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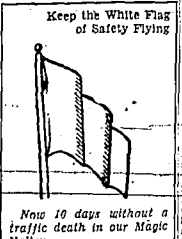

Strobel Says Post Has Not Helped Firm

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (AP)—Peter A. Strobel said today after he had been awarded the position of the government's chief real estate manager to further the interests of his New York engineering firm.

Mr. Strobel, who is president of the A. H. & N. Y. corporation, a New York engineering firm, said he may not have been an advocate of the conflict of interest statute.

Mr. Strobel said that it was a "question of delicacy" as to whether Strobel ought to have disqualified himself from recommending a client of his engineering firm for the job of remodeling a building in New York for use of the U. S. Immigration service.

The client, Serge P. Petroff, was awarded the contract after Strobel recommended him. Strobel said one of his clients is also a federal building contractor in New York.

Mr. Strobel added that in neither case did he or his firm profit from the work, or have any interest in it whatsoever.

Strobel was questioned before a house judiciary subcommittee in New York last week about whether there was any conflict of interest between his influential public relations firm, Strobel & Associates, Inc., and his private business interests.

Strobel is commissioner of public buildings service in the general services administration. He also holds a 50 per cent interest in the firm of Strobel and Salzman, engineering consultants.

He testified he acted on the advice of a "friend" in retaining his firm to identify the friend as Harry Smith, a New York businessman.

Shutdown on Polygamy in Utah Intended

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 27 (AP)—Amid hints that a statewide crack-down on polygamy is being planned, Salt Lake county officers here today one man and sought two more on charges of unlawful cohabitation last night.

County Atty. Frank E. Moss said a fourth man has been arrested to aid in reorganizing Davis county today.

Complaints against the three here were signed before the arrest of Peter Neely yesterday. Moss said the three had a total of 13 wives and 62 children under 18 years of age. The complaints, however, name only 12 wives.

"Taken" into custody yesterday afternoon was Louis Alma Kleckner, 49-year-old Salt Lake City tile worker who is accused of unlawful cohabitation with five women. He is being held in the Meier, Leona Barlow, Elmer Barlow and Guanna Merril Barlow and Barbara Barlow.

Names of the other two named in the complaint were withheld pending their arrest. Moss said investigations of other individuals was continuing.

Both Moss and State Atty. Gen. R. C. Callahan stressed that the investigation for polygamy has no connection with the LDS church, which abandoned the practice more than a half century ago.

Moss and Callahan said most of those believed practicing the practice are members of religious cults originally known as the Fundamentalists. Members of this cult were arrested in a raid by Arizona authorities two years ago on the Utah-Arizona border town of Short Creek.

George A. Hogan, 68, was found by members of his family, lying in the field he had been working, after he failed to come in for lunch.

In recent years, Hogan has won numerous trophies in both Idaho and Idaho for stock horses and has exported 100+ to various parts of the world and four children.

"Any woman who wants his hair to continue to take it," he said, "figure there's hair left from about 25,000 heads on that pile."

GM Sales and Profits Move To New High

NEW YORK, Oct. 27 (General Motors corporation, giant of the world's manufacturing corporation, yesterday reported its highest sales in more than 9 1/2 billion dollars for the first nine months of 1955. Profits also set a record.

This nearly equaled GM's best business for all of 1954. It was within striking distance of the 10 billion dollars in sales achieved in 1953, up to now the biggest year in the company's history.

Fast and furious sales of new automobiles lifted the nine-month sales total to a whopping \$9,540,000. In that period, GM sold 2,922,000 cars and trucks from the U. S. and Canadian plants—a gain of more than one million from the first nine months of 1954, when dollar sales of GM products came to \$7,218,000,000.

More cars were sold in the first nine months this year than in all of 1954.

Net earnings of the big automaker for the nine months also scored a new high at 913 million dollars. That was the profit, GM had after selling aside 1,063,000,000 for U. S. and foreign income taxes, and foreign income taxes.

Profits for the first nine months of last year, GM earned \$45 million dollars after taxes of 614 million dollars.

Spring Planting Advice Is Given

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—Too many carrots growing close together are bad as seeds when they fight each other for water, food and light, according to John Schoeneman, vegetable crops specialist at the University of Wisconsin.

