Rival Peace Plans Prove West and Reds Are Still Far Apart on Top Issues

GENEVA, Oct. 28—The west and Russia today handed to each other rival "peace packages" that showed them still hopelessly far apart on how to end the cold war. The peace offers were contained in western and Soviet draft security treaties put forward at the second plenary session of the big four foreign ministers conference.

The west's package called for a "treaty of assurance" against aggression for an indefinite period of time. But it was made conditional on Soviet agreement to all the conditions and German unity in 1958.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28—The White House said today that it was not only untrue but completely unfounded that a published report that some members of President Eisenhower's cabinet had tried to oust Secretary of Agriculture Benson.

The report was carried by Farm Journal Magazine, one of the largest farm publications. The Agriculture Secretary, Harold E. Benson, launched the ouster move after Eisenhower's Sept. 24 heart attack.

"It was the only time he was impolite. He then requested Mrs. Zipes to lead him into the living room, where her mother-in-law, Mrs. Lucille Zipes, was watching television. Two children, Daniel, 2, and Douglas, 8 months, were asleep in a bedroom.

"I've just escaped from San Quentin," Daley explained. "I don't want to harm you, but I need help to get away."

Daley said he wanted money, clothes and a car. He smiled and

Russia Ready To "Deal" on Tough Issues

GENEVA, Oct. 20—Russia, with foot already in the Middle Eastern door, was reported ready yesterday night with a new diplomatic initiative to expand her influence in the region.

Western diplomats said they expected the Soviet offer to be the West in organizing a new collective security alliance which would include all the states of the Middle East to act against aggression.

There was no confirmation of the Russian Soviet declaration sources. Russian leaders, however, sized the idea publicly soon after the parley of Big Four government chiefs here in Geneva.

The United States, Britain and France now have no objection of any form, full-scale discussion of the Middle East with Russia is being held in the Soviet drive for friends and influence in the sprawling and seething Middle East.

Along the desert frontiers of Palestine, Israeli forces clashed in turn with both Egyptian and Jordanian troops. Each side blamed the other for the trouble in both widely reported incidents.

In Cairo, Egypt, Saudi Arabia signed a defense pact that reportedly would unite the two nations against a common enemy.

Following a similar agreement reached last week between Egypt and Jordan, there were signs that Syria is planning the same sort of deal with neighboring Lebanon.

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Rally Speaker Found in Wastes

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 28 (AP)—A meteorite weighing 106 pounds has been found by a California student in the barren waste of northern Greenland, it was announced yesterday.

Dr. Johannes C. Toeslen, of the Danish Meteorological Institute, said the "sensational" find was made by James Coll. Burbank, Calif., an American geologist in Thule, Greenland.

The meteorite—the finding of which is considered by Toeslen to be "more rare than quadruplets"—has been shipped here for presentation to the Danish museum.

Explorer Robert Peary found a 40-ton meteorite early in the century in the same territory, and a three-tonner was discovered by Danish explorer Knud Rasmussen some years later.

Utah Asserts Cult Members Leave Region

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 28 (AP)—"One by one" Utah's estimated 5,000 to 70,000 Fundamentalists may cause some of the polygamy suspects to leave the state, officials admitted today, but authorities said they would be glad if that is what happens.

In the campaign that began Wednesday, two men with 10 wives and 23 children have been arrested and two others with seven spouses and 21 children have eluded sheriff's deputies who have warrants for their arrest.

"Our jails aren't big enough to hold them all," said Attorney General E. R. Callister, Jr. "We know that since we started a special investigation some of these people have left the state, but that's just fine."

The Fundamentalists, whose members have been involved in at least three polygamy drives in Utah and Arizona in 12 years, is a group whose members claim to be following the original teaching of the Mormon faith. However, the established practice of polygamy in 1890.

Carl Eugene Jensen, 54, chief executive at the new big Clerks field supply depot near Ogden, faced a similar charge after his arrest Monday but was released from Davis county jail on \$1,000 bail.

Unlawful cohabitation complaints were filed against Heber C. Smith and David Brigham Darger, but they evaded arrest.

Salt Lake County Attorney Frank McKee and other authorities said wives whose husbands had been jailed or had left home would be allowed to remain with their broods and would be given state welfare aid if necessary for food and clothing. Mrs. also reported that habitual criminal charges carrying a life sentence would be filed against any men who had previous criminal convictions, "so we can end this thing in Utah once and for all."

Anti-American Author Given Nobel Award

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 28 (AP)—Author Halldor Kiljan Laxness of Iceland, a longtime monk known for his anti-American views, yesterday won the 1955 Nobel prize for literature.

The 50-year-old Laxness is a winner of the Nobel prize in the United States but left in 1930 after a public clamor against him.

American novelist Ernest Hemingway won out over Laxness last year.

Laxness, who terms himself an "idealistic socialist" has publicly deplored the North Atlantic Treaty Organization which includes Iceland.

He has said he is without particular leanings toward Russia, but has been a favorite in the communist literary world. Many of his earlier writings attacked life in the United States.

The author has been in hot water with U. S. immigration authorities. He first tried to enter the United States in 1922. Ordered back to Denmark, he embraced Catholicism and entered a Belgian monastery as a monk. He left one year later to resume writing poetry, short stories and novels. He married twice.

