Bachold, a member of Dr. Jonas Salk's original field trial testing team and the discoverer of live-polio virus in Cutter vaccines used in Idaho last spring, addressed a march of dime campaigners in the Hotel Boise yesterday.

Some warehousemen claim the yield of No. 1s this year may reach as high as 45 or 50 percent in some fields but that the average will be closer to 30 percent.

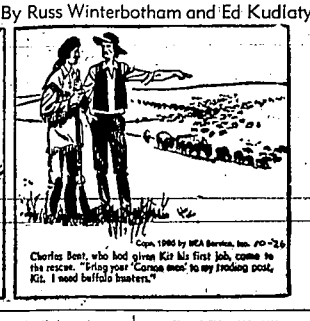

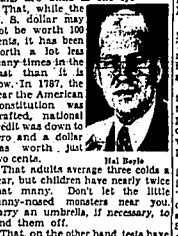

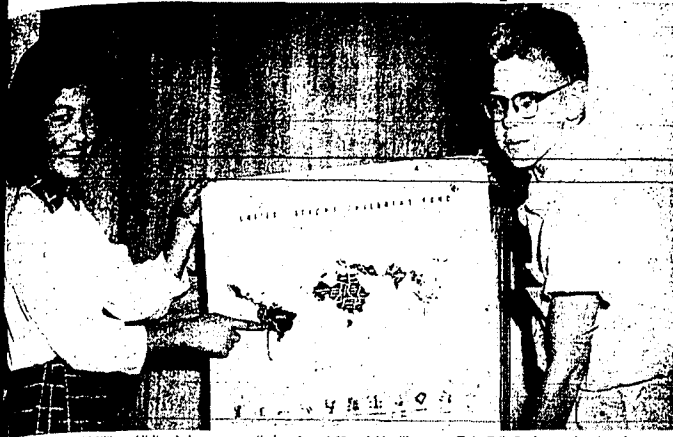

Church Leaders Asking Freedom

BERLIN, Oct. 26 (U-P)—East Germany's Protestant church leaders have tonight defied their communist government and appealed to the big four conference in Geneva to deliver 18 million Soviet zone Germans from oppression.

They charged the East German government with "robbing" of human rights proclaimed by the United Nations. A resolution by the Soviet zone leaders of Germany's dominant Evangelical church, released by the church's office in East-West Berlin, said the big four are "answerable to God for the future and the safety of the entire German people" because the big four insisted on Germany's unconditional surrender after World War II.

Idaho Fights Back in Case of Pheasants

BOISE, Oct. 26 (U-P)—The fish and game department released fewer pheasants but more pheasants from Washington county this year than last, game bird supervisor Robert S. Gaiter said yesterday.

Gaiter made the statement when asked to comment about remarks by Clare Mackrill of Weiser, a director of the third district Wildlife Federation.

Mackrill said the department was partly to blame for "the worst pheasant crop in history" in Washington county because it planted only 200 pheasants in the county, compared with 450 the year before.

Gaiter, in a prepared statement, said the department released 614 pheasants in the county this year, compared with 600 in 1954.

These included 300 adult hens and 14 roosters in the spring of 1955 to bolster the spring nesting population, and 300 young birds in August, mostly roosters, as compared with 200 adults in the spring, mostly hens, and 400 young in the summer of 1954.

Gaiter said figures show only 10 to 25 per cent of game farm releases end up in hunters' bags, so that the 100-bird reduction in the number of young released "represents a decrease of only about 25 birds, at the most, in the bag."

Lost Hunter Too Tired to Bag His Deer

BOISE, Oct. 22 (AP)—A 21-year-old hunter who was lost in the mountains without food or sleep for 26 hours said yesterday he saw three deer and could have had himself a deer steak but was too tired to shoot them.

Merlin Reuser of Boise told a reporter he "walked over two or three mountains" and neither ate nor slept while searching for his deer. He was found on a rugged French creek area near Idaho City.