"Currents up to six times as fast as in unthinned rows can be grown by pulling all but one seedling plant every inch or so along the row."

Proper thinning is also very important for other small seeded vegetables such as beets, celery, head lettuce, leaf lettuce, seed onions, parsnips and radishes.

Schoeneman says plants should be thinned soon after they come up.

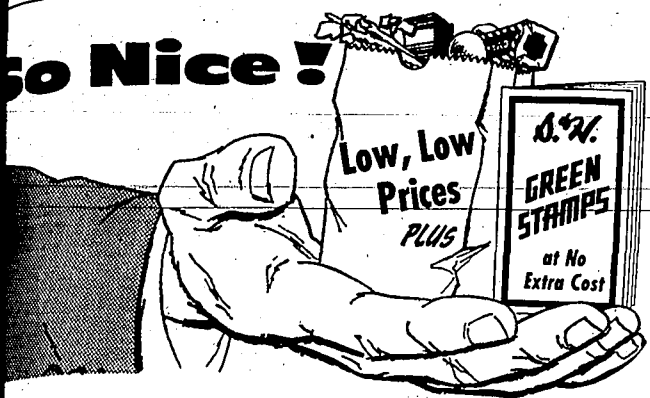

### Farm Policies Of Ike Played In New Blast

**BROOKINGS, B. D., Oct. 27 (AP).**—The senate agriculture committee was greeted today by a new blast by the Eisenhower administration's farm program from Republican farmer-legislator.

Sen. Harold G. Clegg, R-Iowa, who is also vice president of the State Farmer's Union, told the committee in a statement that "we are definitely opposed to any type of sliding scale price support."

That was a reference to the administration's flexible farm program under which five major crops are supported this year between 85 and 90 per cent of the "fair income" partly set. The range next year will be 75-90 per cent.

Clegg also delivered what he says was intended as a warning slap at GOP Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson. He said the administration's farm program is as important as the program itself.

The GOP legislator testified at the fourth of a series of "E" hearings, hearings mapped by the committee to gather advice from farmers before writing a farm bill next year. Another session is scheduled tomorrow at Minot, N. D.

Clegg urged the senators to approve a "house-passed" bill restoring the old Democratic program of rigid, 90 per cent of parity for five major crops "as a step in the direction of 100 per cent of parity for the family farm."

Clegg, like nearly all of 150 farmer witnesses interviewed by the committee in three previous sessions, also endorsed a government land rental program. Such a program would give farmers "partial" subsidies to farmers who put surplus-producing crop land into grazing or other uses.

Clegg also urged the government to "take over" insect viruses under contract with the government.

### Science Finds Way to 'Feed' Insect Larvae

**NEW YORK, Oct. 27 (AP).**—Scientists now have a faster, low-cost way to feed insects in the laboratory, according to a report in the journal "Science."

The scientists found that a technique has been developed for getting insects to eat through the mouths of insect larvae.

Unless you've looked at insect larvae through a high-power microscope, you have no idea how they eat. Their mouths can be "fed" the larvae of the fruit bud moth, which is a pest of quinces and apples.

The technique is less than a third of an inch from stem to stem.

The diameter of the critter's mouth is about one thousandth of an inch. It is now possible to get a needle into it and inject viruses directly. The triumph belongs to the scientists at the University of California, who are spreading his happy ailment among scientists everywhere.

Makes Needle

He took an "ordinary glass" hypodermic needle and ground the tip out, so it is now a fine needle. He broke off a usable length, smoothed the new end on a lathe, being careful not to block its now very thin channel.

This "stump" he attached with sealing wax to a micro-injector. The needle made a hole in the "fields" of the microscope. Then he put the larva but much larger than a whip of ether and shoved it into the needle.

Now under high-power magnification, his body parts were plain to see. With fine forceps, he picked it up and held the head capsule in place. He lifted it up to the needles point with his mouth foremost. A little pressure, and the mouth dropped open. He went the needle and through it injected viruses.

Marriott pointed out, in a technical publication of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, that heretofore scientists have been injecting viruses into insects by puncturing their bodies with needles. Either that or they have been starving insects and then letting them drink liquid containing viruses.

