan. 19, 1943, in opposition to letting the United States get a look into Sovietland.

At that time this country had the problem of sending planes to Russia, or "fight off" the Germans by the roundabout way of North Africa. It would have been easier to ship them from Alaska directly into Siberia.

In a message to Stalin the latter part of 1942 President Roosevelt mentioned that to Stalin, he also told him Japan might attack Russia. In such event, Roosevelt said, American planes would help fight the enemy.

But the amount of help Russia got, Roosevelt said, would depend on the ability of Russian air base to handle American planes. He suggested a few Americans be permitted to look around in Siberia to see what Russia needed in the way of planes.

Russia was having a tough time with the Germans in those days—and would need help from the United States, which was its strongest ally. Nevertheless, Stalin said in a January, 1943, message to Roosevelt: "It would seem obvious that Russian military objects can be inspected only by American inspectors."

After the war the United States proposed a plan to control the atom bomb: It called for teams of foreign inspectors to be stationed in the United States and Russia to be sure neither side cheated or prepared a sneak attack.

But to the end of Stalin's life in 1953 Russia firmly turned its back on that idea. Perhaps if Stalin had had Mrs. Eivore Thompson.

did during or right after the war Russia might have been more receptive.

At any rate his Kremlin successors usually agree to such a plan if arrangements with them reached the point of signing on the dotted line. And by this time the United States has become fairly well disillusioned with the theory that inspection teams can be truly effective.

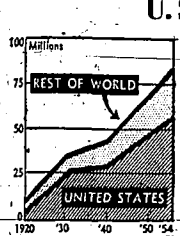

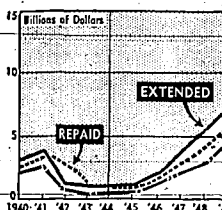

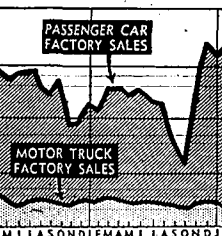

### Plane Secrets No Secret to Alert Japanese Publishers

TOKYO, Oct. 22 (AP)—"Do you think we're farm hands? Have you forgotten the Zero?"

Kunio Baba, editor of the intriguing Japanese aviation magazine, "Atsuryu," waved his hand toward the city, designating the editorial office just off Tokyo's crowded Ginza.

He was explaining how Atsuryu manages to keep startling Pentagon and other places month after month by publishing highly accurate designs, drawings and cutaways of the latest super-secret American jet fighters.

Some of Atsuryu's designs have been rated from 80 to 95 per cent accurate.

"But there is no secret, no miracle," Baba explained.

"We just study the photographs—U.S. companies hand out so many—and figure the rest out for ourselves. When we can't get the photos we gather all the information we can. After all, there are only so many ways to build an airplane and Japan has aeronautical engineers, too. It's as easy as that."

Easy or not, Baba and his boss, publisher Jin Inai, 41, gave the explanation to two "representatives" of the United States air force who visited the office in plain clothes. This was after the magazine's customary North American \$100 fee per Baba—created a sensation in Washington.

The air force men were ever so polite, Baba said, but they showed a deep and penetrating curiosity as to how Atsuryu was getting its information.

The two curious visitors apparently were satisfied with Baba's explanation. At least they left with polite expressions of good will and haven't been back.

Since then, Atsuryu has followed up its scoop with designs, or revealing articles on the super-secret Lockheed XP104 fighter, the Douglas C133 turboprop transport, and for October—with the Boeing B-47 jet bomber.

Atsuryu covers the aircraft of other countries, too, but the results are not so sensational because, Baba says, foreign firms aren't so generous with photographs. In America, he says, all plane makers they know of, with their cooperation, let him and his staff see the aircraft. In Europe, really, hand out promotional pictures of new planes as soon as the air force or navy lifts restrictions.

Baba estimates that 40 per cent of his readers are veteran fliers and the rest are teen- and college-age students.

Baba himself, now 28, was an extremely youthful test pilot for the Westinghouse jet engine, maker of the wartime "Betty" bomber. The other principal editor is Kinuo Hashimoto, also 28, a former naval aeronautical board draftsman.

These youngsters set up an underground series of technical articles on world aviation in general and Japanese aviation in particular. The copy is almost all technical, but once in a while there is a backdated glance at Japan's air role in Washington.

### Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Many seasoned hunters found it rather difficult to get a deer this fall but Ray Clark, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Clark, TWIN FALLS, thought it was easy. The hunt was his first, too, and he even had to borrow a gun.

But getting a deer is only a part of the story. The novice not only brought out the biggest buck from the Three Creek special hunt but the animal probably was one of the oldest ever brought from the area. There were only three points to the old critter's rack but the thickness of the antlers would have put 5000 lbs. to shame.

"I didn't know it was a big deer," the youthful hunter said. "I saw what I thought was a deer and got a little closer to investigate. When I saw a certain 'let him have it, I was only about 15 yards away."

The first shot wounded the big buck and the second one caught him behind the ear.

Naturalists claim the size of a deer's antlers are an indication of his vitality—not his age. The antlers are largest and have the greatest number of "points" when the buck is in his prime. As he gets older the number of points decreases.

The buck the Twin Falls youth killed had only three points on his rack but the antlers, at their base, measured six and one-half inches in circumference.

Checkers at the checking station in Rogerson said the deer was one of the largest ever killed in the Three Creek area.

Young Clark apparently comes by his hunting naturally. His uncle and namesake, Ray Clark, a THREES CREEK area rancher, killed a bobcat on his ranch with a rock last fall.

Clark surprised "the old lady" and two kittens feeding on a rabbit on some rocks. The kittens scurried for cover just about as fast as lightning but the mother cat wasn't about to give ground. Instead, she took one look at Clark and decided she didn't like him.