"I had to keep awake to keep my fire going," he said. "About every half hour or 45 minutes, I had to rustle some more wood. There was frost on the ground and ice along the side of the creek. I couldn't be sure, but I believe it was French creek."

"I saw one buck by himself and two does later on," he added. "I could have shot any of them and had more deer steak, but was too tired and worried more about getting out than I was about eating."

Reuser and three hunting companions arrived at their campsite at 6 a. m. Sunday in the afternoon. They split into two groups. Reuser became separated from his companions and decided to try to find a deer on his own.

He said he "walked over two or three mountains trying to find a road or something familiar." Then he built his fire.

In the morning, he struck off downstream and was found by members of a ground search party. He was spotted by Sheriff John Williams about 45 minutes after the young hunter last spotted the deer.

The aircraft circled several points and made a beeline for camp, timing the way.

Reuser said this was his first trip into rugged country.

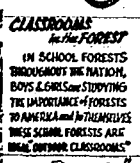

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Soviets Offer Arms Cheap

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—Egypt's arms deal with the communist bloc is reported to total 80 million dollars with individual weapons priced at about one tenth to one fifth of what western countries would charge.

Diplomatic officials who reported that yesterday said they understood the Egyptians have contracted to buy 200 Soviet MiG-15 fighters, 200 Russian tanks, half a dozen submarines and sizable quantities of artillery.

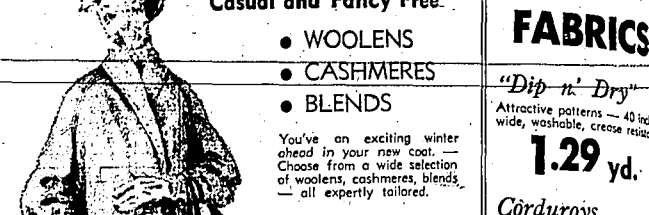

FBI Sees Crime Upsurge Checked

The year 1955 may show a long overdue break in America's long upward crime trend, according to the federal bureau of investigation. In its semiannual bulletin for 1955, just issued, the bureau points out that for the first six months of this year, crime was 1,126,250 compared with 1,126,000 for the corresponding six months of 1954. The decrease was only 7 of 1 per cent, but it is the first time in seven years that there has not been an increase. News charts below give breakdown of crime data.

Total major crimes in the U. S. declined seven-tenths of one per cent in the first half of 1955 as compared with the same months in 1954. Estimated crime totals reached 1,126,250, a decline of 7.50 per cent from the 1,214,140 total for the same period of 1954.

Crime decreased 14 per cent in cities in the first half of 1955. Biggest decrease was in robberies—15.3 per cent. Largest increase—10.4 per cent—was in rape. Estimates of city crimes—numbered at 711,410—exceeds about 30 per cent of the urban population.

Rural crimes showed almost no change, but the three hundredths of one per cent decrease represents an abrupt halt in rural-area crime totals that have been rising for many years. Number of rural crimes in first half of 1955 is estimated at 117,924.

Strike-Breaking Charge Levelled

NEW YORK, Oct. 26 (AP)—Clarence N. Saven, president of the AFL Air Line Pilots association, has been required to appear today or tomorrow before top AFL officials to answer charges that his union is helping United Air lines break a strike.

George Meany, president of the AFL, accused the pilots yesterday of "collusion" with the air line to end a strike called "hot Sunday" by the AFL Flight Engineers International association.

Meany said he had learned that pilots were taking the place of striking engineers. He commented that the pilots were acting "in clear violation of all trade union principles."

Former T. F. Resident Parlays Skunk Emblem, Road Signs Into Big Business

BOISE, Oct. 20 (AP)—"Tourists Must Not Laugh at Natives." "Don't Just Sit There! Nag Your Hubbands!" "Beasts of Skunkz!"

These admonitions—lettered on signs along western highways—are the work of a high-octane entrepreneur who calls himself "the skunk" and whose sense of humor has helped build a quarter-million-dollar service station empire.