Exactness Needed

But those ways aren't exact enough, he said. In nature, insects acquire their sickness and killing viruses through their mouths. Starving insects "introduce an unnatural factor of unknown value to the permit."

What science needs to know is how much of what virus kills which insect. Marriott was engaged in the tedious research of finding out how much of a virus that specializes on the larva bud moth will kill all moths in the larval stage every time. The next step will be to find out how to get the viruses into mouth if not all larvae as they develop.

Science has had some notable success in controlling large pestiferous insects—such as the rabbit hordes of Australia—by infecting them with viruses which kill them but do not kill other animals. These are some dangers in the method. But Marriott said that the viruses are potentially the perfect insecticides. As an example, it is believed that a direct virus which kills ticks and kills the highly destructive Japanese beetle could be harmful to the very useful honey bee. But there's much to be learned about viruses.

### King Chooses New Premier; Avoids Fights

**By United Press**

King Paul of Greece seems to have headed off a possibly serious political crisis by appointing Constantinos Karamanlis as premier.

Paul has been accused more than once of oversteering his powers and interfering in Greek politics. It happened once here in 1921 when the late Field Marshal Alexander Papagos quit as commander-in-chief of the armed forces. Papagos accused the king of weakening the army by giving his court favorites high posts.

Papagos entered politics and as head of a new "Greek rally" party won a landslide victory in the 1926 election. He became premier.

The king overstepped his power again after Papagos died on Oct. 4. He passed over the two leading candidates for the prime ministry and gave Karamanlis the job. As a constitutional monarch, the king should have chosen a man who was recommended to him by the Queen regent.

Disparages from Athens seems to agree, however, that in naming him, the king may at least have thrown Greece back into the state of turmoil which existed before Papagos took office.

Karamanlis has the reputation of being pro-western. He has said that despite the bitterness in Greece over the Cyprus issue, the country will remain loyal to the allies with the North Atlantic Treaty Organization nations.

Karamanlis is 45, a lawyer, a dark and handsome man—5-foot-8. He made himself popular by carrying out an ambitious highway-building program as minister of public works.

### One Man Crusade Begins to Keep Pianos Rightly Tuned

**By HAL JOYCE**

**CLEARFIELD, Pa., Oct. 27 (AP).**—Al Rockwell lets others worry about international discord. But he can work himself up to a real place over the fact that most of America's pianos are out of tune.

He is afraid we are starting a new generation of young piano players who won't know middle C from the sound of chimpanzee screeching across a tin roof.

Rockwell, a professional musician for 25 years, has been tuning more than 100 pianos himself. Fearing piano tuning was becoming a dying craft, he started a school to teach this skill 10 years ago. It is one of fewer than a dozen piano tuning schools in the country.

"A piano is the most expensive piece of furniture in most homes," he says. "If something goes wrong with the television set, a repair man is called immediately. But if a piano is a little out of tune—oh, well, it's not worth bothering about."

This chronic apathy keeps Rockwell in a perpetual hurry. He's launched on a one-man crusade to create a world in which all pianos are not only tuned properly—but are kept that way.

Rockwell first became interested in piano tuning—or, rather, the lack of it—while playing reed instruments with a traveling band at the age of 17. On theater circuits he ran into every type of piano imaginable, most of them out of tune.

"When the band complained," he says, "the story was always the same: There was only one tuner in town and he couldn't be found. The pianos went untuned year after year. They were probably all out of tune."

Rockwell said the situation was even worse in the average home. Parents start a child on piano lessons and the child gets all steamed up after a few sessions on his teacher's piano. But when he goes home to practice on his own old out-of-tune instrument he can't get it to sound like his teacher's. He quits taking lessons.

"This happens over and over," Rockwell says. "Parents think any old piano is good enough for a child to start on. They say that after they've sure the child is really interested in playing, they'll get a better piano or have the old one brought up to pitch. By then it may be too late. The child's musical ear will be completely ruined."

But Rockwell doesn't go along at all with—many—musicians who say that a piano who may half the nation's pianos are outworn and should be junked and replaced. He says that children and young adults have a right to play on good pianos. He says that many of the old pianos are worth \$20 an instrument and that a family that can't afford to have a piano can't afford to have a piano that can't be played.

