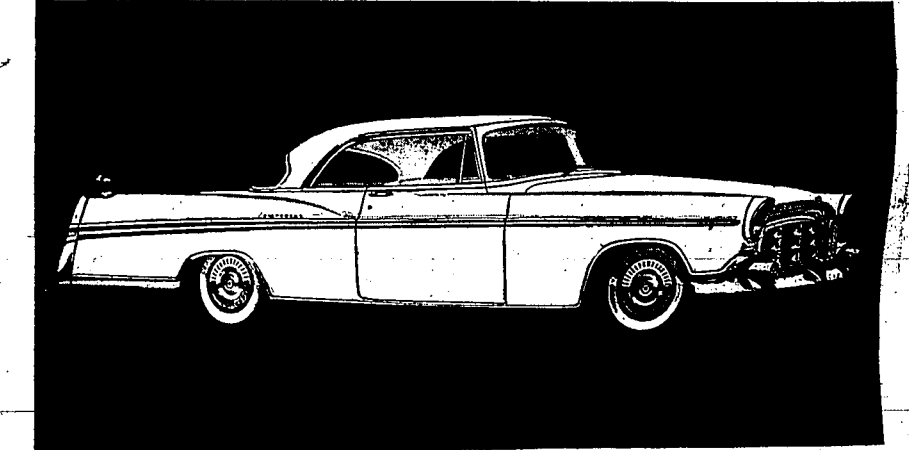

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 (AP)—Some powerful conservative southern Democrats were eyeing Senate Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson today as a possible presidential nominee for next year despite his heart attack.

These southern Democrats are adding to the growing speculation about whether Johnson's health would permit him to be a candidate.

President Eisenhower, however, has not suffered a heart attack this year—a moderately severe attack which kept him out of the senate during the final month of congress.

He has since been reported making a good recovery.

Many politicians have assumed that Mr. Eisenhower would remove himself as a candidate for reelection because of his attack. Those Democrats who would like to nominate Johnson would like to decide whether their party would risk nominating a candidate in similar circumstances even though the Texas senator is 56 years old.

Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D., Va., was reported by friends to be among the southerners eager to support Johnson if the Texas is available.

Sen. James H. Eastland, D., Miss., also is regarded as the most likely possible nominee for the 1956 nomination. But from outside the south, Sen. Mike Mansfield, D., Mont., has talked of nominating Johnson.

Mr. Johnson has many presidential ambitions, he has kept them about him. Before his heart attack, he was being talked to as a possible Democratic possibility for 1960, although the Democrats usually sprang the south in the choice of presidential candidates.

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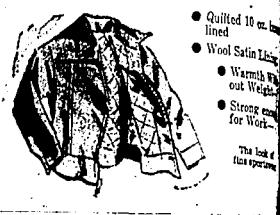

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 25 (AP)—Producer Otto Preminger threatened legal action today against the U. S. commissioner of narcotics for criticizing a picture he is making on narcotics addiction.

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Pheasant Hunting Success Falls Off from Last Season

Pella, Minidoka, Gooding and Lincoln counties reported 1,536 hunters killed 1,267 pheasants during the week-end. The average take was 2.2 of a pheasant per hunter. Last year, slightly more than 2,000 pheasants were checked. They had an average bag of 2.7 of a pheasant each. Hunters spent an average of 3.9 hours in the field for each bird during the first week-end of the current season. In 1954 the average was three hours per bird.

Noting that the figures indicate hunting was slightly poorer than at the opening of the 1954 season, Charles Blake, fish and game department biologist, Jerome, added:

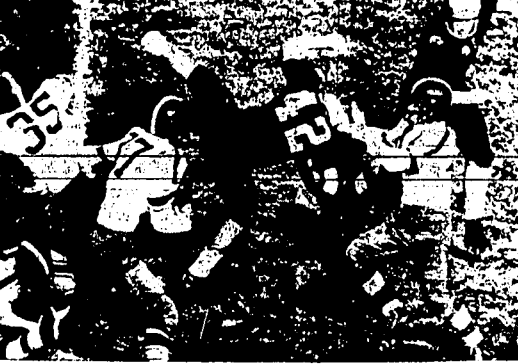

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Reds Fail to 'Collectivize' Polish Farms

By TOM REEDY
WARSAW, Poland, Oct. 13 (U.P.)—After 10 years of communist rule the independent farmer still is king in Poland. Only a tenth of the farms have been collectivized.