Farris Lind started in the gas station business in 1940 by borrowing the price of a bus trip from his native Twin Falls to Boise.

Lind went to the capital to see then Gov. Chase Clark, who he says was threatening to put the state into the gasoline business because of the mounting prices at service stations.

Lind argued that the state should encourage small, independent service station operators instead. The governor arranged for the lease to him of an abandoned truck weighing station at Front street, the warehouse-lined artery over which U. S. highway 30 passes through Boise.

Lind, who previously had slight success in the wholesale gasoline distribution line, opened a tiny station and sold at cut rates.

For the first three weeks, he called his station "Boise Gas Save." Then his name and a comic strip gave him an idea. "Fearless Farris, the People's Friend" was born.

In October, 1942, Lind entered the navy. An avid flier, he served stateside as a flight instructor.

After World War II, Lind opened a larger station at his old stand, but he recalls "more or less neglected the gas business." He was off on a new venture—pioneering crop dusting in Idaho.

Then one day he ran an ad for his curio station which said, "The big boys call me a skunk." Business doubled within a month.

Lind ran follow-up ads and put up a new sign at his station. It read simply "The Skunk" and was accompanied by a logical emblem—a skunk.

Shortly afterwards, he started putting up his highway signs. He has since spread this service station business into three states and his signs into five.

Between Bliss and Rigerman in southern Idaho the signs are spotted with oblong stones. Up went a sign: "Petrified Watermelon. Take One Home to Your Mother-in-Law."

Lind also sent a crew to paint a field of the rocks green. They all have been taken.

Near the salt flats of Utah's Great Salt Lake, a sign queries: "Why go to Siberia? Work in our salt mines. Others say 'Salt Lake City is Full of Lonely, Beautiful Women' and 'Running Rabbits Have the Right-of-Way'."

As the advertising matter is on the back of the signs, inquiries about them go mostly to state officials. The Idaho highway department says almost all of the comments are favorable.

Dr. C. A. Robbins, Lewiston, when he was governor, praised the signs and wrote Lind in a postscript, "We haven't had a tourist laugh at a native since you erected that particular warning sign."

Some tourists don't laugh at the signs either. One woman wrote Utah Gov. J. Bracken Lee that some "moronic joker" had nearly spoiled her vacation, clattering up the roadside with signs "in bad taste" and "bordering on the obscene."

Himself a member of the LDS church, Lind has drawn fire for signs like the one warning Methodists to beware of Mormon crickets.

The biggest furor arose when Lind put up two barrels, painted pink and blue, on the desert south of Boise. The sign between them said, "Emergency Rest Rooms."

The joke amused many people, angered others. An official of the bureau of public roads joined in the protest, and the objects were removed. Lind, who thinks up most of the signs himself, says a woman tourist suggested this one.

"When we get too many complaints

on one, we take it down," he says. "I've given up trying to please everybody."

Lind has erected signs in northern Utah, western Wyoming and eastern Oregon as well as Idaho and Nevada. He now has an elaborate 12-pump station in Boise and stations in Salt Lake City, Ogden and Las Vegas.

He also has a competitor in Boise who advertises: "We don't smile, but we do understand."

NEW YORK, Oct. 20 (AP)—Sen. Richard B. Russell, D. Ga., yesterday expressed "great admiration" for Ohio Gov. Frank Lausche as a possible Democratic presidential candidate.

Russell said he liked Lausche as a "middle-of-the-road Democrat" and added he thought both Adlai E. Stevenson and New York's Gov. Averell Harriman "are too far over to the left."

The influential southern Democratic leader said he has "no intention of becoming a candidate in 1960."