# Nixon Leads in Demo Thinking in Nationwide Poll on Possible Choices

Richard M. Nixon, 35, led in the nationwide poll on possible choices for president in the Democratic primary. He received 40 percent of the vote, followed by Dwight D. Eisenhower, 25 percent, and John F. Kennedy, 15 percent. Other candidates included Hubert H. Humphrey, 10 percent, and Adlai E. Stevenson, 5 percent.

The poll was conducted by the United Press and involved 100 men in most fields of adult activity. It was the first of a series of polls to be conducted in the next few weeks.

Reflecting the likely scramble for position in the GOP if Mr. Eisenhower steps aside, 13 Republicans received varying numbers of "first choice" votes. There were only six Democrats sharing "first choice" votes.

**Republicans:**  
Vice President Nixon is top man for 1956 in the collective judgment of those polled but he is a long way from a majority choice. Nixon got 6,336 first place votes and one as a second choice alternate.

Chief Justice Warren scored 25 and one. Then came Dewey and Milton Eisenhower, the president's brother, with six choice each. It is apparent that they and the other Republicans have far to go.

Other Republicans getting "first choice" votes were Knapland and Gov. Goodwin J. Knight, both of California; Secretary of Treasury George M. Humphrey, Ohio; Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, New York; apocryphal presidential assistant Harold E. Stassen, Minnesota and Pennsylvania; FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, District of Columbia; Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, Massachusetts; Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr., New York and Gov. Christian A. Herter, Massachusetts.

An important factor in Nixon's political situation is suggested by a study of the other Republican choices. Most of them are Eisenhower Republicans or liberal Republicans as contrasted with the right wing of the party. It seems fair to assume that the right wing Republicans centered almost exclusively on Nixon while the other Eisenhower Republicans are from California—Nixon, Warren, Knapland and Knight.

And the fact that Dewey tied for No. 3, even in so limited a sampling, suggests that his previous times as assistant Harold E. Stassen, Minnesota and Pennsylvania; FBI Director J.

**Democrats:**  
The sampling indicated the Democrats already have narrowed their field to three likely contenders—Stevenson and Harriman are well to the front. Tennessee's Senator Kefauver is regarded as a contender.

Only five persons in this sampling believe Kefauver to be the likely Democratic nominee, the five being scattered in the south, midwest and northwest. Both Stevenson and Harriman were picked in every national geographical area.

Only three other Democratic names were returned. Sen. Stuart Symington—Mo., "scored two first place votes; Sen. John J. Sparkman, Ala.—two and Gov. Frank B. Lausche, Ohio, one.

The sampling obtained some salty comment: An eastern labor leader said "Eisenhower will not be rejected. Labor will see to that."

A midwest university president said Milton Eisenhower would be

nominated and elected "if the people had any sense."

A midwest labor leader said "they're crazy if they nominate Nixon."

An eastern industrialist said "a wild guess—and it is wild—J. Edgar Hoover and Senator Symington."

A southern manufacturer said he always had been a Republican but that the party has no one worth nominating, adding, "I'll probably vote Republican again."

A midwest executive: "I think Nixon will get the Republican nomination. I just don't see how the Republicans can nominate anyone else, even though they might want to."

A southern businessman said "no matter whom the Republicans nominate they don't stand a chance—unless, of course, it is President Eisenhower."

Despite the pledge of anonymity, perhaps Texas cotton farm J. V. Moss will forgive this direct attribution to him of an opinion given as he prepared to plow under his big-irrigated crop.

"Hell, it's too early to tell. And besides, it doesn't make any difference who's President. We'll still have control, quotas and allocations."

### Salt Problem For Pretzels Gets 'Licked'

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—The pretzel bakers of America have been having a salt problem but they think they have it licked. This news was a highlight of the 15th annual convention, just concluded here, of the National Pretzel Bakers Association.

Members of the convention were "in a miracle-of-the-pretzel industry," the miracle being the way the industry has grown.