The kulaks seem to have won at least a truce with the red regime. The battle never ends, of course, in the open market the farmers can get five times as much for their grain as the government will pay. Naturally, they withhold grain from government bins. They get together in their farming communities and openly defy government orders to deliver grain.

Sometimes these tense situations go on for weeks at harvest time. Then one night two men—always a pair—call on the leading kulak and tell him his taxes will be increased five fold. From these two extreme positions, they then start to bargain and usually come to some compromise.

Old Poles Firm

A collective farm is almost a museum piece in old Poland. Most of the collectives are set-up in Bialysta, West Pomerania and East Prussia former German provinces. The Poles in this area are from the east. They are glad enough to have a piece of land they can call their own and so they do not have the deep resistance of the old kulaks who are sitting on top of their great-grandfathers' once held.

The brown-eyed Poles from the east have whipped the former German farmhands into what seems to be good shape. In a thousand-mile automobile tour of these areas, the correspondent saw virtually no fallow fields. Tractors and farm machinery were in abundance. The collectives have priority on machinery, of course. The kulak gets along with his horses.

Farmers Produce

Certainly the farmers are producing. The cities are loaded with food, especially dairy products. The cattle are imported mostly from Denmark when Poland ran out of the ashes of World War II. Smoked fish, fowl, butter, bread, potatoes and vegetables are the staples everywhere. Beef and veal are only so-so in quality and flavor.

There is a surplus of milk and government officials would like to export it. They dare not propose that, however, because they tell the public every child has to have his liter of milk a day—and public opinion, where food is concerned, is something to be reckoned with in Poland.

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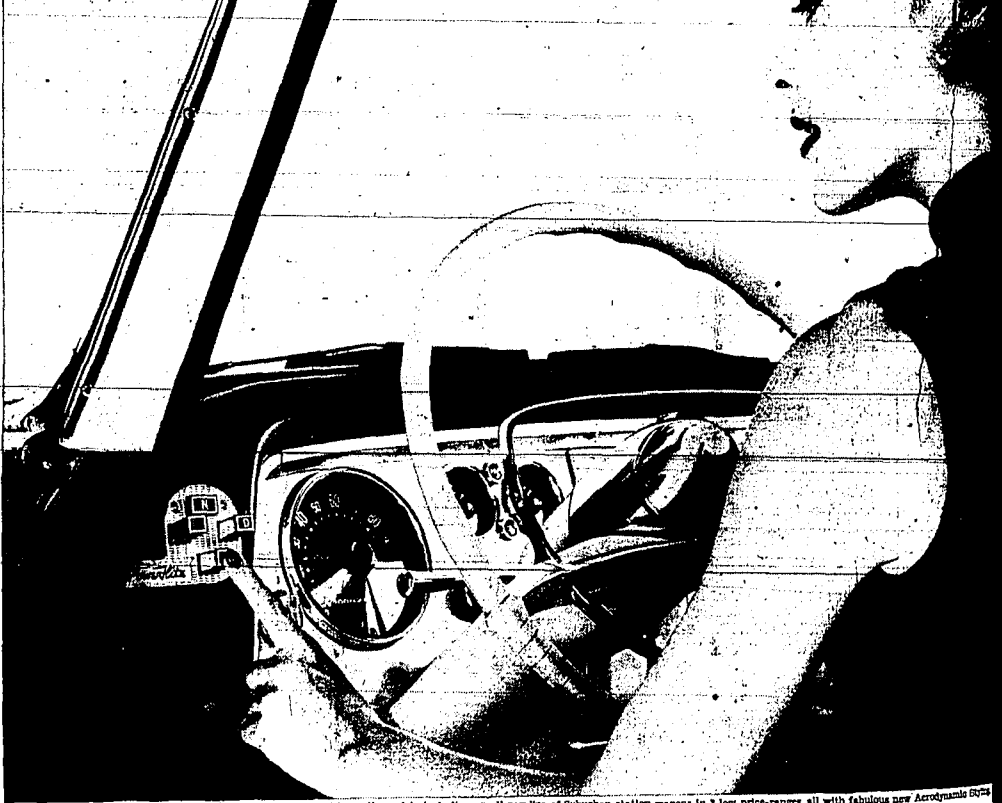
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