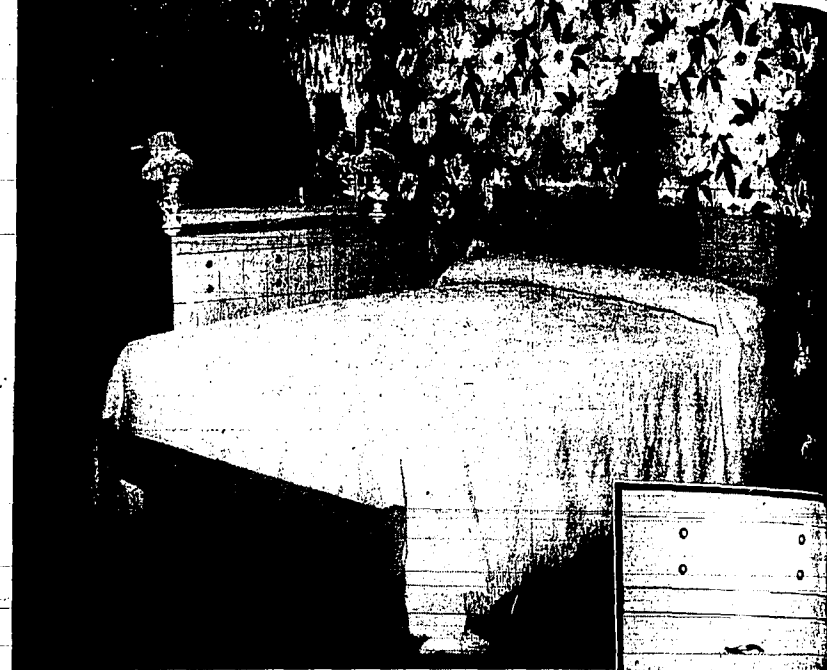

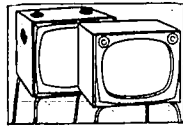

Jail Escapee Is Captured Without Tiff

MONMOUTH, Ore., Oct. 26 (AP)—Muttin Reyes, the jail escapee who shot and killed a man and terrorized the nearby college town of Corvallis, has been captured, state police reported last night.

Edward G. Lewis, police chief of the Willamette valley town, made the arrest of the 23-year-old San Francisco gunman in a restaurant here.

Lewis had been called to the restaurant by customers, who were attracted by a gunshot which Reyes was wearing on his shoulders as a cape.

Quietly Surrendered
Lewis said he went to the restaurant, approached Reyes and asked him his name. Reyes at this point admitted his identity and surrendered without resistance. He had a bullet wound in his arm.

Lewis said Reyes was unarmed and told him he had thrown his gun away earlier.

Reyes told Lewis of his escape from Corvallis by following the Willamette river banks up from Corvallis. He said bloodhounds which had been tracking him at times were only a few feet behind him. Other times they were several hundred feet behind him, Lewis quoted Reyes as saying.

Hurt in Battle
Reyes' bullet wound apparently was inflicted on his head by police, fatally wounding Jimmy Applepie, 33, Corvallis Monday night.

Reyes apparently was not in pain from the wound.

He was taken by state police to Eugene, 60 miles south of here.

Monday nights shooting climaxed a night of terror in which Reyes tried to hold two families hostage and wounded his partner after a jail break at Eugene, 60 miles south of here.