According to Alex V. Tisdale, Pottsville, Pa., executive secretary of the institute and editor of its monthly publication, The Pretzel Baker, Americans now eat 250 million pounds of pretzels a year. The industry, he said, will do \$8 million dollars worth of business in 1955.

**Problem Licked**

One of the most important events of the year's convention, according to Tisdale, was the report of the legislative committee.

Before World War II salt companies supplied pretzel bakers with a special high quality coarse grained salt that stood up without melting under oven temperatures of 500 to 600 degrees. But during the war, salt supplies switched to methods which produced a salt the pretzel bakers didn't like. For one thing, the grains were too hard around the edges. They cut the cellophane bags in the air and moisture.

Well, the salt committee reported, the salt makers are now making a salt similar to the salt produced before the war, which is completely satisfactory.

**Types Enumerated**

There are some 90 pretzel manufacturers in the United States. Twenty-eight, producing about 65 per cent of all U. S. pretzels, belong to the Institute.

The pretzel has come a long way since its origin back in the dark ages. The pretzel, besides, an artisan of antiquity, is on his way out. His fate was sealed in 1933 when someone invented the pretzel tying machine. Pretzels are now made in a variety of sizes and shapes, including the big boy or penny pretzel, cocktail pretzel, Indian or nugget pretzel, and the long loop pretzel.

The loop pretzel is ubiquitous and flourishes only in Cincinnati, O., and coviana.

There also are poppyseed pretzels, rye pretzels, cheese pretzels, hard pretzels (for salt), and pretzels containing vitamins or iron and other minerals.

There are recipes for pretzel crumbs to use in pie, pretzel kabobs, and pretzel ducks.

**History Recounted**

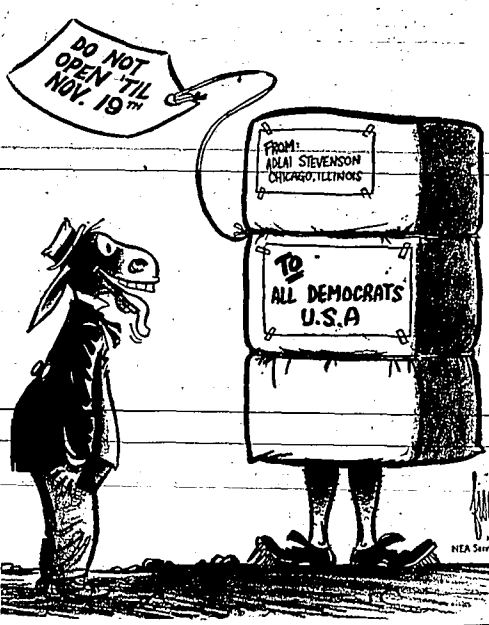
According to Tisdale, the pretzel was invented in 610 A. D. by monks in the kitchen of a monastery in southern France or northern Italy. Having some bits of dough left over from a baking of bread, he rolled them out and looped them in a figure-eight to represent children's arms folded in prayer.

The monks called his invention "pretzel" a Latin word meaning "this reward." The name got corrupted in Austria and Germany to "pretzel" and "pretzel."

The pretzels were given to children as a reward for saying their prayers and to children who had been good.

Children are still great consumers of pretzels.

### Farm Plights Exaggerated, Says Benson

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson said today politicians are exaggerating the plight of the nation's farmers.

Benson, central figure in the controversy about farm policies, declining farm income, prices of farm products, and the new pork purchase program, asserted that politicians are deliberately kicking up a storm without cause.

"The farm program now in operation is the result of a year's study and was adopted on a bipartisan basis," Benson said in an interview.

A farm program should not serve partisan political purposes. Yet a determined effort is underway to paint the picture blacker than it really is. Some politicians are not helping farmers much by their comments."

He answered with a grin only when asked if he thought those persons who advocate a return to 90

per cent of parity price supports should shut up. Advocates of 90 per cent of parity say it would jack up farm income.

Benson did not refer by name to those who have advocated recently a return to price supports of 90 per cent of parity—some on a temporary basis.

Criticism of the administration's farm program has been severe. Benson has been pressured by high ranking politicians of both parties, farmers and farm groups in the Midwest, and others to do something about the economic situation of farmers. Indications are the clamor is mounting and is getting White House attention.