In 1927, Laxness was admitted to the United States and went to California where he wrote two articles denouncing the movies.

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 27 (AP)—More than 1,500 former employees and contributors to the newspaper La Prensa have urged Dr. Juan Peron Gaitan to let them wait for a "new hour for freedom and law in the republic" was not in vain.

The signers voice confidence that La Prensa and its staff will be relieved of the "unjust injuries they have suffered and that the nation will receive early reparation for one of the most shameful outrages ever committed against it."

Two Invasions of Israeli Reported

JERUSALEM, Oct. 28 (AP)—Israeli military spokesmen claimed yesterday that Egyptian and Syrian military units had penetrated Israeli territory in two different demilitarized zones, and said one Syrian soldier was believed killed.

Another spokesman earlier said a Syrian military unit entered the demilitarized zone near Dan in northeastern Galilee and clashed with an Israeli police patrol, then withdrew. He said the Syrians took the body of one of their men back with them across the border.

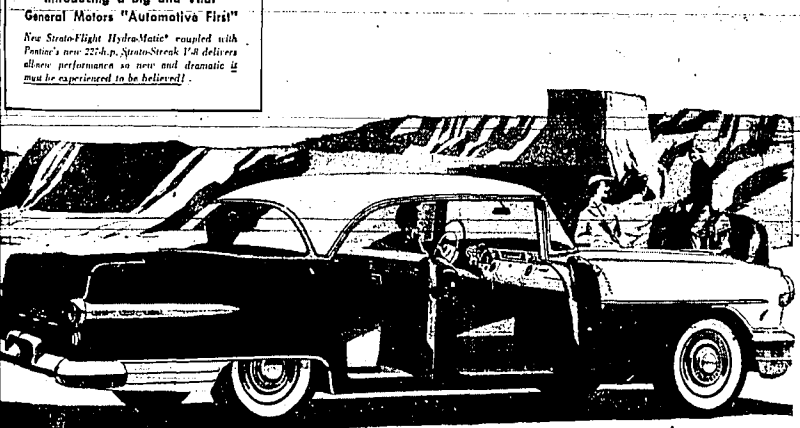

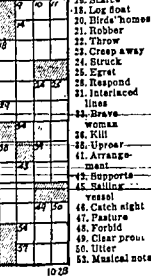

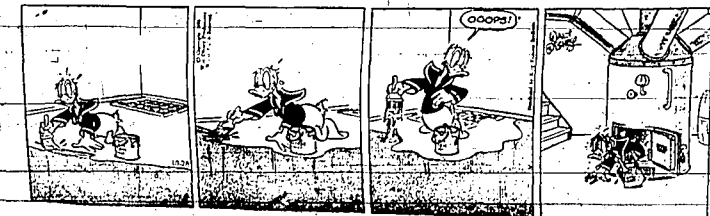

Most of Mrs. Allen's life has been closely linked with DAR work and with the history of Magic Valley. Genealogy has been a hobby with her for many years and in tracing her own she discovered she had 14 ancestors, one of them a woman, who fought in the American-Revolution.

She came to Idaho in 1908 with her family and resided first in Hagerman valley. The following year her parents moved to the Twin Falls tract to homestead. That same year she was married to Granville Allen, a native of the Hagerman valley. For the brief time she lived in Hagerman valley she resided at the site of the old Lewis ferry, the first ferry in southern Idaho. Faure Facing Vote Test in Near Future

PARIS, Oct. 28 (AP)—Premier Edgar Faure's plan to hold national elections in December moved one step nearer yesterday. A committee of constitutional assembly voted to give the subject urgent consideration.

The government was expected to insist that debate in the full assembly open Friday night, immediately after a scheduled vote of confidence.

If the government wins. Under the tentative plan being considered debate would continue Saturday and a final decision be reached by Sunday or Monday.

The deputies were busy with committee meetings and no final party positions have been taken but there was a feeling in assembly lobbies that the chances of the government winning the confidence vote were improved. Thursday morning it seemed inevitable that Faure would be defeated. Two halts on procedural questions went against the government and Faure asked for the con-

ference vote, automatically shutting off debate.

The vote on the conference question will cover rejection of a Eodist resolution which expresses no confidence in the government and adoption of another resolution which "takes note" of the government's statements on its general policies.

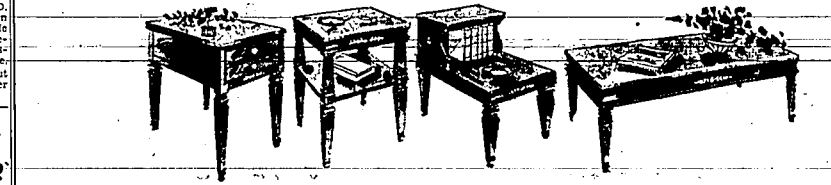

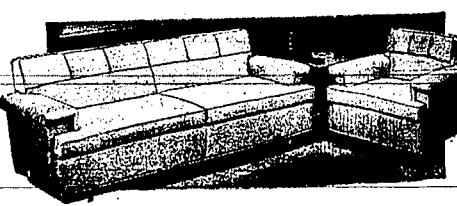
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