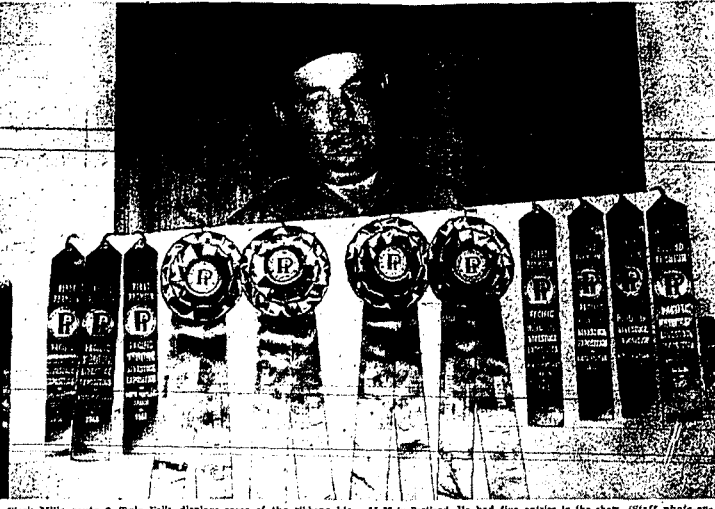

Airline Firm To Acquire Speedy Jets

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—United Air lines has ordered 30 jet airplanes which it says will whisk passengers from New York to Los Angeles in four and a half hours and from New York to Chicago in 90 minutes.

A UAL announcement last night said they will buy 30 Douglas DC-4s, the first of which will be delivered in November 1937. They will be the first jet aircraft in the domestic airline, the UAL said.

The jets will be built by Douglas Aircraft company, Santa Monica, Calif., and will cost about \$75 million dollars.

UAL President W. A. Patterson said they will carry from 115 to 140 passengers each. They will have fast and vibrationless ride at altitudes of 30,000 to 40,000 feet. They will average between 60 and 700 miles an hour.

At present, it takes seven hours and 45 minutes to make the cross-country New York to Los Angeles flight and two and a half hours to fly between Chicago and New York.

In addition, Patterson said, it will take only 11 hours to fly from New York to Honolulu, including an hour's stopover in San Francisco. The Chicago-to-Los Angeles time will be three hours and 20 minutes, while a New York to San Francisco flight will last four hours and 45 minutes, the UAL said.

Historic Craft Does Service At State Field

BOISE, Oct. 25.—The boaters of North American aviation who wonder whatever happened to "old 47-019" could find their answer Sunday morning at the state field. The aircraft taxi apron at Gowen field, Old 47-019 was the "bird." She was completed by North American, the only aviation firm which made a plane in 1947, of the American jet age.

An unusual ship by any standards. For one thing, she was designed as a killer but never saw a minute of combat.

Logged Road Times

And she's probably the only jet fighter in history that can log a 10th as much time on public highways as she can in the air.

Furthermore, what other jet ship can lay claim to the distinction of being stuck at least twice in roadside ditches and having its wings damaged on a highway shoulder bank?

The old lady is not flappable now and might never be again, but just because she's been turned out to pasture doesn't mean she isn't still doing a very vital service.

Transport

For 47-019 now used by the 100th air national guard squadron of Boise to train mechanics, armors and other ground crew personnel in the repair and inspection of jet-mechanics and weapons.

The ship was taken by the air force almost as soon as she rolled out of North America's assembly shop for use as a research craft at Wright-Patterson air force base in Dayton, O.

She was turned over to the air guard bureau with just 200 hours of air time and was assigned to the 100th, then known as the 100th, by Maj. Kenneth Nordling of the 100th, who commented as he set the old bird down on a grass field that she was the fastest 750 he had flown.

She was, however, grounded immediately and hasn't been flown since.

Performs Functions

But she performs many other useful functions in addition to helping train "week-end warriors." She makes an excellent display piece at the state field and other public places to give citizens some idea of the machinery Uncle Sam uses to protect the home shores.

It's impossible to estimate how many thousands of jet-minded children and adults craved over her fuselage and through her cockpit during the Meridian day show and western Idaho state fair this year.

It was during these two trips that the 750 piled up about 20 hours worth of time on the ground to get stuck in a ditch both outings.

Scraped Blown

On her way to the state field from fair grounds, riding piggy-back aboard a big truck, her wing tips scraped both sides of a ditch and had to be replaced.

Air guard 47-019 probably will be leaving the 100th when the squadron converts from a fighter-interceptor to an all-weather group and trades its 750 for P-51B interceptors this winter.

But the old bird will long be remembered by 100th crews as their extra-curricular escapades during the time those area civilian soldiers were cutting their jet teeth on her gleaming but non-flyable hull.