The allied bid for the reunification of Germany is expected to be helped by the result of the Saar referendum. Germany's future is the key issue to be decided at the Big Four foreign-ministers conference which has opened in Geneva.

There is no likelihood, however, that Russia is going to change its policy. That policy is to keep Germany divided.

Aside from that, France may be somewhat lukewarm in its support for the United States-British argument for unification.

France hardly can be blamed if it thinks its interests in the Saar vote and related developments, a sort of "there we go again" warning to the rest of the world, are being served by the referendum.

Saxland, the French nationalist spirit whipped up a former Nazi, rejected the proposal that they accept "European" status by a vote of 27.1 per cent to 22.9 per cent.

The former Nazi is Heinrich Schneider. He has made himself here to nationalize throughout Germany.

France must have voted that when they returned to the Saar to vote against the proposed European status he was attacked.

Japan is the slippery diplomat who kept the pre-war German Weimar Republic's Adolf Hitler get into power.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (AP)—Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney, D. Wyo., said today the Republicans are searching vainly for "a glamor candidate to replace President Eisenhower and conceal" a party split.

The Wyoming Democrat told a reporter that Sen. Dennis Lehman will nominate a man "whose purpose is to serve all segments of our society."

O'Mahoney said that "the Republican national committee is now engaged in a search for a glamor candidate who will occupy the seats of power between the followers of the late Sen. Robert A. Taft and former New York Gov. Thomas E. Dewey.

"But I don't see where they can find one," O'Mahoney continued. "They can't find anyone now to conceal the fact that the Republicans who occupy the seats of power are representatives of concentrated business."

O'Mahoney did not designate his choice of Democratic candidates, though in appraising them he mentioned only Adlai E. Stevenson and New York Gov. Averell Harriman.

He said Stevenson "made an excellent record in 1952 and would fill this role of a Democratic candidate next year."

Harriman, like Stevenson, has had a long and efficient record as a businessman and statesman," the Wyoming Democrat continued. "He served in both the international and domestic fields affected" by the presidency.

### Western Character Will Be Utilized To Help in Publicizing State of Idaho

BOISE, Oct. 27 (AP)—A Boise advertising man says he has the answer to the problem that has bothered some people since Lewis and Clark first laid eyes on Idaho 150 years ago.

The problem: How do strangers get to the place, what do they look for when they arrive, and how can they be sure it's worth the trouble.

The man, John Givens, whose company recently landed an account of \$25,000 a year or more to handle the tourist promotion campaign for Idaho's department of commerce.

And the answer: "Salmon River Bill."

Givens is a character—still on the drawing board—whom Givens hopes will popularize Idaho throughout the nation, giving the kiddies something to chuckle over and adults something to remember, especially when next year's vacation rolls around.

"Our artists are working on it now," said Givens.

"We want a character with a western flavor."

"But we definitely don't want a cornball."

Final drawings of the character will be submitted to the department's publicity and development council at its next meeting in Boise, Nov. 7.

After that, millions of facemasks will be produced to be on the nation's eyes on billboards, travel folders, car stickers and in advertisements in newspapers and magazines and on radio and television.

"We want everyone in the state government to stick it on their official envelopes, and every manufacturer to put it on his product going out of the state," Givens said.

Many of the department's letters will be signed, "Salmon River Bill."

His answer to Smokey the Bear and Paul Bunyan, Givens said.

Smokey the Bear has been used by the forest service—and taken up by lumber companies—to popularize fire safety in the woods. Bunyan has been put to work with considerable success in the Minnesota state advertising program.

The agency chose the name and the department approved Givens' plan because the Salmon is the only river wholly within Idaho and because it cuts nearly across the center of the state—between the north and the south of the state.

Aside from promoting Slim, added Givens, "we plan to do everything we can which doesn't cost."

He said that means persuading Idaho motel and hotel operators, lumbermen, petroleum dealers and other businessmen to let in state advertising as much as possible with their own promotion programs.

Much of the \$25,000 budget for the current year will go for printing 100,000 copies of an Idaho travel folder to be distributed to travel associations and tourist groups throughout the country.

Some of it will be spent on newspaper and magazine advertisements.

Givens added, but they'll be small ones because "we couldn't swing a full page color ad in a national magazine with our entire budget."

Commerce Secretary A. B. Johnson said he may be able to allot the advertising campaign another \$15,000 for the year.

The 1956 legislature appropriated \$100,000 for the department, one-half to be taken from highway-user revenues. But State Treasurer Ruth Nixon has refused to release the highway funds, pending a court decision. She says the Construction armachs them specifically for road construction and maintenance.

Outside Idaho, the department will concentrate on families in the midwest and along the Pacific coast, areas which in the past have furnished the largest number of tourists to Idaho.

Inside the state it will use billboards and scenic markers to persuade the tourists to tarry a little longer.

Givens said he has figures to show that about 3 1/2 million tourists drive through southern Idaho on U-S-90 highway each summer, with barely a pause en route to the Pacific coast.

"We'll be doing our job if we can get just 10 per cent of them to stay an extra day," he said. Figuring \$10 per person for an overnight stop with treats, that would mean another \$3,500,000 in the pocket for Idaho.

### Judge Will Study Service Transfer

CHICAGO, Oct. 27 (AP)—A request of the major railroad brotherhoods to block the transfer of Chicago-Omaha railroad service from one line to another is being studied by a federal judge.

The railroad unions contend the transfer, scheduled to take place Sunday, would cost the jobs of 700-1,000 workers. Involved are about 25 trains which for the past 75 years have been operated between Chicago and Omaha by the Chicago and North Western Railway. They are scheduled to be shifted to the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific railroad's tracks.

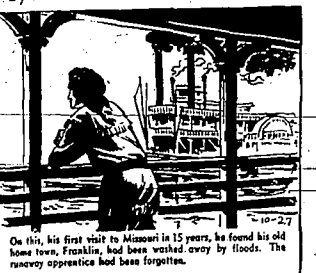

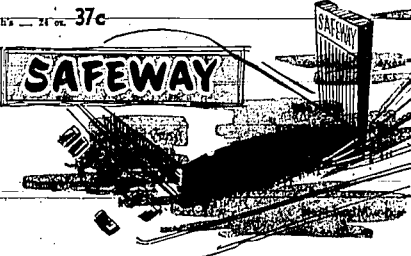

### 50-50 Chance Is Given For Talk Success

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (UP)—The American public in a poll from responsible men here and abroad that there is no more than a 50-50 chance, if that, for success at the foreign ministers conference which began today in Geneva.

The "acid test" description of the conference is not something new and enters only after the July big four conference could be carefully reviewed and considered.

President Eisenhower used the phrase last July 25. He was fresh from the Geneva summit on that evening and made a TV report to the nation. The President said there had been mutual assurances at Geneva of a new spirit among the big four heads of state. But he said the "acid test" of Geneva's sweetness and light would come only when the foreign ministers met. They now are meeting. Mr. Eisenhower repeated the phrase yesterday.

The big four at Geneva merely agreed that the foreign ministers should meet to seek solutions to problems which the big four cited for their attention. They are the linked problems of European security and German unification and the matter of cultural exchanges among the nations.

Not since the big four met has there been more than a shred or two of evidence that the Soviet Union will accept any security or unification arrangements which would be acceptable to the western powers—France, Great Britain, and the United States.

Before Secretary of State John Foster Dulles took off for Geneva and after he had conferred with Mr. Eisenhower, the secretary could express only "measured hopes" for a successful conference.

Adlai E. Stevenson told a Chicago audience this week that the Geneva spirit, so widely acclaimed after the summit meeting, had not "blunted the sword of communist military power or political ambition."

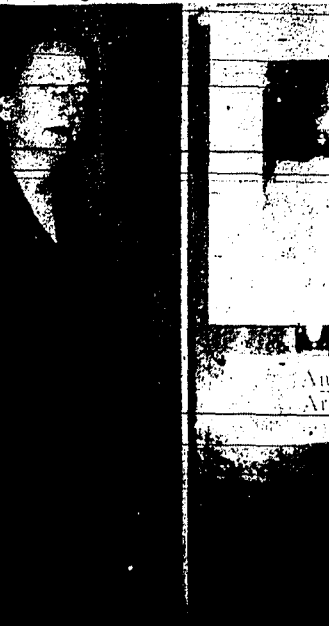

### Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

There comes a time in the lives of little girls in their pre-teen years a desire to write notes to their friends—usually to their girlfriends, as they have not as yet become interested in boys. In that instant, it is an innocent pastime and seems to meet one need in the first stage of growth. Only if it becomes a major interest, so that lessons and home duties are neglected, will it call for any serious attention.

Many a mother will remember how she and her best friend had a postoffice in a hole in the old sign wall into which they smuggled a note and took one out daily and what a thrill of satisfaction, what a warmth of heart it gave her to make the exchange and to write the message for the next day. Think of that! But there are notes and letters.

Children are not to write notes to each other during school hours. There can be no need for it, there can be no place for it. If, as they should be, the children are occupied with their lessons they will not have the time to think about writing a note. Doing so indicates that they are not attending to the lesson, not learning as they should, and that situation demands immediate attention from both teacher and parent.

There is another kind of note writing that I look at with a suspicious eye—writing to strangers, striking up a correspondence with someone quite unknown to the writer, or to any member of the family. In my experience this is a wise proceeding. Any young person who wants a letter-writing friend can have one that is sponsored by some reliable person, such as a family friend, relative, teacher—somebody who knows the background of the stranger and will vouch for him. Letters have an odd way of coming up at unexpected most inopportune times and having effects nobody dreamed of their having.

Some children find release in writing to stranger correspondents, and they pour out the innermost secrets of their beings. They feel free to do this because they never expect to see this person, nor to have any closer contact with him than this distant one of correspondence. One never knows. Children should be encouraged to give their confidence to those whom they trust well and who are known to their families as friends.

Letter writing can be a wholesome, enriching experience when it is between friends or between two strangers of known character. Where children are concerned, such

**Wonders Are Acclaimed for "Wave Tube"**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (AP)—A thing known as the "traveling wave amplifier tube" has normally dead electronic engineers glowing for their own electrominuscule diad faces.

They predict a wonder-filled career for it. It makes possible almost instantaneous transmission of thousands and even millions of telephone conversations for long distances without scrambling.

It extends the range of radar. It looks like the answer to enemy guided missiles. It already is playing a number of military roles, all of them classified secret.

The new tube was discussed here at a two-day meeting of the electron devices section of the Institute of Radio Engineers.

The big thing about the new tube is its ability to give powerful amplification to a very narrow range of frequencies—everything from the human voice on up.

A long thin tube described in a paper presented here is roomy enough in its amplification range to accommodate four million voices simultaneously.

The chokes this one tube can perform were either impossible before its development or could be handled only by many ordinary tubes.

Because it is capable of picking up extremely feeble signals, the new tube makes it possible to space

**Suicide Uses Plane, Makes His Revenge**

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 27 (AP)—A disgruntled ex-air force pilot killed himself when he apparently deliberately crashed his small rented plane into the airport bank branch where he was fired as a teller Tuesday, police said today.

The only injured person was the bank official who fired the crash victim, Benjamin Fauts.

"He apparently tried to get even with the bank," said A. L. Wagon, one of the investigating officers at the crash scene yesterday. "That's only a guess, of course, but he apparently had some reason to fly into it."

Fauts, 29, of nearby Azusa, was killed instantly in the crash of the single-engine airplane plane into the Bank of America's International airport branch, Police and civil aeronautics administration investigators said Fauts apparently turned off the engine and glided the plane directly into the bank.

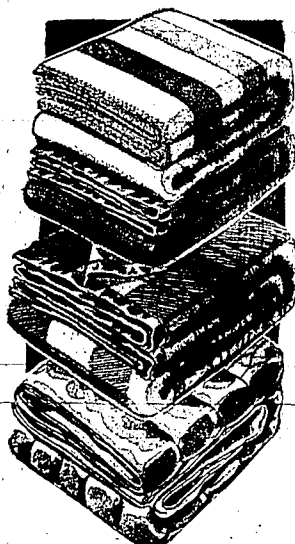
